

"Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, hereby expresses its sincere thanks and appreciation to the pastor of Greene Memorial Church, and the other pastors of our Churches in this city, and to their committees, for courteous and hospitable entertainment during this session of the Conference.

"We also express our thanks to the Roanoke Times, the Roanoke World News, and the Baltimore Sun for their reports of the proceedings of the Conference."

#### REPORT NO. 1, BOARD OF EDUCATION.

I. Whereas, the General Conference, in its prophetic consideration of the two great responsibilities of the Church, recommended that there le two Church-wide movements in the present quadrennium, one for missions and one for Christian education, in the following resolution:

"We recommend that the right of way be given to the Centenary Movement in the first two years and to the educational compaign during the second two years of the quadrennium, and that during these two periods as far as possible the full power of the Church be delivered in these respective campaigns."

11. And, whereas, our Conference educational institutions are in pressing need of additional funds in order that they not only may move forward with the progress and development of the Church; but in truth even in order to maintain their present efficiency under changing conditions, and whereas we recognize the fact that our educational institutions have, by order of the General Conference, been kept for the past two years from presenting their needs to the Conference and connection.

III. And inasmuch as the tragic events of the past few years have taught us that education without Christ is mockery, and, therefore, that if America is to be true to its mission, education must be Christian.

IV. And, whereas, our denomination is now short more than one thousand preachers and is calling for hundreds of missionaries and trained workers not now available, and inasmuch as we recognize our responsibility for recruiting and training young men and women for this work if our Church is to grow and serve.

V. And, inasmuch as we feel, therefore, our responsibility jointly with the other Conferences to focus our attention this year upon all the processes of Christian Education in the home, the Church and the School.

Be it resolved:

First—That this Conference co-operate most heartily in the plans of the Educational Commission's five-fold objective in carrying out the instructions of the General Conference:

1. To develop in the mind of the Church an adequate conception of the place of Christian education in the life of the Church, of the nation, and of the world.

2. To promote the cause of religious education by bringing about a closer and more effective co-operation between our institutions of learning and the Sunday School, and by establishing strong departments of religious education in our colleges and universities.

3. To lead at least 5,000 young men and women to pledge themselves to devote their lives to the ministry, to missions, or to some other form of Christian service, and to seek a Christian education as a preparation for effective life service.

4. To raise for our schools, colleges and universities at least \$33,000.000, the minimum sum necessary to enable them to send out the constantly increasing stream of educated Christian leaders required to carry forward the Christian work of the world, and to secure \$1,000,000 to aid worthy students who are looking to some form of Christian service in their efforts to obtain an education.

5. To deepen the moral and spiritual life of our people and to promote the spirit of Christian liberality in all the efforts put forth to realize these objectives.

Second—And be it resolved that we take all proper steps to fix the attention of all our people upon the fundamental place of Christian Education in the life and mission of our Church, and that to this end we urge pastors to preach and teach, and laymen to lend their influence in every possible way.

Third—That we call upon our people for their prayers in behalf of the presidents and faculties and trustees of our schools, for our young people in attendance upon them, praying especially that the right young men and young women may be led to give their lives as preachers, missionaries and trained workers, and that these schools may supplement the work of home and church in leading the young people of this generation to the acknowledgment of Christ as their Lord and Master in whatever work they may choose.

Fourth—That we approve the following Conference Educational Commission appointed by the Board of Education, acting as an ad entorm committee: E. D. Newman, C. D. Harris, W. W. Millan, Chas. R. McDonald, G. H. Fieding, H. M. Canter, S. R. Pritchard and J. H. Light.

Fifth—That we assume as the quota for this Conference the sum of \$680,000 as original askings, distributed as follows; and authorize the Conference Educational committee, with the help of the Presiding Elders, to divide this amount equally among the Churches of the Conference.

Sixth—That we approve the 40 per cent, surplus askings on above amounts for our Conference schools with the understanding that the surplus for the Randolph-Macon Schools shall be applied by the Board of Trustees as seems wisest, and probably all of it to Randolph-Macon Woman's College.

Seventh—That we request the appointment of a Conference Educational Secretary to be the full-time executive of the Conference Educational Commission, and that we pledge such Secretary, when appointed, our full loyalty and support.

Eighth—That we call upon our churches to co-operate in a manner worthy of the impelling need of our Christian education program in arousing every member to an appreciation of his or her responsibility and in giving fullest financial support in the collections to be taken next spring.

#### REPORT NO. 2 OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

#### THE RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

Encouraging reports were received from all the institutions connected with the Conference. These reports show a total enrollment of 1,661 students, and that nearly half as many were turned away at the beginning of the school year for lack of adequate facilities.

The religious activities in these institutions are worthy of mention. In the College at Ashland there are enrolled this year forty-six ministerial students, which is the greatest number for any one year recorded in the history of the College. At the Woman's College there are nine students enrolled in the volunteer movement, and the College has to its credit twenty-seven foreign missionaries. One for each year of the history of the institution. The reports from the academies at Front Royal and Bedford City and the Randolph-Macon Institute at Danville were correspondingly good.

#### THE EMORY UNIVERSITY.

The Board of Education is unable to say anything with reference to this institution since no report from it has been received.

#### MOUNTAIN TRAINING SCHOOLS.

While the Ferrum Training School (founded by Rev. Benjamin Beckham, D. D., of the Virginia Conference) is not within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference, its nearness to our territory has enabled it to minister to the needs of some of our boys and girls. We would express our appreciation of the generous treatment that those who have at-

tended Ferrum have received. This school is filling a great need of our Methodism in the State of Virginia, and is in every way worthy of our support. Our Conference is to be congratulated upon its decision to establish a similar school within our own bounds.

#### BLACKSTONE JUNIOR COLLEGE.

We regret to note that since our last report the Blackstone School has met with a disastrous fire; but under the capable and inspiring leadership of Rev. Asbury Christian, D. D., plans have already been made to replace the building destroyed and to do better work than ever. Not a few of our young people attend this school, and we appreciate the consideration that has been shown them and commend it to our people.

#### DEPARTMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

During this Conference year the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training has aided 16 students: Three at Emory University, nine at Randolph-Macon College, and four at the Academy at Front Royal.

We recommend that the limit of aid to be granted to one student for a school year be increased \$25.00—making the maximum \$200.00 instead of \$175.00, as it now is.

The Board would call the attention of the Conference to points of serious import brought out in the report of this Committee.

- 1. An apparent unwillingness on the part of many beneficiaries to acknowledge the obligation resting upon them, as evidenced by the scanty payments of interest on pending loans by students now in College, and by equally scanty payments on the principal of outstanding loans by men already in the ministry.
- 2. An evident and entire disregard of such obligation by some beneficiaries. In several instances this year, the details of which need not be recorded here, students in the Academy or College, have proven untrue to their word, after having received financial aid from this Commitee, and after having signed their names to a solemn pledge as a condition precedent to the granting of aid. A ministerial student in a Christian College untrue to his word!

These cases and some half a dozen others in former years, in which young men have proved themselves unworthy of aid by failure to enter the ministry, have forced the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training to require that hereafter an endorsement of application for aid shall mean, not that the endorser knows nothing against the applicant, but that he has a personal knowledge of the worthiness of the applicant. If it means less than this it is altogether worthless and may prove gravely misleading.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

Dr. H. P. Hamill having been nominated by the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon College for election as a member of that Board to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. B. W. Bond, we recommend that the Conference approve his nomination.

We recommend that the Conference request the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon College:

- To provide for free tuition at the Woman's College for approved life service students.
- To see if some plan cannot be devised which will assure adequate provision for all applicants from Methodist homes within the bounds of the Baltimore and Virginia Conference.
- 3. To insert each year in the catalogue of the various institutions of the Randolph-Macon System the following paragraph:

"The Randolph-Macon Schools are Methodist institutions and are an integral part of the work of the Baltimore and Virginia Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Their supreme aim is to realize in the student body the Christian ideals of manhood and womanhood. Their policy is to have officers and teachers who are not only thoroughly competent in their several departments, but who are also, by life and experience, Christian men and women of the highest type. The moral and religious instruction by precept and example is positively Christian and in accordance with the teachings and practices of the Methodist Church. Diligent effort is constantly made to create and maintain an atmosphere helpful to the growth of virile Christian character and free from those wordly amusements that weaken and destroy the spiritual life of young people."

 To provide free scholarships for needy and deserving girls at Randolph-Macon Woman's College as is done for young men at Ashland, Va.

We recommend that the Conference direct that an offering be taken in each charge in connection with the sermon on the call to the ministry instead of at the district Conferences, as at present.

That our appropriation of \$2,000.00 for the current year in aid of Randolph-Macon College be applied as follows: The sum of \$1,000.00 to the Front Royal Academy debt. The remainder to the Ministerial Supply and Training Fund. This change being due to the fact that the conditions under which the assessment was levied, having ceased to exist, the proceeds of the assessment are no longer applicable to the original cause.

We recommend that the Conference authorize the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training to extend to young women who are approved candidates for life service Christian work aid similar to that now given to young men preparing for the same service.

#### APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend the following appointments for the year 1921-22: Dr. H. P. Hamill as Secretary-Treasurer of Education; Dr. H. H. Sherman as Field Secretary of Christian Education Movement; Dr. J. A. Kern as Professor Randolph-Macon College; Dr. H. P. Hamill, Dr. H. H. Sherman, Judge E. D. Newman, Rev. J. W. Smith and Rev. W. D.

Keene as the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training; Rev. Walkeene as the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Academy; Russell ter S. Thomas as Post Chaplain Staunton Military Academy; Russell Kiracoffee as student at Randolph-Macon College; W. M. Carr as student at Emory University.

## RECENT BENEFACTIONS.

We report with great pleasure several recent benefactions that  $\mathbf{h}_{ave}$ come to our educational work.

Mr. Robert Magruder of New York has provided a scholarship of \$500 per year in memory of his father, the late T. J. Magruder.

Judge John Barton Payne has provided two scholarships of \$350 each for students from Fauquier County.

The late G. W. C. Karnes of Fishersville, Va., has left by will about \$10,000 for the benefit of Ministerial students at R. M. Academy, Front Royal, Va.

We herewith express our sincere appreciation of these benefactions and would earnestly commend their example to our people. Nowhere else can more enduring monuments be established or more productive investments be made for the promotion of the Kingdom.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

### THE GENERAL BOARD.

The report of our new Secretary, Rev. S. H. C. Burgin, D. D., is encouraging and inspiring because of the continued progress of Church Extension work. The income for the year ending March 31st, 1920, was \$1,324,061.31. About \$400,000 of this amount came from the Centenary.

The idea seems to have gotten abroad that unlimited funds were available at present, both as loans and donations. This is shown by the large asking, and the hope of receiving seems to rest in the Centenary offering. One-half of the two million dollars Centenary fund is to be added to the General Loan Fund, as it is collected, and the other half set aside as a Centenary donation fund. Forty per cent. of this is to be expended in carrying on our work in the foreign field, and sixty per cent. to aid in the building of Churches, parsonages, and institu45

The General Loan Fund is now past the million and a half mark, yet so great is the pressure upon it that it little more than one-third meets the demand.

## THE CONFERENCE BOARD.

We had before us applications from eleven charges asking for aid in the form of loans and donations amounting to \$35,550.00, to say nothing of the large number who failed to ask because there was nothing to receive

The total received on assessment was \$11,054.36. After crediting \$4.681.50 to the General Board and \$1,500.00 to the Representative Church, Washington, D. C., we had \$4,974.41 to appropriate for local work. After carefully considering each appeal we placed every dollar where we believed the need was the greatest and the cause of Church Extension, for which it was given, was best served. We regret that we could not meet the demands made upon us this year. Our most difficult and distressing work is the distribution of a sum that meets a small portion of a moderate demand.

#### Some Observations.

We realize that the General Board of 'Church Extension is just as strong as all the conferences combined, and no stronger. That increased payments in assessments and increased conference loan funds means a greater Board of Church Extension. Therefore, greater emphasis must be put upon the preaching of the gospel of Church Extension. This can easily be done by circulating our literature. What an opportunity we have in our public utterances and going among the people to illustrate the meaning and value of a bequest to the Baltimore Conference Loan Fund!

Because the Board desires to have an intelligent idea of the needs of each charge in each district, and because we believe that all our people ought to have continually before them this important cause that they may know its needs, we urge all our presiding elders to give it a place in their district conference programs. Nothing less than \$100,000 will finance its work in this Conference now.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South-

The Sunday School Board submits the following report:

It is a subject for hearty congratulation that the backward movement in Sunday School enrollment has been most successfully arrested, so far as our Church is concerned. The latest report of the corresponding secretary of the Sunday School Board shows an increase in enrollment of ninety-three thousand and fifty-five for the last year, with eighty-eight thousand one hundred and seventy-seven members of Sunday Schools uniting with the Church, and \$455,709 raised for missions in the schools. The statistics for our own Conference for the year just closing are not available at the time of the preparation of this report; but enough is known to show that there will be a most encouraging gain.

#### FIELD SECRETARY.

The Board has voted to continue the office of Field Secretary and has employed Rev. W. H. Best for that office. We most heartily commend the efficient work of the Field Secretary during the past year and anticipate yet better results in the coming year, with the co-operation of our preachers and Sunday School workers generally. The Field Secretary's report shows that his work has touched every district in the Conference with special attention to Moorefield district, where there seemed to be a greater demand for his services.

#### LITERATURE.

We express our pleasure with the high standard of excellence maintained by our Sunday School literature, and urge that all our schools use the Sunday School publications and lesson helps of our own Church. This appeal might be made on the ground of denominational loyalty; but it can be made also upon the merits of our publications themselves, for they have no superiors in their several fields.

#### EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN.

Because of the success of the campaign for evangelism conducted during the early part of 1920, the General Board has authorized a campaign to increase Sunday School enrollment and distribute evangelical literature during the month of May this year.

#### Sunday School Day.

Notwithstanding the many drafts upon the resources of our people and the demands of the high cost of living, the offerings on Sunday School Day show a gratifying increase over last year. While the financial report is not yet complete, the amount received from these offerings is \$2,925.24, an excess of \$752.13 over last year, with only ten charges not yet reported. Every school should observe this service and take an offering in order that the plans of the Board for promoting Sunday School work may be adequately supported. The offering when taken should be sent to the Board's Treasurer, O. C. Michael, Aberdeen. Md. Free programs may be ordered of Smith & Lamar, Nashville, Tenn., or Richmond, Va., by all schools that will take and forward such offerings.

#### Summary of Field Secretary's Work.

Some idea of the extent of our Field Secretary's activities is given by the following quotation from his report to the Board: "Made 185 addresses, attended 15 worker's council meetings, held consultation with 42 workers, taught 29 Sunday School classes, preached 8 times, attended 6 district Conferences, 7 conventions, and 4 institutes; was absent from home 220 days and traveled 18,250 miles at an expense to the Board of \$553.54."

#### Training Schools.

During the year successful standard training schools were held at Roanoke, Va., and Washington, D. C., and the Board plans to hold others during the coming year.

#### Recommendations.

Believing that the demand for trained leadership and the best equipment in this department of Church work is more insistent than ever. we have unanimously endorsed the following recommendations of the Field Secretary, and we urge their careful consideration by every worker, viz.:

1. That every officer and teacher be requested to read. if possible. during the next year the following books:

"Organization and Administration of the Sunday School"; "The Teacher"; "The Pupil"; and "Training the Devotional Life."

2. That ever school observe Sunday School Day, Promotion Day and Decision Day.

3. That offerings on Sunday School Day be reported by schools instead of by stations or circuits.

- 4. That every effort be made to raise all our schools to our adopted standard of efficiency.
- 5. That district or sub-district meetings be held in each presiding elder's district.
- 6. That Sunday Schools on circuits form a separate organization and meet at least once in each quarter.
- 7. That Standard Training Schools and local training schools be held, when practicable, wherever local schools are willing to co-operate.

We also urge that in all new building enterprises, for church purposes, careful attention be given to the necessity for providing Sunday School equipment and quarters according to approved modern standards.

#### REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

After a year's strenuous labor, on the part of the Epworth League leaders, we report a most successful year's work. There has been a decided improvement in the condition of the Leagues in the Conference. We stand at the forefront in the League work in our connection. New charters have been granted and chapters that were drooping and dying have been revived, and today a new spirit is manifest in the Epworth Leagues of the Conference. The closest co-operation between the Conference Board and the Conference Epworth League has been maintained.

The Conference Epworth League is functioning efficiently. Its officers are consecrated and enthusiastic, and are not sparing themselves in order to do the most successful League work. Their efforts have not been unrewarded.

There are 130 junior and intermediate chapters in the Conference, an increase of 30 over last year. The increase in senior chapters has been gratifying. The League's subscription to the African Special of \$4,300 will be overpaid.

We take great pleasure in reporting that 56 Life Service Volunteers have been enrolled, some of whom are in school preparing for their life's work.

A very successful summer assembly has been conducted at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va. Our League Assembly will be held at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, June 7-12. A great program is being arranged and a great time is expected. We urge that our pastors co-operate with us in securing the attendance of the best young people of our charges at this assembly. We advise that our young people in making their plans for their summer vacation consider the assemblies at Front Royal and Lake Junaluska. The Anniversary Day was observed a little better than last year. We urge that this important occasion be not neglected during this year.

The Board appreciates the courtesy extended to it by the Christian Education Movement and the opportunity afforded to do some effective Epworth League work, and we pledge ourselves to heartily co-operate in the carrying out of the program of the movement.

We most respectfully recommend:

- 1. That Saturday night of our next annual Conference be set aside as the date of our League Board Anniversary, subject to the approval of the Conference Program Committee.
- 2. That our preachers give attention to the observance of the Anniversary Day in their Leagues, and where there are no Leagues, that a young people's service be held according to Paragraph 404 of the Discipline.
- That an increased effort be made to promote interest in mission study and stewardship.
- 4. That life service be given greater emphasis, and that all volunteers be urged to sign declaration cards.

- 5. That district meetings be held in each of our districts by the District Secretaries in co-operation with the members of the Conference League Board and the presiding elders.
- 6. That effort be made to bring contiguous Leagues into institutes and league extension work.
- 7. That the Epworth League work be given a place on the program of the District Conferences.
- 8. That the Epworth Leagues co-operate in every way with the leaders of the Christian Education Movement in carrying out its outlined program.

#### REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

Dear Brethren:

The Bible Board recommends the following preamble of resolution to the Baltimore Conference, now in session at Roanoke, Va.:

Whereas, Our church has gone on record as favoring the plan of the Commission for the Christian Educational Movement; and,

Whereas, The Sacred Scriptures constitute the textbook of Christian propaganda and are indispensable to the Christian program, and should be more largely used in our churches and schools; and,

Whereas, The American Bible Society is the principal agency representing the Christian churches of the United States of America in the translation, publication and distribution of Scriptures throughout the world; and,

Whereas, It becomes increasingly evident that a larger financial support and a larger place in the program of the churches must be given to the American Bible Society. The investigations in Europe give most practical emphasis to this fact. In the reconstruction of the moral and religious life of Continental Europe the circulation of the Bible is one fundamental necessity realized by all classes of people in this line of work. So definite and real is this necessity that all other processes will be almost fatally limited if it is not met. This is true also of our other foreign fields. No one will deny the immeasurable importance of the circulation of the Scriptures in our home field; and,

Whereas, We cannot, therefore, too strongly urge that our Conference enlarge its interest in behalf of the American Bible Society; be it

Resolved. That this Conference heartily endorse the work of the American Bible Society and its purpose to set up a program commensurate with the advanced program of the Christian churches, and we recommend that such steps be taken to insure that the supply of Bibles shall keep pace with the growth of the work throughout the world.

Resolved, That inasmuch as the organization known as "The Gideons" is an inter-denominational organization of Christian Commercial Traveling Men who believe in Christ as the Eternal Son of God, accept Him as a personal Saviour and belong to some branch of the Protestant Church; and,

Whereas, Their great object is to win traveling men and others for Christ; therefore, a great missionary society; and,

Whereas, They are distributing God's Word by placing it in the guest rooms of the hotels, also in jails, hospitals and sanatoriums in America for the purpose of winning souls for Christ, having placed about 465,000, or 35 carloads in less than twelve years; therefore, be it

Resolved, that we, the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in session assembled at Roanoke, Va., April 7, 1921, do hereby heartily endorse this work and earnestly recommend that our Pastors and people co-operate with "The Gideons" in every way possible to promote this most worthy cause.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Today a new Church faces a new world. Three results of immediate significance have come to us out of the Centenary. First, the enlargement of our work in existing mission fields; second, the opening up of missions in Europe; third, the revealing of needs in the home mission fields that we never dreamed of before.

All this emphasizes the importance of a full collection of the Centenary pledges. We cannot too strongly urge the importance of these collections being made promptly and thoroughly, not only from a financial standpoint, but also in order to preserve the confidence of the Church in its own ability to do things and for the maintenance of a good morale for the future. The undertakings of the future will depend largely upon the financial outcome of the Centenary.

One of the outstanding means for collecting pledges, cultivating the spirit of liberality and making permanent the financial awakening of the Church, is through our Bureau of Specials. Through this agency an aggregate of more than ten million dollars in specials has already been assigned for the five years. It is very desirable that every considerable pledge which has been made in the Centenary should be assigned as a special, if possible.

We nominate as the committee on evangelism: Revs. W. O. Talbert, J. H. Smith, H. I. Stephens, A. Knox, C. D. Harris, S. K. Cockrell, H. H. Sherman.

We recommend to the Bishop Rev. D. L. Blakemore for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary to give his full time to the office in connection with the Centenary Movement.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

Dr. George Elliott, editor of the Methodist Review of our sister Episcopal Methodism, in an address before the Wesleyan Association of Boston, uses these weighty words: "There never was a time in history when there was so much needed a press founded upon the principles of the Kingdom of God. We are in the midst of the eternal conflict of Hellenism and Hebraism, Paganism and Puritanism; between mundane culture and spiritual life. Let no one think that this conflict belongs to a past age. It is a live, tense issue today."

Admitting the truthfulness of such a statement, it is imperative, if the best interests of the Church are to be conserved, that the church paper should be in every Methodist home to counteract the evil tendencies, to aid our people in righteous thinking and living, and to hold up before them high and holy ideals.

#### Connectional Publications.

1. Our Church has in The Christian Advocate, The Methodist Review, The Epworth Era, The Missionary Voice and The Young Christian Worker periodicals of high standard. These should have the whole-hearted support of our people. It will be a better day for Methodism when they are found in every Methodist home and read more largely by the people, old and young.

The Sunday School Literature of our Methodism takes high rank among Sunday School publications. It should be used in every Methodist School.

The Pamphlets and Annual Reports of our various Boards should have a larger reading. These Reports are the record of the history that we as a denomination are making.

Our Publishing House stands ready to supply our pastors and people with books and tracts that will keep them abreast with the movement of Zion. We heartly commend to our constituency these general publications of our Church.

#### The Conference Organ.

2. Bishop Berry has said that if the 18,000 ministers of his Church should devote one week to a tactful pushful canvass for the church papers and do nothing else during that time it would be the best investment of seven days which the denomination ever made. The same truth applies with even greater force to our own Church because of the important and urgent enterprises before our people, who,

for the most part, are dependent on the church paper for information. Nothing can be done with a membership, however wealthy or intelligent, and however progressive its business men may be in their personal enterprises, that does not keep itself informed of the movement of Zion. Wonderful things are being done by the memberships that know God through the Spirit, and the Church through its ministers and press.

A practical way to get our vital information to all the people is through the church paper, and this cannot be complete unless the paper goes into every home. The only way in most charges to get the church paper in every home is for the Board of Stewards to include the cost of the paper in the budget and then to send it to all of the homes represented in the congregations.

First Church, Dallas, Texas; First Church, Anniston, Alabama; Gadsen Street, Pensacola, Florida, and many other churches in the Texas, Alabama and Florida Conferences, following the pioneering of the Baltimore Conference, have adopted this in their budget system. First Church, Dallas, expects to spend a thousand dollars in this way and will reap a harvest of growth in grace and liberality.

Though our Conference Organ is the only one of our connection published at a dollar a year, and is in need of a considerably increased assessment from the Conference in order to effectively carry out its mission, yet its management has decided to ask only for the same appropriation as the present assessment, owing to the many pressing demands upon the Church.

In the light of the foregoing your Board of Christian Literature makes the following recommendations:

First—that wherever practicable the Church budgets should include a sufficient sum to put the paper in every home of the congregations where it does not now go.

Second—That we request the Conference Commission on Finance to fix as the assessment the same amount as last year, viz., \$4,500.

Third—That we suggest October as the month for the annual campaign for securing at least one thousand subscribers for the Conference paper among those churches which have not provided for the paper in their budget, and that the allotment plan and methods of last year, which were so successful, be adopted. The editor and business manager and the presiding elders are authorized to carry these provisions into effect.

Fourth—That nothing in this report shall be construed as authorizing the publishing company to involve this Conference in any debt whatsoever.

Fifth—We request the Bishop to reappoint Rev. Carlton D. Harris, D. D., Editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist.

#### REPORT NO. 1, SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

REPORTS.

Whereas, The Court of Appeals, the highest Judicial Tribunal of Maryland, has declared by a unanimous decision that professional baseball on the Lord's Day is a violation of the law of Maryland.

Whereas, The permitted violation of one law will have the tendency to bring about disregard for all law.

Whereas, the police authorities of Baltimore City have refused to fully perform their duty as prescribed in Section 744 of the laws relating to the Police Department, thereby ignoring and treating with contempt the decision of the Court of Appeals, and by so doing are effectually undermining the law-abiding spirit of the people of our City and State.

Whereas, A community meeting held in St. John's Protestant Episcopal Parish House on February 21, 1921, unanimously protested against the lawless Sunday professional baseball at Oriole Park, and named Messrs. Robert L. Graham, Edwin B. Delcher and Milton W. Gatch a committee to represent the community adjacent to Oriole Park, and Messrs. L. Judson Westfall, W. Frank Keen and Daniel MacLea a committee to represent the Churches of the 9th and 12th Wards, to take such steps as may be necessary to suppress this violation of the law of the State as well as a defiant disregard of the public authorities, the Court and Government of Maryland.

Whereas, the Lord's Day Alliance, in compliance with the request of the above-named committees named, Messrs. Joshua Levering, Henry S. Dulaney and W. W. Davis, a committee to co-operate with them and these three committees, through their counsel, Hon. Isaac Lobe Straus, have petitioned the City Court of Baltimore City to direct and order Police Commissioner, Charles D. Gaither to suppress these Sunday baseball games at Oriole Park, which not only invade the repose and sanctity of the Lord's Day, but seriously tend to the subversion of law, order and good government.

Therefore, be it resolved that we pledge the Lord's Day Alliance and the two committees with which it is co-operating our united support in the endeavor to obtain an order of the Court directing Police Commissioner Gaither to suppress all professional Sunday baseball games in the City of Baltimore.

And, therefore, be it further resolved that Revs. A. Knox, C. D. Harris, D. D., J. H. Balthis be and are hereby named a special committee to co-operate with the committees above named in the further prosecution of this petition for a mandamus by the Court directing the Police Commissioner of Baltimore City to fully enforce the Sunday law with reference to professional sports.

#### REPORT NO. 2, SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Inasmuch as there seems to be a disposition on the part of a large number of the citizens of our country to destroy the Christian Sabbath, we recommend that this Conference put itself on record as opposed to everything that would in any way interfere with the observance of the Sabbath as a holy day, and as approving all legitimate measures to preserve this Christian institution. Also, that we endorse the proposed national law to stop all Sunday mails, newspapers, interstate commerce and secure Sunday as rest day for all.

#### TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

The liquor traffic is not dead. It is still in the throes of dissolution. Like some huge monster with vast vitality it is a long time dying—even after the mortal blow is struck. Also, its powers of recuperation are unmeasured, and, with any sort of favorable opportunity, it may even entirely recover. In every nook and corner of the land there is a well-defined, thoroughly organized conspiracy to restore this outlawed and discredited business to its former place of power in our economic and social life.

And it has to be confessed that this far-reaching conspiracy has met with and is meeting with a considerable, if not alarming, encouragement. It strikes at public sentiment by the exaggerated activity of its agents, and at the administration of the laws by the suborning and intimidation of courts and officers of the law.

It is far too early in the fight for any of us to assume an attitude of ease, overconfidence or indifference to the subject. Indeed, the present situation demands unsleeping vigilance and increasing determination on the part of the friends and proponents of prohibition, of whom the people called Methodists have always been chief.

It is our bounden duty as leaders of the moral sentiment of our people to maintain a wholesome attitude of mind toward the subject. We will not be intimidated by the arrogant behavior of the business, nor will we grow careless under the false assumption that the battle is all over. It is not over and we cannot quit.

Not only are we to exercise due care against the successful resurgence of this ancient foe of public morals; but we are to guard our people against other forms of evil also.

There is, for example, that form of evil that is cutting under the homes of so many of our people—the divorce evil. Divorce is not

an evil simply. It is an immorality. It is rooted in abnormal sexual immorality. Marriage is too often entered upon on the basis of mere sex impulse, and too often divorce is for the same reason.

And we can scarcely expect any other conditions under the constant stimulation of the sex passions afforded by the modern dance and the great majority of the moving picture exhibitions. We cannot wonder at the moral laxness that seems to prevail so largely amongst the youth of the land. We marvel sometimes at the moral integrity of our young people, considering the constant assaults made upon their virtue by these insidious forms of vice.

We recommend, therefore, for your approval these formal expressions of our attitude toward these matters as a conference representing a religious constituency in Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia, numbering some eighty thousand souls:

- 1. We view with emphatic disapproval and no little suspicion the leniency shown by many of our courts and officers of the law toward this aristocracy of crime, the illicit dealers in alcoholic liquors; and we insist everywhere on a more intelligent treatment of this question and a more fearless and conscientious enforcement of these laws.
- 2. That we recognize the Anti-Saloon League as the living active representative of the moral sense of our people on this subject, and we will continue to give to this great nation-wide organization both our unfailing moral and financial support.
- 3. That we suggest to the publishers of our Sunday School literature that a little additional emphasis on the Quarterly Temperance lesson would serve the cause of temperance in the coming generation.
- 4. That we recommend that our pastors be as careful as may be in the remarriage of divorced people.
- 5. That we caution our people against the indiscriminate attendance of young people and children on the moving picture shows.
- 6. We reiterate our statement in the corresponding report of last year on the inter-relations between the white and colord races of the South. We deprecate any effort to raise race animosities and endorse every movement looking to better understanding and kindlier feeling between us. We have great pleasure in the movement for the organization of inter-racial committees in all our Southern States and counties to cultivate mutual good feeling and helpfulness. In 817 counties of the South, having 25 per cent. colored population, 711 committees have been formed. Dr. R. E. Blackwell, President of Randolph-Macon College, is general chairman of Virginia. His name is our guarantee of wise leadership and an assurance that only good can come of the movement.

### REPORT OF VISITORS TO MARYLAND GENERAL HOSPITAL.

Your Committee appointed to visit the Maryland General Hospital of Baltimore offers the following report:

The hospital, notwithstanding the increased cost of commodities, is in the best financial condition of its career as a Methodist institution. Dr. Peck, the general superintendent, is in his second year of that ca-

pacity, and through his untiring efforts and splendid executive ability has brought about a healthy condition in all its departments. Many improvements have been added. A new elevator at the cost of \$18,000 was donated by one of its members. A new heating plant has been installed and a committee has been appointed to select a good location for a new Nurses' Home. When completed the Maryland General will rank with the best in the city.

We recommend that our Conference co-operate with the Methodist Hospital Association in its work in every way possible, but without in any way incurring any financial obligations thereby or becoming responsible for its management in any sense that would bind our annual Conference legally or financially.

We request the preachers of the Conference to commend the hospital to our people, and that each pastoral charge at the discretion of the pastor observe one Sabbath in the year to be known as Hospital Sunday, and the sacramental collection of the day be given to the Hospital Association.

I take pleasure in submitting my second annual report of the Baltimore Conference Memorial Home of the M. E. Church, South, to the Annual Conference of said Church, now in session in Roanoke, Va., April 7, 1921.

At your bidding I have continued to present the interest of the Home for the Aged and Young. And am pleased with the fact that wherever the purpose of our Conference to care for the helpless little ones and the aged or needy adults is told it meets with the hearty approval of our people.

Realizing that some plan or plans must be devised by which to secure means to project this much-needed institution, I have and do suggest the following, viz.: Free Will and Voluntary Offèrings, Memorials, Endowments, Legacies and Bequests. These being similar to methods used in all benevolent institutions. Nearly all of our

churches that I have visited have made a Free Will Offering. And quite a number of individuals have made Voluntary Offerings.

During the past fiscal year Miss Luella Bost, Martinsburg, W. Va., made aVoluntary Offering of \$25.00, and Mrs. Margaret C. Jarrell of Chestertown, Md., \$50.00. Ballston Sunday School has established a memorial fund. The Sunshine Band in the primary department of Calvary Church, Washington, D. C., has done likewise and laid the second stone or gift of \$5.00 thereon. While Miss Myrtle D. Fields of the same Church and Miss Cora Sneathen of Three Churches, Hampshire County, West Virginia, have established an Income Memorial Day Fund by giving \$5.00 and \$300, respectively. Calvary Church, Washington, D. C., has made its second contribution of \$25.00 to its Sacrimental Fund established last year. Dr. W. H. Hannum and wife, of Levels, Hampshire County, West Virginia, have established a Memorial Fund of \$500.00 in memory of their departed son. And Edwin J. Roberts of Westernport, Md., has established a Memorial Fund of \$500.00 in memory of his deceased wife.

There are also three reliable parties who will contribute \$500.00 each. And one who will give \$100.00 toward establishing Rev. William E. Woolf's memorial room. And one who wishes to put memorial furniture in room. The Epworth Leagues of one district have signified a desire to establish a memorial room, while other Leaguers are agitating a movement by which the Leagues of the Baltimore Conference will establish and maintain one of the buildings of the institution.

Besides the propositions contained in the report of your committee, other properties have been visited by your representative, and after the Conference accepts or improves and adopts the charter and by-laws and appoints a committee to secure the location, definite information can be obtained as to the terms on which these properties can be secured.

#### PROPOSED CHARTER FOR CONFERENCE HOME.

We, the undersigned, hereby mutually agree to unite and associate ourselves as a corporation, and for such purpose we hereby make, execute and adopt the following articles of incorporation:

- Art. 1. The name of this corporation shall be the Home of the Aged and Orphans of the Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, South, Incorporated.
- Art. 3. The purpose for which it is formed, as a pure charitable institution, is to establish a home for aged and infirm and needy persons who are members or adherents of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference of said Church, and needy white orphan children of Methodist parentage. and such other aged, infirm or needy persons or orphans as may be selected by the trustees, as hereinafter set forth; to care for such aged, infirm and needy persons and to care for and educate such orphans. And by the aforesaid corporate name it shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, which it may alter or renew at pleasure, may contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, take and enjoy by purchase, grant, gift, devise or bequest estates, both real and personal; and may sell, convey, mortgage or otherwise encumber the property, both real and personal, held by it, and have the general management, supervision and control of the same, subject to the provisions of this charter.
- Art. 4. The number of trustees shall not be less than five nor more than sixteen (at any one time), and vacancies in the board of trustees shall be filled by the Board of Trustees, subject, however, to the approval of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, which shall have the power to confirm or reject.
- Art. 5. The following are the names and residences of the Trustees who are to manage the affairs of the corporation the first year, viz.: Rev. J. H. Kuhlmann, Rev. J. Howard Wells, Hon. M. L. Walton, Tyson Janney and Herman Wilson; and the President for the first year shall be J. H. Wells, whose address is Washington, D. C.; and the name of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be J. H. Kuhlmann, for the first year, whose address is Hamilton, Va.
  - Art. 6. The period of duration of the corporation is unlimited.
- Art. 7. The amount of real estate, to which the holdings at any time of the corporation are to be limited, is 500 acres in land and not exceeding one million dollars in value, and for personal property not exceeding \$250,000.

Art. S. The aforesaid Board of Trustees and their successors shall have authority to elect any additional trustees and to serve for such terms as may be determined upon, subject to the foregoing provisions as to number and the confirmation of the said Baltimore Annual Conference. And the trustees shall have authority to fill vacancies subject also to the confirmation as aforesaid, but in all selections by said Board of Trustees only persons shall be eligible to election as Trustees who are members in good standing in the M. E. Church, South, within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference of said Church, and who are 21 years of age, and the severance or withdrawal of any Trustee from the said Church, shall ipso facto vacate the office of such power as trustee.

Art. 9. The Board of Trustees shall meet at such time and places as it may be determined upon, and five trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, provided that three-fourths of all the trustees shall be necessary to order sale or encumberance of any real estate belonging to said corporation.

The said Board shall have the authority to select an executive committee and such officers as it may be necessary, and fix the salary of the officers and assign such powers to the executive committee as may be expedient, and to do any and all acts whatsoever for the establishment, maintenance and management of said corporation not contrary to law or the provisions of this charter.

Art. 10. The further act of the corporation shall be to establish and maintain at some place or places within the limits of the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South, a home for the aged, and asylum for the support, care, education and industrial training and control of needy or orphan children of both sexes. The said Board shall have authority to take legal custody and control of such children for such time as may be agreed upon in writing, duly signed and acknowledged by the person or persons having authority to do so, and when such children are received as aforesaid, they, and each of them, shall be subjected to the authority of the said corporation according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees of the said corporation, free from the control of any person whatsoever, and the said corporation shall have authority to act as statutory and testamentary guardian without compensation, that persons now have under the law of this State.

Art. 11. The said corporation shall have all of the rights and powers of a parent or natural guardian over the children, and it shall also have authority by and through its duly authorized agents to name a home for any child under its control or to find employment for such child upon such terms and conditions as it may deem best for the interest of said child; and, upon a breach of the agreement as made or any material part thereof by the party receiving the child, the said corporation may compel the said party in the fault to deliver back the said child into its control.

- Art. 12. The aged, as aforesaid, are to be admitted to the home on such terms and conditions as may be determined upon by the Board of Trustees and be subject to such rules and regulations as to conduct, maintenance, support and care as may be determined upon by the Board of Trustees.
- Art. 13. A misnomer of the corporation in any deed, gift, grant, bequest or devise or any instruments or contracts shall not invalidate the same if the said corporation be sufficiently described therein to show the intention of the party.

### **MEMOIRS**

JOHN W. McNEIL.

"They are not dead whose noble minds Lift ours on high; To live in hearts we leave behind Is not to die."

John W. McNeil was born June, 1858, in Pocahontas County, West Virginia, and answered the high summons of God to the abundant life and reward Tuesday morning, November 16th, 1920.) He was the son of the Rev. Washington McNeil and Eveline Waugh McNeil. In 1892 he joined the Baltimore Conference, and for twenty-eight years loved and served his Church with that peculiar devotion characteristic of the faithful itinerant. His first charge was junior preacher on Blue Sulphur Circuit. Afterward serving as follows: Alleghany, 1893-97; Crabbottom, 1897-1900; Green Bank, 1900-1904; Union, 1904-08; Brunswick, 1908-11; Churchville, 1911-14; Covington Mission, 1914-15. Declining health caused him to superannuate in 1915. And though feeble in health, he continued his faithful service to the Church, rarely missing a service, teaching a Bible class and preaching as he had opportunity.

During his illness he suffered two or three surgical operations, but continued to decline in health, and it was very evident that life was fast coming to a close. On Sunday, November 14th, 1920, he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never regained consciousness. His funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. M. D. Mitchell, and he was laid to rest in the Thornrose Cemetery at Saunton, Va.

His surviving children are Mrs. Jacob Havener, Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Cochran, E. L. and E. H. McNeil, their mother having preceded him to the grave. He is also survived by his second wife, Mrs. Ella Hamilton McNeil.

Brother McNeil was a courageous preacher of the Gospel, believing earnestly in the power of the Gospel to accomplish all that is needed in the transformation of individual and community life. He was a devoted and faithful pastor, a man of high ideals and purity of speech. Measured by the high standard of success called Christian Brother McNeil has left a record that calls loudly to us. As a father he was cheerful and thoughtful to a great devotion; as a preacher he was loyal to his Master in the presentation of the Gospel and in daily living; as a pastor a good shepherd; as a friend, true to the end of day.

#### REV. JAMES WILLIAM GRUBB.

The subject of this sketch, Rev. James William Grubb, the son of Joseph P. and Mary A. Grubb, was born in Loudoun County, Virginia, April 19th, 1846, died at Sudlersville, Queen Anne County, Maryland, on Sunday, March 20th, 1921, having reached the age of nearly three-score and fifteen years. Brother Grubb, while still a mere boy, gave his heart to God, and was converted at Arnold Grove Church in Loudoun County, Virginia. He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to which he remained a true and faithful son until death claimed him.

Living during those stormy days of the struggle between the North and South, as a true son of Virginia, he cast his lot with his native State, and though still a boy, became a soldier for his southland. He enlisted in the Confederate Army, and for a short time before the surrender of Lee, was a member of that famous command known as White's Battalion.

He was educated at old Washington College, located at Lexington, Virginia, the name of which, after the death of its peerless President, Robert E. Lee, was changed to Washington and Lee University.

In 1879 he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, South. He was ordained Deacon and received into full connection in 1881, and ordained Elder in 1883. From 1879 to 1913 he served faithfully and well the following charges:

1879 to 1881—Junior preacher with Rev. H. A. Gaver, in charge on Queen Anne Circuit. 1881-1882—Bond Street, East Baltimore.—1883-1886—Trappe. 1887—West River. 1888-1889—Calvary Church, Baltimore. 1890-1893—Warrenton. 1894-1896—Leesburg. 1897-1898—Occoquan. 1899-1900—Fincastle. 1901-1904—Christiansburg. 1905—Grace Church, Roanoke. 1906—Vinton. 1907—New Castle. 1908-1911—Trappe. 1912—Hillsboro.

For some time he had been in failing health, and in 1913 he was given a superannuated relation, taking up his residence in Sudlersville, Maryland, where he continued his residence until called to his reward.

Brother Grubb was twice married. In 1870 he married Miss Carrle White. Of this union one child was born. His first wife, never robust in health, did not live very long, and in 1881 he married Miss Delma Neal. Of this union there were five children, who, with his wife and his other child, are left to mourn their loss.

James William Grubb was a man of more than ordinary parts. He was possessed of a logical mind and a vivid imagination, blended with a wholesome degree of the practical. He was quiet, unpretentious, gentle, and withal faithful in every duty laid upon him by his Church. He believed the Gospel which he preached, and preached it to others in rower and demonstration of the Spirit.

As a preacher he possessed unusual gifts and graces, and those whose favored lot it was to enjoy his ministry, delight to tell of his marvelous power at times as he preached to them the "Crucified Christ."

Brother Grubb was afflicted with Bright's disease, which for years had been sapping his life away, and on March 23rd, at Sudlersville, Rev. R. M. Wheeler and Dr. J. A. Rood officiated at the funeral. His remains were laid to rest to await the coming of Him, who shall call to resurrection and life His sleeping dead.

#### REV. JOHN FREDERICK BAGGS.

The subject of this brief sketch, Rev. John Frederick Baggs, was born in Easton, Maryland, October 19th, 1851. Died March 6th, 1921, in the seventieth year of his age.

Of Brother Baggs it may truly be said he was born a Methodist. He was the son of that well-known Methodist family, John and Mary Baggs, whose earlier married life was identified with Methodism in Easton, Maryland, but who, in later years, with their family, moved to Baltimore City, where they became most valuable assets of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the early age of fourteen years John Frederick Baggs was converted to God and united with the church. Having been convinced of his call from God to preach, he was educated at Randolph-Macon College at Ashland, Virginia. He applied for admission into the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, at a session held in Staunton, Virginia, in 1874, and was admitted on trial. He was ordained Deacon in 1877 and ordained Elder in 1879.

From 1874 to 1890 he served well the following charges: 1874—Junior preacher on Berryville Circuit, with Rev. S. Townshend in charge. 1875—Junior preacher on Brucetown Circuit, Rev. S. Townshend in charge. 1876—Warren Circuit. 1877—Junior preacher on Fairfax Circuit, Rev. C. A. Joyce in charge. 1878-1881—Frederick Avenue, Baltimore, Md. 1882-1884—Piedmont, W. Va. 1885—Bladensburg and Beltsville. 1886—Upper Marlboro. 1887-1889—Waynesboro, Virginia.

Owing to a nervous breakdown in health, he was during 1890 given a superannuate relation. In 1891 he returned to the active work and served as follows: 1891-1895—Alderson. 1895-1897—Edinburg. 1898-1901—East Harford. 1902-1903—Reisterstown. 1904-1906—Beltsville.

Again, owing to ill-health, he was in 1907 granted a superannuate relation, and with his family moved to Berwyn, Maryland, where his family still reside.

Brother Baggs was married in St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, to Miss Clara E. League, who, with their one son, Frederick Grayson Baggs, survives him.

John Frederick Baggs was in the highest sense a Christian gentleman. In his home he was kind, affectionate and considerate. To his friends, loyal, courteous and true. He was a man pure in heart. He despised hypocrisy, and yet knew how to make allowance for the shortcomings of others.

As a preacher of the Gospel he was clear and forceful. He preached the Gospel. His mind was well stored with treasures gotten from the many good books which he had read. He loved poetry, and his expressions at times were gems of the choicest kind. His conversation sparkled with wit; he was splendid company, and those who knew him loved him.

On Sunday, March 6th, after years of poor health, came his honorable discharge from duty. His remains were brought to the home of his brother-in-law, Mr. Grayson Ray, 2010 Park Avenue, Baltimore, Md., where, after private services conducted by Rev. C. D. Harris, D. D., March 9th, they were laid to rest in Mount Olivet Cemetery in Baltimore City.

#### REV. TIPTON TINSLEY FISHBURNE.

For a period of more than forty years Rev. Tipton Tinsley Fishburne, a local deacon, was one of the leading laymen in this Conference. He was born November 20, 1849, in Franklin County, Va., the son of Samuel and Frances Fishburne. Part of his education was received at Oakgrove Seminary, a private institution, which was discontinued during the Civil War. His intention was to prepare for the ministry, but after further consideration decided to enter the business world.

In 1868 he moved to Big Lick (now Roanoke) and was employed in a mercantile establishment. He soon became a leader in the community in matters of business, being closely identified with several large enterprises. "He was regarded as one of the leading financiers and business men of Virginia, and his judgment was sought on questions of importance concerning the affairs of the various institutions with which he was connected, as well as upon matters of public interest in the conduct of municipal business."

Brother Fishburne was a public-spirited citizen, interested in all that concerned the welfare of the community. He cast his strength against every form of evil. He had much to do with the establishment of the public school system in the city, serving for a number of

years as president of the School Board, and was one of the moving spirits in the establishment and maintenance of a City Hospital.

But more than all this was he interested in the things of the Kingdom. Methodism in Roanoke owes to him a great debt. He was a member of Greene Memorial Church from the beginning, being first chairman of the Official Board. In 1880 he organized a Sunday school, the first denominational Sunday school in the town, and was its first superintendent.

He was appointed to important positions in the Church at large, serving on some of the Boards of the Conference, delegate to several of the General Conferences, and member of the Ecumenical Conference in 1911 at Toronto, Canada.

He was a Christian layman, using his gifts and possessions for the work of his Lord. He loved to preach, and did so most acceptably. His sermons were well thought out and delivered with power. His brethren of his Church have said of him, "He has indeed been one of the pillars of the Church, his loyalty and fidelity have been unwavering through the years. He was unusually enterprising and forward looking; his activities were constant and covered all of the departments of church work. He was a safe counsellor, a wise leader and a true friend. His love for the church led him not only in diligent labor for her upbuilding, but awakened within him a spirit of generosity and liberality that grew more intense with the gathering years. \* \* \* The Church at large was the recipient of many munificient gifts at his hand. He gave most liberally of his time, talents and money while living, and made handsome provision in his will for institutions that lay near to his heart."

For several months before his death he was confined to his room and suffered keenly, but his faith in God was strong. He had made all preparations for the end several months before it came. In a letter to his pastor written a little more than a month before his death he says: "When I entered the kingdom of God the great question presenting itself to my mind was not the mysteries I knew awaited me somewhere in the future, but rather the problem that stirred me was right living. I therefore sought to learn the lesson of how to live, and found the answer in the question we so often hear, 'How shall we prepare to die?' Death can have absolutely no terrors to the person who is living in harmony with his Creator and Redeemer."

On October 1, 1874, he was married to Miss Callie L. Greer of Charleston, Illinois. A lady who was ever a true and faithful helpmeet.

His funeral service was held in Greene Memorial Church, conducted by Dr. W. C. Campbell of the First Presbyterian Church of Roanoke, and his pastor. His body was laid to rest in beautiful Evergreen Cemetery, April 13, 1921.
