RULES

For the Government of the Wilmington Annual Conference.

I, DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

1. The President shall call the Conference to order punctually at the time determined upon for the opening of its sessions, have each opened by appropriate devotional exercises, and see that all the business pertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and transacted in a proper and orderly manner, according to the provisions of the Discipline, and the rules of the Conference and the rules of the Conference.

2. He shall preserve order in all of the proceedings, holding speakers strictly to the question, and call them to order when they wander from the point, violate the Rules of Order, or use any improper language.

3. He shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference by any two members.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

5. When two or more members claim the floor at the same time, he shall decide who is entitled thereto.

II. DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

1. The Secretary shall keep a fair and correct record of all the proceedings of the Conference, to be read at the opening of each session subject to correction by the Conference.

2. He shall carefully preserve the journals and papers of the Conference placed in his custody, and shall not allow any person but a member to examine the same, nor allow any one to make a transcript from either, without the permission of the Conference; he shall produce the journals and papers at each annual session, and see that the same be forwarded to General Conference.

3. In an appendix prepared for that purpose, he shall record all reports and documents ordered upon record by the Conference, and all documents so recorded, shall be referred to on the journal.

III. DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.

1. Each member of the Conference will be expected and required to be present at the opening of each session, to participate in the devotional exercises, unless unavoidably detained; and no member may absent himself, without leave, from the seat of Conference.

ticipate in the devotional exercises, unless unavoidably detained; and no member may absent himself, without leave, from the seat of Conference.

2. When a member would speak on any question, he shall arise in his place and respectfully address the President; refrain from all personalities and discourteous language; and no member shall speak more than once on the same question until every other member who so desires shall have spoken, (except strictly to explain when misrepresented,) nor shall any one speak longer than fiteen minutes without consent of the Conference.

3. When a member is called to order by the President, or by any member through him, he shall take his seat until the point of order is decided by the President.

4. Any member may call for the division of a question, which shall be granted when in the judgment of the President the same will admit of it.

5. When a question has been decided by a vote of Conference, any member who may have voted with the majority, may move for a reconsideration of the same.

6. It shall be in order for any member during the discussion of any proposition before the Conference, (except in the examination of character) to move the "previous question," and if such motion be seconded by a majority of the members present, the question shall be immediately put.

7. Any member may demand the "yeas and nays" upon any question, and if ONE-FIFTH of the members present and voting shall second such demand, the vote shall be so taken.

8. Any member may object to the reading of a paper, and when such objection is made, the reading shall be immediately put.

9. No motion unless seconded, shall be entertained; and all motions and resolutions shall be reduced to writing by the member presenting them, if so desired by the President, Secretary, or any member of Conference.

10. When a motion is made, seconded, and entertained by the President, it shall be in possession of the Conference, but it may be withdrawn at any time by the mover with the consent of the seconder, before a decis

11. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, except when a member has the floor, when such a motion cannot be made without his consent.

12. In discussing the Reports of Committees, the chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, or such member of the same as the committee may agree upon, shall be entitled to close the debate, (except when the previous question is ordered.)

IV. QUESTIONS TO BE TAKEN WITHOUT DEBATE.

All motions simply to adjourn.
All motions to lie on the table.
Motions for the "previous question."
Demand for the "yeas and nays."
All appeals from decisions of the President.
All motions for extension of time, either of a member on the floor, or the session of Conference.
All motions to recommit.
All motions to place documents, reports or other papers on record.

All questions that may arise in the course of Conference proceedings, not determinable by these Rules of Order, shall be determined by the President in accordance with established parliamentary law, subject to appeal to the

DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Wilmington Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church commenced its second session in the M. E. Church, in Port Deposit, Md., on Wednesday morning, March 16th, 1870, Bishop E. S. Janes presiding.

The Conference was called to order at 9 o'clock.

Opening Religious services consisted of reading the Scriptures, singing and prayer by the presiding Bishop.

The roll was called by the Secretary of the previous Conference, and nearly all the members answered to their names.

On motion, S. L. Gracey was appointed Secretary, and H. S. Thompson and T. L. Poulson, Assistant Secretaries.

The hours of meeting and adjournment were fixed at 9 A. M. and 12 M.

The Rules of order observed at the last session were adopted for the present session. The usual Standing Committees were nominated by the Presiding Ellers, and confirmed. (See Standing Committees.)

Dr. Dashiell, President of Dickinson College; Dr. Mitchell, of the New York East Conference; Dr. Butler, Corresponding Secretary of the American and Foreign Christian Union; C. M. Pegg, of the Troy Conference, and Bishop Wayman, of the A. M. E. Church were introduced by the Chair.

A Committee appointed at our last Conference to adjust matters involving joint interests with the Philadelphia Conference reported, which report was laid on the table for future action.

A Committee was appointed to confer with Dr. Butler regarding the matters of the A. and F. C. Union. (See Reports.)

Dr. Dashiell reported the condition of Dickinson College; referred to Committee on Education.

Dr. Vincent, of the S. S. Union, J. F. Clymer and Wm. Potter were introduced.

The Committee on Book Depository in Wilmington reported. (See Reports.)

Question 2d of the Discipline, viz: "Who remain on trial?" was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

David Straughn was discontinued at his own request on account of ill health. Conference closed with benediction by Bishop Wayman.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Conference assembled at 9 A. M., Bishop Janes in the chair.

Religious services conducted by E. J. Way.

Roll called and Journal read and approved.

Dr. Kynett, Secretary of the Church Extension Society of the M. E. Church was introduced and represented the claims of said Society.

T. L. Poulson presented a resolution ordering the holding of a Temperance Anniversary in the evening. (See Resolutions.)

Report of Felton Seminary, referred to Committee on Education.

At 10 A. M. the call of the Stewards was made.

The report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund of the Philadelphia Conference was read, and a draft was ordered for the amount due this Conference (\$138 38) to be distributed by the Stewards.

A draft was ordered on the Chartered Fund for \$30.

Question 3d of the Minutes, viz: "Who are admitted into full connection?" was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

James M. Williams, now in Germany, was continued on trial.

C. W. Mc Keehan was discontinued at his own request. Conference closed with benediction by Dr. Cooper.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Conference convened at 9 A. M., Bishop Janes in the chair. Religious services by Joshua Humphriss.

Report of the Wesleyan Female College presented and referred.

Question 4th of Discipline was taken up, viz: "Who are the Deacons? (See Disciplinary Questions.)

Question 5th of the Discipline, viz: Who have been elected to Elder's orders?" was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

Question 7th of the Discipline, viz: "Who are Supernumerary Preachers?" was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The relation of Henry Sutton was changed to Superannuated.

Question 8th of the Minutes, viz: "Who are the Superannuated Preachers? was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The Secretary was instructed to provide a suitable book for recording the obituaries of deceased members of the Conference.

The examination of effective Elders was taken up; Wilmington District was called. The relation of L. Dobson was changed from effective to supernumerary.

Dover District was represented by the Presiding Elder. "Missionany Plan" carried out, as far as possible.

Easton Dictrict was represented by the Presiding Elder. "Missionary Plan" generally carried out.

Snow Hill District was represented. Missionary plan partially enforced.

A Committee was desired and appointed to investigate some difference in a business transaction between V. Smith and a lay brother, on Easton District.

The report of the Stewards was made the order of the day for Saturday, at 10 A. M. The vote on Lay Delegation was ordered immediately after the Steward's report.

The report of the Committee on joint-interest between the Philadelphia and this Conference was read and adopted. (See Reports.)

A motion prevailed to meet in session at night, to hear the Annual Missionary Sermon.

Question 11th of the Discipline was recalled, when J. B. Quigg presented the resignation of Wm. Hammond, who was allowed to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the M. E. Church.

Hon. Jacob Tome was introduced to the Conference.

Journal was read up, notices announced, doxology sung, and benediction by J. D. Curtis.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Conference assembled at 9 A. M., Bishop Janes in the chair. Devotional services by A. W. Milby.

Stephen Johns of the Delaware Conference was introduced.

T. L. Poulson presented resolutions recommending the Ladies and Pastors' Christian Union.

A paper was presented relating to the death of Dr. McClintock. (See Resolutions.)

The question relating to the election of Local Preachers to Deacon's Orders, was taken up and acted upon.

The committee appointed to investigate the case of Vaughan Smith was reported. (See Reports.)

The report of the committee on matters pertaining to the American and Foreign Christian Union, was presented. (See Reports.)

The order of the day was now taken up, viz: The call of the Stewards. (See Reports.)

A resolution was passed commending the Missionary Sermon of A. Rittenhouse.

A paper was presented relating to the interest of this Conference in the Tract Depository. Philadelphia, and the Secretary was instructed to notify the Philadelphia Conference of our demand for first payment.

The Bishop read the following report, received from the Presiding Elders, of the Lay vote on Lay Delegation, viz:

The Report of the Tract Committee was received, read and adopted.

The Committee to prepare suitable minute of the death of Dr. McClintock, reported. (See Resolutions.)

George W. Sparks, Esq., Treasurer of the Conference Missionary Society, and Rev. Mr. Smyser, Baltimore Conference were introduced.

Conference adjourned to meet at 3 P. M. Benediction by Joshua Humphriss.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference reassembled at 3 P. M. Dr. Kenney in the chair. Devotional services by B. F. Price.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was presented and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Sunday School Committee was presented and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Committee on Freedmen's Aid interests was received and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Committee on Bible cause was presented and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Committee on Education was received and adopted. (See Report.)
The usual Committees to visit our literary institutions were appointed. See Visiting Committees.)

Several resolutions were offered and adopted which are published under head of adopted resolutions.

The report of the Committee on Church Extension was presented and adopted. (See Report.)

The Doxology was sung, and Benediction pronounced by Rev. I. T. Cooper.

FIFTH DAY.

MONDAY MORNING.

The official notice of the ordination of Deacons and Elders on the Sunday previous was given by the Bishop. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The Conference was opened at 9 A. M., T. J. Quigley D. D. in the chair; opening services by B. F. Price.

The majority and minority report of the book committee at New York, were received and ordered to be filed. The Conference proceeded to elect by ballot four clerical Stewards resulting in choice of Charles Hill, John Hough, D. R. Thomas, and W. F. Talbot.

J. H. Lightbourn presented resolution in reference to list of appointments of members. Adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Resolutions of thanks were presented by George A. Phoebus, B. F. Price, Lightbourn, Chatham and others. All adopted and printed under resolutions.

The Presiding Elders and Pastors of the City of Wilmington were appointed a committee on "Ladies and Pastors' Christian Union." (See Resolutions.)

A Committee on Peninsular Convention was appointed. (See Committees.)

The Bishop took the chair and announced the following Examining and Visiting Committees. (See Committees.)

The report of the Committee on General Statistics was made. (See Statistical Tables.)

The report of the Committee on Missions was received and filed. (See Reports.)
Resolutions of sympathy with Rev. D. Titlow and Rev. Wm. R. McFarlane were

dopted.

The Conference ordered that the name of D. Straughan be entered on the Journal

as "discontinued on account of ill health."

A collection was taken up for the benefit of the sexton amounting to \$48 41.

The Presiding Elder of Easton district was instructed to demand the parchments of Ordination of William Hammond, to be returned to the conference.

The transfers of Charles F. Shepard and Cornelius M. Pegg were announced by the Bishop.

The officers of the church extension society were nominated and elected. (See Conference societies.)

The journal of session was read up preparatory to adjournment.

The Bishop made a very appropriate and impressive address, the conference joined in singing and prayer, when the appointments were announced by Bishop Janes, viz: (see appointments.)

DECISION OF QUESTION.

The Bishop presiding gave the following decision in regard to local appropriation of Missionary money:

"No Church has any right to divert any part of the collection for Missions to any local enterprise." Such act he regarded as a "moral wrong and fraud upon the Missionary Society."

The Stewards in presenting their second Annual Report to the Conference, would express their gratitude to God for moving the hearts of the people to increased liberality in contributing to the fund under its control, for the support of its claimants.

The collections have this year nearly reached the aggregate apportionment, which to us is a very gratifying result.

This amount we have distributed with care to two superanuated, three supernumerary, three effective, preachers, twelve widows and two orphans.

In making the allowances, every fact and circumstance, in each case, that came to the knowledge of your Board, have been patiently considered.

As last year, we would suggest to the several pastors having claimants within the bounds of their charges, to have prompt and efficient men placed upon the estimating committees, and enjoin upon them the necessity of obtaining the fullest information that the questions in the printed circular will possibly secure. And the Board would further say, that high estimates embarrass the case, rather than otherwise.

Your Board of Stewards still retain the conviction that, while the collection has increased, there is yet a want of attention to it, on the part of some preachers having charge. And it is the judgment of your Board, that they ought to keep up their record of such delinquents, that it may be known to the Stewards and the Conference, who they are that habitually fall greatly below their apportionment. That should they at any time find it necessary to make a claim upon the Conference funds, they will do so in the face of such record.

We present with this report an assessment upon the several charges for the en-

C

suing year, not as a tax, but as a guide for pastor and flock, as to the amount the charge can and ought to raise.

The aggregate amount of the assessment is \$3385 00. When we consider the necessities of the claimants upon this fund, they strongly plead with us to exert ourselves to raise the full amount assigned.

Your Stewards further report that they have appointed J. F. Williamson, Esq., (Treasurer of the Board,) to receive under the Act of Incorporation, approved by this Conference, the transfer of such securities from Messrs. Daniel M. and Martin H. Bates, as will carry out the incomplete will of their late father, the Hon. Martin W. Bates.

With this report the Board would respectfully submit to the Conference for its adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st, That we recommend the collection for our necessitous Conference claimants, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathies and benevolence of our people, and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our several charges.

Resolved 2d, That preachers in charge of circuits and stations, shall be required to report their collections for Conference claimants on the second day of the next session of the Conference, stating at the time, both the amount apportioned and the amount collected; said collections to be in checks or in United States notes of as large denomination as possible.

Resolved 3d, That, inasmuch as it is important to the Board of Stewards, that they be notified at an early period in the session of all claims likely to come before them, it shall be the duty of all recognized Conference claimants, as well as of those about to change their relations and needing assistance, to give notice of the fact in writing, or through their presiding elder, on the second day of the next session, immediately after the call of the Stewards shall have been made.

REGARDING CONFERENCE PREACHERS' AID SOCIETY.

The Board of Stewards who were instructed by this Conference at the Session of 1869, to consider the subject of a Preachers' Aid Society and report at this Session, beg leave to report that they have had the subject under consideration, but have not been able to put in proper form a constitution for said Society; but with the progress already made, we hope to be able to make a final report at the next session, if the Conference so desire.

REPORT ON CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Committee on Church Extension, respectfully submit the following report:

There has been laid before them the Plan of Report adopted by the Parent Board of the Church Extension Society providing for the publication in the Annual Minutes of the Conferences, the levy, distribution and collections from the various charges within the bounds of the Conferences, of funds for the Church Extension Society.

As it has been the pleasure of the Wilmington Conference not to call for a report of collections from the charges, in open Conference, as has formerly been done, we have no means of knowing to what extent the apportionments have been fully met. We are persuaded that but few charges have raised the full amount apportioned.

It ought not to be forgotten that in the establishment of the Church Extension Society among us, our people are virtually cut off from all right of appeal to foreign aid for our weaker societies. They must obtain help here, or be shut up within their own resources. The Church has pledged her assistance in this way, and her ministers and laymen are morally bound to redeem the pledge. We hold it to be our duty to study the nature and design, to understand and work by the plans and methods of the Church Extension Society, and to meet the arguments and objections raised against it.

It is a source of gratification that the General Committee of Church Extension, at its late session in Philadelphia, generously favored us with the privilege of appropriating to the necessities of our own territory, the full amount of \$1500 00 apportioned to be raised this year, and further, in the meeting of November 1868, passed a resolution in the following words, to which we most respectfully call the attention of the Conference: "Resolved, That the defense of the title to our Church property against the claims of seceding bodies is in the opinion of this Committee, a legitimate use of the funds of this Society." Your Committee therefore recommend,

1st, That, the Conference Secretaries be instructed to publish in connection with the printed minutes the statistics for Church Extension, after the manner of the statistics for Conference Claimants, stating the names of the circuits or stations, amount apportioned this year, amount raised this year, and amount apportioned next year.

2d, That at every session of the Annual Conference, the preacher in charge be instructed to report his Church Extension Collection, at the same time that he does the Missionary Collection.

3d, That we commend to our people every where, the interests of this Society, and use our influence in behalf of the Loan Fund, so auspiciously established.

4th, That we commend to the Board of Managers of the Wilmington Conference Church Extension Society, the cause of the churches in Virginia, which now is represented to us in a favorable light, as worthy of their endorsement and aid.

REPORT ON AMERICAN AND FOREIGN CHRISTIAN UNION.

The Committee appointed to confer with Dr. Butler, Secretary of the American and Foreign Christian Union in reference to the operations and interests of the said Union, respectfully report:—That we have examined the papers put into our hands by Dr. Butler, and have heard his representations of the work committed to his charge, and hereby submit the following preamble and resolutions for the consideration of the Conference:

WHEREAS, The system of Roman Catholicism, in our opinion, is incompatible with

the civil and religious liberties of mankind through its assumption of the right to exercise and control the temporal power of the State, and its absolute authority over the religious faith and conscience of its votaries:

And Whereas, The numerical strength of Roman Catholicism is rapidly increasing in these United States by emigration from the States of Europe, we deem it wise and prudent in the Evangelical Churches and people of this Protestant country to give timely attention to the dangerous encroachments and claims of the ecclesiastical upon the civil power, believing as we do, the civil power under our constitutional Republic, is the protection of our rights and liberties.

And WHEREAS, The American and Foreign Christian Union is an association of members of Protestant Evangelical Churches for the diffusion of true scriptural christianity throughout the world, and especially for the enlightenment and spiritual conversion of the adherents of Rome to the true faith and power of Christ:

Therefore Resolved, That we approve the objects and efforts of the American and Foreign Christian Union, and we will in all timely and suitable ways, fellowship its agents, circulate its publications, and aid its pecuniary supplies.

TRACT REPORT.

The Committee on Tract Cause beg leave to report that in their judgment the Tract Cause is an important auxiliary for the spread of scriptural knowledge, and claims the liberal support of the church. They respectfully submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we recommend to the Tract Committee of the several charges a greater activity in the distribution of tracts.

Resolved, That we will take up the usual collection in our respective charges.

Resolved, That the Finance Committee of this Conference be instructed to pay the Tract Collection to the Secretary of the Finance Committee of the Parent Board, Rev. S. W. Thomas.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION.

The undersigned appointed by the Philadelphia and Wilmington Conferences at their last sessions, having met at the rooms of the Tract Society in the city of Philadelphia on this seventeenth day of November, A. D., 1869, and organized by calling Dr. T. J. Thompson to the chair and appointing J. B. McCullough Secretary, and having fully considered the different matters referred to them by the said Conferences, do report to the said Conferences as the result of their deliberations the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Centenary Fund be divided between the two Conferences in the proportion of five-eighths to the Philadelphia Conference, and three-eighths to the Wilmington Conference; that being found by us, after investigation, a fair proportion according to numbers as to membership and ministers.

Resolved, That the Educational Fund be divided on the foregoing basis of fiveeighths and three-eighths, the said share of three-eighths to be carried to the credit of the Wilmington Conference as soon as they shall have secured a qualified corporation to control the same, and that when said division is made, that part of said fund heretofore loaned to the Wilmington Female College, and which is used by them without the payment of any interest, by a vote of the Philadelphia Conference, be taken by the Wilmington Conference as a part of their share, to be controlled by them in the future as they may determine.

Resolved, That the sum of Five Thousand Dollars is agreed upon by this Commission as the amount due from the Tract Depository to the Wilmington Conference; which sum is to remain in said Depository until otherwise ordered by said Conference, of which withdrawal twelve months notice shall be given to the Philadelphia Conference; at the expiration of which notice the sum of Two Thousand Dollars is to be paid over to the Wilmington Conference, and One Thousand Dollars annually thereafter, until the whole shall have been paid, interest to be paid in the meantime to them, on such sum as may remain, at the rate of six per cent., interest to commence from the time of the acceptance of this settlement: and until such time as the Wilmington Conference may set up a book room of their own, the patronage of said Conference to be given to the Philadelphia Book Depository.

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the Wilmington Female College be recommended to have their charter so altered as that hereafter the Philadelphia Conference, Wilmington Conference, and the Board of Trustees of said College, each elect annually two members of said Board, instead as heretofore.

Resolved, That we acknowledge that the lot in Mount Moriah Cemetery, heretofore donated to the Philadelphia Conference, is held for the joint benefit and use of both Conferences in accordance with the provisions of the charter of said Cemetery.

Resolved, That should the Philadelphia and Wilmington Conferences accept this settlement, that they be requested to respectively take such steps as may be necessary to carry the same into legal effect.

REPORT OF MATTERS IN DISPUTE BETWEEN BROTHERS VAUGHAN SMITH AND JOHN F. ELLIOTT.

The Committee in the case of Brother Vaughan Smith, against whom certain complaints were preferred by Brother John F. Elliott, having heard the statements of the parties, as well as all the evidence produced, beg leave to report:

That they do not find Brother Smith has been guilty of any moral wrong, and therefore recommend that his character pass; nevertheless, inasmuch as there are clearly admitted and just claims held by Brother Elliott against either Brother Smith or Snow Hill District, the Committee are unanimously of the opinion, and so report to Conference, that there is just and proper ground for the arbitration provided in the Discipline for such cases, and therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That all matters in controversy between Brother Smith and Brother Elliott be referred to arbitration as provided for in the Discipline.

FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

WHEREAS, The Freedmen's Aid Society of the Methodist E. Church continues in a most important and interesting field of christian activity, reporting at this time 60 schools established in all our Southern States, except Texas and Florida; 105 teachers; 10,000 pupils; \$120,000 put into normal and common schools buildings in

the South, buildings that are used for our preachers as preaching places, and also for Sunday School operations.

And Whereas, The work grows on our hands, increasing in importance and brightening in promise, therefore

Resolved 1st, That we cordially approve an enterprise that is so manifestly doing the work of patriotism, philanthropy, christian education and practical piety.

Resolved 2d, That we interest ourselves to see that all contributions to this noble charity within our bounds be turned if possible into the treasury of the Freedmen's Aid Society of the M. E. Church.

Resolved 3d, That any monies intended for this enterprise, and paid over during the present session of our Conference, be forwarded to the agents of our Book Concern at New York.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance beg leave to submit the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st, That total abstinence from all intoxicating drinks as a beverage, is the only safe and scriptural ground for christian people to occupy, and that as opportunity offers, we will preach upon the subject of Temperance to our respective congregations.

Resolved 2d, That we recommend the formation of public temperance societies in all our congregations on the pledge of total abstinence.

Resolved 3d, That we approve of all temperance organizations having for their object the abolishing of the traffic in and use of intoxicating liquors, and will co-operate with them in their laudable purpose.

Resolved 4th, That we utterly disapprove of, and hereby condemn the use of all intoxicating liquors on social or festive occasions; and also the use of those preparations under the general name of "bitters," of which alcohol is the chief ingredient.

Resolved 5th, That we hail with unfeigned satisfaction the exclusion of intoxicating drinks from the Capitol Buildings at Washington, and the formation of a Congressional Temperance Organization; and we devoutly pray that this good example may be followed throughout our land.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The study of God's Word is the primary object of all Sunday School work, and the best talent of the church, the most cultured minds, and the purest hearts, should be enlisted in this holy work. The Sabbath School is the training department of the church, and hence, the great importance of the most careful and thorough preparation of the Sabbath School lessons on the part of the teachers. Your Committee recommend the adoption of a system of uniform lessons. The "Serial Lessons" prepared by Rev. J. H. Vincent, Cor. Secretary of our Sunday School Union, are valuable and may be used in all our schools with great profit. The following resolutions are respectfully submitted:

Resolved 1st, That relying upon the great Head of the Church for continued help and success, we pledge ourselves to increased labor in this important department of the church, and that we will spend as much of our time as possible in our Sabbath Schools.

Resolved 2d, That we heartily recommend to officers and teachers, as an invaluable assistant, the Teachers' Journal.

Resolved 3d, That we request the Presiding Elders and the Conference Sabbath School Committee to arrange for holding a Sabbath School Convention in each of the Districts.

Resolved 4th, That we will form in the Sunday Schools of our various charges, as far as practicable, Juvenile Temperance and Anti-Tobacco Societies.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education beg leave respectfully to report that there have been brought to their attention the Smyrna Seminary, the Felton Institute and Classical Seminary, Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College, in all of which, under the care and culture of competent christian instructors, the sons and daughters of our people are furnished with the facilities of such an education as will fit them for the high responsibilities of life. The institutions of Syrmna and Felton ask only to be recognized as auxiliaries in the work, and we very cordially extend to them our favorable consideration as entitled to the confidence of all who seek by their means a liberal christian education. Though not strictly denominational, they are largely under Methodist control and influence, and we recommend the appointment of visiting committees to both.

The Wyoming College, located in Wyoming, Delaware, being under the supervision and control of another denomination, we deem it our duty to state that it sustains no relation nor holds any connection whatever with this Conference.

Of Dickinson College, so venerable in years, so rich in cherished associations and memories, your Committee are happy to say that evidence before us establishes its continued claim to our confidence and practical regard. The health of its students, its high standard of education, the competency and fidelity of its President and Faculty, its freedom from pecuniary embarrassments, and above all the pervading religious influences which attend its ministrations, are causes of devout thanksgiving to God, and of sincere congratulation among its numerous and devoted friends in the patronizing Conferences, as well as for increasing and continued effort to increase its patronage. Many subscriptions for its liberal endownment still remain unpaid, and your Committee recommend that these be collected at the earliest practicable period.

The Wesleyan Female College, located within our own bounds, demands and should receive our highest practical consideration. It is eminently worthy. Under the management of President Wilson and his estimable lady, it is a safe, christian home for our daughters while securing the blessing of a liberal education. Its corps of teachers is possessed of the highest qualifications for the responsible work in which they are engaged, and harmoniously co-operate with each other and with the Principal of the Institution, in working out the great ends of its establishment and organization. It is our Institution; and we together with the other patronizing Conferences, should be faithful to the trust providentially assigned us by extending its usefulness in every practicable way. Our daughters—the daughters of the people—among whom we exercise the high and solemn functions of our ministry will be educated, and we should see to it, that they be brought within the sphere of those influences which will

indoctrinate them into the principles and experiences of a true Methodism—a vital christianity; and these, our own Wesleyan Female College furnishes.

Let us then everywhere and always insist on the blessing that will ensue to the individual, the family, the church, and the world, by the liberal christian education which this Institution is adapted, under the divine blessing, to secure to all who are placed under its care.

The debt which encumbers it should be extinguished as soon as it is at all possible to do so by every legitimate means. It is now more than self-sustaining, having within the last three years paid over two thousand dollars of indebtedness out of its own earnings.

The attention of your Committee has been called to the organization of the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church as provided for by the last General Conference, the object of which is "to diffuse more generally the blessings of education and christianity throughout the United States and elsewhere." In the objects of this organization we recommend a hearty and unanimous concurrence by this Conference. The fund in furtherance of these objects and secured by centenary contributions, amounted on the 1st day of January, 1870, to \$84,000; \$14,000 of which belongs to the General Education Fund, and \$70,000 to the Sunday School Children's Fund. In all the recommendations of the Circular setting forth these interests and objects, and which is herewith submitted, we recommend that the Conference fully concur.

We live in perilous times. The "mystery of iniquity doth already work" in the organized effort to exclude that great Educator of humanity—the Bible—from our schools, and to dilute its purifying inspirations by the specious and plausible skepticisms of modern rationalism, and the atheistic speculations of a refined materialism. It is no time for a temporizing policy in the living church of the living God. Educational instrumentalities must be baptized into a true efficiency for its great ends by the fires of a new Pentecost; and upon us devolves the solemn responsibility of leading the van of Christ's militant host. We must see to it that the education of our children and youth be made conformable to that Bible for whose plenary and purifying inspirations we must not only contend, but if need be, even dare to die. Keep our educational institutions up to the highest possible standard of purity, and then sustain them; and the reward is sure; our children will rise up and call us blessed and we shall thus be true to the high character of a living Methodism made and kept vital by a true liberal christian education.

Your Committee in conclusion beg leave to offer the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st, That we have undiminished confidence in the high character and qualifications of those to whom is committed the management of the Dickinson and Wesleyan Female Colleges, and that we will in every practicable way seek to increase their usefulness by increasing the number of students.

Resolved 2d, That as far as possible we will, at every appointment during the coming year, preach on the subject of liberal christian education, and urge our people to patronize the Institutions under our own care and control.

Resolved 3d, That the following Visiting Committees be appointed: 1. For Dickinson College—Two ministers to be named by the Bishop; and Prof. W. A. Reynolds and Dr. L. Kittenger as laymen. 2. For Wesleyan Female College—Hon. Jacob Tome and Walter H. Thompson, Esq., as laymen, and two ministers by the Bishop. 3. For Felton and Smyrna—Two ministers, each to be appointed by the President of the Conference.

Resolved 4th, That we recommend the appointment of the following lay members

for the Committee on Education, of our next Annual Session: F. A. Ellis, L. F. Riddle, Walter H. Thompson, R. C. Carter, Hon. Gove Saulsbury, J. E. Clawson, G. H. Richardson, R. E. Jones.

Resolved 5th, That the second Sunday in June be set apart as the "Children's Day" in all our charges, in accordance with the recommendation of the Circular of the Board of Education.

Resolved 6th, That we recommend the appointment of a Committee consisting of A. Cookman, W. Kenney, Chancellor Bates and President Wilson, to prepare a plan for the organization of a Conference Education Society, and report at our next Annual Session.

THE REPORT ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on the Bible cause beg leave to submit the following brief report:

It is impossible adequately to estimate the value of the Holy Bible. The relation which it sustains to our common christianity; its connection with the advanced civilization of the age; its harmony with our civil institutions, especially the support which it gives to our civil and religious liberty; the authority with which it guards the privileges of our common humanity and sustains the purity of our domestic relations; the truth of its doctrines; its awful denunciations of sin; the sublimity of its promises, and especially the hope of salvation which it offers to every sinner through the infinite merits of our blessed Savior; all impress us with the profound conviction that the universal diffusion and practical enforcement of its Divine teachings are identified with the progress of society and the happiness of mankind.

We offer for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st, That we earnestly recommend and urge our people diligently to read and study the Holy Scriptures.

Resolved 2d, That any attempt to suppress the reading of the Bible in our Common Schools is an implied censure upon its divine teaching, and we will oppose by all proper means in our power, the consummation of all such purposes.

Resolved 3d, That the growth of rationalistic ideas in this and other countries renders it one of the first duties of the Church to uphold and defend the divine inspiration of the Holy Scriptures.

Resolved 4th, That the American Bible Society commends itself to our cordial support, as one of the grandest means of giving universal circulation to the Bible.

Resolved 5th, That we will continue our annual collections for the support of said Institution.

Resolved 6th, That we recommend to our preachers where there are local or county societies, auxiliary to the American Bible Society, to pay their monies to said auxiliaries, the receipt of whose Treasurer shall be evidence of the amount raised by their respective congregations.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CONFERENCE EXTENSION SOCIETY.

To the Wilmington Conference of the M. E. Church—Dear Fathers and Brothers:

In submitting this the First Annual Report of the Church Extension Society of your Conference, we wish to record our gratitude to Almighty God for the favor He has

shown us during the first year of our history. None of our officers, managers or members have been smitten down by the hand of death; our meetings have been well attended, our plans have been prospered, and we feel to enter upon our second year with encouraged hearts and increased confidence in the success of our excellent society.

Called together in the fall, by our President, the interests of Church Extension within our bounds were very carefully and fully canvassed. Assessed by the Parent Society for the present year to the amount of \$2000, of which \$1000 were to be paid over and used for interests without our limits, and believing that such an arrangement would seriously militate against the success of our collections in this behalf, we agreed to memorialize the Parent Board, asking that at least one half of our collections might be appropriated for home uses. Accordingly a resolution was carefully drawn, and a Committee consisting of Revs. T. J. Thompson and Alfred Cookman was appointed to present our action to, and confer with the Parent Board that met in Philadelphia during the month of November. In response, the Brethren of the General Society, diminished our apportionment, making it \$1500, instead of \$2000, and agreeing that all (mark, not one-half,) but all raised by our charges might be used within the limits of the Wilmington Conference.

During the year the several stations and circuits have been apportioned different amounts to raise. Collections have very generally been taken, and we are hoping for a financial showing that shall be decidedly in advance of that of last year, and greatly encouraging to all hearts.

At our meetings there have been before us several applications for aid from needy churches; applications that have been carefully considered, and such action taken as the exigencies of the different cases seemed to call for. Especially would we mention the appeal for help made by our struggling Society at Lincoln. We think that this and other needy enterprises are in a fair way to secure speedy help, and thus will be multiplied practical illustrations of the usefulness of our noble society.

The present year found us with \$250,a part of last year's collection, in our Treasury. To this some other small amounts have been added; \$230 has been paid to the Treasurer of the Parent Society in Philadelphia, some other small expenses met, the Treasurer's account carefully audited by a Committee appointed for the purpose, and at this time, exclusive of what may be received at this Conference, there is \$65.60 in the Treasurer's hands. In this connection we should state that Mr. Gilbert Robinson of Wilmington, elected Treasurer of our Society a year since, and positively declining to serve, the Board requested Mr. G. C. Maris, the Recording Secretary, to assume, until the session of this Conference, the responsibilities of that office.

During the year a series of By-Laws was adopted, which with your permission will be published in the Annual Minutes of this Conference.

The Board recommend the appointment of a Committee who shall nominate the officers of your Society to serve during the ensuing year. They venture to suggest to said Committee the following lay brethren who might be nominated for the offices attached to their names, viz: L. F. Riddle for Recording Secretary; Stephen Postles for Treasurer; Chas. Moore, J. Sharpe, and A. J. Burnite, for lay managers.

And now, dear brethren, having endeavored to discharge our trust with a simple and single regard for the Church's welfare and God's glory, we submit for your consideration and judgment our year's proceedings.
