#### RULES OF ORDER

#### OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is move and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which

shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:
(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute.
(8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide, or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

#### CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

## Appointments.

AIREYS, despite the fact that early in the year some dissatisfaction arose over the equitable apportionment of ministerial support and the benevolences between the three churches of the Circuit; despite the fact that the Church at Fork Neck rebelled, refusing to pay its apportionment, a good year's work has been done. A new church at Bucktown has been started and \$125 paid on the same. Paid on old debts and improvements, \$112. Conversions, 21; probationers, 18; accessions, 15; 2 classes of children formed for religious instruction. Benevolences not including the Carnegie Fund, in advance of last year. G. T. Townsend, pastor.

BECKWITH.—Brother Grinnage has succeeded in having the parsonage remodelled at a cost of \$324; paid \$258.12. Benevolences not quite up to last year. Conversions, 9; probationers, 9; accessions, 4. Supplied by J. H. Grinnage.

BOX IRON has surpassed all former record in her Conference and Benevolent contributions. Brother Nichols has worked hard and obtained results. Raised for the benevolences, \$52; for the Carnegie Fund, \$50; the full apportionment to this Charge; paid on old debts, \$262. Conversions, 9; probationers, 9; accessions, 2. E. H. Nichols, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE is soon to be one of the leading stations. Its pastor is a leader thoroughly aggressive; its membership is unquestionably loyal and the community resourceful. The new Church was dedicated June 5, 1910, a very stormy day. It is doubtful whether a dedication could have been held at any other point on the district on such a stormy day. The Rev. M. C. Jennings preached the sermon and the District Superintendent dedicated the Church. Collection, \$255. Paid on old debts, \$360; benevolences in advance of last year. Conversions, 23; probationers, 10; accessions, 4; 1 class of children for religious instruction. J. W. Fenderson, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT is an experiment and results seem to indicate the wisdom of the trial. Organization complete; every department of the Church trying to do its work. The Epworth League at Bethel would do credit to some of our more pretentious Churches. The pastor, though young in the work, should be given much credit for the excellent condition of this Charge. Paid on improvements, \$37; on Bethel Church, \$126; benevolences in advance of last year. Conversions, 7; probationers, 9; accessions, 10; 2 classes of children for religious instruction. M. Rasin, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE STATION. A new breeze of spirituality and prosperity struck Waugh Chapel, the old ship of Colored Methodism in Cambridge, and filled every sail. It appeared as though the old ship had at last found the heavenly trade winds. The congregation has been more than doubled and the Sunday School more than trebled. The Sunday School has been re-organized and graded. The Sunday School Orchestra, composed of some of the best musicians of the Merry Band, render invaluable service gratis. A new piano has been purchased for the School, and with Mrs. Mamie St. Clair as chorister a very high class of music is rendered. League is no longer a valley of dry bones, but a living organism with every function in action. Waugh has the honor of having organized the first society of Methodist Brotherhood on the District. The trustees stated at the last Quarterly Conference that they had been able to meet every obligation, this year, without having to borrow a single dollar. More than \$3000 have been raised for all purposes during the year. Raised for the Carnegie Fund, \$80, which completes the full apportionment of \$140.00. The benevolences are more than doubled that of last year. A gracious revival resulting in 115 conversions ranging in ages from 8 to 90 years has greatly sternegthened the Church. Probationers, 89; accessions, 17; 1 class of children for religious instruction. S. S. Jolley, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has made marked advancement. The old factional spirit seems to have given place to unity and fellowship. Brother Hammond and his wife have endeared themselves to the people. Arrangements have been completed with R. B. Dixon Co., Easton, Md., for remodelling Roch M. E. Church at a cost of \$1075. Weather permitting, work will begin April 12. Conversions, 15; probationers, 17; accessions, 11. Benevolences nearly double that of last year. S. J. Hammond, pastor.

CHURCH CREEK has made rapid advancement under the leadership of Brother Helm and his wife. It has far exceeded some of our much stronger Charges. Raised for old debts and improvements, \$107.88. Benevolences full. Conversions, 11; probationers, 14; accessions, 2. W. J. Helm, pastor.

CRAPO, all things considered, has had a very good year. The pastor reports that a piece of land on Hooper's Island has been bought and paid for on which to build a church for the people who have no place of worship; that the greater part of the lumber is on the ground and paid for; that the white folks of the Island are in sympathy with the movement and have promised substantial aid; that the carpenters are expected to go to work on the building in the near future. Raised for improvements, \$132.48; on new Church, \$104; for the benevolences, \$80. Conversions, 14; probationers, 13; accessions, 5. T. A. Johnson, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET, notwithstanding the pastor, on account of illness, was unable to attend his work for more than four weeks during the winter months, has surpassed all previous records. At the last Quarterly Conference the trustees stated that their books were practically clear of

debts for the first time in twenty years. The Church is well organized and every department working. Raised for trustees, \$366.12; for the Carnegie Fund, \$85, which completes the full apportionment of \$110; benevolences full. Conversions, 3; probationers, 5; 1 class of children for religious instruction. J. R. Brinkley, pastor.

FRANKFORD. Brother Hollis has done very well. Paid on old debts, \$321.05. Raised \$25 for the Carnegie Fund and the benevolences slightly in advance of last year. Conversions, 15; probationers, 15; accessions, 3.G. R. Hollis, pastor.

HARRINGTON reports 16 conversions; 30 probationers and 3 accessions. Raised for old debts, \$50; for the benevolences, \$30. G. B. Coleman, pastor.

HURLOCK has been in a state of war almost the whole of the year and the work has been seriously hindered. The parsonage is in a dilapidated condition and some effort has been made toward remodelling it. The pastor reports \$115 raised for building and improvements; for the Carnegie Fund, \$14; for the benevolences, \$38. Conversions, 25; probationers, 14; accessions, 5; 3 classes of children for religious instruction. J. W. Bowling, pastor.

LAUREL loyally sustains her reputation for good work. The mort-gage on the parsonage has been burned and the Church is entirely free from debt. Paid on improvements, \$125; on old debts, \$288; benevolences not including the Carnegie Fund away ahead of last year. Conversions, 5; probationers, 16; 1 class of children for religious instruction. R. H. Wallace, pastor.

LEWES has been seriously hampered on account of the burning of the Fish Factory, where many of the men worked; nevertheless, the report is excellent. Raised for old debts, \$114.72; for the Carnegie Fund, \$21, which completes the full apportionment of \$50; benevolences full. Conversions, 3; probationers, 14; 1 class of children for religious instruction. J. W. Cook, pastor.

LINCOLN is all right with Wright in the lead. Raised for old debts, \$152; for the new Church, \$243. Benevolences, \$106 Carnegie Fund, \$45. Conversions, 12; probationers, 9; accessions, 8; 2 classes of children for religious instruction. F. C. Wright, pastor.

LINKWOOD. The new Church at Thompsontown was dedicated October 9, 1911, the District Superintendent officiating. Brother Fields hasdone magnificently. Raised for old debts, \$168.50; on the new Church, \$---: for the Carnegie Fund, \$25. Conversions, 50; probationers, 48; accessions, 15. Benevolences normal. G. T. Fields, pastor.

MADISON. The new Church at Harrisville which was started sevenor eight years ago and for some reason unknown to the writer was never

completed, has been lathed and plastered and the trustees are expecting to open the Church for worship in the near future. Raised for improvements, \$365; for the new Church, \$200; total on old debts, \$405. Raised for the Carnegie Fund, \$49, which completes the full apportionment of \$80; benevolences not quite up to last year. Conversions, 4; probationers, 4; accessions, 5. D. S. Quillen, pastor.

MILFORD. The faithful few have stood loyally by the Church and for them a great year's work has been done, but the load has been heavy. The pastor and the people agree that he is a misfit and consequently not much has been done. Raised for old debts, \$176; for benevolences, \$63. Conversions, 10; accessions, 4; probationers, 11. D. A. Ridout, pastor.

NASSAU AND REHOBOTH. The pastor reports \$450 raised on old debts; for Carnegie Fund, \$10; for the benevolences, \$63. Conversions, \$5; probationers, 4; 2 classes of children for religious instruction. D. W. Martin, pastor.

NORTH BERLIN retains her position in the front rank. Brother Molock was stricken with partial blindness sometime last fall and gravest fears are held for the total loss of his sight. So far he has received but little, if any, benefit from the treatment of specialists. North Berlin does herself great honor in inviting him back for another year who has served the Church so faithfully for the past seven years, though he is seriously incapacitated. Conversions, 16; probationers, 12; accessions, 4; 1 class of children for religious instruction. Benevolences full. Raised for the Carnegie Fund, \$20. J. F. Molock, pastor.

SEAFORD has had a very prosperous year. Raised for improvements, \$49; on the parsonage, \$132; on the Carnegie Fund, \$29, which completes the full apportionment of \$100; benevolences in advance of last year. Conversions, 57; probationers, 47; accessions, 4. C. W. Downs, pastor.

SNOW HILL has broken all records. Ebenezer, the church in town, has been seated with beautifully carved quartered oak pews at a cost of \$480. These were bought in the west for much less than the same kind of pews could have been bought here in the east. It would require an expert to decide which Church has the better pews, St. Paul, Milford; Waugh, Cambridge; Ebenezer, Snow Hill; or John Wesley, Salisbury. Mt. Wesley has been remodelled and extensively improved at a cost of about \$1200, \$510 of which has been paid already. This Charge sends up the largest benevolent contribution in her history, \$160 and \$32 on the Carnegie Fund. Conversions, 40; probationers, 30; accessions, 4; 1 class of children for religious instruction. J. W. Jewett, pastor.

SNOW HILL CIRCUIT. Arrangements have been partially made for a new church building at Hutts. Raised for the proposed new Church, \$104.65; the benevolences, \$48. Conversions, 8; probationers, 9; accessions, 2. Supplied by C. H. Spencer.

SOUTH BERLIN is one of our strong Charges and this is her sixth time with us to send in her strong report. Raised for new Bethel Church, \$230; for improvements, \$150; on parsonage, \$30; for the Carnegie Fund, \$45. Conversions, 30; probationers, 16; accessions, 15; 1 class of children for religious instruction. G. W. Downs, pastor.

STOCKTON, like Snow Hill, has broken all previous records. St. Paul Church has been extensively remodelled at a cost of \$1200. A large new bell has been put in the belfry. The Church has been reseated with quartered oak pews. Reports show that \$800 have been paid on improvements; on old debts, \$48. The benevolent collections are the largest in the history of the Charge, \$126; raised for the Carnegie Fund, \$32. Brother Gillis has not only looked after the temporalities of the Churches, but a gracious revival swept over the Charge, resulting in 40 conversions; 40 probationers and 5 accessions. J. W. Gillis, pastor.

TRINITY. Friendship Church was destroyed by fire more than a year ago with no insurance on it. The people have rallied in their might and replaced the former building with some improvements. Although it is not completed services have been held in the building during the latter months of the Conference year. On account of a division among the people themselves, there has been much confusion and the work has been carried on with much difficulty. Paid on new Church, \$250; on old debts, \$13; raised for the benevolences, \$49. Conversions, 12; accessions, 2. I. D. Paine, pastor.

VIENNA. The members and friends of Wesley Church contemplateresuming the work of remodelling soon after Conference. Paid on old debts, \$214; benevolences not quite up to last year. Conversions, 5; probationers, 5; accessions, 3. L. H. Martin, pastor.

WHALEYVII.LE has not done so well for the benevolences this year as is her custom. There were local conditions and the Connectional interests were somewhat neglected. The trustees were forced to close the mortgage on the parsonage of \$116. Raised for the benevolences, \$46; for the Carnegie Fund, \$7. Conversions, 6; probationers, 25; accessions, 8; 1 class of children for religious instruction. D. G. Waters, pastor.

## The Ladies' Aid Societies.

The Ladies' Aid Societies have outgrown all other societies of the district in both number and efficiency. They are a mighty host doing a mighty work. The pastors' reports show them to have achieved the following results: Aireys, \$48; Beckwith, \$142.78; Box Iron, \$149; Bridgeville, \$325; Bridgeville Circuit, \$35; Cambridge, \$100; Cambridge Circuit, \$25.45; Church Creek, \$54.80; Crapo, \$35; East New Market, \$312; Frankford, \$80; Harrington, \$20; Lewes, \$25; Lincoln, \$137; Linkwood, \$80; Madison, \$29.79; Nassau and Rehoboth, \$38; North Berlin, \$50; Sea-

ford, \$102; Snow Hill, \$126; South Berlin, \$345; Stockton, \$150; Vienna, \$50; Whaleyville, \$96. There is a rivalry between South Berlin, Bridgeville and East New Market. Bridgeville held the third place last year and the second this. It is but fair to Bridgeville to say that it has made greater progress this year than any other society on the district. The rivalry is carried on in a most friendly way.

### The Carnegie Fund.

We have done everything that we knew to do to lay the Carnegie proposition on the hearts of pastors and people. In most cases the pastors have loyally supported the cause and the people have responded in a creditable manner. There are a few places, however, it seems to us that we have utterly failed to arouse the interest of either pastor or people in this cause. The leaders in some of these places have flatly refused to aid the pastor to push the cause and have declared open hostility to it. Crapo, Nassau, Trinity and Whaleyville may justly be put in this class. are other Charges where there is no open fight but little or nothing has been done. The only explanation the writer can give for the position taken by these persons is that they are not aware of what good things they are turning away from themselves. The education which this campaign gives seems to us the greatest reason why it should be vigorously pushed. The apportionment to this District is \$1890 and of this amount \$1735 have been raised. Some Charges have paid far beyond their equitable apportionment. One of the things which we so much desired was to see the full apportionment of the Carnegie Fund raised before the close of this year, but Alas! it is not. I sincerely regret it. My faith and prayer is that the men of the District will never cease the struggle till the last dollar is raisba.

#### Summary.

While the revival fire has burned greatly on some altars, this has not been a year of general and large revivals with us. Reports from pastors show that there have been 589 conversions; 542 probationers; 168 accessions. We have raised for Foreign Missions, \$436; for Home Missions and Church Extension, \$431; for Support of Conference Claimants, \$366; for the Carnegie Fund, \$663; that the aggregate of Conference and Benevolent Collection is, \$2778.

### A Brief Summary of the Work.

1. Young Peoples' Societies and other organizations. Six years ago there were 23 Senior and 2 Junior Epworth Leagues; today there are 35 Senior and 10 Juniors, an increase of 12 and 8 respectively. Six years ago there were 16 classes of children for religious instruction, at present there are 22, an increase of 6. Six years ago there were 3 Ladies' Aid Societies, pow there are 41, an increase of 38.

- 2. New Churches and Improvements. During these six years 12 ne churches have been built, 3 have been remodelled and 11 renovated. During these six years, 1 new parsonage has been built and 4 have been remodelled and enlarged.
- 3. Benevolent and Conference Collections. Six years ago the aggregate of the Benevolent and Conference Collections was, \$1839; for the present year it is \$2778. The aggregate of Conference and Benevolen=Collection for the six years preceding the present term was \$9841, for the present term, \$14,362, an increase of \$4521.
- 4. Salaries. Six years ago the highest salary paid on the District was \$600 and only one Charge paid that. There were only 4 Charges that paid over \$500. Now the highest salary paid is \$900 and 12 Charges paymore than \$500, and 9 pay \$500. Twenty Charges have increased the salary. The aggregate of the salaries paid to pastors six years ago was, \$12285, the aggregate for this present year is, \$14910, an increase of \$2625. The number of conversions reported for the six years preceding the present term was 3989 and the number reported for the present term is 3911, a decrease of 78.

The collocation of these facts is done by no means in a spirit of boast-fulness, God forbid, but in humble acknowledgement of our gratitude to Almighty God for his unspeakable goodness to us; that He through the ministry of His word has put it into the hearts of the people to lay these gifts upon the altar to help bring this old world to the feet of Jesus.

I wish to state boldly here and now that it has been my extreme pleasure to have associated with me during these six years some of the best hearted pastors and laymen in our great Methodism. They have never grown weary sacrificing for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom. They have felt that the burden was theirs. These advances could never have been made but for the willingness on the part of the laity. As touching our own comfort we have been treated as a prince in the homes of our pastors and laymen. During these six years no unpleasant episode has occurred in a single Quarterly Conference. If I am a judge of men, the bond of Brotherhood was never stronger between the ministry and the laity than it is today. I know of strife in the rank of our ministry. I speak for the Cambridge District. If I have a real enemy anywhere, I am not aware of it.

And now the time has come when, I as Commander-in-Chief of the District must lay aside the robe of authority, and, take my place by the side of my comrades upon the firing line. I do it in the best spirit, feeling that I have done my duty as I saw it. Having always before me the interest, I have endeavored to be true to the trust which was imposed upon me. In my representations to the Bishops I have tried to be fair and impartial, and have endeavored to eliminate the element of personal interest. Five years ago we wrote "the Io peans of victory" were "not ours to sing". After five years in which many advances have been made, and fallures almost innumerable, we still can but write, "The Io peans of victory are not ours to sing. We have but touched the fringes of our possibilities and have not measured up to our responsibilities". There are thousands on our District who are yet unchurched and scores who live almost under

the shadow of our Church spires who never hear a sermon, no not even do they enter within the walls of our Zions. With the Great Sun of Right-eousness high up in the heavens, with His glaring revealing iniquity all around, with so many victories yet to be won, we hang our heads in shame and say, "Lord we are unprofitable servants".

With grateful hearts for Divine Protection the pastors of the Centreville District return with effective rank unbroken. We are not however without sorrow, for we join with our brethren in their sorrow for the mighty of their ranks who have crossed the bar into the better land. As an evidence of the deep interest manifested many of the churches have held memorial services to honor the late champion, N. W. Moore, who for six years led to victory the host who tender these tokens of love; also to the memory of brother C. A. Horsey, an honored superannuated pioneer, who tell asleep Dec. 31st, 1910, has like honor been given. Brother R. H. ·Coleman, his pastor, was assigned the honor of preparing his memoir. The health of the brethren and their families has been very good during the year, only a few having been obliged to remain from any church service. Brother F. T. Johnson had a very malignant attack of illness, which for a while made his recovery quite hopeless, but God graciously lifted the cloud and restored him to his family and work. Others who were kept in-doors for short periods by prostration are brothers Shelton and Chase, as also the companions of brothers F. T. Johnson, I. D. Pitts, and P. M. Shelton.

This report can at the best only serve as a partial review of the achievements of the toilers in our territory, for nearly all of this body of workers show a willingness to labor and to sacrifice for the advancement of the Master's Cause that is hard to excel. It is true that our results are meager when compared with the demands of the worthy cause for which we labor; it is true also that I am unable to describe fully with pen and words what they have endured in order to be able to lay upon the altar the offering they bring from the four thousand members in whose midst they labor.

Never have we faced a time in the history of our work when high success in our calling demanded harder or more earnest labor than now, for today a single leap carries no man into position of eminence and honor, the prize, if won, requires the greatest amount of labor, the kind that 'goeth forth and weepeth bearing precious seed", then awaits the day of rejoicing whether it be far or near.

To say that the field is difficult to work is repeating the oft told story made thus through the industries by which the masses of our people earn their living, for upon whether the seasons in berries and oysters are pros-

perous or a failure, depends largely the amount of success financially to be reported by the greater number of our pastors, but in the face of the fact, many will not acknowledge defeat, and yearly write victory on their banner.

General activity on the line of child training has characterized the life of many charges this year, this of all work is most important if real church life is our aim.

. Classes for religious instructions with devoted leaders are in evidence in a number of churches. Wherever I meet them they furnish life in the class-meeting and inspiration to the preaching service.

The people are learning a lesson that is destined to pay them in real pleasure if continued, for the church going child is more likely to be the church going man or woman. Further they learn that to know Christ by sitting at His feet gives a larger vision, making religion to mean more than singing and shouting alone, but a staff, a fortress, the power that exalts a nation, an act that cannot be accomplished fully without proper care is bestowed in efforts to train the children.

The revival spirit, while it is about the same as last year, has not reached the mark for which we prayed and hoped. Some charges have enjoyed copious showers this year, for which we are thankful, but the lack of growth in our membership is sadness to me as these reports are made year after year, for it shows both a failure to nurture into full membership, and the baneful effect of wholesale cutting of the membership in many places under the head of leaving without letter. May the time speedily come when these reports may mean in every place ground gained and held. The charges report 570 conversions and 500 accessions.

That the Sunday School is healthy is a great complement to the faithful officers, for the forces arrayed against the steady growth of this department are unflagging, in the summer they in many places are scattered by the many campmeetings, and prevented in the winter by bad roads and severe weather, thus numbers of our young people fail to receive full benefits offered in this department, the effect of which must be noted in their lives.

The Epworth League is a strong factor in the spiritual life of our young people, therefore a feeder to the church in that they are touching through their spiritual department a vein unreached by the old form of prayer meeting common in our section. These weekly services of praise have more to do with the spiritual life of the church than many suspect, and will gradually lead on to full and effective work in all other departments. Our Junior League Supt. is no longer simply a name, but means a Bible teacher now, a student of child life, they are studying the courses for the little folks and imparting to them the same, this is building for eternity.

Nearly every charge is justly proud of their Ladies Aid Society, which is already a vital power wherever they exist. The district has 37 societies, they having raised for the churches this year \$1500. Our brethren are slowly being aroused to the value of the Methodist Brotherhood in helping to solve the great problem of indifference among men towards the church,

and as an evidence a few real effective working organizations exist and are reporting quarterly work well done. This movement rightly encouraged will bring into the church many men hitherto unreached.

Three splendid churches that are a credit to the pastors and congregations for whom they were erected have been dedicated this year: Charles Wesley Memorial in Centreville, Md., June 26th, 1910; Union Memorial on Kent Island, Md., July 17th, 1910; and John Wesley at McDaniel, Md., Sept. 4th, 1910.

New life has been inducted into the W. H. M. S. on the district, which we truly hope will gratify these worthy workers by a continued growth. A strong and convincing paper was read before our annual district preachers meeting by Mrs. M. E. Holland, and also a tour touching many charges made by Mrs. M. J. O'Connell, making inspiring addresses, have produced good, and we hope, lasting results.

There has been no let up in our efforts to complete the raising of the Carnegie Fund this year. The response from most of the charges has been most gratifying, but there remains a few who failed to see the necessity for haste. As a result we have raised \$\$49, there remaining to be raised to fill our apportionment, \$265. We will not despair, but continue, for a failure means as much shame and sorrow to the active of our race in this proposition as it does to the inactive for the world in their bitterness would spare none.

### Charges.

CARMICHAEL is joyous in the work they are doing for the Master, and are winning some strong workers to the fold. They report their debt well in hand, and have paid on the same \$279. For the Carnegie Fund \$53. Benevolence \$79. Total \$132. Conversions 16. Accessions 16. The pastor is winding up his fourth year, and is invited to return.

CENTREVILLE has not abated the activity reported last year, but has completed and dedicated on June 26th, 1910, their beautiful edifice with appropriate ceremony in the presence of a multitude of admiring friends. The pastor and the good people of Centreville have wrought well, and are repaid for the sacrifice made, by the convenience and beauty of their church and parsonage. They were able to adjust all debts by placing a mortgage of \$2850. The charge reports for all purposes this year \$2100. For the Carnegie Fund \$26. Benevolence \$223. Conversions 5. Accessions 12. No part of the work is neglected by this painstaking pastor, Bro. Shelton, who will return 1 am quite sure.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT—R. E. Stepney is ending his first year on this charge with success. This is not an easy work to manage but the hearts of the people seem to be won. A gracious revival at one church brought 32 converts into the church; accessions for the year 35. The pastor is having his second turn at raising the Carnegie Fund having filled the call in his former charge. Raised for benevolence \$30. Carnegie Fund \$20. Total \$50. His return is requested.

CHESTERTOWN—J. R. Holland is closing his seventh year as pastor of this charge, and still the cry is "we will not let thee go." The brother as an earnest worker and builder has earned and is worthy of this clinging devotion. The organization of this church is unique. Raised for debts and improvements \$860. Benevolence \$232. Conversions 57. Accessions 49. The apportionments are full.

CHURCH HILL maintains peace and satisfaction under the leadership of the pastor who is ending his third year in their midst. Bro. Lee is an earnest worker untiring in his efforts to meet the call of the church. The benevolences are reported in part; for the Carnegie Fund \$10. Total benevolent collections \$69. Conversions 6. Accessions 8.

CORDOVA is satisfied that their pastor is there by Divine appointment. The work is in good condition, and has two interesting organizations of the Methodist Brotherhood doing splendid work. The number of conversions reported 18. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$26. Benevolences \$97. Total \$123. Rev. W. H. Hayman's return is requested.

DENTON has enjoyed a year of success which is true to her record. A splendid barn has been erected on the parsonage lot, also preparation for building a new church is in progress, with a goodly sum banked for the work. Thomaston has paid the remainder of a long standing debt, and the church is now free. The charge reports paid on improvements \$153. Benevolence \$151. Conversions 17. Accessions 17. F. T. Johnson, pastor.

EASTON—C. W. Pullett is ending his fourth year in this charge. The revival spirit has again blessed this work, forty-two persons have professed faith in Christ. Accessions 44. Carnegie Fund \$85. Benevolences \$183. Total \$268. The church is well organized, and the pastor untiring in his efforts for victory.

EASTON CIRCUIT has made wonderful progress under the leadership of W. G. Matthews who was appointed to supply the work. The charge reports 17 conversions and 14 accessions. Carnegie Fund \$10. Benevolences \$23. Total \$33. The charge has done much toward self support, the pastor is happy, and has the confidence of the people. His return is earnestly desired.

FAIRLEE has not abated her former interest, and under the faithful guidance of R. H. Coleman keeps victory on her banner. Raised for the Benevolent cause \$133. Conversions 30. Accessions 25. The charge is in good condition and the pastor well beloved.

FEDERALSBURG under the pastorate of C. W. Moore is constantly advancing. Notwithstanding the fact that the much needed new church has not been erected, steady preparation for the same has not ceased. The future is bright, and all things are ready. Paid on old debt \$198. Carnegie Fund \$64. Benevolences \$138. Total \$202. Conversions 6. Accessions 8. This work is in good condition.

GREENSBORO has improved the parsonage at a cost of \$262. Paid on old debt \$175. Benevolences \$139. Carnegie Fund \$63. Total \$202. Conversions 52. Accessions 56. The work is alive and the organization of two Methodist Brotherhoods the Woman's Home Missionary Society with the presentation of a fine conference suit to the pastor marks the additional work of the charge. The pastor's return is desired, A. Chase pastor.

LONGWOOD—S. A. Earle, pastor. This charge continues to grow in strength, the purchase of a parsonage is evidence of this statement. Raised on old debt \$200. Benevolences \$84. Conversions 6. Accessions 6. Effective organizations among the young people have produced life that is full of hope for good results. The pastor is invited to return.

M'DANIEL has lost none of the splendid record reported last year. The new church is complete, and was dedicated Sept. 4th, 1910. The structure is a thing of beauty void of extravagance. The people are justly proud of their achievement under the guidance of this energetic workman. Raised for the Carnegie Fund \$10. Benevolences \$52. Total \$62. The congregation earnestly pray that Rev. J. M. Dickerson be returned.

MELITOTA—There is apparent more hope for success in the development of this work than ever, the growing effect of true spirituality can be seen. Conversions 6. Accessions 6. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$2. Benevolence \$23. Total \$25. Improvements \$150. The Rev. D. R. Dunn is invited to return.

OXFORD is struggling to master debt, but loyal to the Master In an effort to extend the work among the needy. The pastor has succeeded in organizing and maintaining a Sunday School at Trappe Station convenient to at least twenty families who live a distance ranging from three to five miles from church or school. The school has on roll fifty scolars, with several devoted officers who believe that a bright future awaits the work if continued. The church in Oxford is anxious to be made a station in order that they may be able to give more attention to the training of their youths in all departments of church life. The charge reports three conversions and and five accessions. Raised for the Carnegie Fund ——. Benevolences \$98. Improvements \$66. J. H. Harman pastor.

PRESTON has enjoyed another year of prosperity, and peace which is indeed characteristic of them. The newly appointed pastor took up the work and led on to heights of victory. A splendid stable has been erected and \$111 raised for same. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$87. Benevolence \$126. Total \$213. Conversions 55. Accessions 48. Every department of the work is carefully nurtured. The people love him and ask for his return. W. C. West pastor.

POMONA-W. A. Hubbard pastor. This charge has gone beyond former marks in many things this year of which they are justly proud. Conversions 25. Accessions 19. Carnegie Fund \$108. Benevolences \$126. Total \$234. For improvements \$18. Rock Hall the lower part of this work has made full preparation to have a pastor live in their midst, and ask to be made a station. The good judgment of the pastor has been so exercised that this division is made in a spirit of good will.

RIDGELY started off finely this year, was the second charge to report to the call for the Carnegie Fund, but I fear that the spirit of benevolence nas not continued thereby the cause may suffer. The report for all purposes will at least equal that of last year, but these are strong people, and we had hoped to see their full strength exerted in this cause. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$65. Benevolences \$16. Total \$81. For debt \$287. Conversions 6. Accessions 6. It is hoped that this charge may see their great possibilities and rush to the front. J. C. Bantom pastor.

ROYAL OAK believes in going a step farther, and has done so in their work this year, for debt has greatly decreased. The church at Bellevue is free from debt. The societies of the church are alive and working. Reports show that every cause has been well cared for. Carnegie Fund \$35. Benevolences \$162. Total \$197. Conversions 4. Accessions 10. The return of Brother Cooper is eagerly awaited.

ST. MICHAELS.—The election of T. H. Kiah to the principalship of Princess Anne Academy by the Trustees of Morgan College made necessary a change in this charge midyear. "Thy will be done" was faintly and tearfully said by this congregation, but as a loyal people they have rallied to the standard, and followed Father W. C. Dickerson to certain victory, who claims happiness in being called from retirement to pastor this good people at such an hour in life. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$74. Benevolences \$147. Paid on debt and improvements \$450. Total benevolences \$221. Conversions 15. Accessions 25. The pastor and people are happy in their success.

STEVENSVILLE.—This charge has made a record during the pastorate of 1. D. Pitts for building and renovating; the result is that the parsonage and two of the churches are in fine condition. The work has so commended the workman that the white friends of Stevensville have joined with members in urging his return for another year. The benevolences reported does not show the strength of these people, though the pastor has labored hard to have them reach the full apportionment. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$30. Benevolences \$20. Total \$50. Conversions 16. Accessions 6 The new church erected last year was dedicated July 17, 1910. The pastor and his co-laborers in this effort with a splendid monument standing to their memory are happy.

TRAPPE.—A. L. Henry pastor. Activity continues in this charge making both pastor and people delighted with their success. The offering for benevolences this year is greatly advanced over that of last year. For Carnegie Fund \$21. Benevolences \$99. Total \$120. Conversions 61. Accessions 52. The church desires the return of the pastor.

WILLISTON ends another year of peace with success on the banner. The benevolences are advanced over last year. Raised for Carnegie Fund \$21. Benevolences \$41. Total \$62. This charge can easily become one of the foremost and are awaking to their power. The pastor, N. D. Scott after faithfully supplying work in the conference for about eighteen years retires to his beautiful home near Ridgely, Md., highly esteemed by the people he served, and blessed by the church which thus honored him.

WITTMAN continues to excell their former work, and both old and young seem fully interested in the forward movement. The addition of a tower with side entrance and a bell with other extensive improvement on the interior tells the story of progress in part. The charge has raised for the Carnegie Fund \$33. Benevolences \$\$1. Total \$114. For improvements \$275. Both old and young of this charge are asking the return of Brother Norwood.

WOODLAND has enjoyed another gracious revival and reports the number of conversions 59. Accessions 59. Benevolences \$41. Carnegie Fund \$6. Total \$47. The pastor is a hard worker and greatly teloved by his people who ask for his return for another year. Jose Angulo pastor.

## Summary.

Our love for the grand old church whose labor for the uplift of fallen humanity knows no color (but would lift the human race to God) could not fail to make us wish that the apportionment for each cause was full and running over, nevertheless the offering we bring is one of love won by sacrifice. The reports show that \$849 have been raised for the Carnegie Fund leaving a balance of \$265. The charges having filled their apportionments are: Carmichael, Centreville, Chestertown, Cordova, Denton, Easton, Easton Circuit, Fairlee, Federalsburg, Longwood, Pomona, Preston, St. Michaels, Williston, while very small sums will finish the apportionments of all others except six charges, in these my faith is strong for them I say that the sum will be raised.

For benevolences the district offers \$2475. Grand total \$3324. For which may God be praised, and His cause advanced.

## PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

### BISHOP AND BRETHREN:--

Burdened with the weight of years of service, during which the flower of his splendid manhood of both mind and body were unreservedly placed at the disposal of his church on a district requiring sagacity, foresight and prudence, Dr. H. A. Monoe upon receiving at our last Conference an appointment as pastor of Ferry Avenue M. E. Church, Camden, N. J., retired from the sterner activities of leadership to allow one more virile in body, but not more acute in mind, nor sane in judgment, to undertake the work so nobly begun and so successfully prosecuted.

The character of the work accomplished in all those years of magnificent leadership can best be appreciated when some of the difficulties are understood, for it is only in the perspective of the future, when the possibility of prejudice is reduced to a minimum, and the actor himself, withdrawn from the stage, and the calmer voice of sober and unbiased judgment is given a hearing, that anything like justice can be obtainable.

This territory had been thoroughly pre-empted by other distinctive Negro denominations, so that our entrance on this field, especially the northern part of it, about twenty years ago, was considered speculative and experimental, and as such every advance made was bitterly opposed and hotly contested.

Again, this has always been in some sense a metropolitan district, in which the glare and tinsel and seductive temptations incident to city life offered a formidable hindrance to work of the church; but so well did he succeed that not only has the M. E. Church grown in increasing numbers and influence among us, but also her pulpits now rank among the most efficient agencies for advancing the claims of the Kingdom. His work was systematic and constructive, and the successor shall do well if he serves so truly and faithfully as did the predecessor.

To the execution of this severe but loving task I addressed myself with some misgivings and doubts, which were quickly dispelled by the cordiality with which the ministers and laymen welcomed me, the older pastors proffering most graciously such advice and admonition with which their long term of service and varied experience richly endowed them: and the younger men presenting an almost immeasurable amount of enthusiasm and spirit, both of which constituted a splendid asset of encouragement. To this must be added the abiding presence of God, the consciousness that I was lis fellow-workman, yea, bond-servant, the possession of almost perfect health, the absence of any kind of accident, though in labors more abundant, and perhaps in perils many, and a thorough-going vision of my duty, clear-cut, distinctive and positive, the interpretation of which constituted the norm that should inspire all my thoughts and unfetter all of my pentup activities.

I realized that the church had called me to administer her discipline, which was done resolutely but lovingly; to guard well all her connectional interests, which was done with pride, with special emphasis on the Conference Claimants and the Carnegie Fund. The former of these, the Conference Claimants

ence Claimants, represents to me one of the most sacred obligations of the ministers of the younger generation, for to provide a respectable competence for those who are pressing hard toward the line of physical inefficiency, to be mindful of the former years of sacrifice and toil, and to have due reverence for the past, constitute a trinity of trust which can be neither lightly treated nor ignored.

The Carnegie Fund has been persistently presented at our Quarterly Conferences, our several Conventions, both of the ministers and laymen, in private and public. The amount assessed me has not been fully raised. The total raised this year amounted to about \$700. This, however, does not mean that the pastors for the most part have not done their duty in this direction, but there are some conditions which we face on this district scarcely noticeable anywhere else. These facts ought to be known and presented; they do not constitute an apology, for none ought to be given when one does his duty, but they do constitute a reasonable explanation.

The laymen on this district do not, for the most part, feel the need of Morgan College. The privilege of unsurpassed educational facilities for all the people has made the more fortunate unmindful of the claims of the less fortunate; that we are bound together by blood, by sympathy and common interest, and that Morgan College is for all of us, in that what advantage accrues to the race in one section accrues to the whole race. These and other claims represent our treasury of argument in connection with the Carnegie Fund, and conviction is brought home to the minds of the people, less through the persuasive words of the orator than through the slow, painstaking didactic method of the pedagogue, which attitude our preachers have had to assume.

Another difficulty is seen in the almost insuperable financial burdens that our churches are bearing. The total debt on the district amounted to \$115,000, an amount more than the total amount on all the other four districts. To this must be added the lack of equal industrial opportunities, a minimum wage, a maximum of living expenses and house rent and many other ills which the race alone suffers. These represent some hindrances in executing our severe but very enjoyable task in not only raising the Carnegie Fund, but the other benevolences. The marvel is that we do so well.

But to raise benevolences and build and repair churches, etc., was not our whole duty. To do this and more, yea, infinitely more, this embraces my vision. Our chief duty is in the higher thought, forms of life and living, to give to our pastors a viewpoint, a world-view, a labenschaunung, even Jesus-view of the world, which view is its own apologia, in the majesty of its commandments, in the breadth of its purpose and the idyllic tendencies of its consolations.

Our pastors are requested that they, in turn, give to the people this, for where there is no vision the people perish, and because of the presence of almost unparalleled economies and industrial problems of financial struggle, the inter-play of social forces and the evidence of spiritual laxitude, it is inevitable that the people should perish. The preacher with his splendid mental equipment, his moral and spiritual endowments, is Divinely called to offer to the people, both social and spiritual salvation. The church

has various agencies at work among us for the realization of these higher purposes, every one of which has received my personal observation and heartiest endorsement.

# The Sunday School.

There is no more potent factor at work among us than the Sunday School. How well we are taking advantage of this agency may be judged by the following statistics:

There are 6000 children of all grades in our Sunday Schools.

There are 12 thoroughly graded Sunday Schools, with all the working departments.

There are 2 partially and 21 not graded at all.

This last number is entirely too large, for we cannot hope to compete unless we adopt the modern methods and appliances in religious instruction; in fact, the Sunday School is the real strength of our church life, the efficient solvent of both social and racial difficulties. Our own Sunday School missionary, the Rev. M. C. Jennings, has been actively engaged throughout the year in organizing on the district new schools, in grading 10 schools. Such labors are calculated to be productive of very positive results.

# The Epworth League.

There are 1070 members, associate and active. This makes a formidable army of young folks, arrayed in strength to fight sin. The Epworth League Convention held in June was a memorable event, thoroughly practical of its out-reach, intellectual in tone, and evangelistic in spirit, the influence of which was largely felt in the several local Chapters. I suggest that more emphasis be placed on the other departments, such as Educational, Mission Study and Christian Stewardship rather than only on the literary and devotional, in order that our young people may more thoroughly be prepared for Christian leadership in our communal life.

#### The Methodist Brotherhood, Etc.

This organization, with its emphasis on the idea of reaching men and soliciting their energies for the church and social reconstruction and regeneration; the Women's Home Missionary Society, with its accentuation on the needs of the indigent, and the salvation of our young women from the terrible Juggernaut of our sin-congested centres—have all been operating with some marked degree of success.

#### Special Meetings.

Two meetings exclusively for the pastors—one at Yonkers, N. Y., and another at Mt. Holly, N. J.—were held, both of which were fruitful of re-

sult in creating a bond of sympathy between the brethren, in energizing their faculties, both mental and spiritual, and in broadening the scope for the year's work.

A third meeting, composed of both preachers and laymen, was also held in the month of January. These were dominantly evangelistic, in harmony with the movement of the Commission on Evangelism. Eight such meetings were held at various points. The purpose was to give encouragement to the spiritual activities of the church, with a view of making these activities permanent rather than occasional, and thus to look forward to the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and His concomitant attendant of soulgathering at every service than on certain seasons of the year.

# Temperance.

Most of the pastors have been actively engaged in temperance and such other reforms as their local conditions warrant, but the district as such has taken no active part other than the passage of suitable resolutions whenever occasion demanded; but that we as a Conference may be more permanently engaged in this very important work, I respectfully suggest that we adopt at this Conference the Constitution of Inter-State Conference Society, of which Bishop Luther B. Wilson is the president. Such an act will constitute us, through our Conference Society on Temperance, a member. There are fifteen M. E. Conferences, wholly or partially in this State of Pennsylvania. There are eighty thousand members of the M. E. Church in this same territory, all of whom ought to be mobilized through this temperance organization in behalf of temperance reform and social redemption. We can well afford to be a member of such a militant army.

#### The Pastors.

The efficient human factors in bringing to pass whatever success we have enjoyed is to be found in the consecrated, hard-working, uncomplaining, self-sacrificing pastors and their wives, a truly courageous band, whose health has been Divinely preserved, although three brethren, the Rev. Samuel W. Wesley Waters, the Rev. J. H. B. Hubbard, the Rev. N. W. Moore, all members of other districts, died while in hospitals on this district. The funeral services were largely attended by the pastors, and resolutions of sympathy and condolence were read.

Our men have remained on the firing line, though some have faltered a little through sickness, the number being: Dr. H. A. Monroe, the Rev. W. J. Moore and the Rev. W. L. Butler. The quiet heroism of all, however, is faintly indicated by some startling figures. \$15,441 were paid this year on ministerial support, a slight increase over last year. This, when divided among 35 persons, makes an average of about \$440, a miserable pittance for God's workmen.

It was my privilege and agreeable duty at each one of the first Quarterly Conferences, as well as at the Layman's Convention, to present the

question of better support for our pastors. The ever-increasing demands made upon the minister as the social, intellectual and spiritual leader of the people, such demands as are found in good library equipment, in genteel personal appearances, in necessary medical attention for the preservation of health, in recreation, for the purpose of re-creating in body, mind and spirit, all these together with the perplexing problem of the cost of living, make it imperative that something be done to relieve the stress of the situation.

Every pastor ought to be free from financial embarrassment, especially since he has placed his all—time, talents and self—on the altar. No pastor can ever be at his best unless thus relieved. The layman can assist largely in this direction; nay, it is their religious duty, which constitutes a categorical imperative. He ought; therefore, he must. This oughtness is plainly seen in that he who serves the many on their higher eternal interests, morally obligates the many to serve him on his lesser temporal interers.

A careful gathering of statistics on the district shows that 24 charges made no advance in pastoral support. Two actually decreased the pastors salary below last year; namely, Brooklyn, \$50; Burlington, \$60. Total, \$110. But 12 charges increased the salary above last year; namely, Atlantic City, \$100; Goshen, \$25; Morrisville, \$50; Mt. Holly, \$100; Ossinning, \$120; Haven, \$204; John Wesley, \$60; Somerville, \$25; St. Paul, \$50; Salem, \$100; Salem Circuit, \$80, a total of \$1014. This is only fairly good, and if Providence permits and the good judgment of the bishops consent to allow me to remain on the district the full term, to this worthy cause I propose to "Cry aloud, and spare not, and lift up my voice like a trumpet", until every charge is swung in line with this great movement for better ministerial support.

#### The Charges.

ATLANTIC CITY .- Subsequent events justified the wisdom of this appointment last year; here was a problem of many perplexing and peculiar difficulties; the question of providing a much-needed new house of worship and, at the same time, not to increase the already-tremendous debt that had taxed the wisdom of the officiary and previous pastors. The new Pastor coming on the field at the psychological moment, with an unlimited amount of enthusiasm and tact soon proved to be the man for the situation. The congregation steadily outgrew its old quarters and the Trustees were compelled to build a larger but temporary structure on a very valuable lot, which they had purchased several years prior. The final summary of the year's work demonstrates the wisdom of this tentative arrangement. Over \$5000 raised for all purposes. \$250 raised for benevolence; \$50 for Carnegie Fund, this being the largest amount raised in the history of the church and placing the charge the third in the district in benevolences. There were 47 conversions, 114 accessions, 85 of whom were from other Evangelical Churches; a flourishing Epworth League, a thoroughly graded

Sunday School. The best year in the history of the Church. Plans and specifications are in hand for the building of a modernly-equipped church this coming Conference year.

BRIDGETON.—This point was formerly a circuit, consisting of two charges. It was thought expedient to separate these, thus giving either a better opportunity for development, the pastor remaining at Bridgeton and a local preacher supplying Springtown. This temporary arrangement has proven successful. There is practically no debt, an increase in benevolences and marked evidences along all lines of church activities. Carnegie Fund, \$25.

BROOKLYN.—Here is presented a rare combination of opportunity and power, for, while there has been seen the necessity of a new structure in answer to the pressure of city life, there has also been recognized here the presence of a well-trained young man to take the leadership in this enterprise, and if I am a little too exacting in my anticipation it is due to the thought, "that to him who has much, more is required." Benevolences increased over last year, Carnegie Fund, \$7; raised for all purposes, \$430.

BURLINGTON.—In the evening tide of his life, this Pastor was called upon to perform a task and to make personal sacrifices that would tax the energies of a younger man. He saved our parsonage from being sold, though he suffered financial want. All of the connectional interests safely guarded. Carnegie Fund, \$1.00.

BRONX.—Here a very good year's work has been done. The congregation has changed its place of worship from the narrow, insufficient quarters to a very comfortable church building in the centre of a large, growing population of our people. Many thanks in aiding us in this new enterprise are due to Dr. Frank Mason, North of N. Y. City, Church Extension and Missionary Society, and to Dr. W. H. Brooks, of St. Mark's M. E. Church.

CAMDEN.—A very remarkable report is presented by this charge. The Pastor, a veteran of the War of the Sixties, in which men became iron, with nerves of steel, was halted in his activities by the insidious approach of disease, his hand relaxed his grip on the helm, and we all despaired for a while of his life. Quietly, and no less gracefully, his loving and faithful wife stole to his side, and taking the helm in her own steady hands, steered the ship full sailed and brought her safely into port, while the patient with indomitable will, so characteristic of him, gallantly fought his way back again from the angry jaws of death to the smiling gateway of life. The charge reports \$878. raised on old debts; \$741 on new debts. The benevolent collections taken amounted to \$83. The Church Extension obligation met a Sunday School of 201 members, a promising Junior League and the entire officiary, pulsating with expectancy for his return, "sick or well." These loyal laymen have my highest respect and congratulations for so nobly standing by their church.

CAPE MAY.—This Pastor has safely brought this church through the meshes of unfriendly criticism and hostile opposition and reports a good year's work. \$1183.00 was raised for all purposes. An increase in the benevolences; there are also 325 pastoral visits to his credit, and a life beyond reproach. Carnegie Fund, \$5.

CHESTER.—St. Daniel's.—The year closes with divergent opinions as to its real success, but with the emphasis placed on the spiritual rather than on the material, but little doubt remains in my own mind as to the year's prosperous ending. A grand total of \$2259.00 was raised for all purposes, \$964 of which was received for Trustees, an increase over last year, and nearly \$250.00 raised for benevolences. Carnegie Fund, \$70. What appears to be a falling off here is not really so, when compared with the first year of this administration; last year witnessing redoubled activities in the interest of the Carnegie Fund. This year represents a marked increase over the first. In Pastoral labor the work of the year stands out prominently—700 visits, the next largest number in the entire district. There were 44 converts, 28 of whom were children. There were 64 accessions, 35 of whom were children. A good Sunday School of 412 members and a flourishing Epworth League. The Pastor is a firm defender of Christian Ethics, a tower of strength in the pulpit and a terror to evil-doers.

CHESTER.—Siloam.—All the departments of this charge are in splendid working order. The benevolences increased over last year. Carnegie Fund, \$14.00. A glorious revival is reported, in which 56 souls were happily converted. Accessions to Church, 20. A good Sunday School, thoroughly graded, in which work the Pastor is very actively engaged, and has rendered invaluable services as President of the Tenth District of the Delaware County Sunday School Association.

FORDSVILLE.—Under the leadership of this new energetic Pastor this charge presents a good report in benevolences and other activities. At Friendship, a little community, several miles from here, where the church has been closed for several years, work was resumed this past year. The church there was repaired and a very promising Sunday School organized. Carnegie Fund, \$3.

GOSHEN closes up a prosperous year, the pastor and people happy.

GRENLOCH AND RHODES.—This charge reports an increase in benevolences over last year, and under the careful leadership of the Pastor, promises much for the future.

HAVEN.—A splendid year's work. Here for 13 years the Pastor has remained, and each year with increasing success. The courage of the people and the faith of the Pastor in managing their debt is surprising. All the benevolences raised. A goodly number of accessions and conversions end the year.

HUDSON.—Out on this frontier of our Methodism, this Pastor and people are true and tried. There is reported an increase in benevolences, Carnegie Fund, \$3, and other activities indicative of a growing church organization.

MAGNOLIA.—Were it not that I should hope to report at subsequent Conferences, the work which this pastor is capable of accomplishing, I would speak of this year's work in the superlative. The people have worked harmoniously and well. The total of the yearly receipts amounts to \$2962, of which \$1930 was raised for the Trustees. The total benevolences amounted to \$119.00 and the Carnegie Fund, \$25.00. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension granted to these struggling people a loan of \$3000 and a donation of \$200, which, added to the amount already in hand, will enable the Trustees to satisfy their many urgent creditors on a basis of 70 per cent. of the entire indebtedness, thus relieving the church of a continuous annoyance and embarrassment. For this happy consummation of a long drawn-out difficulty, both pastor and people deserve much commendation. A glorious revival immediately followed the financial successes, to which 53 persons were converted.

MERCHANTVILLE.—Under the leadership of a new Pastor, this charge assumed the attire and vigor of youth, and proceeded to demonstrate its appreciation of a young, vigorous pastor. The church building was renovated, the benevolences increased, Carnegie Fund, \$8.00, and the spiritual life of the church quickened.

MT. HOLLY.—The people and pastor here have worked hard during the year, and report a good result. Benevolences cared for, and the church in a good condition.

MT. CLAIR.—The Pastor here is now completing his sixth year. This appointment justifies the wisdom of retaining men of exceptional ability and tact as long as the relations between Pastor and people are harmonious. Here are demonstrated consecration, devotion, thoroughness and hard work, resulting in one of the most delightful charges in the district. \$3180 was raised for all purposes, of which \$2050 was for the Trustees; an increase in benevolences and all Pastoral activities, 31 conversions, 74 accessions. The Pastor is thought of as a communal necessity.

MORRISVILLE.—For another year this charge has quietly pursued the even tenor of its way. Increase in benevolences. Raised for all purposes, \$865; Carnegie Fund, \$7.00. A newly graded Sunday School and Teacher Training Class. 8 conversions, 6 accessions.

NEWARK.—A year of struggle and earnest endeavor, not without some very positive results in the building of character and laying the found-dation of a permanent and representative institution. Benevolences, \$119.

ORANGE.—The ability of the Pastor and the loyalty of the people have combined in producing a very prosperous year. This is the Pastor's

first year on this field and his coming, in response to a long-felt desire, has resulted in placing our church in the front rank of the City churches. The administration has been sane, thorough and reliable. A new heating plant has been added. Total received for the year, \$2476.00. Benevolences, \$103. Carnegie Fund, \$25.00. 15 conversions, 28 accessions.

OSSINING.—The enthusiasm of the Pastor here has not abated in the four years which he has served. He sweetly sings the message, as well as preaches it to the delight of his listeners. Results, a very good year. Through a special gift of \$1000 to the church, all indebtedness on the property was removed. The benevolences provided for. Carnegie Fund, \$10.12 conversions, 10 accessions.

GERMANTOWN.—The Pastor here is completing his sixth year of a very successful administration, and this year does not lay behind the others in point of Pastoral service or church loyalty. \$2557 were raised for all purposes. All the benevolences paid in full. Entire Carnegie Fund was paid last year. 45 converts, 49 accessions, both of which are marked increase over the previous year. These statistics seem to indicate that a man who can serve successfully for 12 years as District Superintendent, can, in turn, be no less successful on a charge as Pastor.

OCEAN CITY AND PLEASANTVILLE.—A very creditable year's work has been done here and the way is now clear for a new church at Pleasantville.

ST. FAUL.—The continuous labors of the Pastor and the fidelity of the people, and the need of a place of worship in South Philadelphia justify the existence of this mission. Its chief field, of activity, though not its only opportunity, is among the children, 218 of whom have been gathered in the Sunday School. These buds of promise are our hope. An increase in benevolences over last year. Carnegie Fund, \$7.00.

ZOAR.—Here is demonstrated one of the best examples of systematic and constructive leadership and completeness of church organization on the district, and it is quite fitting that it should be so, for the mother of our Negro Methodism cannot better endow her offspring than to bestow on them a liberal heritage of those great principles of life and living of which she is such a splendid exemplar. \$4849 raised for all purposes. \$619 for benevolences, an increase of \$56 over last year. Carnegie Fund, \$125.00. \$1231 paid on old debts. 27 conversions, 50 accessions. The officials are loyal and thorough-going, and request Pastor's return.

CALVARY.—Our own Methodism in Philadelphia has long required the uplift and inspiration of a great personality and at last, fortunately, found it in the present Pastor, who for nine successive years, with remarkable ability and unchallenged purity of life, has attracted and still attracts with unbated insistency overflowing crowds to hear the simple message of the Cross. Here the revival fires burn continually and almost at every

service people join the church. The existence of this institution on Broad street, even under a \$65,000 debt, is justified by both the conditions and circumstances. All over Philadelphia our other denominations are widening their opportunities and in order to save our own constituency and also to increase our sphere of operation, we must move forward on all aggressive and evangelical lines. Calvary presents the example, and in this respect is the premier. Raised for all purposes, \$16,000. For benevolences, For Carnegie Fund, \$200. In addition, the church building has been beautifully decorated and every effort made for the comfort and enjoyment of our guests. The officiary are as loyal and true a set of men as may be found in Methodism, and the successful handling of this great enterprise is due to their business sagacity and intelligence. This church, by actual statistics, is carrying one-half the indebtedness of the entire district; is paying out one-half the amount paid out by the entire district, and receives for its Trustees one-half the amount the Trustees receive in the district. Other activities, a Sunday School of over 3000 members, a church membership of 2157 persons, 235 conversions, 250 accessions. The year closes happily and Pastor and people rejoice that they have fought their way The fourth quarterly conference unanimously requests the Pastor's return.

FRANKFORD.—During the past twelve months, the Pastor and loyal people have striven very hard with the small resources at their command, to do as creditable in debt-paying as in benevolences and in building up the congregation. Their ideal has not been fully realized, but they are encouraged to continue working for the desired end. Received for all purposes, \$1405: for benevolences, \$52; Carnegie Fund, \$15.

JOHN WESLEY.—This struggling congregation began the Conference year with 51 persons as members, a debt of \$6200, and a deed for their property in the name of a private individual, for which they are compelled to pay taxes, an anomaly in church life. How they survived at all is the miracle of the year. But with supreme faith in themselves, in the right-eousness of their cause, and the presence of God, they fought their way out, raising for the year \$1775. \$52 for benevolences, of which \$20 was for the Carnegie Fund. 6 conversions and 16 accessions.

WHITE PLAINS.—Here, quietly, but persistently and uncomplainingly, these people have been making brick without straw; with only 11 members, they have built a beautiful church, raising for all purposes \$848, an average of \$43 were raised for benevolences, \$5 of which is for the Carnegie Fund. The Pastor is to be highly commended for during all these 12 months of toil and responsibility he has received less than half his salary, but he stuck to his post. This represents the kind of material necessary for leadership for our churches in this district.

SPRING LAKE.—A delightful summer appointment, the Pastor has worked well and deserves commendation.

SALEM.—The Pastor's strenuous activities and long term of service of 8 years on a previous charge, left him impaired in health, so that he entered on this new charge at the beginning of the Conference year somewhat handicapped. He reports to Conference not yet strong in health, but hopeful in spirit and greatly encouraged for a year's successful work. Raised for all purposes, \$745; for benevolences, \$93; for Carnegie Fund, \$26.

SALEM CIRCUIT.—The year began very hopefully and promised to be one of the best in the church's history. Early in September the Pastor was taken seriously sick, and practically remains so at this session of the Conference, in consequence of which but little has been done. Total receipts for the year, \$404.

WOODBURY AND NORTH CAMDEN.—The work at Woodbury is in a good condition, and the results following the Pastoral labors justify his presence. North Camden is problematic. The future alone can reveal its outcome.

The following charges failed to send in blank reports filled out in time for tabulation: Goshen, Mt. Holly, Ocean City, Pleasantville, Haven, Somerville.

These 35 charges constitute to me the scriptural talents given as a trust. But to guard these and only this, was to remiss in my full duty. Our territory offers unsurpassed opportunities for the extension of Methodism, a strange desire gripped me; a desire somewhat akin to that which so filled the consciousness of Jesus that through his efforts the Gospel of the Kingdom was preached in Judea, in Gallilea and in the regions beyond Jordan. This missionary spirit flooded my soul, and I longed for new empires to conquer.

Through the evangelistic activities of Brother Morris, of Ossinning, the missionary labors of the Sunday School Missionary, who often sought and found opportunities to create new Sunday Schools, my attention was called to the possibility of establishing new work.

After several visits to the points indicated, 3 very promising missions were established at Yonkers, N. Y.; at Jersey City, N. J.; at Englewood. Already in the thought forms of the Old Testament Scriptures, "The isles are walting for us, and the prophetic language of the world's Saviour is heard ringing in our ears: "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest".

And the ancient cry which Paul heard capering against the clouds and reverberating at the foot of the hills, prepossesses us.

We further propose to begin work at old Bainbridge and establish a mission there. There is an unparalleled opportunity. A fully-equipped church, a neighborhood swarming with the unchurched and unsaved. All that we need is a man. If I can find a man, for a true man for service is wanted, I shall request the Bishop to appoint him there, thus establishing another agency for good in a centre so distraught by evil, for it was of Jesus that the Scriptures say, "He beheld the City." If we save the city, we save the race.

Our encouragement for the future is the supreme belief that all men are worth saving and can be saved. Our important and best asset is in the divineness of our call to seek and help save. Our sublime faith is in God.

"Nothing before, nothing behind, The steps of faith fall on seeming void, And find the rock beneath."

Here we stand, awaiting the call of God to labor and service.

#### SALISBURY DISTRICT.

## BISHOP AND BRETHREN:-

By the grace of God I have completed the term of six years as supervisor of the Salisbury District, and now present my final report.

## Charges.

COTTAGE GROVE. The nine years of J. W. Waters' service on this charge have been years of ever increasing success materially, morally, and spiritually. The climax of his labors is the building and practically paying tor, one of the best churches on the district, in the past two years. Raised for new building and repairs \$915; for the benevolences \$173, for Africa \$7, Carnegie Fund \$25, total \$180. Total raised for the Carnegie Fund \$114. Conversions 20, probationers 18, accessions 20.

CRISFIELD. The itineracy, at best a hardship, often meets with impressive justification in the beneficial results that attend the changing of pastors by authority. Brother C. S. Sprigg met with strong opposition on going to Crisfield last spring. But he left the town full of joy over a great revival, in which 131 persons of all ages and moral conditions were converted. The moral tone of the community has been profoundly changed for the better. And the people now love him and his wife, and earnestly desire their return. Raised on old debts \$492; for the benevolences \$154,

for Africa \$8, Carnegie Fund \$39, total \$201. Total raised for the Carnegie Fund \$110. Conversions 131, Probationers 72, accessions —. This in the largest amount ever reported for benevolences from this charge.

DAMES QUARTER. Brother J. L. Davis has labored two years in this most difficult field with good result, for his reports are the best received from the charge in the past six years. Raised on old debts \$---; for the benevolences \$32, the Carnegie Fund \$25, total \$57. Total Carnegie Fund \$57. Conversions 50, probationers 50, accessions 50.

DEALS ISLAND. J. M. Washington, a young man of good education and excellent character, having been admitted on trial last year, was appointed to Deals Island. After about two weeks trial, he and the people were so disappointed in each other that he with my consent left the work, and returned to teaching. I consented to his returning to his old profession with genuine regret, and only after I found it impossible to place him. You ask why did he fail? He was born, reared, and educated in western Pennsylvania, and the good people of the Peninsula are another proposition. He could not solve it. I begged brother S. A. Waters of Kingston to take charge of the work; and he has given such satisfaction that the people have asked for his return. Raised for improvements \$20.95; for the benevolences \$53, Africa \$4, Carnegie Fund \$20, total \$77. Total Carnegie Fund \$52. Probationers 2, accessions 2.

EXMORE. A serious difference has arisen between L. D. Beecham and his people. He thinks that in the five years he has been with them, he has done all that he is capable of doing, and he desires to leave. They think that there is no other man in the conference that could serve them so well, and they beg that he be not taken from them. But both parties have referred the matter to the appointing powers. Raised on old debts and improvements \$——; for the benevolences \$46, Africa \$1, the Carnegie Fund \$17, total \$64. Total Carnegie Fund \$30. Conversions 6, probationers 10, accessions 2.

FAIRMOUNT, CENTENNIAL. Competition is the life of trade, Necessity is the mother of invention, Emulation is the spur of endeavor, all these maxims came into my mind as I viewed at a distance, then entered with surprise and delight and inspected from lecture room to tower, the transformed, beautified, modernized old Centennial Church. Those who refused to leave the sacred spot where rests the dust of the fathers, have shown that they were controlled by the noble sentiment of reverence, not vapid sentimentality, by answering in such a splendid way the question which had agitated them for years—Shall we repair or remodel? Brother J. W. Bond has demonstrated fine leadership, and merited the highest praise for this truly great achievement, for these people. Raised for old debts \$200, for new building \$500; for the benevolences \$96, for the Carnegie Fund \$15, total \$111. Total for the Carnegie Fund \$70. Conversions 5, probationers 8, accessions 5.

FAIRMOUNT, ST. ANDREW. The hopes which sprang up at the beginning of this strong church, are being fully realized. And their obedience to the voice of progress calling them to go out from their fathers' house, is justified by the steady growth they are making in all regards. They think their pastor, R. G. Riley, is fit for any position in the Conference, and they are good judges. Raised for old debts \$350, for repairs \$50; for the benevolences \$92, Carnegie Fund \$30, total \$122. Total Carnegie Fund \$55. Conversions 5, probationers 12, accessions 12.

FRUITLAND. W. C. Bowland and his people were pleased with each other at the start. And they showed it by raising the balance due on the Carnegie Fund at once. And they are still working harmoniously together. One of the churches, the Flower Hill mission was burned in a forest fire started by a spark from a locomotive. Through brother Bowland's persistent efforts the company paid them \$150, and the people are now busy trying to build another church. We do not always recognize blessings when they come. These people have at last waked up; yet it was so as by fire. Raised on old debts \$189, repairs \$94, for new building \$157; for the benevolences \$112, Africa \$3, the Carnegie Fund \$67, total \$182. Total Carnegie Fund \$96. Conversions 32, accessions 32.

GREENWOOD. Whenever I think of the brethren who have the small charges, for small is apt to mean poor with us, I always recall the words of our Lord Jesus, "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much." And the apostle Paul says, "Here, moreover, it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." Brother Boggs, who supplies this work, has the glory of being faithful in one of the smallest of our appointments; and his faithfulness bears substantial fruit also. Raised on old debts \$75, for repairs \$50; for the benevolences \$50, Africa \$2, Carnegie Fund \$10, total \$62. Total Carnegie Fund \$20. Conversions 15, probationers 15.

HOPEWEILL. Brother J. K. Adams is still holding the hearts of his people, and leading them on to success. He laments that his work has not been blessed with a revival. But in temporal affairs they are in the first rank. Raised on old debts \$634, for repairs \$28; for the benevolences \$83, Africa \$2, Carnegie Fund \$20, total \$95. Total Carnegie Fund \$77. Conversions 2, probationers 6, accessions 6.

JAMESTOWN. Brother M. P. Sterling is ending his second year on this charge. His not being an elder has militated against his success. He reports as follows: Raised on old debts \$410; for the benevolences \$46, Africa \$2, the Carnegie Fund \$30, total \$76. Total Carnegie Fund —. Conversions 17, probationers 17.

LAWSONIA. Brother J. A. Jeffers has boldly, constantly, and uncompromisingly stood against the empty emotionalism and horrible noises our people take for spirituality; and he has insisted upon a consecrated life, and has been a fearless disciplinarian. But he has so faithfully, wisely,

and lovingly taught the Bible to his people, that the church has grown in five years from sixty-five members to over two hundred members and probationers. And they have just experienced a most remarkable revival. The church and Sunday School are thoroly organized. The financial condition is first class. Raised for improvements \$417.45; for the benevolences \$147, Africa \$7, Carnegie Fund \$31, total \$185. Total Carnegie Fund \$80. Conversions 58, probationers 102, accessions 54.

LEEMONT. Brother J. E. A. D. Grigsby is a man who has not failed a single year of the five he has spent on this charge. He wrote me saying, I have my work well in hand; but the people have no work. And yet he brings a report characteristic both of himself and the people of Leemont. Raised on old debts \$500, for repairs \$40; for the benevolences \$59, the Carnegie Fund \$37, total \$196. Total Carnegie Fund \$100. Conversions 35, probationers 28, accessions 30.

LIBERIA. L. J. Waters has served this charge two years, and each year he has reported an advance in every respect. This year he reports an advance of \$18.50 in the benevolences over last year, besides exceeding last year's work for the trustees. He writes: But we regret that more has not been done. We feel that we have not yet measured up to our possibilities; but what has been done, is an inspiration to try and accomplish yet more for the Lord and His cause." Raised on old debts \$280, for repairs \$130; for the benevolences \$94, Africa \$5, Carnegie Fund \$10, the gift of the Ladies' Aid Society, total \$109. Total Carnegie Fund \$43. Conversions 21, probationers 20, accessions 25.

MARDELA SPRINGS. C. L. Anderson has finished his first year here with great success. We welcome him back to the Salisbury District. We know his worth. The first thing accomplished was the raising of \$67. for the Carnegie Fund. This was hard money to raise. Doing it tested the pastor's mettle. But it was the auspicious beginning of the year's work. Raised on old debts \$250, for repairs \$280; for the benevolences \$128, Africa \$4, Carnegie Fund \$67, total \$199. Total Carnegie Fund \$110. Conversions 64, probationers 21, accessions 46.

MARION STATION. For six years L. E. Toulson has labored on this charge with marked success. The debt on one church has been paid off, and a beautiful new church erected at Mt. Peor. He leaves the work in excellent condition. Raised on old debts \$837, for new building and repairs \$147; for the benevolences \$72, for Africa \$2, for the Carnegie Fund \$45. total \$119. Total Carnegie Fund \$78. Conversions 4, probationers 7, accessions 5.

MT. VERNON. W. T. Purnell comes from a year of conflict, brought on by his manly opposition to that unmitigated curse of our people, the Camp-meeting. He has been in danger of personal violence; and of course, the reports are not as they were last year. But there was no Camp-meeting at Polk's Road; and the right-minded leaders say there shall never be

another. I have more pleasure in announcing this, thun I could possibly have in reporting a great increase in the benevolences. For what sense, not to say good, is there in making savages and fiends of our people at home to raise money to Christianize the savages of Africa? Brother Purnell's conduct has been really heroic. Raised on old debts \$62.40; for the henevolences \$93.

NANTICOKE. Brother A. R. Shockley has supplied this work most acceptably. The people say he can preach, and sing, and pray. They would greatly rejoice in his return. The report for the benevolences shows sacrifice on the part of the faithful few, and labor on the part of the pastor. And I may add, he knows how to work. Raised for repairs \$45; for the benevolences \$113, the largest amount received from this charge for several years. And with \$20 for the Carnegie Fund and \$3 for Africa the total \$136, is the largest amount reported from this charge in six years. Conversions 4, probationers 4, accessions 3. Total Carnegie Fund \$100.

OAK HALL. S. T. Parker ends four years of fine service, respected and trusted by all his people, and the community. Raised on old debts \$300, for repairs \$75; for the benevolences \$71, Africa \$6, the Carnegie Fund \$30, total \$107. Total Carnegie Fund \$89. Conversions 30, probationers 15, accessions 15.

ORIOLE. I fear that Oriole has lost its glorious color, and has become less than dull and commonplace. Brother R. S. Johns and I have both labored to bring these people back to their old standing. But they seem determined not to be helped. They are nursing their misfortune, bemoaning their poverty, not once discerning that they are giving others the impression that they are rather glad of some excuse for not doing their duty toward the church. They do not realize that poverty may be converted into the greatest spiritual opportunity. I hand them over to my successor as a fine chance to show his skill in resuscitation. But I must give them credit for not having a Camp-meeting. Raised on old debts \$136; the Carnegie Fund \$32. Conversions 1, probationers 10, accessions 5.

PARSONSBURG. E. E. Rogers has spent eight years here. While this period has been the most prosperous the charge has ever known in paying debts and church building, as well as in moral and spiritual regards, both pastor and flock think it good to change. Raised on old debts \$104.13, for repairs \$87.34, for new building \$118; for the benevolences \$52, Africa \$2, the Carnegie Fund \$31.45, total \$92.45. Total Carnegie Fund \$40. Conversions 1, probationers 10, accessions 5.

POCOMOKE CITY. Mount Zion church has been rescued from a depressing burden of debt, and her credit restored. Brother M. L. McKenny has accomplished this in the four years of his pastorate. The last \$600 was paid during this year. Brother McKenny regrets that he was so engrossed in the effort to pay off the debt that the benevolences were put off too long; and the report is not so good as it should be. But being freed

from the burden, they can make up the deficiency next year. Raised for the benevolences \$102, for the Carnegie Fund \$18, total \$120. Total Carnegie Fund \$134. Conversions 5, probationers 8, accessions 8.

PRINCESS ANNE. The report from this charge shows work in the pursuit of the highest ideals. The plain, earnest, continuous preaching of the Gospel of righteousness, was followed by a gracious revival, in which 44 became personally acquainted with the Lord Jesus Christ. The moral tone of the community has been quickened; and many have married, and established Christian homes. The young people are being trained in the institutions of the church. The Sunday School is thoroly organized from Cradle Roll to Adult Bible Class; and one of the teachers is taking the The same Teachers' Training Course. A Reading Circle has been formed. progress is seen in temporal things. A new and much needed lighting system has been installed at the cost of \$120; \$22 has been spent for repairs and \$250 on old debts. Raised for the benevolences \$178, Africa \$8, total \$186. The Carnegie Fund was raised last year and the year preceding, the total amount being \$112. Probationers 54, accessions 53. Hargis, pastor.

PRINCESS ANNE CT. Brother C. T. Covington has given perfect satisfaction as pastor of this work, and has done good work as a student in Princess Anne Academy. Raised on old debts \$39, for repairs \$24, for new building \$21; for the benevolences \$30, Africa \$3, Carnegie Fund \$10, total \$43. Total Carnegie Fund \$44. When all things are considered, brother Covington leads the district in the amount raised for the Carnegie Fund. Conversions 28, probationers 32, accessions 28.

QUANTICO. We were all glad when brother L. W. Deakins was sent back to the Salisbury District. His brotherliness and simplicity and wisdom secure for him a unique place among us. His ministry at Quantico has been very acceptable to the people, because of the real good he has accomplished for them. Raised on old debts \$17, for repairs \$61; for the benevolences \$58, Carnegie Fund \$30, total \$88. Total Carnegie Fund \$58. Conversions 4, probationers 11, accessions 11.

SALISBURY. The appointment of R. G. Waters to Salisbury, was one of the several unexpected happenings of the last Conference. But it has proved to be a most happy selection both for him and the church. He entered upon the work at once with large plans for the improvement of the property. And the people showed their high estimation of him by giving him \$700, the largest salary ever paid by them. The good work done in Crisfield by him has been greatly surpassed in Salisbury. The church has been remodeled, a pastor's study and recess for the choir having been added, and thus the seating capacity has been considerably increased. Both the auditorium and the lecture room have been frescoed and painted; and the auditorium has been reseated with fine circular pews. And a steam heating plant has been put in. The good people of Salisbury are deserving of the highest praise for this great improvement. They are very happy

over it; and they invite the Conference to hold its next session there. Raised on old debts \$500, for improvements \$700; for the benevolences \$242, Africa \$8, Carnegie Fund \$121, total \$371. Total Carnegie Fund \$281, of which \$160 was raised last year and the year before. Conversions 25, probationers 10, accessions 46.

SALISBURY CT. The work of brother C. E. Davis on this hard field has been very good. The report for the benevolences is the best we have had in the six years. Raised on old debts \$165, repairs \$194.48, new building \$50; for the benevolences \$53, the Carnegie Fund \$15, total \$66. Total Carnegie Fund \$50, of which \$35 was raised in the two years previous to this. Conversions 11, probationers 12, accessions 10.

UNIONVILLE. Brother J. H. Winters ends his second year with the usual success. He is a veritable old man eloquent, and preaches with force. Being genial and wise, he is greatly beloved by all. Raised on old debts \$25, for repairs \$125; for the benevolences \$69, the Carnegie Fund \$50, total \$119. Total Carnegie Fund \$75. Probationers 7, accessions 7.

WACHAPREAGUE. As was feared when the appointment was made, brother J. H. B. Hubbard was not able to hold this work. The good report sent up, is to be put to the credit of his good wife, and the loyal people. Sister Hubbard did all but preach and administer the sacraments. When it was thought advisable to send him away for treatment, I appointed brother H. C. Snead, a local preacher of their own, in his place. Brother L. D. Beecham administered the sacraments. Under the direction of sister Hubbard, the church built years ago, and known as Powelton Mission was removed to Locust Mount in the midst of the people. It will henceforth be the main church of this charge. Raised on old debts \$195.45, for improvements \$48.83, for new building \$24.12; for the benevolences \$59, for Africa \$2, for the Carnegie Fund \$15, total \$76. Total Carnegie Fund \$70, of which \$55 was raised two years ago. Conversions 6, probationers 10, accessions 6.

WATTSVILLE. Brother J. S. Coulbourne is certainly a swift witness to the good character of the people of Virginia. For he has been with them nine years; and I believe he wants to return, because he wrote me, "The people are anxious to have me return." I said as I read that, It's mutual. The people have begged me often not to take him away from them. Why? They have proved him. He has changed the whole moral atmosphere of their neighborhood; and is still as forceful and acceptable as when he began. Raised on old debts \$375, building and improvement \$125; for the benevolences \$102, for the Carnegie Fund \$50, total \$152. Total Carnegie Fund \$110. Conversions 22, accessions 20.

WETIPQUIN was left in a very bad condition by the former pastor. Brother A. W. Lowber found no easy task when he went there last spring. Creditors were threatening; the people were angry; the officials were discouraged. And owing to the ill health of the pastor, it seemed for a time

that the change would bring no relief. But with the return of health, he and his wife gave themselves unreservedly to the work with good results. The unfinished church was completed; old debts were paid; and the people's credit and cheerfulness was restored. Raised on old debts \$228. for new building \$266, for repairs \$134; for the benevolences \$40, Carnegie Fund \$25. Total \$65. Total Carnegie Fund \$50, \$25 of which was raised in the two preceding years. Conversions 12, probationers 9, accessions 10.

WHITE HAVEN is still in need of the baptism of the Holy Spirit and fire. Brother I. H. Bivins, a supply, has done as well as possible at this place. We hope for its regeneration. Raised on old debts \$100, for new building \$207, for repairs \$32; for the benevolences \$41, Africa \$2, the Carnegie Fund \$30, total \$173. Total Carnegie Fund \$64, of which \$4 was raised year before last.

## Summary.

Raised on old debts \$7260.98, for repairs and improvements \$2821.25, for new building \$1753.95, total \$11836.28. Raised for the benevolences \$2740, for the Carnegle Fund \$969.45, for Africa \$81, total \$3790.45. Conversions 767, probationers 591, accessions 600. Total Carnegie Fund \$2630.

EDUCATION. For the first time in its history Princess Anne Academy has a son of the soil as principal. No one rejoices more in this fact than I do. Principal Kiah is fully qualified in both natural gifts and training for the important position to which he has been called. Finding the work as left by Prof. Trigg in good condition, he has carried it to a higher stage. The standard of scholarship has been raised; so that in some cases text-books used in a higher grade have been successfully used in a lower. The farm is being drained; and new machinery has been installed in the Industrial Department. There has been closer coordination between the literary and industrial work in some regards; and greater enthusiasm for the industries has been created. The highest ideals are kept constantly before the students. Order is enforced, not as a mere drill, but for its benefit to the student in after life. Special attention is paid to the proper relation of the sexes. And the students, themselves, seeing the fundamental necessity of this, are cooperating more and more with the faculty in their effort to keep the school pure. The various young peoples societies of the church, the Sunday School, etc. are faithfully operated as a means of training the spiritual life. The attendance has not increased, there being only 61 boys and 79 girls, total 140.

The sixty-five thousand colored people of the Peninsule ought to send at least three hundred students to the academy. And the Delaware Conference ought to raise at least \$5000 a year for its support. You startle at this, not remembering that for our twenty thousand members that would be only 25c per capita. And furthermore, if now without any effort, or rather with all our attention concentrated upon foreign missions, we can raise \$1619, as the Minutes for last year show,—what could we not do, if

we saw the matter as it really is-our first duty to God, the church, and ourselves? The white friends who have supported our educational institutions, have told us by word and deed that they think we ought now to take up the burden of our schools. They are interested in the heathen, and are able to do great things for them. And it is certain that no state school can give the education which we need. Brothers, this is the sixth time that I have called attention to our indifference to education. And while I may have depleted my vocabulary, and exhausted my invention, my interest is stronger today, if possible, than it was when I first addressed you on the subject. I will not speak lightly of anything that you have accomplished; for I know your meaning, your love, your zeal, your pain. I praise you; I rejoice with you over your achievements. But notwithstanding all the work, and all the merit, and all the joy; in my patient impatience, I must tell you again, that unless you make Christian education your chief concern, all your work is an inverted pyramid: a house built on the sand. The example of the great people among whom we live; the voice of common sense; the storm and stress of daily life, solemnly enjoin upon us the duty of the systematic training of our whole being. And religion gives its final sanction to this manifold injunction. We are commanded to love God from the mind as well as the feelings and emotions. And our race needs to be told this till they heed it. For it is thru the mind as understanding that reality enters the soul; the mind as reason furnishes those grand principles by which reality is valued, and conduct directed. Now all truth is grounded in God. All beauty is the garment of light with which He is arrayed. His awful holiness is the substance of the glory of which He is the hidden personal force whose will effected, is nature consists. history. And the soul that has been wooed and full won by Divine Love delights to seek and see him everywhere. As Browning says:

I but open my eyes, and perfection, no more and no less, In the kind I imaged full-fronts me, and God is seen In the star, in the stone, in the flesh, in the soul and in the clod. And thus looking within and around me, I ever renew (With that stoop of the soul which in bending upraises it too) The submission of man's nothing-perfect to God's all-complete, As by each obeisance in spirit, I climb to his feet.

Our Christian schools study this one subject, God, however they may approach it. They bring together the best means and methods for the accomplishment of this great enterprise. They inspire and direct the efforts of earnest, but plastic minds in this high endeavor. And, adapting the language of the great apostle, These all with unveiled face beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are transformed into the same image from glory to glory, even as from the Lord the Spirit. Yea, they can run through troops, and leap over walls. Their feet are like the feet of the hind, and they can walk upon the high places of the earth. They shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; they shall walk, and not faint. Such men shall be as a hid-

ing-place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest, as streams of water in a dry place, as the shade of a great rock in a weary land. (Isaiah). Does not our race need such men? Is any sacrifice too costly to obtain We must have them at any cost; or become paupers, criminals, slaves. Hated and hating; stung by the ridicule, which our folly excites; withered by the scorn which our grossness provokes; chilled by the indifference which our worthlessness justifies; terrified by the violence which our vices invite; wallowing in our loathsome defilement: we shall become, the disgrace, as well as, the dread of mankind. I know that you call such sentiments impatience, ingratitude, atrabilous dreaming, pessimism. the criticism assumes that patience and piggishness are synonymous; that gratitude and improvidence are equivalents; that clear perception or difficulties and vain hope are convertibles; that optimism and faith without energy are reciprocals. But the prophet Amos cries woe to them that are at ease in Zion. And Shakespeare says, And you all know, security is mortals greatest enemy. There are two hundred million contented black men in Africa; but they are naked savages; and their land is being taken from them every year by the restless white man, who is satisfied with nothing that he has discovered or invented. Patience does not mean ease, but passion, suffering, striving, persevering, calmly determined, invincibly moving forward over every obstacle. Patience does its best today; and hopes for-the best today. And tho the worst may come to pass, the next day sees her stand, as she stood the day before, doing and hoping. The preacher's commission involves the divine paradox of constantly demanding the immediate, unconditional surrender of the will to God; and repeating the same message tho it be a thousand times disregarded. Those who preach repentance, reformation, and progress, and expect men to heed them some other day, are like the ancient Chinese soldiers, who loaded their guns with powder alone. And if they cease to preach, and to be very earnest, and turn to the ways of the people: they are like those same Chinese soldiers, who when they had fired, if the enemy did not run, ran away themselves. Brothers, do not cry peace when there is no peace; do not heal the hurt of the daughter of our people slightly; do not daub their leaning walls with untempered mortar. Be no funeral directors, embalming corpses, and decorating tombs. You are physicians, whose business it is to cut and burn, as well as cool and warm and soothe. You are soldiers, whose motto should be, advance and fire, fire and advance. You are seers; and the people's need is daily crying unto you, Watchman what of the night? and, Is there any word from Jehovah? O, let it not be that vision shall have been withdrawn from the prophet; and the law shall have perished from the priest, and counsel from the elder, in the hour of their dire distress.

Observation has fully convinced me that the settlement of the race question is in your hands; you who live in the north, the land of light, liberty, brotherly kindness. Your response to this environment, will determine the attitude of the superior race toward us. Your proper adjustment to the surroundings will show the vile things that are written against us in the daily papers in their true light. What you are that is noble, will furnish arguments with which our friends may answer their critics, who say they are wasting time and money on us. Your children must not be

allowed to stop going to school, because there is no paying position open to them. They must be encouraged to seek the highest culture and greatest practical efficiency in the assured hope, which is more often realized than we seem to care to remember, that there will be an opening for them sometime. The common schools, the high schools, the colleges, the universities, the daily press and periodical literature, the public libraries, the lecture courses, yes the very atmosphere, call to us loudly, challenge our manhood, point the way to success; or pronounce the doom of the people who pass them by unheeded, unused.

I repeat it, our condition is precarious; our need is imperative. emotionalism of the fathers cannot save us; for it is heat without light. and has no power to build character. The higher education cannot save us; for knowledge puffeth up. And too often it is seen that our most brilliant men take their gifts and acquirements as license for the practice of the most degrading sensuality and most fiendish hypocrisy. Industrial education cannot save us, for it has no ideal, and leaves the nobler part of the mind untouched. Politics cannot save us; for we are between the two great parties like the shuttlecock in the game of shuttlecock and battledore. A mere cork tricked out with feathers, we are tossed from one to the other, and we are always beaten. But there is hope in our very helpless-For the Gospel delights to rescue such as we are; and stakes its divinity upon its oft proved power to save and glorify that which proud, blind man despises. The Gospel has to power to call the non-being into existence. It can create a soul under the ribs of death. It can cleans lepers, open the eyes of the blind, unstop the ears of the deaf, cast out devils. It can change the leopard's spots and the Ethiopian's skin. It can emancipate slaves and enfranchise them, as we all know. I beg, I beseech, I pray, I implore you brethren, make Jesus and the people acquainted with each other, and our problem is solved.

Finally, six years of association with the kind-hearted people of the Salisbury District, have woven a bond between me and them that cannot be severed without pain, even to go to a more congenial position. the people and cherish the deepest gratitude toward them for their willingness to be led by me. I taught them nothing new, but made more noise, if you please, about the things taught; was more passionate and determined, perhaps, than others. But whatever may have been the cause, there has been real improvement in the character of the people. They believe more in virtue as the intention of the Gospel, as the sole condition of power, social and spiritual. They are more fully convinced that holiness is the end of life and death of Jesus; and the sole aim of the Holy Spirit in his gracious work upon the heart. There is no longer that contentment in sin which is the sure indication of the stupor just before death. Where once there was boldness or indifference to sin, there is now fear, alarm, shame. cases there has been perfect harmony between the pastors and myself. deed, none of the things attempted by me,-the lifting of the moral plane, the abolition of the camp-meeting, the reintroduction of the prayer-meeting, the raising of the Carnegie Fund and, as much as has been raised for Africa, and the increased interest in education,-could have been realized at all, had not the pastor entered heartily with me into the matter. Some of them being virtual reformers, were already at the work, when I went on the district; and had achieved great things. All they needed was not to be restrained by the hand of authority. In their case I have had only to speak a word of encouragement to them; repeat what they had already effectively said; and tell the people their value. While I have not been when in earnest, a mere shekel gatherer, and ordinarily, simply a functionary, I joyously give the glory of the success of our district to God and the good men who have served as pastors down there.

I have been a member of this Conference for seventeen years, covering the most vigorous period of human life. I have been entrusted with important charges, even from the first. And I have made some friendships here which, I am persuaded, will endure with my conscious being. I pass now in obedience to the call of God, who sent me here, to another field. My work here is done; the results belong to the people, to you, to God. Too proud to be vain-glorious, too self-conscious to be conceited, I have been much more impressed by weaknesses and failures, than I have by my success. And I am happy in this, I have learned the wisdom of humility, the grace of patience.

In admitting that I have made mistakes, I do not mean to affect graciousness. But I thank God, that I have never loaded my gun without ball; I have not ceased to fire because the enemy's position seemed impregnable; I have not turned traitor because he remained true to his colors; I have not run away because he stood his ground. Hight above the din and roar of the combat, I have heard the captain-general of our salvation saying, "Because iniquity shall abound the love of many shall wax cold; but he that endureth to the end, shall be saved. In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world. Thru the cloud of dust and smoke, I have seen him in awful glory arrayed, stand and the field survey; and lo, in his hand are crowns,—of life, of joy, of righteousness, of glory. And his voce louder cries, Be thou faithful unto death; and I will give thee a crown of life. Hold that fast which thou hast that no man take thy crown. He that overcometh shall inherit these things. At the vision, I have wiped the sweat and dust and blood from my face, reloaded, stepped into position, and fired again. Have I hit any of you? It was a love ball, if you take it as it was meant. Brothers, knowing that sensuality is the fetter that binds us, the millstone around our neck, the poison that corrupts the blood and kills us, the worst thing that I have done to you is totell you that thecarnal mind is enmity against God. It is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can it be. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. I have exhorted you to walk in the spirit, that you might not fulfill the lusts of the flesh. I have told you that the Lord Jesus saith, If a man love Me he will keep My word: and My father will love him, and we will come unto Him, and make our abode with Him. And my last word to you is Behold what manner of love the father hath bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God. Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be, but we know that he shall appear, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. And every one that hath this hope set on him, purifieth himself, even as he ispure. Farewell. Respectfully submitted,

# WILMINGTON DISTRICT.

#### BISHOP AND BRETHREN:

A retrospect of this year's pilgrimage, reveals in our ranks some faithful servants bearing not only theirs, but the burdens of others; plodding through darkness the rough and thorny way, seeking those who need life, pointing them to its high and eternal source and frequently for the blessings they labored to confer have been compelled to drink the gall of ingratitude.

The privilege of giving an account of our stewardship here, is only ours because the Master's promise, "Lo I am with you alway", has been verified in our experience. Considering the frailty of human life, the shocks and accidents that flesh is heir to, we have ample cause for thanksgiving that not more than two have fallen from our ranks.

Our beloved Noah Watson Moore, on Sunday morning January 29th, 1911, at St. John Methodist Episcopal Church, Newark, N. J., selecting his text, 2 Tim. 4. 7-8. "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith; hencefourth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord the righteous judge shall give to me at that day and not me only, but also to all them that love his appearing", this good man and great preacher delivered with unusual power his last sermon, at the conclusion of which death began its destructive work, and within an hour and a half had sundered every tangible connection between him and a loving wife and helpless children, between him and the flock he pastored, between him and the Delaware Conference which he loved, the conference which loved and honored him. On his way from the church to the hospital he was transferred from the ambulance to a divine conveyance which bore him away to realms of light and love.

Andrew J. Wallace, pastor of Millington charge, after an illness of twenty-one days, passed from labor to reward. Instead of answering the Conference roll-call Thursday morning, April 6, he reported to God in the Glory-land, April 7, 1911.

Lillian, the beloved daughter of Bro. and Sister Dickerson, crossed the bar Oct. 15th, 1910. She was a charming girl, the joy of the home, a real bud of promise which seemingly the cold hand of death plucked all too soon, for she was only thirteen years old.

# District Steward's Meeting.

The District Steward's Meeting held at Middletown, Del., April 14th, 1910, was an auspicious beginning of this year's work. The routine of business was quickly and satisfactorily transacted. The District Steward's remarks concerning the charges they represented were radiant with hope. The morning session adjourned to meet at 2.30 p.m. at which time nearly a hundred laymen assembled to hear Dr. Ward Platt's address on Home Mission and Church Extension work. He pleased, instructed and encouraged us, and we determined to attempt greater things, and do more for Christ and His church, and in many respects we have made good.

# The Sunday School.

Our Sunday Schools are slowly but surely imbibling the spirit of this age which is manifesting itself in a more thoroughly organized and systematic effort for the mental and moral improvement of the young. The ancient proverb which affirms that "as the twig is bent the tree is inclined" tells but a fractional part of the truth concerning the potential significance of early influences in shaping the character of the young. The propriety of training youthful minds is unquestioned, but the normal development of the spiritual life of our children is not receiving the attention which it merits. We are more and more realizing that the Snuday School is not merely a bible school, but a school of religion, and the test of its efficiency is not how much Bible the child has learned, but what the child has become by studying the Scriptures and singing such songs as are usually sung in the Sunday School.

The enrollment is one hundred and thirty seven more than it was last year. But scarcely two thirds of the children on the district attend Sunday School, and those attending are not regular.

# Epworth . League . Work.

There are nineteen Junior and twenty four Epworth League Chapters on the district. Cheswold, Dover Circuit, Newport and Sassafras have neither Epworth or Junior Leagues. Again and again has the importance of these institutions been emphasized, but with results by no means commensurate with the effort. Nevertheless our people are fully realizing the good and far-reaching influences of Epworth League work. Parents not of our persuasion are sending their little ones to our Junior League services. The literary department is doing commendable work, but the Spiritual is the most active and influential of all the departments.

An Epworth League Convention, the most successful of all our attempts, was held in Middletown, Del., June 28-29, 1910. In attendance it was the largest. In interest it surpassed all other efforts. Papers were practical, and discussions generally clarified the truth. The good influences set in motion by the Convention have been felt over the entire district, and even those charges having no League, now feel that their young people would be better morally and stronger spiritually if the League operated among them.

In connection with the Delaware Conference Chautauqua, the Conference Epworth League held its first convention at Delaware State College, July 28-29, 1910. Drs. Mowbray and Penn who conducted the round-table talks were the principal speakers, and they served us a literary feast. The Rev. J. U. King well deserves our praise for planning and presiding over the Convention.

# The Ladies Aid Society.

There are thirty-six of these organizations on the district, and they indicate the influence and financial strength of the women of our church. By means of these organizations \$2170 have been raised for church work.

#### Methodist Brotherhood.

There are operating on the district nine Methodist Brotherhoods, the one at Dover is the most active financially, through its efforts a concrete sidewalk has been placed in front of the church and new steps of the same material have been added to the building at a cost of \$175, and the Brotherhood paid for the same. But our men as a rule do not so willingly work together for God and His church as do the women.

# Christian Education.

But for the Wilmington District contributions to the Carnegie Fund, and the Freedman's Aid Society, one might infer from the very few students attending our schools that the people have little or no interest in Christian Education. We sincerely regret that only four young people of the Wilmington District are being trained in our church schools. Eight pastors of our district were trained in Morgan College, and they faithfully present the claims of the institution. But the people are rightly impressed that the Delaware State College for Colored Students with its splendid facilities exists especially for them, and the young people are crowding its halls; but notwithstanding we shall continue trying to make our people see the advantage of having their young people trained in our church schools, hoping that our efforts in the future will be attended with better results.

#### The Temperance Cause.

The Temperance Cause within our territory has made but little if Rural New Castle Co. Del. has been any progress during the past year. The Anti-Saloon the scene of conflict between the wets and the drys. movement makes the negro responsible for the dry's defeat ly true that some negroes did vote for the retention of the saloon, but to make them entirely responsible for the dry's defeat seems preposterous when the white vote more than trebles the colored. The negroes are not legally engaged in the liquor traffic, but a few of them are persuaded that it is a money making business, and slyly barter it, only to be trapped and se-Among us there are many who verely punished for their transgression. distressfully witness the waste of means and the wreck of character occasioned by the saloon, claiming that they would heartily co-operate with the Anti-Saloon movement, if it appealed to them a clearcut moral issue, but its attitude in political affairs makes many of them distrustful. Our preachers enjoy the reputation of being pronounced foes of intemperance. They are on the firing line and act at a moment's notice, and not one of them has ever been accused of being derilect as to his duty to the Temperance Cause.

#### Charges.

BARCLAY is still tugging away on the old parsonage debt at the expense of ministerial support and the benevolent collections. Paid on old debts \$100. Conference collections \$41. Carnegie Fund \$43. Total \$84, which is the largest amount the charge has ever given for benevolences. Accessions 8. O. P. Dickerson, pastor.

CATLIN—Conference collections \$74. Carnegie Fund \$15. Accessions 5. W. H. Turner, pastor.

CHESWOLD has contributed \$30 to the benevolent causes. Only a few people of this charge have learned that it is more blessed to give than it is to receive. Carnegie Fund \$5. S. Hammond, pastor.

COLEMAN—This charge has enjoyed both spiritually and financially a year of unusual success. A wave of revival swept over it, and resulted in eighty-two conversions. Reciprocal love and genuine harmony exist letween pastor and people. There is great joy among the people because the Lord of hosts is with them. Raised for improvements \$50. For old debts \$225. Conference collections \$153. Total benevolent collections \$133. Carnegie Fund \$60. Accessions \$7. E. O. Parker, pastor.

CRUMPTON raised three times the amount that it raised last year for the benevolent enterprises. Paid on old debts \$200. Conference collections including \$15 to the Carnegie Fund \$70. Accessions 6. T. B. H. Coleman, pastor.

DELAWARE CITY a charge of two small congregations has done splendid work this year. Paid on old debts \$140. Conference collections \$64. Carnegie Fund \$13. Accessions 3. J. A. T. Foust, pastor.

DOVER'S greatest need has been abundantly supplied this year in a great revival resulting in the coversion of more than one hundred persons and adding to the church 86. The membership now only lacks four of being double. The pastor is earnest, unassuming, studious and is exerting a powerful influence for good among the people he serves. Raised on parsonage improvements (bath and bedroom) \$208. The church has been greatly helped by the organization of the Methodist Brotherhood. Conference collection \$148. J. W. Jefferson, pastor.

DOVER CIRCUIT has accomplished much more financially this year than last. The church at Camden which was closed for more than two years is now open with a fair congregation attending and adds much to the strength of the charge. Conference collections \$26. Carnegie Fund, \$13. Accessions 28. M. H. Murphy, supply.

GALENA—The pastor has been greatly handicapped by the protracted illness of his wife. She is a great sufferer and no medical treatment effects permanent relief. But against these odds he has done well the work assigned him. Paid on old debts \$300. Conference collections \$135. Accessions 4. W. E. Waters, pastor.

HOCKESSIN is a weak charge with only fifteen members, but it has met its financial obligations with the Building and Loan and contributed \$20 to the benevolent enterprises and \$5 to the Carnegie Fund. Accessions 5. J. E. Stanton, supply.

MARYDEL has raised \$217 on old debts. Conference collection \$62, which is a little more than one-fourth of the amount apportioned. Accesssions 4. W. T. Spellman, pastor.

MIDDLETOWN has done a work that surpasses all recorded efforts. A mortgage of long standing has been satisfied and burned. The benevolent collections have been increased nearly one hundred per cent. The Lord has greatly revived the work. All of the departments of the church are in excellent condition. Pastor's salary paid in full three weeks before conference. Genuine harmony exists between pastor and people. Raised on old debt \$275. Conference colection including \$32 to the Carnegie Fund totals \$200. Accessions 40. J. U. King, pastor.

MILLINGTON records another year of success which would be greater but for the pastor's illness in the closing days of this conference year. A special delivery received today 12.45 P. M. breaks to me the sad news of this veteran's passing, Friday, April 7th, 1911, 6.15 P.M. Conference collection including \$53 paid to the Carnegie Fund \$124. Accessions 25. A. J. Wallace, Pastor.

NEWCASTLE—The church has been renovated at a cost of \$160 and the same has been paid. The benevolent collections are not up to our expectations but they are advanced. Conference collection \$56. Carnegie Fund \$34. M. W. Clark, pastor.

NEWPORT has done a fair year's work. The mortgage of \$200 held against the grove near the church has been satisfied. The benevolent collection and ministerial support have been advanced. Paid on old debts \$200. Conference collections including \$10 to the Carnegie fund, \$50. Accessions 6. A. F. Ennels, Pastor.

ODESSA, now a station, has done more financially than it did when the charge included three churches. Paid on old debts \$70. Conference collections \$25. Carnegie fund \$25. Accessions one. E. H. Webb, pastor.

PORT DEPOSIT expected another ice gorge during the winter, but was joyfully disappointed, but many of the people have become restless and are seeking homes elsewhere. Present conditions make church work exceedingly difficult but notwithstanding a fair years work has been done. Conference collections \$59. Carnegie fund \$25. W. E. Hilton, pastor.

PORT PENN, a new charge of three churches formed by detaching one church from Delaware City and two from Odessa. The union has demonstrated a decided advantage to all concerned. Leon S. Moore after completing the A. B. course at Morgan College was given charge of this work. Small congregations with debt and dis-organization confronted, but did not discourage him. He had once faithfully set himself to the task of paying church debts, building up the work, and has achieved success far beyond our expectation. He is greatly beloved and respected by his people and they are earnestly desiring that his services be continued among them. Conference collection \$35. Carnegie fund \$12. Accessions five. L. S. Moore, pastor.

SASSAFRAS. The pastor was unfortunate in losing his horse and not being in position to purchase another, could not properly look after his work. Conference collection including Carnegie fund \$11, total \$45. Accessions 6. J. W. W. Cox, pastor.

SMYRNA'S membership has decreased four notwithstanding the pastor's and people's efforts to increase it. Raised on old debts \$40. Conference collection \$70. Accessions 7. W. H. Johns, pastor,

STILL POND is not at all still. It by reason of the pastor's directing force has motion in the right direction, steadily advancing. Conference collection \$189. Carnegie fund \$68. Total \$257. Accessions 45. J. L. Parker, pastor.

TOWNSEND has been rather quiet, but it has accomplished much more financially than it did last year. The faithful services rendered by the pastor and his wife, a help-mate indeed, have not enlisted the support and sympathy they deserve. Raised and banked \$173 for erection of a new church at Ebenezer. Raised for improvements \$50. Conference collections \$60. Carnegie fund \$10, total \$70. Accessions 5. P. W. Price, pastor.

WILMINGTON, EZION. Brother N. W. Moore had confidence in his wife's ability to do things. Standing on the corner of French and Sixth Streets, Saturday, January 28th, 1911, with his wife, who was persuading him not to go to Newark, New Jersey, he said to her, "Lieg, go on with the work, you can do it." She assured him that she would attend to the church matters. They kissed and parted to meet no more on this side. After cruel death had seized him he spoke as if his wife were standing before him: "Lieg, preach the Gospel, and go on with the work." The widow soon acquainted me with the plans formulated for raising the benevolent apportionments, and requested that she be permitted to carry the same into effect. That we are able to report \$710 for the conference collections, the full apportionment, is due to sister Moore's ceaseless energy, the cooperation of an earnest, liberal people, and the services rendered by pastors and people not of our persuasion. Raised for improvements on parsonage \$267. Accessions 21. N. W. Moore, deceased.

WILMINGTON, HAVEN. This church, once in the sheriff's hands. with a debt of more than \$4000, without any means for heating, lighting and seating the auditorium, with a discouraged membership of 87 worshipping in the basement, has at last emerged from the cloud of doubt and distress, and is now enjoying the sunlight of cheer and confidence. Fourth Quarterly Conference of 1910 requested that the charge be put with Newport again, giving as its reason, its inability to pay a pastor more than \$400 while the church was thus encumbered, but the proposition did not appeal to me. We are pleased to give you the results of this year's efforts. Raised for trustees \$2100, and of this amount \$843 were spent for heater, electric light fixtures, pews, etc., and \$511 on old debts. The church is now completed, and it is a thing of beauty. The happiest day in the history of the church was October 9th, 1910, when it was dedicated to the The members have made marvelous sacrifices. them ate no breakfast for thirty days and gave the price of the breakfast to the church. Some refrained from drinking coffee and using tobacco for thirty days and donated their savings to the church, and others walked to and from their work and contributed that which they would have spent for car fare to the church. They brought their tithes into the store house and the Lord of host opened the windows of Heaven and poured out a blessing in the form of a revival which added 48 persons to the church. Benevolent collection full, \$187, and of this amount \$25 to the Carnegie fund. J. T. Fletcher, pastor.

WILMINGTON, MOUNT JOY is the best organized charge on the district. It is the leader in Junior and Epworth League work. It is the young people's church. The pastor helped by his good wife has most acceptably served this charge for eight years. Each year has had a record of financial and spiritual success, but this year surpasses them all. Encouraged by the pastor the people have saved their earnings and purchased \$24000 worth of real estate. His ministry among them has been a benediction and they have the highest regards for their pastor and his wife. The Third Quarterly Conference unanimously voted for his return. The mortgage of \$700 against the parsonage has been satisfied, and that property is now free from debt. Benevolent and other conference collections raised in full. Total \$174, which amount includes an offering of \$10 to the Carnegie fund. Accessions 4. W. J. L. Hughes, pastor.

The conference year now closing is fraught with more than ordinary interest, because pastors for the most part have more vigorously prosecuted the work assigned them, and the people have more generously responded to the call of the church. Every charge has advanced the benevolent collection. There have been 536 conversions on the district this year. My burden was greatly increased on account of the passing of Ezion's pastor, but the Lord gave me strength for the task.

# Report No. 10.

# MORGAN COLLEGE AND BRANCHES.

The attendance of the schools of Morgan College has been well maintained. In Baltimore, we have the largest enrollment for at least ten years. The College Department is steadily growing. Two young men, both having prepared at Princess Anne Academy, graduate this year, with the degree A. B. The Normal Course has been strengthened and lengthened. We hope to give advanced work in Education as a part of the A. B. course, so that those who take this course will go out thoroughly fitted as teachers. Dean Young has charge of the college and preparatory school, and with an efficient corps of teachers has maintained high standing in both departments. The time is not far distant, I trust, when we shall be able to have an entirely separate College Department.

No great number of students are now candidates for the ministry. This is to be regretted. I do not pretend to point out all the reasons, but some may be the indifference of the churches and a few ministers to the real claims of the gospel. You cannot expect young men to enter a profession, which some members of the profession do not thoroughly honor.

Principal Kiah and his corps of teachers have done good work at Princess Anne Academy. Considerable expenditure has been made in the way of improvement, especially the drainage scheme is relieving the farm of open ditches and unsightly hedge rows, and making the farm not only of more value, but a thing of beauty. We hope to continue this project until it is completed. Steps are being taken to interest young men more actively and practically in farm work, not the mere matter of work, but the scientific aspects of improved farming. The most insistent call of today on the part of society is for men who can produce more.

The Virginia Collegiate Institute at Lynchburg opened last autumn, under the direction of Principal Trigg, who had been in charge of Princess Anne Academy. Substantial improvements have been made and earnest efforts are being made to build up a strong secondary normal school. The southern end of the Washington Conference no doubt needs such a school, and if they stand by it, sending the students and contributions, there will be no doubt as to the permanence and prosperity of this school.

The effort to raise \$25,000 in the Delaware and Washington Conferences, toward meeting Mr. Carnegie's condition, is proceeding with considerable success. The results will be shown by the reports to this Conference. If it is not all secured by this session, it must be done immediately thereafter. We cannot allow the stigma to rest upon the Delaware and Washington Conferences, which would certainly rest there, if we fail in this endeavor.

It is believed that the Delaware Conference can and should now substantially increase the contribution to local education, and we recommend that increased apportionment be made for this purpose, that our scools may continue to grow.

# Report No. 12.

### SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Sabbath is the Lord's Day. He rested from all of His works after the creation of the world and sanctified the day, commanding us to keep it holy.

The Sabbath law was put in the holy scriptures and remained there; it has never been repealed, but is still in force. In this age of commercialism and worldliness the temptation to ignore this law is very great, and this holy day is constantly being descerated both in business and social life. Money getting during the six days of the week and taking their own pleasure on the Lord's Day or in some cases, carry on the work through the Sabbath. What can be done to arrest this lawlessness? Shall we as ministers and members of the Church of Christ be silent and look on with indifference while the world tramples on the law of God? We cannot be silent without becoming partakers of other men's sin, as Eli did in the case of his two sons; all three of them died on the same day because he was silent while they sinned.

Therefore, be it resolved:

- 1. That we call upon all of the people to refuse to patronize or encourage the Sunday newspapers, Sunday excursions, and as far as possible Sunday Railroad travel or traffic and every other form of Sabbath desecration.
- 2. That we discourage Sunday visiting, and teach our people that the Sabbath is a day set apart for the worship of God, and that the Sanctuary and the Sunday School are the places where they should go with their children and no Sunday visitors should be allowed to keep them from their religious duties.

It is also the purpose of the Commission to change the date of the Baltimore Convention from May 31-June 4 to July 19-23rd, therefore giving us more time to work the plans of the movement in our local churches and to get ready to attend ourselves and secure the attendance of a delegation from our churches.

In view therefore of the plans and purposes, the endorsement already given the movement and its farreaching significance,

RESOLVED 1st, That we as a Conference unite with our brethren in giving this great plan our unqualified endorsement. That we do our best to be present and secure the attendance of a delegation from our churches.

That inasmuch as the Conventions are to be self-supporting, we agree

as all other Conferences have, to send in to the Treasurer of the Commission one cent per member from each of our churches.

That as the two supreme aims of the Convention movement is 1st, to encourage better support of the ministry, that we cooperate with the Commission by furnishing them the official list as requested, and 2nd, that as soon as the number of subscribers for the Southwestern has been apportioned to our charges on the basis of self support of the paper, we will use our best endeavor to secure the number and report the same on or before the date of the Baltimore Convention.

# ANDREW J. WALLACE.

Andrew J. Wallace, son of Anderson and Sarah Wallace, was born near Summit Bridge, Del., March 31, 1848, and die April 7, 1911. A wid-ow and son survive him. He was a Civil War veteran, one of those brave men, who through blood and tears, midst shot and shells, the terrible shrieks of dying men, fought for the preservation of the Union, and was ever true to his country's flag.

At Penshauckens, N. J., in 1873, he was converted, enlisted in the army of the Lord, "endured hardness as a good soldier" and died at his post.

He was received on trial in the Delaware Conference in 1883, and faithfully served the following charges: Sassafras, South Wilmington, Stockton, Merchantville, Denton, Deal's Island, Leemont, Greensboro, Wittman, Salem, Newport, Chesterville, Barclay, and Millington.

He was a man of unusual vitality, who spared not himself no matter what his task might be. Whether preaching or toiling in the field, he did with all his might whatever his hands found to do.

He was an acceptable pastor, his conduct, never betraying selfishness always won for him the confidence of the people whom he served. He was a man of keen observation, with a rich and varied experience which furnished the greater part of the material for his sermons.

Many souls became reconciled to God through his preaching. He was an humble minister of the Lord Jesus who did the best he knew, and after twenty-one days battling with death, he got the victory over death, the cords which bound him to the flesh were broken, and Andrew J. Wal-

lace instead of answering the Conference roll call April 6, 1911, reported to God in the Glory-land, April 7, 1911.

"The pains of death are past, Labor and sorrow cease, And life's long warfare closed at last, His soul is found in peace."

# SAMUEL WESLEY WATERS.

It is not an idle custom to pay tribute to our departed heroes—our translated comrades. They have won their fight. They have received their crowns.

While we recall their work and labor of love, and remember their courage and patience, their sufferings and triumphs, we are inspired to renew our zeal and to push forward with redoubled energy.

Since our last assembling in Annual Conference, the Rev. Samuel Wesley Waters was the first to be mustered out of our Ministerial ranks and to join the triumphant hosts around the throne of God.

He was the son of the late Rev. S. G. Waters, who was one of the class of ten received on trial at the first session of this Delaware Annual Conference in 1864, and who did much pioneer work and gave yeoman service for the kingdom of God.

His mother was Henrietta Waters, of blessed memory, who was recognized as "a Christian lady of the finest quality."

In Upper Fairmount, Somerset County, Md., Samuel Wesley Waters was born Feb., 1851.

There were no public or private schools for children of African descent in that part of the country until he was nearly grown. But the home of his preacher father was a school in itself in those days. He was well bred.

In 1872 he was converted at Zell's Gate Campground at a meeting conducted by the Rev. W. C. Dickerson, who is still active, eloquent and fervent. From the time of his conversion until his health failed he was desirous of doing something for the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom. In a few years he became a local preacher. He supplied Snow Hill Circuit for 1 year. By hard application to study under private instruction he made preparation for the work of the ministry.

In 1891 he was admitted on trial and by devotion to study he was able to advance with his class each year.

He served the following appointments: Bridgeton, N. J., 2 years; Newport, Del., 1 year; Frankford, Pa., 2 years; Warwick, Del., 2 years; Kirkwood, Del., 2 years; Hopewell, Md., 5 years; Centreville Circut, 2 years; Easton Circuit, 2 years; Dover Circuit, 2 years. At the last session of the Conference, 1910, he was granted a superannuated relation on account of failing health.

He was thrice married. In 1873 he was united to Miss Amelia Hutt, the granddaughter of the late Rev. Henry Hutt. Three sons and two daughters were the result of this union. Two sons only survive.

His second wife was Miss Maggie Moss by whom one son was born, and he mourns the departure of his father.

After his bereavement by death of his second wife he married Miss Bessie Johnson.

Four brothers and two sisters survive him. Two, the Revs. J. R. Waters and W. E. Waters, are members of this Conference.

His was a lingering illness, but he bore it patiently. He said to his brother Joseph a few days before his departure, "All is well. I have seen my mansion. I am happy." He trusted in Jesus. He was not disappointed, for on August 28th, 1910 he departed from the body but was present with the Lord.

"The soul that on Jesus leans for repose, God will not desert to his foes, That soul, though all hell should endeavor to shake, He'll never, no never, no never forsake."

# ISAAC HENRY WHITE.

Isaac Henry White was born March 6th, 1842, in Kent County, Md., near Smithville. Philip White, his father, was born in 1822, at Wye River, Talbot County, Md. His mother, Elizabeth, was born in Baltiomre.

He was converted Nov. 12th, 1860, at Mt. Pisgah Church, near Hanesville, Kent Co., Md. He and Miss Martha Elizabeth Spencer were married March 23rd, 1865, at Still Pond, Md., by Rev. J. E. O'Brien of the Philadelphia Conference. He organized a Sunday School which was the first in Kent County among our people outside of Chestertown. He founded Union Leagues among the freemen, which brought him in contact with many men. He was licensed to preach in June, 1873, by Rev, Nathan Young, Presiding Elder of the Philadelphia District of the Delaware Conference. He organized a mission at North Penn, Phila., with three children, and increased the membership to thirty, and eight probationers. He was received in the Delaware Conference on trial July 1874, at Wilmington, Delaware, by Bishop Matthew Simpson, D. D., and was appointed to New Castle, Del. Here he secured forty dollars from the City Treasury, which was due our people, and opened a school. He purchased a lot and moved the Church which was near Kirkwood, one and a half miles.

He was ordained Deacon July 1876, by Bishop E. S. James, and received into full connection.

He served New Castle three years. From New Castle he was sent to Wilmington Circuit. He was ordained Elder at St. Michaels, Md., July 28, 1878 by Bishop William L. Harris. The late George H. Waters and Daniel R. Dunn were members of this class. He remained at Wilmington Cir-

cuit two years. His next appointment was Washington Circuit, East New Market, Dorchester Co., Md. He erected the church which now stands at East New Market, and purchased three lots for building churches. He paid for the church at Preston built by Rev. W. H. Coffey and was successful in the liquidation of many old debts. Here he published "The Steward's Plan and Record Book". An acknowledgement of its merits was received by him from Cornwall, London, and commendations from the New York Christian Advocate and the South Western Christian Advocate. He remained on Washington circuit three years, and from there he went to Princess Anne. At Princess Anne he bought the old joil for a church, and erected Union Church, four miles from the town. He remained at Princess Anne one year. He was appointed Presiding Elder of Philadelphia District in 1883 by Bishop Edward G. Andrews. He served the district four years with great success.

In the year 1886 he read a poem at the anniversary of Zoar M. E. Church, Phila. He suggested to Dr. Butler, then Pastor of Ezion M. E. Church, Wilmington, and Abraham Murray, that there should be somewhere within the limits of the Delaware Conference an institution for the higher education of colored youth. The result of his energy is Princess Anne Academy at Princess Anne, Md.

At the expiration of four years he was continued in office of Presiding Elder of the Salisbury District. His first appointment on returning to the pastorate was St. Daniels, Chester, Pa., then Haven, Phila., Pa., then Mount Clair, N. J. Here he secured the church edifice, remodeling it to suit the convenience of his congregation. He erected a beautiful parsonage, one of the best in the Delaware Conference, which stands as a monument to the credit of his ministry. At the end of his pastorate here, he was appointed Conference Evangelist. His next appointment by Bishop Cyrus D. Foss from the Conference held at Milford, Del., was Snow Hill, Md. The church was destroyed by lightning. He built a Tabernacle for temporary worship. Then he built the present church edifice at a cost of \$3300. Marion Station was his next appointment, where he also buila a beautiful church, an honor to him. He had a legal mind and everywhere he went he saw to it that the deeds and legal papers of the church were in the proper form, and in the right hands. He next was sent to Fruitland, Md. by Bishop Berry from Dover, Del. Here he built a Tabernacle in which the public school is taught. At his own request he was appointed by Bishop McCabe to White's M. E. Church, Salisbury, Md. Here he began to investigate the conditions surrounding the new church then in the course of erection. He asked the Board of Church Extension for a grant of three hundred dollars. This request was sent to the Board of Church Extension on Friday before he was stricken with paralysis in the pulpit on the following Sunday evening, April 19th, 1906, less than one month after his appointment. The writer had the honor of being his Pastor for three years. For helpfulness, strength, information, and spiritual uplift no superannuate has been more of an inspiration than he. Dr. P. O'Connell, his District Superintendent, after his paralytic stroke, appealed to the members of the Conference for help during the winter, and by supplementing the aid received made him and his family comfortable until his death. He died in Salisbury, Md., November 4th, 1910. His funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. R. G. Waters, assisted by Revs. W. C. Bowland and C. E. Davis, at Salisbury, Md. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Martha E. White, and an adopted daughter, Miss Viola White.

# CHARLES A. HORSEY.

The memory of Rev. Charles A. Horsey, the son of Mahalia and Charles Horsey, was born a slave June 5th, 1837, in Sussex County, Del., owned by one Marshall Pennock, at an early age his time was sold by him to one Charles Cottingham. He was converted when quite a youth and became a useful member of the John Wesley M. E. Church, Denton, Md., about the year of 1858. He went to sea and sailed for two years, in 1860 he returned home and remained for three years. In 1861 he was joined in marriage to Miss Sarah Burton of Sussex County, Del. There was born unto them three children, two boys and one girl. In 1863 he enlisted in the Government service in the 26th New York, from which he received an honorable discharge in 1865. In 1867 he served as Junior Preacher under Rev. John Manlove, and in 1868 he joined the Delaware Conference at Milford, Del. In 1869 his wife Sarah was taken ill and never recovered for God took her. He traveled and preached night and day under a load of grief until October 29th, 1874, when he found a companion to help sustain his arm, in the person of Miss Mary Brown of Fairlee. God blessed them with two children, one son and daughter. He was faithful to the trust left him. A good preacher, a zealous worker, in the church of his choice, a kind husband, a loving father, a strong believer in the faith of the Lord. Jesus Christ and has preached and served the following appointments, served as supply two years; Chestertown Circuit, one year; Denton, Md., one year; Willington, Md., two years; Church Creek, Md., two years; Tobacco Stick, Md., two years; Quantico, Md., three years; Princess Anne. Md., one year; Federalsburg, Md., two years; Leemont, Va., one year; South Berlin, Md., three years; Cambridge Circuit, Md., one year; Fairlee, Md., two years; Trappe, Md., two years; Mardela Springs, Md., three years; Linkwood, Md., two years; Frankford, Del., three years. He took a superannuated relation in 1902, since which time he has resided at Fairlee, A consisten Christian Minister, always ready to help in every way when called on, for the last two years he had failed somewhat in physical strength, but it never weakened his vigor or darkened his hope. He was also a member of the Grand Army Post of Chestertown, Md. The last visit to his church on the way home he looked back and said, "I shall soon

go no more." He was taken very ill on December the 10th, 1910 with paralysis of the brain and never recovered. On December the 31st, he closed his eyes to Earth to open them in Heaven. There survives him a wife, two brothers, two sisters, one son, and an adopted daughter, and many friends. "Servant of God well done, thy glorious warfare is past, the battle fought, the race is won, and thou art crowned at last."

# NOAH WATSON MOORE.

Noah Watson Moore, son of Colwell and Maria Elizabeth Moore, was born in Sussex County, Delaware, July 9, 1857, and died in Newark, N. J., January 29, 1911, aged 53 years, 6 months, and 20 days.

He and Miss Annie C. Roberts were united in wedlock November 28, 1879. He was converted May 28, 1881, and joined the church June 11th of the same year. He was granted local preacher's license in 1884, entered Morgan College, Baltimore, in 1885, graduating in 1891.

He was married a second time to Miss Eliza A. Boyce, April 20, 1893. Together they lived happily and worked earnestly for the Master till be was taken suddenly from labor to reward. Six children are the fruit of this union. Toussaint, Ruth Elizabeth, Sadie Mattie, Noah Watson, Jr., William Colridge and Mary Omega. Besides his widow and children he is survived by an aged mother, two sisters and four brothers.

He was received into the Delaware Conference in 1891 and served most acceptably the following charges: Denton, three years; Nanticoke, three years; Fairmount, three years; Newark, N. J., four years: Presiding Elder of the Centreville District, six years; Ezion, Wilmington, one year and ten months, a total of nearly twenty-one years.

His attitude toward his church was that of a loyal member. He was always anxious for the success of the Master's Cause, and never unfaithful in the discharge of the duties devolving upon him. He loved his church, her Founder, the exponents of her precepts, the exemplars of her laws. He loved her doctrines, her creed, her polity; in these he had implicit confidence; and at her shrines before her altars it was to him food for the soul to pay his homage.

In his home he was the painstaking father and the considerate and devoted husband. He loved his children, with tenderness fondling the smaller ones, and with love but positiveness training the larger. As evidence of his devotion for his wife, on one occasion when he was Superintendent of the Centreville District, the writer with two others comprising a committee for the District informed him that the preachers of the District were planning to give a reception in his honor; he waited impatiently for us to cease speaking, and immediately said "Boys you are very kind, but I had much rather that you give it in honor of my wife." I will never forget this unselfish devotion of an ideal husband to his wife.

As a preacher, his ability is not only well known to the Delaware Conference, but it is conspicuous. Dr. Cotton in his most excellent eulogy

of the deceased put it but mildly when he said, "N. W. Moore had but few equals if any in the Delaware Conference and certainly no superiors." As a pastor, the attest of his acceptability and success is the expressions of love and respect coming invariably from the people of the various charges where it had been his lot to serve. As District Superintendent, he knew not bossism, he never reminded you in any way that he was the District Superintendent.. No man under him ever went into his Quarterly Conference with fear and trembling as in days of yore. Many of us here today served as his subordinates. Let me ask of you, to whom did he ever speak a harsh word? Whom did he ever give an unpleasant look? No answer is needed, a knowledge of the ideal personality of the man is more convincing than any verbal expressions. With pleasant anticipations we awaited our approaching Quarterly Conferences; and when he came, he came as a brother and friend, and with open arms and sincere hearts both pastor and laymen cordially greeted him. Did the work of the District succeed under him? The tale is told by the statistics. He had no driving force, but his drawing power was remarkable; he came having within him ever the image of Jesus Christ, that "Silent Love", this love more powerful than any conceivable force, constrained both pastors and laymen to indefatigable labors, while N. W. Moore kept silence. Dist. Supt. F. J. Handy said, "We shall never look upon his like again". Dr. P. O'Connell said, "He stood at the centre of things in the Conference." Let me say, many of usbelieve that our most ideal minister is gone, but in the language of Longfellow:

"Oh, how blest are ye whose toils are ended! Who, through death, have unto God ascended! Ye have arisen From the cares which keep us still in prison. Christ has wiped away your tears forever; Ye have that for which we still endeavor. To you are chanted Songs which yet no mortal ear have haunted".

Sunday, January 29th, while preaching at St. John's Methodist Episcopal Church, Newark, N. J., from 2 Tim. 4: 7-8 "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith", he was stricken, and breathed his last while he was being taken to the hospital. The funeral services were held at Ezion Church, Wilmington, of which he was the honored pastor, and were in charge of Dr. W. F. Cotton, assisted by the District Superintendents and other ministers of the Conference, and ministers of various denominations of the city of Wilmington, with final services and interment at Concord, Delaware.

Brothers, the Delaware Conference has sustained a loss, irretrievable, but by God's help, let us so live that we may be able in the end to adopt the text first uttered by the Apostle Paul, and made more memorable to us by Noah Watson Moore,—"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

# JOHN H. B. HUBBARD.

John Henry Bascomb Hubbard, son of the late Wright, and Emiline-Hubbard, was born at Preston, Caroline County, Maryland, Nov. 28th, 1854, and died in the Pennsylvania Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 21st, 1911.

He was a member of one of the most respected families of that section, and shared with the other members of the family in the industrial activities common to country farm life, in the days of his youth.

He was converted when quit young, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. In early manhood, he moved to Germantown, Pa., where hefound employment in a brick yard. He connected himself with the Janes. M. E. Church in 1876. In 1879 he married Miss Gertrude R. Murry, who proved to be a real helpmeet to him in the ministry, and was a faithful and loving companion to the end. To them were born five children, all of whom die in infancy.

Brother Hubbard was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conferenceof Janes M. E. Church, Germantown, Pa., in 1880; he then attended the Centenary Biblical Institute, now Morgan College, Baltimore, Md., and at the session of the Delaware Conference held in Ezion M. E. Church, Wilmington, Del., 1883, he was admitted on trial, and ordained Deacon, by Bishop E. G. Andrews, who appointed him to Chincoteague Island. Va. He was admitted to full membership in 1885, and in 1887 was ordained Elder by Bishop John F. Hurst, since which time he has served the following charges faithfully: Ferry Ave., Camden, N. J., 1 year; Haven, Philadelphia, 1 year; Snow Hill, Md., 3 years; Princess Anne, Md., 3 years; Haven, Wilmington, Del., 1 year; Salem, N.
