

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH Session in the Trinity Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Martinsburg, West Virginia, Wednesday morning, March, 14, 1888, at 9 o'clock.

Present, Rev. Bishop ALPHEUS WATERS WILSON, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair.

Religious service was conducted by the Bishop.

The Bishop led in prayer, after which he read from the Holy Scriptures, I Corinthians, chapter XII.

Roll called. By request of the President, Rev. John S. Martin, Secretary of the last Conference, called the roll of Clerical Members, and 119 answered to their names. (See Roll, pages 1 and 2.)

Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology, and with the Benediction by the Bishop, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Memoirs. By request of the President, Rev. J. S. Gardner took the chair. The hour for Memorial Service having arrived, the Report of the Committee on Memoirs was presented and read, answering—

Question Twentieth. Who have died this year? as follows: Rev. Thomas Hildebrand, Rev. Joseph N. Spangler, Rev. William L. Lynch, Rev. S. Holland Engle, (Probationer.)

Hymn 716 was sung-

The Memoirs of Rev. Thomas Hildebrand, Rev. Joseph N. Spangler, Rev. William L. Lynch, Rev S. Holland Engle, were severally read.

Rev. P. H Whisner addressed the Conference in relation to Rev. Thomas Hildebrand and Rev. Joseph N. Spangler—their christian character and ministerial labors.

Rev. John S. Martin addressed the Conference in relation to the excellency of character and work of Rev. Thomas Hildebrand, of Rev. William L. Lynch and Rev. Samuel Holland Engle.

Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology, and with the Benediction by Bishop Wilson, to meet again this afternoon at 3½ o'clock.

SIXTH DAY.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON, March 20, 1888.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop Wilson in the chair.

Religious service was conducted by Bishop Wilson, announcing hymn 555—

Rev. J. H. Waugh led in prayer.

The Journal of this morning was read and approved.

Joint Board of Finance. Report No. 2, of the Joint Board of Finance, was presented, read, and, on motion, it was adopted.

Question Sixth of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are received by transfer from other Conferences? Ans. Henry H. Kennedy, from the Florida Conference.

Wm. G. Cassard having sent word to the Conference of his determination to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South the President directed the Secretary to enter the name of Wm. G. Cassard withdrawn.

Publishing Interests. The Report of the Committee on Publishing Interests was presented, read, and on motion, it was adopted.

Church at Lexington, Va. The following was presented, read, and, on motion, it was adopted

Whereas, The church building in the town of Lexington, Virginia, is an unfavorable one, and its condition is such as to make it almost unfit for use; and

Whereas, Lexington is the seat of Washington and Lee University, and the Virginia Military Institute, two of the leading institutions of learning in the State, to which young men come from all parts of the country to be educated; within a few miles of the Natural Bridge, it is a place of resort for people of leisure; and

Whereas, Our society at that place is unable to build such a house of worship as we ought to have especially in view of the fact that all other denominations have large and elegant houses of worship, prominently located in attractive portions of the town; and

Whereas, the Quarterly Conference of Lexington Station has authorized and requested the Pastor, Rev. A. M. Cackley, to solicit contributions from abroad, to aid them in the erection of a suitable church; therefore,

Resolved by the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Conference assembled, That we heartily endorse the action of the Quarterly Conference of Lexington Station, and most earnestly commend this enterprise to the members of our church at large, in the hope that the appeals of our Lexington people may meet with such responses as will enable them, at no distant day, to build such a church as will fitly represent our denomination in that place.

Observance of the Sabbath. The following was presented, read, and, on motion, it was adopted:

Resolved, That we greatly deplore the growing tendency in our land to Sabbath desecration, which desecration we regard as being highly offensive to God, and a withering blight upon our fair heritage.

- 2. That it is the imperative duty of the Christian Teacher, whether in the home, the Sunday School or Pulpit, or by the Press, to seek to enforce the Fourth Commandment, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."
- 3. That as the Sabbath is for man, so it is alike binding upon all men, upon individuals, corporations and States; and hence the public service should observe the Sabbath, and all Incorporated Bodies should do the same; and every man should see to it that he is not a partaker in other men's sins.

The following resolution was presented by J. H. Waugh, J. E. Armstrong and J. S. Gardner:

Resolved, That the Presiding Bishop be requested to fix the date of our Conference session hereafter on the third Wednesday in March.

REPORTS.

I.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. THOMAS HILDEBRAND.

The departure of Rev. Thomas Hildebrand to the Church above, November 28, 1887, was to him "gain," though we to-day miss him, who was so long a member of this body, We have from his own pen the following simple statement of his parentage, birth and early conversion to Christ: "I was born in Adams County, Pennsylvania, March 12, 1816. My parents, James and Mary Hildebrand, were brought up under Quaker influence, but were converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church when in the meridian of life. Nearly all of their children became members of that Church, and three sons were itinerant ministers and members of the Baltimore Annual Conference. I was converted when about fifteen years of age, under the ministry of Rev. Henry Tarring, who was at that time assisted by Rev. Samuel Lilly, a devoted and useful local preacher. Thiswas in Lewistown, Mifflin County, Pennsylvania, to which place my parents had removed, and where I attended Lewistown Academy for several years, the only education I received before entering the ministry. I was 'admitted on trial' into the Baltimore Conference, March, 1838—received into full connection, March, 1840, in Georgetown B. C., and ordained by Bishop Waugh—was elected to Elder's Orders 1842, but was not present to be ordained, on account of sickness—was ordained Elder in 1843, by Bishop Waugh, in Baltimore city. March, 1838, my first appointment, was as junior preacher of Licking Creek Circuit, Pennsylvania, Rev E. E. Allen, preacher in charge, Chambersburg District, Rev. R. Cadden, Presiding Elder. This was a year of great religious prosperity, over 100 additions to the Church; 1839, appointed junior preacher to Fincaste Circuit; 1840, junior preacher to Christiansburg; 1841 preacher in charge of Clearfield Circuit, Belle Fonte District, Pennsylvania; 1842, given a superannuated relation. I did not ask it, but was unable to go to Conference, and my Presiding Elder thought it advisable, as my health was much broken—throat and lungs seriously affected. Nevertheless, I recruited and

Circuit; 1869-70-71, Franklin Circuit; 1872-73, Crab Bottom Circuit; 1874-75, Monterey Circuit. Broke down September, 1875, with disease of the brain, and have been able to do but little since."

At the Conference of 1876 Brother Hildebrand was assigned a superannuated relation, which was continued until his death. The appointments, he served as before named, were Circuits, only, mostly of four weeks round-some of them large and laborious, numbering as many as twentyeight appointments, and embracing a territory half as large as a Presiding Elder's District now. Yet he was a bold rider, and with a trusty horse, he shrank from no mountain path, or creek, or river that was fordable, or from exposures to snows and winds of winter in reaching his appointment. Thus his fidelity to his promised engagements for preaching won the confidence of the people, who never doubted that he would meet them unless impossibilities should intervene. The work of some of his earlier and largest Circuits was accompanied with hardship and privation. Yet at these he smiled, and rejoiced in the privilege, even amidst such exposure, of bearing to secluded congregations in the mountains the gospel of Christ. He was content to live, as then did most of the people he served, in rural simplicity. With surroundings not showy—to a selfseeker unattractive, he was contented and happy in the plain homes of his people, or even in the log cabin with primitive simplicity, where money was little known, yet hospitality and warmth of heart abundant, he felt himself much at home, and his provision, though plain, yet sufficient. In his own family home he practiced and inculcated the same spirit of sub-mission to circumstances, unavoidable. Though the allowance of "provisional committee" was small-provisions often scanty-supplies promised, slow in reaching the parsonage-and the year closed with deficiency appalling-yet, conscious that his own fidelity and diligence had not been lacking to prevent it, he acquiesced in the word "be content with such things as ye have, for He hath said I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." (Heb., xiii, 5.)

His was the "spiritual mind." With a soul undaunted by any array of pride, or pretensions, of sectarian claim, set forth by others, he respected more the convictions of the Holy Ghost, wrought in his own soul, "so that in nothing was he ashamed, but with all boldness" he witnessed for Yet nothing distinguished him more than that modesty of spirit, which, in early life, must have been inculcated by Godly parents, and after his conversion, developed more beautifully by the grace of the divine spirit, that it impressed every beholder, and whether in his countenance, or manner-his conversation with ministerial brethren, or his discourses from the pulpit, it was a jewel to adorn him—a silent influence speaking in his praise. It could only have been his great modesty, perhaps, unduly controling, and joined with his aversion to encountering the world's forms and ostentation, that prompted him to shy off from position and place, more prominent, and prefer to be in obscurer appointments, where less under observing eyes, or hyper-critic's tongue no one could arraign him as unfitted. While others suggested his occupancy of more prominent and responsible places, he objected because not consonant with his feelings, and "in honor preferring another," craved some lower place. In this, only, was the solution of the question so often propounded by his brethren. "why had Thomas Hildebrand never been assigned to a Station or a District of responsibility?"

Though suited in earlier life to have entered upon appointments more exacting and responsible, the appointing power of the Church rightly adjudged that sensibilities so tender, and feelings so sacred, should remain uninvaded, and that the "Four weeks Chruit," long so honorable and useful in Methodism of the Baltimore Conference, would be best served and present a noble representative preacher in charge, worthy of the many colleagues, then young, some of whom have crossed the river, while others linger among the more matured of the Conference. Looking at the range of his appointments, and the territory that bounded them, it may be a

wonder how he could continuously maintain his hold on the people. The answer is, that in every Circuit adjacent to that he then traveled, there had reached them the fragrance of his name, and the fervor of his ministrations, so that his future appointment to them was an object of desire. This, with the contented spirit that controlled him, may have been the reason that his itinerant life of so many years was limited to little more than Circuits bounded by two Presiding Elders' Districts. In his charge of a Circuit, he watched with solicitude and eager vigilance, over every interest. His pastoral visits among the sick and suffering—the destitute and lowly, were well fitted by sympathy, intensified by his own personal suffering, and by his intimate communion with God, to give him access to the hearts of those he visited. "Sincere without offense," and "seeking things that make for peace," even Circuits, before the scenes of feud and division, were moulded by his influence and example in the "unity of the spirit, in the bonds of peace."

But especially, he excelled as a Preacher of "the glorious gospel of the blessed God." If in the one called to be a minister of the New Testament, every other talent, gift or acquirement must be considered inferior to the high endowment and facility of preaching the word, to which his Lord has specially called and empowered him—if under this view, "helps, administrations"—service and tact in finance—"governments," are all in themselves less than "the grace given to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ," then, indeed, Thomas Hildebrand excelled in the highest gift. Though he may have appeared inferior in the eyes of some, as lacking in temporal activities, because physical infirmity prevented or questionable methods were distasteful—yet with the paramount gift divine—"the demonstration of the spirit, with power"—the sway of human hearts—the conviction and conversions by the Holy Ghost, that followed—all attest that his name will ever be remembered as high in the roll of our Conference. How this gift and influence of preaching were developed in him might be a wonder to one who should fix his thought on mere literary qualification, or the alone study of books.

His claim to such preparation before his entrance upon the ministry, he does not make. Nor was knowledge afterward so easily acquired in this particular form, stranger as he was to technical rules and mental discipline. Books, in their methodical reading, were at first confusive. But the colloquial discourses of his preacher in charge, of the subjects of the books read, he drank in with avidity. In this way alone, he succeeded in his preparations for Conference examinations, which he passed with approval. Though afterward, from conviction of duty, he studied books which were then more readily perceived, yet in other forms, and with a perceptive and intuitive power, unusual, which he daily followed—when traveling on his horse to his appointment—or as he sat in the houses where he stopped, amidst the conversation of the family—and especially as he listened to the preaching of the word—or in conversation on scripture themes, he was the student of the word. This was a favorite method of storing great truths for future use. Thus he became a "workman that needed not to be ashamed." His familiarity with the scriptures was apparent in his preaching. His sermons were radiant with light, because the right text, at the right time, illumined them. His daily intercourse with his people, and his observations in general on man, added more to his enlargement of thought. Added to all this, in his effectiveness as a preacher, which drew the people to him, was the carnestness of his manner—the richness of his voice—the fervency of his expression—his manifest feeling of what he preached—his vivacity—"the demonstration of the spirit with power" crowning all gifts, and the realization of "utterance given unto him," and the opening of his mouth boldly, and speaking the mystery of the gospel. It was under this endowment of the Holy Ghost, hallowing all native gifts—which had been ripened by experience, that he often riveted his congregation as with a wondrous spell, or bore them away in ecstacy, with his rapture of communion with God.

Thus will his name live on in fond remembrance as the preacher whose sermons fed the Church and fastened conviction on the erring. The cross he had to bear, when summoned to preach, under some circumstances, seemed too heavy, and his physical system almost gave way. But commencing with trust in God, strength of body revived with the mounting upward of his spirit, and some of his most powerful discourses were uttered, when in the commencement, he seemed hardly able to stand or speak.

In the great crisis of our Conference, at its session in Alexandria, March, 1866, when the time of trial came, affecting ecclesiastical relations, he evinced his fidelity to the votes he had given before, and to the promises solemnly made by the Baltimore Conference to its people, through a series of years, pledged in open Conference, to hold no ecclesiastical relation with any body which should make a new term of membership or maintain any principle adverse to that embraced in former Conference resolutions. When that trying exigency summoned him, he responded bravely in accordance with his pledge of former years. I'leas, of place of his birth—of early associations, of superior comfort and support—change of circumstances—fear of poverty and reproach, were all made to him in vain. He "went out"—not from the Baltimore Conference, itself—its traditions and principles which had descended from its fathers—but from parsonages and even church edifices—from provisional arrangement—facing want and privation, and visible compact organization, that he might maintain inviolable his recorded promise, and give his influence to perpetuate the old Baltimore Conference, unchanged in principle.

Brother Hildebrand was married January, 1841, to Miss Sarah J. Stevens, in Salem, Virginia. Of the eight children she parted with for her home above six still remain, one of whom is a minister of this Conference. In February, 1873, his second marriage was to Miss Margaret A. Newman, of Crab Bottom, who, with two children, survive him.

On the morning of November 28, 1887, "without a lingering groan," he the welcome word received from his Lord. He departed in great peace, and in the triumphs of faith.

"Servant of God, well done."

Rev. SAMUEL HOLLAND ENGLE.

Rev. Samuel Holland Engle, son of Rev. Joseph J. and Mary B. Engle, was born August 12, 1864, in Botetourt county, Virginia, and died at his home in Berryville, Va., June 12, 1887. Being surrounded by the sacred influences of a christian home, he received quite early in life religious impressions. In the summer of 1878 he was happily converted to God at Wesley Grove Camp Meeting. Although retiring and diffident in his disposition, he refused not to bear the cross in the discharge of his duties in the prayer and class meetings, nor was his christian life without fruit at this early stage. Older christians were both reproved and encouraged by his example, and sinners led to see there was a reality in the religion he professed.

Later there came to him the conviction of a call to the ministry. Here he faltered. Here, too, we may add, he made what he afterward regarded as the mistake of his life. His religious activity and enjoyment waned. In 1879 he entered Randolph Macon College as a student, but owing to the failing health of his father, he was called to his home in Freedom, Md., in the spring of 1880. Soon after this he engaged in the mercantile business in Berryville, Va.

In October, 1883 he presented himself at the altar for prayer during a meeting held at Millwood, Va. Here it was, after a hard struggle, that the

question of a call to the ministry was finally settled. Here it was that the zeal which he had formerly possessed was restored, and he again rejoiced in a consciousness of divine layor. He at once arranged to re-enter Randolph Macon College to prepare himself for the ministry. As a student be wasdiligent, persevering and successful. His greatest ambition was to prepare himself to be a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. When, however, he was within a few months of the degree of Bachelor of Arts, he was admonished by failing health to abandon college life for the more active life of the ministry. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Berryville Circuit, Rev. P. H. Whisner, D. D., P. E. While at college, and during his vacation seasons, he frequently exercised his gifts in preaching. He was ready to improve any opportunity afforded to preach the word, and gave great promise of becoming an able minister of the New Testament. He was humble and consistent in his walk, earnest in his appeals and powerful in prayer. So thoroughly unselfish was he, that one of his chief pleasures was to deny himself in order to add to the happiness He was admitted on trial in the Baltimore Conference at its session in Staunton, Va., 1886, and appointed to Berryville Circuit as junior preacher, with Brother W. L. Lynch as preacher in charge. These two brethren, who were thus united as colleagues in the church militant, were not to be long divided in death, nor in participating in the foys of the church triumphant. Soon after Conference Brother Engle was attacked with pneumonia, which was followed by consumption. He realized his condition, but felt no alarm. It was a sad trial to him to have to realize that he never should be able to lift his voice in telling the preciousness of Jesus and His love, yet he indulged no murmurings. He bore the sufferings of his protracted illness, which continued for more than 12 months, with christian fortitude and patience. He talked of death with a marked degree of calmness, and rejoiced in hope of eternal life. When the end drew nigh, as though surprised at the terrors of death being removed, he inquired, "can this be death?" and then added, "surely this cannot be death." "Glory" was his adieu to friends on earth. Mysterious was this Providence that has removed from our midst one so carnest, so young and so promising as he. But the Lord makes no mistakes. The brief but bright life of our young brother, the more than earthly glory that attended his departing spirit, the notes of victory sounded by him in the dying hour, may well preach of the power of the holy religion of Jesus. He is "more than conqueror through him that loved us, and gave himself for us."

Rev. WILLIAM LEWIS LYACH.

William Lewis Lynch, son of George and Mary J. Lynch, was born in Monroe county, Va., (now West Va.,) April 25, 1842. His father never made a public profession of religion. His mother was a member of the Presbyterian Church. Brother Lynch sought religion very early in life, but checked by that insidious whisper, "too young." he stopped short of the blessing. At the age of 15 he professed conversion, and united with the church at Hedding chapel, under the ministry of "Old Father Nixon." "For two or three years." to use his own language, I grew in grace, but afterward lost the evidence of my acceptance with God, and when about 18 years old, feeling myself unworthy of a place in the church, I had my name stricken from the roll.

On the 14th day of July, 1863, he was united in marriage to Miss Mattie J., daughter of Jesse and Isabella Parker, also of Monroe county. This proved a most happy union, for Brother Lynch thus writes—she was of great service to me in my work, taking care of home and without complaint enabling me to do my work on the circuit.

On the 5th day of October, 1867, he was licensed to preach, at the third Quarterly Conference of Gap Mills Circuit, held in old Trinity Church, in Greenbrier county, West Va., Rev. J. H. Waugh, P. E., and Aaron Boon, P. C. His license was renewed October 25, 1868, again October 30, 1869, and October 29, 1870. At the latter date, Brother J. L. Gilbert was P. E. During these years he did a great deal of effective preaching, and quite a number under his ministry were converted and added to the church.

In the spring of 1871, having attended Conference at Salem, Va., as a Lay Delegate, he consented to serve a part of Gap Mills Circuit, in connection with some new appointments, near Sweet Springs, under the name of "Sweet Springs Mission." In this work he was greatly successful. At the session of the Conference held at Warrenton, Va., in March, 1872, he was received on trial, and having been four years a local preacher, on the 10th day of March he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Robert Paine. That year he was assigned to Blue Sulphur Circuit, Lewisburg District, which charge he served four consecutive years. Brother R. M. Wheeler was his colleague on this work during the fall and winter of 1874. At the Conference held at Staunton, Va., March 7, 1874, he was received into full connection. On the 8th day of March, 1876, at Winchester, Va., he was ordained Elder by Bishop E. M. Marvin; at that Conference he was appointed to Frankford Circuit, with H. S. Coe as junior preacher. Here he remained four years; in 1877-78 Rev. H. C. Caldwell was his colleague, and in 1879 Rev. W. N. Wagner. In 1880, and again in 1881, he was appointed to Centerville Circuit. In the latter year, Alderson was added to this circuit, and Rev. D. L. Reid was his colleague during the last half of the year. In 1882 he was assigned to Alderson and Ronceverte, and having no parsonage, he lived at his old home with his mother. Here, on the 20th of April of that year, his wife died, leaving seven children, one a little babe only six weeks old. In 1883-84-85, he served Bridgewater Circuit. The first two years Brother B. W. Waters was his colleague, and the last, Brother Forrest L. Prettyman. In 1886 he was appointed to Berryville Circuit, with Rev. S. H. Engle as junior preacher. In 1887 he was re-appointed to this work, and scarcely had he entered upon the discharge of his duties, ere the messenger came and he was called from work to reward, from labor to rest.

On the morning of the 26th of March, Saturday, at 3 o'clock, he passed away. His death was a surprise to all. Well did Dr. Martin write, "Preachers of Winchester District are bowed in spirit under this stroke, so painful and unexpected, and in this gloom stand his ministerial and Lay Brethren throughout the Conference, to whom his heart was 'knitted in love." We said his death was a surprise to all. At Conference he was cheerful, and apparently robust, but there the ravager began his work. On the 4th day of the session, Saturday, he writes in his diary, "a little unwell this morning." At night he adds, "quite unwell to night." On Sunday he says, "suffering with my head to night." The strong man feels a twinge of pain to shoot across his brow, 'tis but the summons for him to go home to die. He was conscious through his suffering.

A loving daughter writes, "no one knows how much he suffered, for he scarcely ever complained." He talked of his children, and committed the helpless one to the loving hearts and willing hands of the stronger. He talked to his children, expressed his tender love for them, and his approval of their conduct toward him, but above all, he talked to them of their obligations to their Heavenly Father, and pointed them to Him who was a Father to the fatherless. He spoke calmly of the hour of his departure, which he knew to be at hand; expressed his willingness to go if it was the master's will. But one desire seemed to cause him to cling to life, 'twas "to work more for the master and become more holy."

When Dr. Martin entered the room and asked him how it was, he answered in this verse of a favorite hymn—

"I know not what awaits me, God kindly veils mine eyes, And o'er each step of my onward way, He makes new scenes to rise. And every joy He sends me, Comes a sweet and glad surprise, Where He may lead I'll follow, My trust in Him repose, And every hour in perfect peace, I'll sing He knows. He knows."

But a few hours before his death, in a conversation with some of his former colleagues, he witnessed to the peace of God which filled his heart; expressed his thankfulness for the religion that comforts under all circumstances, and calms the spirit in death, and exclaimed: "It is all of grace, of grace." In his last moments there was not a struggle. He gently breathed away his life, and "fell on sleep." Truly, Brother Lynch was a consecrated man. That which was written of Barnabas, can well be chronicled of Brother William L. Lynch. He was a man "full of faith and of the Holy Ghost." He was an carnest and useful minister of the gospel of the Son of God. Difficulties and discouragements melted away before his unwavering confidence in the power of that gospel. His was an untarnished life, developing every day the practical duties and virtues of christianity, and he ever enjoyed the confidence and esteem of those among whom he lived, and for whom he labored.

As a friend, he was a friend indeed—never given to speak-evil of any. He was careful in his selection of friends, but attachments once formed were not easily broken. Those who knew him best, loved him the most. In the home, as the husband, he was tender and affectionate; as the father, he won strict obedience, as with firm but kind hand he swayed the sceptre of love, construing literally the words, "train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." He was careful to bring up his children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Six children survive him, four are in the church, one of whom writes: "We love God, and strive to obey Him, and live up to the rules of the church."

As a preacher he was faithful and fearless, of sound judgment, with depth and clearness of exposition. With impressive sincerity, and intense earnestness, the gospel was proclaimed and the appeal made with an evident consciousness of the fact, that though his appointment was of man, his call was of God. Every charge that he served prospered spiritually and materially, and this is the record which he leaves. "My relations have been always of the most pleasant character with my colleagues and Presiding Elders." His last message has been delivered, his last report has been made. He has entered into the joys of our Lord, and upon a new employ. We fellow-soldiers of the cross, his comrades in the army of God, as we assemble this hour to pay our tribute to his worth and his memory, "having the same spirit of faith," knowing that He which raised up the Lord Jesus, shall raise us up also by Jesus—knowing that because our Saviour lives, we also shall live, and in that new and better life, shall meet and greet again our departed brother, as together we shall stand to give an account of our ministry before the bar of that great Conference, presided over by the Bishop of our souls, can make melody in our hearts though the voice may of song be sad as we sing—

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease,
Life's well fought warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.
Soldier of Christ, well done,
Praise be thy new employ,
And while eternal ages run,
Rest in thy Savior's joy."

Rev. JOSEPH N. SPANGLER.

Rev. Joseph N. Spangler was born at Williamsport, Md., March 12, 1820, and died suddenly in the city of Baltimore, December 27, 1887.

He was converted in his early manhood, and at once made an entire consecration of himself to God. The new life into which he was inducted was to him so grateful and joyous a surprise, that he could not repress the expression of his desire that all around him should share in the same blessed experience. He rose from the spot where he had found the peace of pardon to exhort others to become partakers of "like precious faith." He felt that he was called of God to be a herald of salvation to his fellow-men. Shortly after his conversion, he was licensed to exhort, and subsequently to preach in a local relation.

On the 12th of March, 1845, he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, and was appointed to Bloomfield Circuit, Carlisle District, as junior preacher; in 1846 to Mifflin Circuit, in same relation. In 1847 he was ordained Deacon, admitted into full connection, and appointed to Berlin Mission. He was re-appointed to the same charge in 1848. In 1849 he was ordained Elder, and appointed to Concord Circuit, with Rev. J. H. C. Dosh as preacher in charge, and was re-assigned to the same charge in 1850, with Rev. D. Shoaff as junior preacher. In 1851 and '52 he was appointed to Cassville Circuit, Cumberland District; in 1853 to Stonerstown, and in 1854 and '55 to Shellsburg in the same District; and in 1856 to Birmingham, Pa. In 1857, when the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church was divided, Brother Spangler connected himself with the East Baltimore Conference. By this Conference he was assigned to Mercersburg, Pa.; in 1858 to Frederick Md.; in 1859 and '60 to Great Falls; in 1861 and '62 to McConnelsburg, Juniata District, Pa.

In 1863 he was noted on the minutes as "withdrawn from the connection." Having the courage of his convictions, he did not hesitate to avow his endorsement of the protest and resolutions of the Conference, at Staunton, Va., in March, 1861.

He was admitted into the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, at its session in Alexandria, in February, 1866. He was assigned a supernumerary relation, which he successively received each year until his death. It is known to many members of this body that that relation did not in his case imply a mere inactive appendage to the several appointments to which he bore this relation. He rendered most efficient service on Taylor's Circuit, and other appointments adjacent to Baltimore; at Hill Street Mission, North Baltimore, East Baltimore, and for some years past at St. Paul's in Baltimore. His last and crowning work was in connection with the missionary work of that charge. About three years ago, prompted by that ardent desire to work for his Master, which has stimulated his entire christian life, he made an effort in the extreme southwestern portion of Baltimore, to gather together a group of neglected children, and afford them that religious instruction which they failed to receive at home. Against many difficulties and drawbacks, he succeeded, with the help of a few faithful co-laborers, in establishing a sunday school, and conducting religious service regularly twice a week. When about a year and a half ago, the erection of a chapel was projected for the benefit of the mission, he entered with great zest into the enterprise, and gave his heartiest support to the pastor of the church and others who had the enterprise in charge. He was rejoiced beyond measure at the spiritual success which attended the work after the dedication and occupancy of the chapel. He was indefatigable in his labors in behalf of the mission up to the very day that the fital stroke prostrated him at the threshold of his own home. Though thus suddenly deprived of consciousness, and of the opportunity of giving any final expression to his christian faith and hope, yet his record was on high, and his devoted, useful life has left us all the assurance we could ask as to his glorious and blessed destiny.

Brother Spangler was characterized by great humility of spirit. His piety, though marked, as has been seen, by great activity and zeal, was of the most unpretentious and unobtrusive character. Like his divine Lord and Master, he was "meek and lowly in mind." He esteemed it an honor to render any service, however humble, to the cause of Christ. He illustrated in a striking degree that beautiful precept of the New Testament: "In lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself."

He was a man of great kindliness of heart. Generous, sympathetic and self-sacrificing, he was ever ready to minister to the welfare and happiness of others, at any cost of his personal comfort and convenience.

He was pre-eminently "given to hospitality." Heart hand and home were always open to welcome the sojourner, and especially the Methodist itinerant, to his genial fireside. He was emphatically a man of faith. With childlike simplicity he accepted the truth of God's word without questioning, appropriating its precious promises as his personal and daily inheritance. His trust in God, in His faithfulness and love, was unwavering, and no circumstance or change in life could affect his confidence or destroy his peace. Intent upon saving souls he was the instrument in the hands of God of bringing many to Christ. Has he not already begun to realize the reward of those who "turn many to righteousness," and who "shall shine as the brightness of the firmament forever and ever?"

II

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

It is gratifying to report the steady growth of the Sunday School work in our territory.

The summary of the year's work shows an increase of 16 schools, 1,612 scholars; also, 1,432 conversions—making the aggregate in the conference 40,000 officers, teachers and scholars. There is an advance all along the line of our Sunday School work. More schools, more teachers, more scholars, better equipment, increased zeal according to knowledge, and large returns in spirituality, numerical strength, and financial ability to the whole Church. This is only the reasonable and expected result from the careful attention that is being given to the Sunday School work in our own, and all other Christian Churches. The Church, or individual christian, that has not felt the contagion of a holy zeal in the Sunday School work, is sadly out of harmony with the times in which we live. With the helps at hand, we know how to do this work, and are helped in doing it.

It is not vanity to assert that our Conference stands in front rank of the Sunday School work. We must maintain this position, and move forward-

"Our Conventions," "Institutes," "District Conference Day," and "Children's Day," furnish the organized body in which, and through which, spiritual life asserts itself.

The work done through these organizations may be silent and unheralded, but the results are seen in the life inspired, and local energy awakened through their operations.

In order to reach the highest efficiency, we must work according to the methods adopted by the General and Annual Conferences. Hence we recommend and urge the use of all the helps furnished through our Central Boards, and the observance of all the special methods that may be recommended by the Conference. Use the Sunday School literature of our own Church. Take an active interest in our Conference Sunday School Convention. Give the "Institute" a fair and honest trial, and let the "Children's Day" be the gala Whitsuntide of the last decade of the 19th century. "Children's Day" demands our careful cultivation. The child loves to be the distributor of the parents' alms, so the children of the Church love to be the almoner of the Church.

The Treasurer's report shows that \$347.50 were distributed to the needy schools. A few figures will show what this money can do: It will furnish 200 Magazines, 300 Senior Quarterlies, 1,000 Intermediate Quarterlies, 500 Little People, 50 Note Books, 500 Word Hymn Books, and \$32.50 for Library Books.

In other words, with this amount we could equip 200 teachers and 1,800 scholars.

This is no mean result, and is only made the more encouraging when we consider that it may safely be calculated that this much relief will stimulate to, at least, a like sum of local provision, hence your Board would urge the enthusiastic observance of "Children's Day" by all of our schools. Let

superintendents and teachers spare no pains or labor to make this day full of delight to the children.

But thus far we have presented those features that pertain to the outward organization, and inward systematizing of the school. The vital principle lies within. In that which attracts, interests, teaches, wins, and leads the children to Christ.

We want to lead the children to Christ—save them from sin, and train them Heavenward. To do this, we deem it of the utmost importance:

1. That, in the school, and before the children, no jarring or discord should appear. Let the relation between the pastor, the superintendent and teachers be so perfectly harmonious that no hindrance be put in the way of the conversion of the children. Children should feel that in the school the deepest interest is taken in their salvation.

Parents should feel that in sending their children to the school, they are placing them under pure religious influence. A word to parents may be dropped here. Can you be indifferent to the work of the school, when you know its deep interest in your children? Will you not study to show to your children your appreciation of the Sunday School?

2. To make the children of the schools prominent participants in the public congregational exercises. Pulpit services lose nothing of their value when shaped for, and directed to, the children. Hence they should frequently be brought into the Church as a school—massed together—to lead in the singing, and take such part in the exercises as the occasion may require or permit. It is a matter of common observation that children's services in the Church are always attractive to adults. The parent will not be absent on an occasion that fills the soul of the child with delight. It is God's law in us that our children's joy or sorrows are ours.

We cherish the memory of our pious parents, and the holy men and women who have sought to do us good. But the mounds we moisten with our tears, and strew with flowers, force upon us the questions: "The fathers, where are they? and the prophets, do they live forever?" while the loving care we bestow upon our children is sustained and brightened by the assurance that, "Instead of the fathers shall be thy children, whom thou mayest make princes in all the earth."

3. The careful cultivation of the study of the lesson by parents, teachers and children. It is not saying too much when we say no teacher can furnish himself or herself for the work of teaching a class by the rapid glancing over the lessons, after going into the school room, as is too often the custom. Therefore, we urge regular teachers' meetings, and Bible Classes, for the study of the lessons. The children justly claim the attention of the teacher, as soon as they report at the school; nor ought the teacher to leave the class until the close of the service.

Great care has been taken to accurately map out the work for home study. Everything on the page of the lesson leaf is put there for this end. The Lesson Page, the Golden Text, The Reference Word, the Passages for daily reading, have all been selected with care, and form one connected whole to embody the fullest truths of the lesson for the day, and to best illustrate

these truths. Let them all be studied. R and the daily selections on the day for which they are given. Let parents join with their children in these lessons. Remember we are to teach them. Do not say, "it will not do for me to learn my children's lessons for them. They require that you do this, and they will learn it, and will learn it as you teach it to them." But if possible, we would urge that some attention be given to every part of the lesson, as we teach it to our classes. And

¹4. Let all the schools be organized into Missionary Societies. Teach them to give—give of their own—give that for which they have labored—give that which they would love to keep for themselves.

⁵The Executive Committee of the Baltimore Conference Sunday School Society are authorized, and requested to prepare and publish the Programme for the Annual Sunday School Convention, to be held at Berryville, Va.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Randolph Macon College.

The increasing prosperity of this College, under the immediate patronage of the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences, is gratifying to every lover of christian education. The self-sacrificing zeal and christian devotion of the President and Professors of this Institution, should enlist our prayers and most hearty co operation for its highest success.

Mind consecrated to God and His service, and trained under christian teachers, is a blessing to the church.

We are glad to know it is intensely religious in its spirit, and thoroughly Methodistic.

Professor J. A. Kern is doing good work, in preparing the young men for the ministry.

There has been a considerable increase in the attendance of students, from 109 last year, to 165 this session—125 are members of the church—40 are ministerial students—16 from the Baltimore Conference and 24 from the Virginia Conference. These and many other facts give encouragement as to the moral advantages our young men have at this College.

The course of study is complete and thorough, the mental training and the graduation, of a high order, her graduates are sought after as teachers in our colleges and schools.

The physical culture department is a new feature in the College, developing the body to the better use and strength of the mind.

The sanitary condition of the College is excellent. The grounds and buildings have been much improved. \$7,000 has been added this year, in general improvements, by special gifts.

The Young Men's Christian Association, in their library, reading room and necessary conveniences, have every comfort and advantage.

The financial condition of the College is especially encouraging. It is virtually free from debt.

The endowment fund has reached fully \$100,000.

The Virginia Conference is doing noble work in behalf of the College, in the way of endowment; and it becomes the Baltimore Conference to unite with her in the same good work.

In order to aid indigent students, the highest individual liberality, as well as the most encouraging efforts on the part of the Conference, in the educational collections, and any aid society that may be formed, will be needed.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That we most cordially recommend to our people, any effort that may be made in the endowment of the College; and as the Virginia Conference proposes to raise \$125,000 or more, the Baltimore Conference should raise \$50,000 at least, toward this fund; and that we heartily endorse President W. W. Smith in his faithful and successful efforts in this direction, and we also recommend that the Conference, through the Joint Board of Finance, continue their annual assessment of \$2,000, for the benefit of the College.

The Valley Female College.

From the report of the Conference Visiting Committee, from the testimony of those who have patronized the school, and from the representations of eapable and trustworthy eye-witnesses of its daily workings, we are pleased to learn that the Valley Female College, located in Winchester, Virginia, continues to deserve our commendation and patronage.

From these sources of information we learn that due prominence is given to physical health and culture; that the mental training, also, is thorough and complete, the president being assisted by a full corps of competent instructors; that special attention is given to the formation and cultivation of a religious character. It may be interesting to state, that at a recent sacramental service in the town, every pupil in the school knelt at the altar to-commemorate the Savior's death.

Believing, therefore, that this College is doing a work that would not else be done by any other institution of learning in our midst, we heartily commend it to the favorable notice and patronage of our people, and othershaving daughters or wards to educate.

Wesleyan Female Institute.

Your Committee would most respectfully report that we have carefully examined the report of Rev. W. A. Harris, the President of the Wesleyan Female Institute, together with the report of the lease made recently by the Board of Trustees, and would say that we approve of the terms of the lease; it assures, we think, that in the course of time the whole property, real and personal, will be preserved to the Board of Trustees of our church. The property is leased to W. A. Harris, the present President, for a term of five years, with the privilege of seven years additional for the sum of \$3,200 per annum. By said lease, the amount to be appropriated for improvements is limited to the sum of \$300 per annum.

It is expected by the Board of Trustees, that the whole debt of \$24,975.51, will be paid off in about thirteen or fourteen years, or less; and then our church, through the Board of Trustees, will own the property, worth at least \$40,000.

It affords us great pleasure to most cordially recommend the Wesleyan Female Institute to the most favorable consideration of the great Methodist family, and to the public generally, as an Institution of the very highest grade, and we cordially ask the ministers and lay delegates to our Conference to bestir themselves in behalf of this Institution.

The Board of Education having under consideration the subject of the proper preparation of young men, who feel themselves called of God to the work of the ministry, and who offer themselves to our Conference, beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Conference Board of Ministerial Education, consisting of one minister and one layman from each district be appointed by the Bishop annually.

The Board shall elect a chairman, secretary and treasurer, and executive committee of five, and for convenience of location, this committee shall have power to elect three members of the Board, in addition to those appointed by the Bishop. The Board may also fill all vacancies occurring between the sessions of the Conference.

The Board so constituted shall be charged with the duty of raising and applying funds to aid young men who feel called to the work of the ministry, and who offer themselves to our Conference to secure a proper educational preparation for that work, if, after careful investigation of their qualifications and promise, they shall be satisfied that they deserve and need such assistance and only to the extent of that necessity.

All persons receiving such aid shall be under the supervision of this Board during the course of their studies.

Any pastoral charge which shall contribute one hundred dollars to this fund, may nominate a young man from its membership, to the Board, and if eligible under its regulations, he shall be made a beneficiary of the fund, in preference to others applying without such nomination.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Conference Board of Church Extension, in presenting its fifth annual report, assumes that the practical value of this important enterprise of the church is being better understood, as its fruits are multiplied among us.

During the comparatively brief period of its existence, aid has been extended to forty-three churches within our Conference territory. The erection of many of these, we may safely say a majority of them, would not have been undertaken but for the timely help thus afforded. Regarding each church as a centre of religious power and influence, an instrument of blessing and salvation to its immediate neighborhood, the spiritual results growing out of this increase of houses of worship, perpetuated from year to year, must tell most happily upon the welfare of the church and the souls of men.

While our Conference compares favorably with most other Conferences in our connection in its contributions to this great object, yet it still falls far short of the urgent and reasonable demands upon it. An average of ten cents per member, would more than meet the full assessment upon us. Instead of this, at no time since the incipiency of this movement, have we reached two-thirds of the amount apportioned to our Conference. The consequence has been, that each year we have been reluctantly compelled to decline some of the applications for aid, and to reduce the appropriations where help is granted. In dispensing our funds we have placed them where we thought the most good could be accomplished and the cases seemed most urgent.

The following appropriations have been made at our present session: to the Church at Eagle Rock, Botetourt County, Roanoke District, \$150; to Trinity Church, Monroe County, W. Va., Lewisburg District, \$150; to Church on Woodland and Hebron Mission, Lewisburg District, \$75; to Bennett Chapel, Warren County, Winchester District, \$100; to Hopkins Chapel, Shenandoah County, Va., Rockingham District, \$75; to Mt. Pleasant Church, Montgomery County, Md., Baltimore District, \$75; to Grace Mission Chapel, Washington City, Washington District, \$100; to Mt. Zion Church, Howard County, Md., Baltimore District, \$100; to Manassas Church, Washington District, \$100; to Coe-Memorial Church, (Blue Sulphur Springs,) Greenbrier County, W. Va., Lewisburg District, \$250; Piney Grove Church, District of Columbia, Baltimore District, conditional appropriation of \$50; making a total of absolute and conditional appropriations this year of \$1,225. This is the largest amount appropriated at any one time since the organization of the Board.

As the assessment upon the Conference this year is \$500 less than the year before, may it not be hoped that the preachers in charge will make an extraordinary effort to bring up the assessments for the incoming year in full? The manifold benefits accruing through this beneficent agency, becoming more and more apparent every day, should stimulate every true minister and member of the church earnestly to seek its promotion. We cannot commend too highly the example of one of our laymen, who has not only greatly stimulated church building in his District, but, by his personal suggestion and supervision, has seen to it that every new church structure has conformed to the canon of architectural taste and finish. Indeed, one of the good effects of church extension is not only to multiply houses of worship, but to provide for their erection in an attractive style. Catalogues containing a great variety of designs, are furnished free of cost; and plans by skilled

architects, accompanied by all the necessary specifications, at prices so moderate as to put them within the reach of all.

We call special attention to the "Woman's Department of Church Extension," instituted by our last General Conference, and designed to aid in the erection of parsonages, not only in the older portions of our territory, but especially upon the western and southwestern frontier. A Conference society upon this plan was organized at our last session; but, owing to the circumstance that several of the ladies elected as District Secretaries declined to serve, but little has yet been accomplished in this direction. We are about perfecting the organization, however, and hope soon to put it into effective operation.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTREESTS.

Your committee respectfully submit the following report:

- 1. It gives us pleasure to learn from the business manager of our Publishing House, in a report submitted July 15th, 1887, that the debt has been reduced from \$80,550.00 to \$47,400.00, which amount represents the entire indebtedness of the House. And to also learn that the balance in the sinking fund and cash on hand, when applied to this indebtedness, will reduce the debt to \$25,000.00.
- 2. The Christian Advocate, published at Nashville, as the general organ of the church, and intended to impart information of the progress and work of every interest of the church, we think might better serve the object of its founding by publishing fewer items of a mere local character—being the only weekly periodical authorized by the General Conference, it should be in every Methodist family.
- 3. We rejoice to know that our Sunday School literature, which so fully meets the wants of the church has grown in favor, and we trust will ere long

be used throughout our entire connection, to the exclusion of such Sunday School literature as fails to teach the distinctive features of Methodism. We deeply regret that the issue of our graded catechisms has been so long delayed, and that the church has been inconvenienced and disappointed by not having the revised Hymnal.

4. The Missionary Reporter and the Woman's Missionary Advocate, being devoted to the interests of Foreign Missions, deserve the hearty support of

the church, and we recommend them to our people.

5. The Southern Methodist Review, we are led to believe, has extended its circulation, but deserves enlarged patronage, and we commend it to our

Ministers and people.

- 6. We call special attention to the Book Depository under the direction of Rev. B. F. Ball, and located at Baltimore, Md. Brother Ball's experience and approved business qualifications, authorize us to advise all within the boundary of our Conference to obtain such works as they may need, through him. We request his reappointment to the work so satisfactorily discharged heretofore by him.
- 7. The Episcopal Methodist, as a local organ, is almost indispensable to our Conference. It has been well and safely managed, and has proven a blessing to the homes it has visited.

We be peak for it a liberal support, and request the reappointment of Rev. W. K. Boyle, D. D., as editor.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We are still convinced that the use of alcoholic stimulants as a beverage is the most fruitful source of crime, wretchedness and pauperism, as well as one of the strongest foes to everything that is honest, pure and good; and we would therefore offer the following resolutions:

1st. That we most heartily approve the action of our last General Conference on this subject, and the chapter in the Discipline which recognizes the manufacture of spirituous liquors as an immorality, except for mechanical, medicinal and scientific purposes, as well as the selling and use of the same, save in cases of necessity.

2d Believing the saloon to be the greatest enemy of society and religious progress, and the nursery of an evil forbidden in the Word of God, we will rejoice to see the day when, through the influence and power of the Gospel, and through the passage and enforcement of wise and wholesome laws, this evil shall be utterly extirpated.

3d. That we will continue to pray and to preach against the evil of intemperance, and to do all we can, consistently as christian men and ministers, to hasten the overthrow of the rum power.

REPORT ON THE EXAMINATION OF DISTRICT CONFERENCE RECORDS.

Your committee beg leave to report the examination of the Conference Records of seven districts, as follows:

Baltimore District—A new and suitable book containing the Minutes of the District Conference of 1887, which are legibly and neatly recorded and properly signed. It is noticed, however, that the roll of the Conference does not designate the relation of the clerical members viz: Preacher in charge, junior preacher, supernumerary, superannuated or local preacher.

East Baltimore District—There is no fault to be found with the book, or the manner in which the record has been kept.

Winchester District—The book is suitable in style, and the minutes neatly recorded. The roll of the Conference is transcribed without mention of the official relation of members.

Rockingham District—A small memorandum book was submitted as a substitute for the original record book, which had been misplaced, but your committee have been assured that the original will be found, and the proceedings properly recorded. The book presented is unsuitable for a permanent record. The same defect in the Conference roll is noticed in this case.

Moorefield District—Book suitable, neatly recorded and in proper form, except as to Conference roll, in which the Sunday School delegates are not designated.

Roanoke District—The book is in fair condition, the binding being indifferent. The Conference roll is tabulated in convenient form, under headings showing the official relation of delegates. The minutes are legibly recorded, but not with the care in details which other districts have observed.

Lewisburg District—Book in good condition and suitable in every respect. Minutes neatly and legibly recorded. There is a failure in some instances to insert the page number, where reference is made in the minutes to reports which are recorded in an appendix.

The records of Washington District were not presented for examination.

All the records examined were properly signed.

East Baltimore and Lewisburg present the best records in all respects, and particularly in the matter of marginal notes, which greatly faciliates reference to special items of business.

Your committee suggests, that too much care cannot be taken in the preparation of records, which may become links in the history of Southern Methodism.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PAINE INSTITUTE.

Your committee, to whom was referred the paper of the Commission of Education, together with the report of the Rev. Geo. Wm. Walker, President of Paine Institute, would say that this is no new matter; but that it has had the endorsement of two General Conferences. One thing is settled: the church has committed herself to the work of establishing Christian Schools in behalf of her ecclesiastical offspring--The Colored Methodist Episcopal Church in America. Your committee is greatly pleased with the progress of Paine Institute, in the work she is appointed to do. We are pleased to know that her work is growing upon the confidence of our church, and especially of the people who come in immediate contact with it. This demonstrates the wisdom of the movement, and the groundlessness of the fears entertained by some at its inauguration.

By every token we are urged, not only to establish The Paine Institute, but to extend and enlarge this enterprise until the whole South is reached, and the colored church, as our representative in giving the Gospel to the negro, is qualified to do so with an intelligent ministry. The Conference will remember the visit of the Commissioner to us two years ago, and the request of the

Board that we would assume the payment of \$650, as our part of a sum needed to purchase a habitation for the Institute, and that upon the performance of this, depended a twenty-five thousand dollar donation from Rev. M. M. Paine. The Conference did assume that amount, and what was not taken by individual members, was directed to be divided among the districts, and collected during the year. It appears from the Treasurer's book, including what has been paid the Commissioner during this session, that only about \$350 has been received on the amount assumed—\$650.

Our lamented and glorified Bro. Lynch, was appointed collecting agent of this fund for the Conference; a number of brethren state that they paid over their subscription to him last Conference; it will be remembered that he left the seat of Conference sick, and that he died very suddenly a short time after his arrival home. The reasonable explanation is that he was wholly disabled from making any report of these amounts to the Treasurer. No reflection is intended upon our precious brother—it was entirely providential. But we can better afford to lose it than Paine Institute. We hope it will be the pleasure of the Conference to provide here and now for the small balance of this apportionment—in round numbers, \$300 There is only a small balance due on the grounds and buildings of \$1,000. When this is paid, which we have good hope will be by the first of May, the church will come in unquestioned rights to property that is worth anywhere from \$15,000 to \$25,000; also the \$25,000 endowment from Bro. Paine.

In conclusion, we beg to offer the following:

Resolved by the Baltimore Conference, That we give our heartiest endorsement to the movement of our church in behalf of our former slaves—the negroes of the South—and of which Paine Institute stands as a representative; and we hereby extend to the Commissioner of Education an invitation to visit our charges at any time that suits his convenience, and that we will take pleasure in co-operating with him.

REPORT OF THE LAY DELEGATES, ON THE BETTER SUPPORT OF THE MINISTRY THROUGHOUT THE CONFERENCE.

We beg to submit, that in obedience to the resolution of the Conference in annual meeting assembled, we, the Lay Delegates, met and fully discussed the question of the insufficiency of salaries allowed and paid our preachers.

It is a matter of painful regret to us, that so small salaries are paid, and that so many deficiencies annually occur.

We express, without hesitation, our conviction and belief, that this state of affairs is attributable largely to the illiberality of the stewards, and the lack of recognition on their part, of the duties solemnly made incumbent upon them in this important relation under our church polity. It is our desire to put ourselves squarely upon the record as favoring the maximum allowance for the preachers' salary, and to utterly repudiate any middle ground in this matter.

It is proper however, for us to remind the preachers of the Conference in the effective relation, that it is with them, under the laws of our church, to select liberal, large hearted, diligent stewards, or the reverse, those who are illiberal and indifferent. We therefore earnestly appeal to our brethren in the ministry, to assist us of the laity, in the effort to advance their temporal interests, by the selection of stewards who meet all the requirements contemplated by our Discipline, and by excercising discretion in the number required to do the work wisely and well, rather than nominate the full complement, and the progress of the working force, be thereby possibly impeded.

We are surprised upon examination and observation, to ascertain the large amounts paid on Conference claims, and the meagre pittance of some of our pastors' salaries, when contrasted therewith.

It shall be our pleasure and earnest endeavor to effect a radical reformation in this department of church work, and we invoke in this behalf the assistance of the preachers of the Conference, whether as Presiding Elders of Districts, or Preachers in charge of Stations or Circuits.

Bro. M. L. Walton of Winchester District, has been appointed by us to prepare a suitable letter, on the subject of better support for our ministry after proper statistics have been procured from the Minutes of the present session of the Conference; the said letter to be published in the Episcopal Methodist, and in the form of a circular.

In this connection, we deem it advisable to suggest a plan for the raising of salaries, which is recommended on work where there is a deficiency, or which has no scheme, or none better, viz: let the stewards severally accept the proper apportionment of the membership, and assess them reasonably, according to the financial status of each case; then distribute envelopes with printed instructions thereon. Ten envelopes are to be given each member of the church, which are to be returned monthly to the stewards.

Monthly meetings of the stewards should be held, and if any member fails to return the envelope during the month, then the steward having the name of any such member is to give his personal attention to the matter.

The member paying should be credited in a book specially provided and kept for the purpose, which is to be forthcoming at all meetings of the stewards.

The system can be modified so as to suit the peculiarities of any of the charges or circuits so desiring, but we urge as far as practicable, uniformity of system.

We include the hope, and ardently pray that the Lord of the harvest will impress our people with the important truth, that "the laborer is worthy of his hire," and that it may be their characteristic joy to devise liberal things for His servants and our beloved pastors.

We therefore submit:

- 1st. That the preparation of a letter bearing upon the better support of the ministry, should come from the laymen of the church.
- 2d. Such letter should bear the endorsement of Bishop A. W. Wilson, that it may go forth with the authority of this Conference.
- 3d. A letter which would meet the need of the church, cannot be satisfactorily prepared within the remaining hours of the present session of the Conference. Therefore—

Resolved, It is the opinion of the lay members of this Annual Conference, that the support now paid to the ministry under its jurisdiction, is not equivalent to the service performed, and that the close relation of pastor to his people, calls for and demands more than a mere support.

Resolved, That Bro. M. L. Walton be and is hereby appointed to prepare a circular letter, for and in behalf of the lay members of this Conference, addressed to the membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, within the bounds of the Baltimore Annual Conference, urging the necessity and obligation for a more liberal and better support for the ministry of our church, that in this particular, our branch of the church of Christ may do her duty and take her proper place among sister denominations.

Resolved, That the letter above mentioned shall be submitted to Bishop A. W. Wilson, for such endorsement and approval as he may deem proper.

Resolved, That the plan of raising funds for ministerial support be that of assessment, as directed by the Discipline, in preference to all others; and that suggestions be made by Bro. Walton, (in an addenda to the circular letter,) regarding the best methods of raising such funds.

Resolved, That (25000) twenty-five thousand copies of the said circular letter be printed for distribution to the membership of the several stations and circuits, and that the lay delegates to this annual Conference pledge themselves for the expense of printing the same.

Resolved, That the circular letter shall be prepared and ready for issue, within thirty days from the adjournment of this Conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The Conference year now at a close, has been one not out of the usual order of the Woman's Missionary Society. The slow, yet sure and steady growth that marked its history in former years, continues to characterize it.

Accessions have been made both in membership and number of auxiliaries but here and there some societies have almost become inactive, and thus loss has been sustained; however, there is hope that as spring opens, these will again bud and blossom into life. During the year new work has been inaugurated in the Lewisburg District, where we have not hitherto had any auxiliaries. We are grateful to our Brethren of the Ministry for invaluable service rendered in the extension of work, both in this and in other Districts. While confident many already feel burdened with the press of duties upon time and attention, we cannot but appeal for further assistance in the work before us. We need your aid and counsel. A District Secretary, timid and shrinking, yet with a heart burning with fervor and zeal for unsaved souls, writes: "My courage would fail me to undertake these duties, but for the encouragement and hearty co-operation of my presiding elder and preacher in charge." Will not every pastor and presiding elder "help those women" that this department of christian work may prosper and accomplish results commensurate with its possibilities and demands? There are only 61 congregations in which are auxiliaries, some of these support two societies, an adult and a juvenile. In 4 other congregations, there are members who annually send their dues to the Conference Treasurer. Are there not many other churches and stations where auxiliaries can be sustained? None can better judge and decide than you who have the oversight and are familiar with the surroundings and capabilities of the people. We earnestly seek your aid, asking that during the coming year you will so present the subject that auxiliaries may be formed, or we may at least claim members in every congregation.

Last October, at the annual meeting which convened in St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, we had with us Miss N. E. Holding, missionary from the Mexican border. The demand for enlargement in that field could not be met by appropriation, and the Woman's Board had granted Miss Holding permission to make individual appeals for the amount needed. Her clear statement at the annual meeting, of the work at hand, enthused many hearts and quickened zeal, which has been evidenced by the gifts brought into the Treasury for Laredo Seminary. Encouraged by past success, and looking forward to a more abundant harvest through the power of the Holy Spirit, we close this imperfect sketch of woman's work in the Baltimore Conference.
