

WEDNESDAY, March 23, 1892.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Eighth Session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Harrisonburg, Virginia, Wednesday morning, March 23, 1892, at 9 o'clock.

Rev. Bishop John C. Keener, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair.

The Bishop read from the scriptures. 1 Pet., chap. III.

Hymn 228-

"And are we yet alive,"

was sung by the Conference, and the Bishop led in prayer.

Roll called—By request of the President, Rev. James E. Armstrong, the Secretary of the last Annual Conference, called the roll of the clerical members, and also of lay representatives. One hundred and four clerical members and eighteen lay representatives responded to the call of their names.

REPORTS.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. HENRY HOFFMAN.

Henry Hoffman, son of Henry and Gescha Hoffman, was born in the town of Severn, Kingdom of Hanover, Germany, on the 28th day of May, 1814. In the year 1831 he left his native country to come to America. For several years he found a home in the city of Baltimore. In the fall of 1833 he was converted and united with what was then the William Street Church. On the 28th day of May, 1839, at the first Quarterly Conference of that church he was licensed to exhort, Rev. Norval Wilson, P. E., and Rev. B. N. Brown, P. C. On the 16th of September, 1840, he was licensed to preach. In 1841 he was received on trial by the Baltimore Conference, which met in Baltiwas received on trial by the Baltimore Conference, which met in Baltimore on the 16th of January. He was sent that year to Woodstock, Va. 1842 he served Bellefonte Circuit. On the 19th of March, 1843, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Waugh, at Wesley Chapel, Baltimore, and was sent to Clearfield: 1844 to Warrior's Mark, Pa. On the 16th day of March, 1845, at Charles Street Church, Baltimore, he was ordained Elder by Bishop Hedding, and that year traveled Franklin Circuit, Va.; 1846 Springfield Circuit; 1847 Sunbury, Pa.; 1848 Bloody Run, Pa.; 1849 Frostburg, Md.; 1850 Bald Eagle, Pa. In the spring of 1851 he was happily united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth P. Huntley, of New London, Conn., who, for forty-one years was his faithful helper, adviser, comforter and companion in all the vissitudes of life. She survives him, and now mourns his departure. He was sent that year to New Washington, Pa.; 1852-3 to Sinnamahoning, Pa.; 1854-5 Williamsville, Rockingham District, Va.; 1856-7 Lost River; 1858-9 New Creek; 1860. Lacy's Spring; 1861, West Rockingham, all in Rockingham District. In 1862, he was again named for New Creek, which place he could not reach because of the disturbed condition of the country. In 1866 he went from Harrisonburg to New Creek, now Keyser, whose there was neither prescher nor house of washin, the churches where there was neither preacher nor house of worship, the churches having all been destroyed during the war. Here he succeeded in securing a building where he preached regularly, as well as in the country surrounding. During the winter of 1868 he had a severe spell of sickness, by which he was much enfeebled. By the advice of his Presiding Elder, Rev. J. C. Dice, he sought and obtained the following spring a superannuated relation. Yet to him this did not mean a listless life. From this time until 1875, when this charge was made a regular appointment by Rev. Wesley Hammond, Brother Hoffman did much effective work. Soon after his superannuation Brother Hoffman, in connection with a layman, collected together a few children and began a Sunday-school. In this work he took a special interest, and here makes he did some of the best work of his life. From this school and here, perhaps, he did some of the best work of his life. From this school

he was seldom absent until the last three Sabbaths he spent on earth, Says his pastor, Brother Coe: "His devotion to his Sunday-school class, considering his age and feebleness, was something wonderful. He devoured everything accessible that shed light on the lesson and latterly read nothing besides." As an evidence of the good work he did, let the following from a letter written to his son by a young Jew who was in his Sunday-school class for several years testify. The letter speaks in glowing terms of Brother Hoffman's character, and thus concludes: "If there is any reward beyond the grave for well-doing here, Mr. Hoffman is certainly reaping that reward now."

Let it be borne in mind that Brother Hoffman was by no means of a strong, but rather delicate constitution, at times suffering intensely. Yet, when the Master's call came for a workman, his response was, "Here am I, send me." He never missed an appointment when it was possible for him to reach it. His protracted meetings were always the means of good, and resulted in the conversion of many souls. As a man the local paper thus speaks of him: "As a neighbor and friend he was always pleasant and urbane, with a kind greeting for everybody, and we shall greatly miss him." Says his pastor, "His presence in the congregation was a benediction, and his cheering words after the sermon are greatly missed by me." He delighted, too, to go into the homes of the people with his pastor, and on errands of mercy. Indeed he was ready for any good work.

On New-Year's Day he visited his pastor; on the morning of the 2d of January he arose, apparently in his usual health. In a little while he complained of being unwell, and said he would lie down. It was the summons for him to go Home. On the 12th day of January, at 5.45 P. M., "he fell on sleep."

During his illness the ministers of the sister churches of the place visited him, and, in response to their inquiries he replied: "It is all well; I have no fears." To his own pastor, Brother Coe, he said: "If I do not meet with you at Harrisonburg tell my brethren of the Conference that my heart is with them, and give them my love." The morning of the day of his death he requested his youngest son to read to him the 121st Psalm; those beautiful words which set forth the great safety of the godly who put their trust in God's protection. Just before he died, in reply to his wife, be said: "Yes, it is all bright," and soon after he added: "Meet me in Heaven." Then he left on earth the partner in his joys and sorrows, his beloved wife, with her two devoted sons, to join in heaven two sons, a lovely little daughter and a host of friends who had preceded him to that land where—

"Sickness, sorrow, pain and death Are felt and feared no more."

Truly a good man has gone home.

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease,
And life's long warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.
Soldier of Christ, well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages run,

Rev. JOHN LANDSTREET.

When a man of such acknowledged uniqueness as our deceased brother, John Landstreet, is to be the subject of a paper assuming to be a sketch, however brief, of his life, the task becomes as delicate as the life was interesting. The difficulty of such an undertaking is compensated for, it may be allowed, by

the singleness of purpose threading the various events of the career. Born in Baltimore, Md., April 23d, 1818, of parents descended from Huguenot ancestry, Brother Landstreet was in mature life by the time he came to pass through critical periods of civil and Ecclesiastical change. In such periods the patriotism and loyalty to conviction peculiar to his lineage were to be put to the thorough test necessary to determine fully a man's moral calibre. Anticipating somewhat the chief line of his life we may here glance at the peculiar union of co rage and humaneness observed in his war record. no doubt, bore in mind that his own race, generations back, had been driven before a relentless power, and so he trained himself to be pitiful as well as A fellow-soldier, who knew him well, says of him: "The history of Stuart's Cavalry during the entire war was replete with many incidents in which our favorite chaplain was a most conspicious character, ever ready to lend a helping hand, to administer comfort to the sick and wounded, and to offer consolation to the dying soldier on the field of battle. He never neglected an opportunity to hold divine service in the regiment whenever an opportunity presented itself, and that in an able, zealous and impressive man-His services among the wounded and dying soldiers, sons of his old friends and relatives, were of the most affecting character. He would march and fight with our regiment all day, and spend the night administering comfort and consolation in the hospital; or bear the sad tidings of death to the home of afflicted parents." Such piety and philanthropy were the outcome of a religious experience, which was clear, decided and satisfying. converted at a camp-meeting when a young man, becoming a member of the old Charles Street Church. The natural energy of his temperament soon urged him to great zeal in the church and he turned towards the neglected with the gospel. An obituary notice from one of his friends states that with Alfred Cookman, Gershom Broadbent and others, he organized the "Seaman's This is one of the best known and most successful of Methodist Home Missions in Baltimore. We find that he was licensed to preach in 1847, and served Bladensburg Circuit under Presiding Elder J. A. Collins until March, 1848, when the following became the order of his successive fields of labor: In 1848 he was appointed to Stafford's Circuit; in 1849 to Fairfax; in 1850 to Bladensburg; in 1851 to Lexington; in 1852 to Shippensburg; in 1853 to Georgetown; in 1854 to Woodville; in 1855 6 to Warrenton, where occurred under his ministry one of the most gracious revivals ever blessing that community. 1857-58 was his first term at Martinsburg; 1859-60 he was stationed at Leesburg, Loudon County; in 1861 he went to the adjoining Circuit of Loudoun. He preached here one year, entering the Confederate Army as chaplain to the First Virginia Cavalry under Genl. J. E. B. Stuart. Upon the surrender of Lee, he resumed his work on Loudon Circuit, filling there, in all, five years. Perhaps in none of his charges had he a better chance to show his skill in organizing than in this section, somewhat seri-ously affected by war. He left the Circuit in a fine condition, going in 1869 to Hillsboro, where he successfully passed four years; 1874 he spent in Piedmont, W. Va ; 1875-6 on Baltimore Circuit; in 1877 he was agent for the Wesleyan Female Institute, and zealously did he labor for its highest good. He made friends for it, procured for it the best patronage, and to his death was its loyal friend and champion. 1878-80 he was in Arlington, Md. 1881-83 at Martinsburg the second time making there, as before, friends who rendered so pleasant his last days. 1884, at Cumberland, and 1885, at Piedmont, were his last years of active service. At Staunton, in 1886, in touching words he asked for a superannuated relation, which he sustained till his death. It was in this apparent routine work that his individuality, so far from being lost, became conspicuous. By nature he was what might be termed a social genius. never forgot old acquaintances, because always more or less inverested in everybody. Intensely magnetic, he drew about him the heterogeneous elements of a congregation or community, attracting peculiarly the young people. With these he proceeded to draw forth their best powers, endeavoring to give every one something to do in the work of the church. The pastorate was his In it he was a power, because a preacher as well as pastor. He was as striking in appearance as in character. He is said to have resembled Carvosso; he certainly also did look very much like Spurgeon. Energy, sympathy, alertness, and significant gesture kept the attention of his audience intact; while quickness in thinking, and an earnest presentation of a simple, precious message, satisfied his attentive hearers. As he was a most entertaining talker, so he was a most felicitous extempore speaker. In conversation, in writing, in preaching and in praying, he was singularly fluent. Intent upon achieving some purpose in every discourse, he ordinarily disdained the use of a pretentious style, coming by the quicker way of simple and forceful speech to the consciences of the people. His was a mind eager for the possession of facts. The close analysis peculiar to some sermonizing gave place with him to the power to select significant and telling points. He was fond of the vivid imagery of the prophetic parts of the holy scripture. Taking from these texts of startling denunciation or of tenderest comfort, he was able to warn, rebuke and console his flock, according to their various needs. As a result of such preaching, his ministry was not without revivals. He was unsatisfied unless the fruit of the word appeared. Of a courage undoubted, he stood ready to charge to professing Christians, at times, the lack of effectiveness in the means of grace, and a prevalent indifference to the demands of the Gospel. At the same time, he could be terrible in assailing the consciences of the impenitent. He might take kindly by the hand an unfortunate man, thereby assuring him of his benevolent regard; but if such a one turned not away from his sins, he could hope for no quarter from the pulpit at the hands of this honest preacher.

In his views of our system, in his association with his members, in his conduct of services, and in his general style of preaching, there was a flavor reminding a younger generation of what the fathers of Methodism in Virginia and Maryland must have been.

Turning from this general characterization of the man and minister we come to the time of his marriage. In 1852, by Rev. Norval Wilson, Brother Landstreet was married to Miss Mary F. Swink, of Fairfax county, Virginia. To any one observant of this union more than an allusion is not necessary, yet page upon page might be written in illustration of his domestic happiness. Contented with his lot, it may be that he would have been unmurmuring if he had fared bardly, but it would seem that his well-known generosity was recompensed by an abundance enabling him bountifully to provide for his own household. The inmates of this parsonage were happy. Surely there were not wanting on his part the affection and watchfulness essential to such happiness. He had the pleasure of seeing several of his children join his church, in which his bereaved widow is a communicant. This is not the place for an eulogy of her; but at every turn of the pen we think of Sister Landstreet as the helpful sharer of his diversified experience. Knowing him cebetter than any one else, she may be relied upon when telling us that through the hardships of the war, the vicissitudes of the ministry, and the suffering incident to failing health, he was uniformly considerate, cheerful and hopeful. In failing health for years, he at last succumbed to valvular disease of the heart and dropsy, peacefully passing away at his home in Martinsburg, W. Va., November 21st, 1891, and was interred in Green Hill cemetery, of the same city.

A friend, writing of his last days, says: "He talked constantly of his home, and of the Great Conference he would soon join. A few days before he passed away, he raised his hands, and with a bright smile, repeated from the 98th Psalm the words: 'O sing unto the Lord a new song, for he hath done marvelous things; his right hand, and his holy arm, hath gotten him the victory.' Just before he became unconscious, his sons laid him down, when, turning to his wife, he said: 'Lord bless my children.' and then repeated the lines, 'On the other side of Jordan,' In the sweet fields of Eden,' continuing presently, 'There is rest for the weary.' The presence of his children was a source of great pleasure to him in the last weeks of his life."

It may be added that his pastors tell us of a ripening and sweetening of his experience, as deeply religious as we all know him ever to have been, so that of him, too, it may be said, his last days were his best days. For several sessions of our annual meetings we have missed him from us. At an annual conference he seemed as much at home as in his own parlor. He knew so many persons wherever we might assemble, and so thoroughly enjoyed the intercourse with his brethren, that he seemed at his best on such occasions. Though absent, his memory is precious to us. His work remains. In this body to-day, we doubt not, are ministers and laymen who owe to him their first, recurring, and abiding impressions of religious truth. His trueness to conviction, steadfastness and consistency of course, and his earnest wish that we may rejoin him in the life beyond, appeal to us to follow him as he followed Christ.

Rev. PRESLEY B. SMITH.

Your Committee regrets that data needed in order to the presentation of a complete memoir of Rev. Presley B. Smith could not be procured. He was born in ______, Virginia. He was converted in his youth, and was received on probation into the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, March, 1853. He was abundant in labors until failing health made a change in his relation necessary; he was placed on the supernumerary list at the Conference held at Martinsburg, West Virginia, March, 1888, and on the superannuated list March, 1889. He died at Alameda, Cal., June 1st, 1891.

During his active ministry he served on the following charges: In 1854 St. Mary's: 1855, Glen Hope. This year he was ordained deacon. In 1856' Warrior's Mark, and in 1857 he was ordained elder. In 1857, Rockville' Maryland; 1858, Warm Springs, Virginia; 1859, the same charge; 1860-1, Monroe. In 1862 he met in Conference in Harrisonburg, Virginia, with twenty-six others, who were separated from the rest of their brethren by the war, and was appointed to Blacksburg, Virginia. In 1864 he served as Chaplain in the Confederate Army. In 1866 he was appointed to Charles Circuit Maryland, and in 1867 to Charles and Prince George, Maryland, and in 1868 to Prince George, Maryland; 1869, East Fairfax; 1870, Falls Church; 1871-3, West River; 1874-5, Lewisburg, West Virginia; 1876, Beltsville, Maryland; 1877, Martinsburg, West Virginia; 1879, Piedmont, West Virginia; 1880, Keyser and Cumberland; 1881-3, again at Falls Church; 1884-6, Frederick Avenue, Baltimore. And in 1887 he was appointed to Hinton, West Virginia, This was the last charge he saved before leaving for California, where he This was the last charge he served before leaving for California, where he. died.

He went to the West, hoping in a change of climate to regain his vigor, and meanwhile to be with his soas, who had previously gone to that place. While living on the Pacific Coast he was abundant in labors. The burden of souls was upon him; and against advice and remonstrance he continued in the work he loved so well. He was appointed as a supply, assisted in special services, and in every possible way sought the prosperity of Zion.

While wanting certain data and facts, without which this sketch must be incomplete, we are at no loss of material for an estimate of the man. He lived and labored so many years among us that we have only to review his

life, if we would learn what manner of man he was.

First of all must be mentioned his unclouded experience. There was no day, after his conversion, when a doubt of his acceptance with God disturbed his peace. The joy of his life, after the knowledge of his own salvation by Jesus Christ, was in winning souls. Indeed, so constant and intense was his desire that men should believe and be saved, that if they refused to accept Christ in his own charge, he looked abroad, and would go anywhere and everywhere, if only he could lead sinners to the Saviour, and in this he was eminently successful. He was very attentive to children, and was instrumental in bringing many of them into the church. Sometimes the infidelity in regard to the possibility of the early conversion of children, looked with suspicion upon his work among them, yet he was not discouraged, and the results of his labors were his vindication. In a few years the children who were supposed not to understand this subject, were the substantial men and women of the church.

It is scarcely necessary to say that he was instant and earnest in prayer. He knew the source of strength, and gained spiritual power by waiting habitually upon God.

He regarded himself as the steward of the Lord. From the first money he carned when a boy he gave one-tenth, and during his whole life he was always ready, according to his ability, to contribute to the needy, and to the furtherance of the Gospel. He loved his brethren, and was loved by them. If there was a man who did not love him, and if there was ever estrangement between him and others; the facts are unknown to us. He was fortunately happy in his domestic relations.

In his preaching he commonly presented the great Gospel themes. He was a good preacher, not often falling below the average, and at times rising much above it. And even when the thought might not be specially novel or impressive, his warmth kept attention awake, and secured a lodgment of the divine word.

It is hardly necessary to say that the end of such a life was peace. If triumph is more than peace, then let it be known that he triumphed. This memoir could be much extended by quotations of words of his dying moments. But it is enough to say that he had victory through the blood of the Lamb. We think of the abundant entrance he has received. We think of him as with the Lord. We think of him as glorified, and of the joyous welcome given to him by his children in the Lord, who had preceded him into the heavenly place. We thank God for His grace which was magnified in the life, ministry and death of this servant of God.

Rev. EDWARD F. HETERICK.

Rev. Edward F. Heterick was born in Winchester, Va., February 19, 1821, and died at his home at Welltown, Frederick county, Va., May 28, 1891, aged 70 years, 3 months and 9 days.

He was of Scotch descent. His father, after many years of service as principal of the Winchester Academy, resigned this position and retired to his country home, a few miles from Winchester. Here young Edward was reared. Until the age of twelve he studied under his father, then for several years he attended the Academy at Winchester. Subsequently he purchased his father's home, where he spent his entire life, excepting the time he was in the active work of the ministry.

He was united in marriage March 2. 1875, to Miss Marian Strother, of Frederick county, Va., who, with an only child, a son, survive him. An older sister was the only Methodist in this Episcopal family. It was while attending services with her at Milburn's church, near Winchester, he was convicted of sin; and soon after was converted and united with the Methodist church. It was his sister's dying prayer that he might become a preacher of the gospel.

He entered the traveling connection in the Baltimore Conference in 1857, and was appointed to the following charges: 1857 to Wardensville, 1858-9 Capon Circuit, 1860 to Front Royal, 1861 to South Branch. From this work, at the beginning of the war, he returned home and remained until the close as a protection to his widowed mother and sister. While here he was not idle, but preached Christ whenever he had the opportunity. In 1866 he was again

in Conference with his brethren, and was appointed to Winchester Circuit, and in 1867 to Berryville Circuit. In 1868, from increasing infirmities, he was granted a supernumerary relation. This relation he sustained until death.

He was held in high esteem in the community wherever he lived and labored. This esteem was but a just estimate of his noble life.

As a preacher of the gospel he was clear and strong. His preaching was with power and in demonstration of the spirit, carrying conviction to his hearers. Many souls were the seals of his ministry. It was his delight to preach to those who were destitute of the gospel, and to gather them into the church. It is possible that he preached as often after as he did while he was effective.

He was a man of strong Christian character, humble, earnest, devout and zealous. Brother Heterick was a liberal supporter of the various benevolent interests of the church, especially that of the wornout preachers. In addition to giving through the regular channels, he often remembered them in special gifts. He was an earnest worker in the Sabbath school, filling the offices of superintendent and teacher. He loved the children.

For many years he suffered with organic disease of the heart, to which, in his last illness of one month, was added a sympathetic affection of the brain. In all his affliction he was resigned to the will of God. His religious enjoyment was undisturbed by his sufferings. He waited patiently for the summons from above. His faith was firm unto the end, and his death that of the righteous. The counsel to his son in the death chamber was touching and characteristic of the man. Edward F. Heterick died in great peace.

At Bethany church, five miles from Winchester, Va., on Saturday, May 31, at 11 A. M., funeral service was conducted by Rev. Rumsey Smithson, assisted by several of his brethren in the ministry, and in the presence of a large concourse of people, his body was there laid to rest.

THOMAS JEFFERSON MAGRUDER.

Thomas Jefferson Magruder was born in Prince George County, Maryland, September 1, 1823, and died in the city of Baltimore, July 25, 1891. When eleven years of age he was converted, and united with the Presbyterian church, of which his mother was a member; afterward, and when about seventeen years old, he transferred his membership to the Methodist church, in which he continued till the close of life. When about twelve or thirteen years old he moved to the city of Washington, and in his twentieth year, he was appointed class-leader in the Wesley chapel charge of this city, and a year later he was chosen superintendent of the Sunday School of the same. In his twenty-first year he was united in marriage with Miss Sarah A. P. Boteler—a happy union, dissolved only by death. He removed to Baltimore in 1863, and was soon afterward chosen superintendent of the Sunday School conducted in Biddle Street hall; he was continued superintendent after the school had been removed to Trinity church.

This office he held by repeated election, till the day of his death. He was a trustee of Trinity church, and for many years one of its stewards.

He was a member of the General Conference of 1870, the first in which laymen had seats, and was a member of every General Conference from that of 1870, and in this body he was one of its most influential members in the lines of work to which he specially devoted his energies. He was a delegate to the Ecumenical Conference in London, in 1881. He was a member of the Annual Conference in every session from the date of the admission of laymen,

till that of March, 1891. At that time disease was upon him, and with great reluctance he was compelled to abandon the hope he had cherished of meeting his brethren again. He was treasurer of the Joint Board of Finance, chairman of the Committee of Sunday Schools, and later of the Sunday School Board.

Bro. Magruder loved children! In the Sunday Schools they listened with interest to his voice, and Sunday School workers became enthusiastic when moved by the magic power of his speech. Little ones of every degree attracted his attention and received the benedictions of his abounding love. About twenty years ago he was instrumental in organizing and establishing an Annual Convention of the Sunday School workers of the Conference. He was president of this Convention till the church incorporated it as a part of the general machinery, and afterward he was continued at its head.

His admirable and successful management of these assemblies cannot be forgotten. He was an admirable leader of holy song. Wesley Grove Camp Meeting took its rise through his efforts; and to promote its prosperity, he gave time and labor—a labor of love—year by year.

There is not a church in our connection in Baltimore city, that is not indebted to his liberality and services.

The closing weeks of his life were weeks of suffering, yet seasons of trust and peace and hope. He loved to pray, and as long as his failing voice permitted he sung—"His Great Redeemer's praise." His life work done, he entered upon the eternal reward of the faithful. In the death of Brother Magruder, we have lost a great man; judge him by what he wrought! He has gone from us—we miss him. His works follow him. We thank God for his life, and for his triumphant death.

The Board of Missions of the Baltimore Conference had under its care forty-seven (47) charges receiving aid from its treasury. These charges have reported as having 9,300 members, 371 net increase, 875 conversions, 856 additions, 168 Sunday Schools, 1,291 officers and teachers, 8,651 scholars and 638 baptisms. They have raised \$17,131 for the support of the gospel, and \$3,695 on the d'sciplinary collections.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

In the year just closed, the Woman's Missionary Society of this Conference has made considerable advance over previous records. It now numbers 76 adult and 26 juvenile societies. Of this number, twelve were organized during the year. The total membership is 2,924, an increase of 473. Taken by districts, the greatest increase has been in the Moorefield District, where a year ago we had only one society of ten members, but now have eight societies with a membership of 124. This rapid extension of our work has been mainly due to the efforts of the Presiding Elder, Rev. Geo. T. Tyler, and the Society gratefully acknowledges his kindness.

A word from the pastor or the elder has often been the means of awakening a deep and abiding interest in the Woman's Missionary Society, and we ask, for the incoming year, your hearty co-operation in sustaining and extending our work. We do rejoice that our society evidences such vigorous growth but our hopes will not be realized until we can report from every circuit and station an active missionary organization.

Since my last report four of our auxiliaries have been greatly afflicted in the loss of their chief officer. These now sainted women had long labored efficiently and devotedly in the missionary cause. They have gone to their reward, but the sweet influence of their lives surrounds us as the very air of heaven.

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Baltimore Conference Society was held in Staunton, Virginia, October 4 to 7, 1891. An unusually large number of delegates and visitors was in attendance. The annual sermon was preached on Sunday by the pastor, Rev. J. T. Williams, from the very appropriate text: "The greatest of these is charity." Bro. Williams kindly gave all the services of the day into the charge of the Society. A children's mass-meeting was held in the afternoon, and at night, addresses were delivered by Miss Mattie B. Jones, of Brazil, and others.

The presence with us of our beloved missionary added no little to the interest of our sessions. Hearts already given to Christ flamed anew with zeal for Him, as she graphically described the sorrows, sufferings and moral degradation of the women in that priest-ridden country, whose people are as verily heathen as if they knew not the name of Christ.

The present and greatest need of our work is "more laborers" in the foreign fields. In our own Conference we long to see the increasing interest in missions bear the much-desired fruit. For this end we pray, and to this end are our most earnest efforts directed.

Our next annual meeting will be held in Roanoke, Virginia.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

I. Institutions under the control of the Board of Trustees of Randolph-Macon College:

1.—Randolph-Macon College.

The number of students for the current session is 130, these being the usual number of ministerial students. Owing to peculiar circumstances, the receipts from students will fall about \$2,300 short of the amount estimated for the session. The course of instruction in Biblical Literature has been extended one year since the election of Rev. W. J. Young, adjunct professor. Commanding the services of Profs. Kern and Young, and Bishop Granbery, this department now affords advantages superior to any which have been offered by this institution for the education of those preparing for the ministry. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Prof. Sharpe was filled last June by the election of Dr. A. C. Wightman, late assistant professor at Johns Hopkins University. His ability, enthusiasm and scholarship render him a valuable acquisition to the faculty.

2 .- Randolph-Macon Academy, at Bedford City.

This Academy is in operation with increased patronage and growing popularity, the number of students this session being over 170. It may now be considered a permanently established and self-supporting institution. During the present session there has been a gracious revival of religion, in which over 60 students professed conversion. The income of the institution promises to be sufficient to pay all current expenses, and to turn over to the sinking fund a sufficient amount to pay off, in a few years, the debt incurred in erecting the building.

3 .- Rand Aph-Macon Acidemy, at Front Royal.

The work upon this Academy has been prosecuted with vigor. The building is under roof, and the contracts for heating, lighting and plumbing have been let. The building, which is somewhat larger and in several respects superior to the one at Bedford city, is under contract to be completed by the first of July, and the school will be ready for the reception of students in September of this year.

The citizens of Front Royal are to be especially commended for the promptness with which they have paid their subscriptions to this institution. The Board of trustees have elected Rev. B. W. Bond, D. D., principal of this academy, and will elect the other teachers and officers at their meeting in June.

4.—The Randolph-Macon Woman's College, at Lynchburg.

The work on the buildings of this institution is considerably advanced, and there is every reason to believe it will be completed in time for the proposed opening of the institution in the fall of 1893. About \$1,200 in interest wil

accumulate from the endowment fund of \$100,000 before the expenses of conducting the institution begin. It is proposed that this institution shall be equal in resources, courses of instruction, and standard of graduation to Randolph-Macon College, and shall thus afford at Lynchburg the same advantages for the education of young women as are now enjoyed by young men at Ashland.

What remains to be done? This Conference resolved several years ago to participate in the endowment of Randolph-Macon College. The time has now come when it is proper and necessary to carry out this resolution, and the Conference should at once undertake to raise at least enough to endow the Department of Biblical Literature, for which purpose \$30,000 will be needed.

To fulfill the pledge made as the condition of the subscription of \$90,000 by the citizens of Front Royal, we must also raise \$10,000 for the completion of Front Royal Academy. We have, therefore, to secure \$40,000 in order to do our part towards completing and placing upon a solid financial footing these great educational enterprises so happily begun.

In view of these considerations, the Board recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Conference will render every possible assistance to President Smith and Dr. Bond in their efforts to raise the \$40,000 during the present Conference year.
 - 2. That the assessment of \$2,000 for the College be continued.
- 3. That the Board be required to appoint Rev. J. A. Kern, Professor at Randolph-Macon College, and Rev. B. W. Bond, Principal of Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal.

II. American University.

Whereas, a movement has been begun under the leadership of the M. E. Church to establish at the National Capital a great Protestant University for post-graduate instruction in the Liberal Arts and Sciences, and for professional courses in Law and Medicine; and whereas, such an institution as will worthily represent the Protestant Christianity of our country in this field will add to the prestige and power of all Protestant Churches, and will supply the lack of a distinctively Christian University for post-graduate study and original research, not conflicting with any of the institutions established by our own Church, but supplementing their work,

Resolved, That we hail this movement with satisfaction, and commend it to the appreciative sympathies of our people.

III. Wesleyan Female Institute.

The present session is proving to be one of the most successful in the history of the school. The number of boarding pupils enrolled is 152, an increase of 17 over the number in attendance last year. The general health of the pupils has been good, and, as a rule, they have shown due diligence in

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their studies. The school has enjoyed the efficient pastoral attention of the Rev. J. T. Williams, pastor of our church in S.aunton; the usual religious services have been faithfully kept up; and a number of conversions have occurred since the beginning of the session.

The school is subjected to no little inconvenience from the lack of suitable accommodations—especially of a chapel and an infirmary. We are in full sympathy with President Harris in his earnest desire that measures may be adopted to secure these improvements, and regret that the way does not seem to be open to the adoption of such measures at this time. We sincerely hope that before long, the heavy debt still remaining upon the property may be so reduced that the Conference shall feel justified in requesting the Board of Trustees to make all necessary additions to the material equipment of the school. The President reports the following, as the debt now due: To Mr. Cochran's heirs, \$13,279; to W. A. Harris, \$10,326.

The amount available annually for the sinking fund, is \$1,295. We recommend the appointment of the Rev. Wm. A. Harris as President, and ask for the Wesleyan Female Institute, our Conference School, the favorable consideration of our people.

As amended by order of the Conference;

Resolved, That the Conference, seeing the necessity for the erection of a Chapel and Infirmary for the Wesleyan Female Institute, approves of such suggestion, and refers to the Board of Trustees the question of Finance in relation thereto.

IV. Valley Female College.

The Valley Female College, located at Winchester, Va., and under the Presidency of Rev. Jno. P. Hyde, D. D., is a thoroughly equipped institution, both as regards teachers and all appliances for successful instruction. The graduates who have gone out from this school testify as to the thoroughness of the work done there.

The Visiting Committee, appointed by the Conference last year, speak in high terms of the health, training and home-life of the institution. During the past year the Faculty has been increased from five to seven teachers.

Your Board heartily recommends the Valley Female College to the patronage of our people, with the assurance that under the care of Dr. Hyde and his estimable wife, and corps of lady teachers, the daughters of our people will be well cared for, and instructed so as to fit them for the duties of life.

We recommend that Rev. Jno. P. Hyde D. D., be appointed as President of this College.

Paire and Lane Institutes.

It is cheering to hear of some increase of patronage at each of these schools, having for their aim the education of preachers and teachers of the colored race. There are over 400 students now in attendance. We are told that graduates from both schools, and especially from Paine Institute, show fine improvement. Some of the latter are found doing good work as far as

Arkansas. There is need of good school buildings at Paine Institute, those now in use being too small and inferior. Those of Lane Institute are very good. Our church has not only morally, but also voluntarily assumed responsibility in this work of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church.

Your Board recommends increased earnestness on the part of our preachers in pressing its claims, and increased liberality on the part of our people in contributing to them. The Commissioner of Education requests us to raise \$500. We would recommend that a collection be taken in each charge, privately or publicly, and as much as practicable of this amount be raised. Let all money for this object be sent to Rev. W. M. Hayes, Covington, Ga.

Ministerial Education.

The Board would gratefully record the encouragement it has received this year in its efforts to aid in the preparation of young men for the ministry in our Conference. An unsolicited contribution of \$250 from the Roanoke District Conference, together with some equally generous private contributions, has enabled it to meet all the most pressing demands upon its funds. Seven approved candidates for the ministry have received appropriations thus far, in sums ranging from ten to seventy-five dollars; and none of them will be permitted to leave college for lack of means before the close of the session.

It is not the policy of the Board to make appropriations to men of whom little or nothing is known, but to offer a helping hand to such as have proven themselves to be worthy and promising students, and, without some such help, would be compelled to quit school prematurely, either to enter the Conference with insufficient preparation or to earn money in some secular employment for the completion of their education.

We have seen nothing to change our conviction that this work is second to none that the Conference is called upon to undertake and accomplish.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. Collins Denny, as Professor at Vanderbilt University.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday School Board has given careful and conscientious attention to the important interests committed to its care.

We submit the following report:

We are still deeply impressed with the vast importance of the Sunday School, and are grateful to the great Head of the Church for the blessings which have heretofore rested upon this department of our work.

We feel that the Sunday School should enlist the best energies of all—ministers and laymen alike—and that the best talent in the Church should be employed in the Sunday School.

It gives us great satisfaction to state that our Sunday School work was never in a more prosperous condition than at this time. We feel, however, that there is still room for large improvements. Hence, the aim of our people

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should be to bring up the Sunday School to the highest degree of efficiency as a soul-saving agency. The following figures are introduced to show the growth and prosperity of our Sunday School work: Number of schools 554, increase 17; number of officers and teachers 5,436, increase 93; number of scholars 37,183, increase 554; conversions 1,375, increase 269.

We recognize our own literature as of a very high degree of excellence, and are glad to state that it is very generally used in our schools.

Children's Day is observed in many of our charges. We call special attention to this feature of our work, and wish to record our decided conviction that it should be observed in every station and circuit in our Conference.

We also endorse the Epworth League, and believe that it may be made an important auxiliary to the Church and the Sunday School. We are of opinion that our Epworth Leagues would be greatly enhanced in numbers and interest by a weekly journal devoted to that department of our work. We believe that the inauguration of such a paper, devoted to its interests and work, would be hailed with delight, and gain an extensive circulation among our laymen and young people. It would also prove a valuable medium for the dissemination among our young people of a knowledge, not only of the work, but of the doctrines of our Church, and inspire them with greater earnestness and zeal in their efforts to promote the welfare of the Church and of society. We deem the necessity of such an organ imperative, and trust that our Publishing House may respond to this need, and make the subscription price such as to insure general circulation among the members of the League. Hence we suggest that the cost to single subscribers shall not exceed one dollar.

The Board examined and approved a plan, presented by Brother G. L. Stevens, of Roanoke, for raising missionary money in the Sunday School, and cordially recommend the adoption of this plan in all our schools. Brother J. Edgar Wilson will send copies of this plan to all the preachers at an early day.

We also commend to our people our Baltimore Book and Sunday School Agency, conducted by J. Edgar Wilson & Co., and recommend that our Sunday Schools secure their supplies through them.

We desire especially to call attention to our Annual Sunday School Convent'on. It is an institution of the Baltimore Conference, and is controlled by the Conference through its Sunday School Board. We believe that the Convention is a most important means of advancing the Sunday School work of our Conference. We commend it to the cordial support and co-operation of every member of the Conference. It has been very successful in the past, and can be made more successful in the future. The next Convention will be held at Martinsburg, W. Va., in July, 1892. This Board has elected Bro. M. L. Walton, President of the Convention until the next session of the Annual Conference. It has also appointed the following Executive Committee to dispense the fund for needy Sunday Schools, and make further arrangements for the Convention: E. B. Prettyman, H. S. Dulany, Rev. J. H. Light, G. L. Stevens, M. L. Walton, J. Edgar Wilson, R. F. Barr. E. B. Tucker, and the preacher who may be appointed Pastor of our Church in Martinsburg. Bro. H. S. Dulany was elected Treasurer of this Board to receive the funds for needy Sunday Schools.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

Each year's experience demonstrates the growing importance of the Church Extension movement, as supplemental to our home missionary operations, or, rather, as a marked feature in our domestic work.

When that movement was first introduced among us, it was not a mere experiment. Our brethren of the Methodist Episcopal Church had for several years been extending through this means the area of their work, and multiplying their houses of worship.

While from various, and perhaps justifiable causes, we were somewhat tardy in entering the field, yet both the general and local boards have made a most worthy and encouraging record since the initial act of the General Conference on this subject in 1882. Our own Conference, while it has not done all that might have been accomplished, or could have been desired, has yet stood in the front rank with her sister Conferences in this regard. During the period of the existence of this society among us, it has contributed of its funds \$16,575 to the erection of 73 churches. These are distributed through all parts of our Conference domain; and, as stated in a former report, most of these churches would, in all probability, not have been erected but for the aid and encouragement thus extended to them.

The receipts by the General Board for the last fiscal year were \$72,917.85, for the previous year, \$71,122.05, showing an increase of \$1,795.80. The General Board and Conference Boards helped last year 387 churches, paying them \$82,729.42.

Our own Conference Board has raised during the year just closed, \$2,400, which, apart from special contributions, is \$139 in advance of the former year. One-half of this amount has already been forwarded to the Parent Board, and the remainder apportioned among the following churches in our Conference:

We are happy to state that the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Department, which sustains an auxiliary relation to our Board, has made quite an advance during the past year. As the Setretary of this department states in her annual report, the society was not fully organized till August, 1891, at which time the ladies held a meeting for the purpose at Wesley Grove. Mrs. C. H. Buchanan was elected Conference organizer. She entered upon her

work with the most energetic zeal, begotten of her enthusiastic interest in the object of the organization, and succeeded in organizing fifteen adult and nine juvenile societies, making an increase of 24 societies since July, 1891; the total number being 28. In this interval 426 members have been added, making a total of 477. Five patrons have been secured to the Preachers' Wives' Loan Fund. \$288.33 have been transmitted to the Conference Treasurer as dues and contributions to special work.

A Christmas-box, valued at \$200, was sent by the societies to the Spokane District, E. Columbia Conference, and the contents divided among the preachers' families most in need. We have reason to know that the assistance thus rendered was most opportune and helpful.

We most heartily commend this department of our work to the encouragement and patronage of our preachers and people throughout the Conference. Appended to this report is that of the Treasurer of the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Society.

While we again respectfully call the attention of the Presiding Elders to the action of the last General Conference, as indicated in page 381, Article XIV, of the Discipline, requiring them to bring the subject of Church Extension prominently before the District and Quarterly Conferences, we also earnestly request the preachers of the Conference to call the attention of our people more fully to this matter so vital to the best interests of the church, and to do all in their power to bring the collections up to the full amount of the assessments.

The summary of business of the Publishing House of the M. E. Church, South, shows the total business from all departments, for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1891, to be \$336,808.56, from which a gain in assets of \$54,658.18 was realized. We are gratified to report prosperity in all the departments of this great and growing arm of the Church.

The Nashville Christian Advocate is ably edited, and justly holds its place at the head of all our Church papers.

The Quarterly Review has not a sufficient subscription list to pay for its publication. We heartily commend it to our people as a Review in every way worthy of their patronage.

The Sunday School literature shows marked improvement. Our missionary publications show painstaking, and deserve a larger circulation.

We call attention to our own Conference organ, The Episcopal Methodist, and urge our preachers and laymen to consider its claims. We request that Drs. W. K. Boyle and S. K. Cox be appointed editors of the paper.

Dr. Boyle requests us to report a proposition made by him to your Committee—said proposition is in the words and figures following: If the preachers and laymen of the Baltimore Conference will secure 2,000 subscribers for the Episcopal Methodist, I will allow the Conference to donate one-half of the amount of said subscription to Randolph-Macon College; the party collecting said subscriptions shall remit one-half to the paper and the other half to the treasurer of said institution. We make no recommendation concerning this proposition.

We recommend that our preachers and laymen devote more time and attention to the circulation of our publications among our people. We especially emphasize the importance of the Quarterly Review in the hands of all the people.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

Your Committee on Bible Cause, beg leave to report:

We recognize the great importance of a knowledge of the word of God, as set forth in Christ's great commission to His disciples, to "go into all the world and to preach the gospel to every creature;" i. e., to teach all nations the plan of salvation as found in His word; a knowledge of the word being necessary to the production of faith, which is an essential act of salvation. "He that believeth shall be saved." In order to this faith, a knowledge of the truth is necessary, "for how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they hear without a preacher?"

While preaching the word of God is the great agency in teaching the plan of salvation, still the necessity for the circulation of the written word among the people is necessary in order that they may read and study it as a means to the end. "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

Feeling impressed that there is a great and growing disposition upon the part of many in the present time to read other books to the exclusion of the word of God; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we urge our people to a more diligent and constant searching of the Scriptures, "for in them they think they have eternal life."

Resolved, 2. That we, as a Conference, do not only recognize and endorse the great American Bible Society and its auxiliaries, the State_Bible Societies, which, in the providence of God, have done a grand and noble work, but that we will pledge ourselves to give more earnest effort in presenting this subject to our people, and in taking collections in our respective charges for this object.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Your Committee, to which the subject of "Evangelism" was referred, has carefully considered the subject and respectfully report:

We are fully convinced that the employment of irresponsible or self-styled evangelists, traveling throughout the country and operating in our Churches, is an evil of great magnitude.

To specify—The respect of the people for the duly authorized ministry is diminished; discord is introduced into the Churches; means that should be used in the regular work among our people is diverted; a lamentable irreverence follows the teachings of these men; irreverence marking their own speech and conduct; the conversions that are counted, in many cases, do not show the evidence of real change, or even of genuine conviction of sin; that serious errors in doctrine are often promulgated by them; that our methods of calling sinners to repentance are discredited, and not to multiply the statement of facts, we add only this, that after revivals conducted by these men, congregations are diminished, the means of grace are neglected, and the people less easily impressed by the gospel of the Lord Jesus.

The paper referred to us directs that some measures be devised 'for the proper protection and direction of the work of the Church by the members of this Conference." We therefore recommend:

- 1. That our pastors, whenever able to do so, conduct all the services themselves.
- 2. That if aid should be needed, they call to their assistance their brethren in their own or adjacent Conferences.
 - 3. That such traveling evangelists be not admitted to our Churches.
- 4. That our people are urgently advised and requested to give no countenance or support to such men, either by attendance upon their services or the contribution of means.

It evidences our conviction of the importance of all that we report, when we affirm that in our judgment no more effective system or method of evangelization, the itinerancy, has been used in modern times than that hitherto in use in our Church, and which we sincerely trust will never be abandoned.

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
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
