

# RULES OF ORDER.

# OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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# DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT.

#### CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

Bishop Jones and Brethren:

With sincere gratitude to God for sufficient strength with which to prosecute the work, and due acknowledgment of the manifold mercies that have crowned the months, we venture this brief report of another year's strenuous efforts. "We have been troubled on every side, yet not distressed. We have been perplexed, but not in despair; cast down but not destroyed."

Our effective ranks were broken April 24th, when Rev. Louis T. Robbins was translated.

June 4th, Mrs. Eliza Jane Scott, the widow of the late James A. Scott, "was not for God took her."

October 6th, Mrs. Mary V. Shockley, the wife of the Rev. D. R. Shockley, went to her eternal reward. Suitable memoirs have been prepared.

Rev. J. H. Dredden lost his father; Rev. James A. Fassett, his mother; Mrs. R. W. Thomas was bereft of both father and mother; Mrs. F. T. Johnson and Mrs. B. B. Carson, each a brother.

The following have been on the sick-list some time during the year: Rev. J. R. Holland, Rev. and Mrs. E. H. Jolley, Rev. and Mrs. F. T. Johnson, Rev. D. W. Henry, Mrs. J. L. Nichols and Mrs. L. H. Martin. Revs. W. E. Davis and C. W. Downs are now ill.

#### Program.

At the beginning of the year a joint session of the pastors and district stewards was held. The District was reorganized into eight district groups. The entire program of the Church was reviewed. Definite work was assigned to the leaders in each group. We resolved to stress more strongly than others the following: 1—A complete constituency roll in each charge; 2—A thorough organization of this roll in accordance with the Unit System; 3—A greater Sunday School and Epworth League consciousness in each church with their attendant activities; 4—An Evangelistic campaign and a revival in each charge culminating in 10% increase to the membership; 5—A proper regard for and paying the Centenary pledges in full. We have not accomplished as much of this as we desired, but the survey of charges will show that most of the pastors have made strenuous efforts.

#### Survey of the Charges.

AIREY, at the beginning of the year was grievously afflicted by the death of her pastor, Rev. Louis T. Robbins. By permission of the resident Bishop, Rev. Peter H. Stanley has supplied this work. He has done well. Christ Church has been beautified by painting and Waters' Chapel renovated, both of which have been paid for. Centenary \$140, and other Conference collections increased; conversions 4; accessions 6.

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BECKWITH. John Wesley Church has been renovated and paid for. Zoar is growing in spiritual purpose. Centenary \$60; other collections taken. Conversions 1; accessions 1. H. J. Stewart, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE has strenuously striven to maintain her previous good record. A class for religious instruction has been effectively organized. Centenary and apportioned benevolences in full, \$460; other collections nearly in full. This charge remains on the Roll of Honor. Conversions 13: accessions 13. D. W. Henry, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT has paid \$638 on old indebtedness and further beautified their new parsonage. Centenary \$224, other Conference collections taken; conversions 20; accessions 20. R. W. Thomas, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE, ST. LUKE. This Mission has been crippled thru the migratory spirit of its members and the protracted illness and death of the pastor's wife. Centenary and other collections taken. Conversions 6; accessions 6. D. R. Shockley, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE, WAUGH, has installed a new heating plant, paying \$360 on the same. The social life of the city is being greatly helped by a large Bible class taught by the pastor, M. A. Thompson. The Sunday School has been graded. Centenary \$431; other collections taken; conversions 10; accessions 26.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT, reported last year greatly revived, begun to show signs of financial decline. But pastor R. A. F. Graham took unto himself a wife. The young people are now rallying around the church. Things bid fair to advance another year. Centenary \$49; other collections taken; conversions 3; accessions 8.

CHURCH CREEK continues to suffer reverses. Centenary \$36; other collections taken; conversions 3; accessions 10. S. S. Lankford, pastor.

CRAPO halted the first part of the year because of the new financial methods and rugged moral principles inaugurated by her new pastor, A. E. Martin. They now mutually understand. The work goes better. Centenary \$70; conference collections taken; accessions 1.

EAST NEW MARKET, famous for doing things, started up with a glow. The parsonage was beautified with the addition of a porch. Plans were laid for a splendid year's work. But the pastor, C. W. Downs, became seriously ill in November, and is yet unable to do effective work. The Local Preachers and visiting pastors have stood loyally by and the charge makes a favorable report. \$350 paid on indebtedness; Centenary \$250, an advance; conference collections taken; conversions 20; accessions 20.

EAST NEW MARKET CIRCUIT. James A. Fassett, pastor, fits gracefully in this charge. The young people are being well organized, plans are in operation to give the Reid's Grove congregation a better church. Centenary \$61, and other collections increased; conversions 20; accessions 10.

FEDERALSBURG. F. T. Johnson, pastor, brings his sixth good report. \$315 paid on indebtedness; Centenary \$301, an increase; other collections in full; conversions 4; accessions 16.

FRANKFORD. F. H. Quinn, pastor, has labored hard for the moral, social and spiritual betterment of his people. The Sunday School is prop-

erly graded. \$176 paid on indebtedness; Centenary \$57; other collections taken; conversions 9; accessions 6.

GIRDLETREE with J. L. Nichols, pastor, has earnestly endeavored to maintain last year's good financial record, but the odds have been against them. Centenary \$151; other conference collections nearly in full. Conversions 9; accessions 10. Nearly all the preparatory members of last year's big revival have been conserved.

GOLDEN HILL, located in the tidewater section, has been handicapped by her poor industrial conditions and bad roads. Logs are ready to be sawed to build a new church at Meekins' Neck. Centenary and conference collections taken; conversions 9; accessions 9. B. B. Carson, pastor.

HARRINGTON, last year, had a mind to work. This year she has lost her zeal. The home church is intact. Williamsville is very much depleted thru the death and migration of her members. Centenary and other collections taken. Conversions 23; accessions 23. T. A. Johnson, pastor.

HURLOCK evinced her joyful acceptance of the new pastor, J. N. Bullen, by having twenty-six conversions his first Sunday on the charge. His zeal has not abated but is manifesting itself in the moral and spiritual development of the people. Petersburg is planning to build a much needed church. Union Grove is growing in Christian unity. Washington excels in liberal giving. Centenary \$436, an increase; conference collections nearly in full; conversions 41; accessions 41.

LAUREL has increased her pastoral support \$150 and raised \$621 on building a new church and improvements. Centenary \$326, an increase; conference collections advanced; conversions 20; accessions 20. D. G. Waters, pastor.

LEWES with T. L. McDonald, pastor, has been intensely engaged in recorganizing and spiritualizing her forces. A more healthy social condition prevails. Centenary \$87; conference collections taken; conversions 4; accessions 4.

LINCOLN CITY reports the home church renovated and paid for. Centenary \$119; conference collections taken; conversions 12; accessions 12. J. G. Harris, pastor.

LINKWOOD, led by E. H. Nichols, has done the best she could but falls below last year's good record. The parsonage has been renovated and \$100 paid on the same. Centenary \$54; conference collections taken. Conversions 13; accessions 13.

MADISON is remodeling the Malone Church. \$275 raised on the same. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension will donate \$500, \$300 of which have been paid. Lane and Smithville churches have been awakened by a revival. Conversions 39; accessions 39; Centenary \$61; conference collections taken. Jose Angulo, pastor.

MILFORD has undergone a financial and spiritual transformation. A new site has been purchased and the house thereupon remodeled into a modern parsonage, the whole costing \$3,200. There has been raised \$400 and the old parsonage was sold for \$900, leaving an indebtedness of \$1900. Pastoral support increased \$200. A glorious revival resulting in 83 conversions; accessions 70. Centenary \$226, an increase; conference collections in full. 30 tithers and 30 Life recruits. J. R. Holland, pastor.

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NASSAU, baffled by the financial conditions, has concentrated on the spiritual culture of its members. Paid on indebtedness \$125. Centenary \$95; conference collections nearly in full. Conversions 8; accessions 7. Alexander Reid, pastor.

NEWARK. The dove of peace has returned to this charge. Again, the people have a mind to work. Centenary \$76; conference collections nearly in full; conversions 8; accessions 8. E. H. Jolley, pastor.

NORTH BERLIN, led by W. J. Helm, reports victory. \$1500 raised on indebtedness and improvements; Centenary \$549, an increase; conference collections in full; conversions 5; accessions 5. A very large graded Sunday School is doing much to help the social life of this community.

PRESTON continues to grow in spiritual vision. These people enjoy doing service for the Lord. They form the vanguard of next year's Stewardship Campaign with 47 tithers ready to make their Easter Offering. \$300 raised on indebtedness. Centenary \$302. Conference collections advanced; conversions 8; accessions 13. Plans are being laid to erect a new church at Dover Road. W. G. Matthews, pastor.

SEAFORD, JOHN WESLEY. The town church is handicapped by the migration of its members. Cokesbury and Mt. Hope are increasing their membership by conserving their youth. W. T. Purnell has been actively engaged in the social uplift of the city. Centenary \$150; conference collections taken; conversions 50; accessions 50. Pastoral support increased \$100.

SNOW HILL, visited for two years in succession by big revivals, has required much of the new pastor's time in conserving and training the new disciples. To this task D. S. Quillen has applied himself most assiduously. Centenary \$290; conference collections nearly full; conversions 5; accessions 5.

SNOW HILL CIRCUIT has experienced some reverses. W. E. Davis, the pastor, has been unable to walk since the first of last October. Medical skill thus far has failed to restore him. Arrangements were made to send him to the Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia, but he has delayed. What has been accomplished since then has been thru visiting pastors and local helpers endeavoring to consummate Bro. Davis' plans. Centenary and conference collections taken. Conversions 4; accessions 4.

SOUTH BERLIN has become a religious training station. Our young people's societies are well organized with a Mission study class. A Delco lighting plant has been installed, greatly increasing the indebtedness. A new church is needed at Sinepuxent. \$300 raised on old indebtedness; Centenary \$117; Conference collections taken; conversions 34; accessions 34. E. F. Showell, pastor.

STOCKTON, with L. H. Martin, pastor, has raised on indebtedness \$227. Centenary \$70; conference collections taken; conversions 4; accessions 3. The large number of converts in last year's revival have mostly been conserved.

STOCKTON CIRCUIT has done well under the existing circumstances. The racial disturbance threatening to culminate into a riot on Chicoteague Island greatly hindered this work. Centenary \$84; conference collections taken. Conversions 8; accessions 6. S. J. Hooper, pastor.

TRINITY is peroidic in her endeavors. W. H. Saunders has striven hard to develop these people. With its increased public school advantages there is yet hope. Centenary \$67; conference collections taken; conversions 4; accessions 4.

VIENNA, under the leadership of M. W. Clark, has purchased the lot and dwelling formerly used for the parsonage for \$1,000 and paid \$500 on the same. The erection of a \$2,800 modern public school building, combined with the arduous spiritual labors, should also fill these people with a lively hope. Centenary \$100; conference collections taken; conversions 20: accessions 16.

WHALEYVILLE is a three cornered charge hard to travel. But J. H. Dredden, pastor, dreads not the bad roads nor stormy weather. Success crowns his daring efforts. \$438 paid on indebtedness; Centenary \$150, an advance; conference collections nearly in full. Pastoral support increased \$100.

#### District Conventions.

The District Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held June 21st, 22nd and 23rd, 1921 at South Berlin, and was very largely attended. The subjects treated were of a lofty character. The able addresses delivered by President W. C. Jason of Delaware State College, and Dr. F. H. Butler, Secretary of Colored Work of the Board of Epworth League, and the Annual Sermon by Dr. Charles A. Tindley, were highly inspirational. The needed stimulus was given to our work. Many of our young people attended the Epworth League Institute of the Delaware and Washington Conferences held at Morgan College, Baltimore, Md., August 22nd-29th.

All our pastors affiliated with and several attended the Delaware Conference Chautauqua and Campmeeting held August 9th to 16th, at Dover, Del.

Our Annual District Conference held October 11th, 12th, 13th at Federalsburg, Md., excelled all former ones for enthusiasm for the work and spiritual fervor. The Annual Sermon delivered by Dr. Vaughn S. Collins, Superintendent of the Salisbury District, Wilmington Conference, was a masterpiece. The addresses of Dr. Leonard Murdock, Executive Secretary of the Philadelphia Area and Drs. McConnell, F. H. Butler and T. H. Kiah led us to the very summit of Centenary activities. District Superintendents R. H. Wallace and J. W. Jewett greatly felicitated us with their fraternal greetings.

#### Education.

The late Honorable Theodore Roosevelt once said, "That standard of living is poor, whether for mechanic or bank president, which is based on ease, comfort, luxury and social ambition rather than on education, culture and wide ability to shift for one's self." Knowing this, the necessity for a Christian education has been emphasized in each quarterly conference, and some semblance of a favorable response is attending our appeals. There are twenty-five students attending Morgan College and Prin-

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cess Anne Academy, and one hundred and five attending other secondary schools and colleges. The collections for the Board of Education and the Board of Education for Negroes have been taken.

Both the States of Delaware and Maryland continue to intensify their interest in the education of the Negro Youth. Thru the philanthorpy of the Honorable Pierre S. Dupont, the former persists to erect magnificent building and the latter is renovating her dilapidated buildings, or building new ones. A higher standard of efficiency is required of the teachers. All things considered our people are showing their appreciation by reasonably responding with large attendance.

During the months of April, May and June an intensive campaign was waged to increase the subscriptions to the Southwestern Christian Advocate. Many of our pastors continued the drive in connection with Good Literature Day. Their reports will show that besides other church literature taken that many of their quotas were subscribed in full.

#### Temperance and Rural Schools.

Intemperance, the lack of self-control; Sabbath desecration manifesting itself in the form of auto joy riding; Sunday picnics advertised as religious meetings; baneful substitutes for John Barleycorn manufactured by improvised distilleries clandestinely operated, have been rampant in our midst. In many places the social and religious life has been almost wholly perverted. It is very evident that the gospel must be rightly interpreted with all its ethical implications and practically applied to the social life of every community until self control, the sanctity of the Sabbath, and the 18th Amendment, have become everywhere the popular standard of living.

July 6th an effort was made to supply this great need. Dr. W. A. C. Hughes, Secretary of the Bureau for Colored Work of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, and Dr. George W. Orcutt, Superintendent of Wooster District, North East Ohio Conference, organized the District into a Rural Society known as "The Cambridge District Rural League."

Eight more of our pastors attended the Summer School for Rural Workers, increasing our number of Rural trained pastors to fourteen. We hope thru these to make the Rural League function toward the solution of these difficult problems.

#### Ministerial Support.

While the industrial crises, impassable roads and long period of inclement weather have weighed heavily upon our people, the ministerial support has not been reduced. But a few of the charges have advanced their pastoral support.

The reports from the Episcopal Fund for the last two years show our apportionment raised 100% plus. Our pastors are ambitious to maintain this unique standing. Our efforts have been to increase the Conference Claimants so that each annuity due our retired fathers, widows and orphans shall be paid in full.

#### Summary.

The intensive Evangelistic Campaign resulted in 539 conversions and 554 accessions. Total raised for Centenary and Apportioned Benevolences \$5,775; old indebtedness and improvements \$7,500; one church in process of building under the auspices of the Centenary; two parsonages purchased; one renovated. The majority of our young peoples societies have been reorganized and spiritually quickened.

The Ladies' Aid and the Woman's Home Missionary Societies have been very forceful adjuncts in increasing our finances and intensifying the missionary spirit. The building loan dues on the District Parsonage are paid up to date. We maintain a scholarship in the College of West Africa.

Nearly all the churches are ready to begin the Stewardship Campaign.

Christianity is not merely good news to be heard, but it is something more; it presents a task to be achieved. It calls for devoted sacrificial service. The Centenary movement is applied Christianity. It is not simply a message, it is a deed to be done—a crusade to transform the world.

Our pastors have stood doggedly against the financial and spiritual reactions. They have done their best. We are not discouraged, but willing to try again.

I am concluding this report. I want most sincerely to return thanks to our Heavenly Father for His unbounded goodness and His loving care during the trying days of the year. Also to express my great appreciation for the hearty cooperation and good will of the brethren, both ministerial and lay with whom I have been permitted to labor.

Bishop Jones and Brethren:

I rejoice that in the multitude of labors, I have been kept in good health. I appreciate greatly the cooperation of the ministers and laymen of the District. .

Toward the closing days of our last Conference our ministerial fellowship was broken by the sudden translation of brother I. D. Paine, to his eternal reward. Suitable memoir will be read by W. H. Johns.

I am pleased to report the good health of the pastors and their wives, with the exception of Brother C. W. Moore, Mrs. J. E. A. D. Grigsby, Mrs. M. V. Waters and Mrs. J. C. Bantom.

Brother G. W. Joynes, pastor of Melitota, was bereaved of his loving wife because of acute indigestion. She was buried at Jamestown, Md. Rev. O. P. Dickerson officiated.

Financial stringency, lack of employment, unfavorable weather, and practically impassable roads, seriously handicapped the success of the District along all lines.

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#### Charges.

BARCLAY was abandoned by its pastor who was appointed there by Bishop Berry last Conference. W. R. Price, a Local Preacher, was appointed to fill out the year. He has done his best to overcome the handicap, and reports: Conversions 4, accessions 1, tithers —, centenary \$51, other benevolences \$30. Total \$81. W. R. Price, pastor.

CARMICHAEL makes the following report: Conversions 24; accessions 33; centenary \$50; other benevolences \$39; Total \$84. J. E. A. D. Grigsby, pastor.

CATLIN, which was never a very strong Charge, has gradually lost its members until there are but a few left. The First Quarterly Conference made the request that they be placed with another charge. T. B. H. Coleman has supplied the work for two years. Reports: Conversions 2; accessions 2; Centenary \$42; other benevolences \$7; Total \$49.

CENTREVILLE has done well in spite of financial stringency. Many out of work, wages low. The pastor with patience and tact, has had a measure of success. Modern convenience installed in the parsonage, a new side porch, and a new roof. Paid on debt \$1,600. Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants Fund full; conversions 6; accessions 8; tithers 7; Centenary \$220; other benevolences \$81. Total \$301. S. J. Horsey, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT. This charge has done practically nothing this year. The former pastor left his appointment, and returned to this charge and lived among the people the better part of the year, and prevented the pastor's success. The pastor did his best. Paid on debt \$103; conversions 2; Centenary \$13; other benevolences \$7. Total \$20. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

CHESTERTOWN had quite a struggle to maintain its record. The scarcity of work and money taxed the resources of the people severely to meet the requirements of the mortgage against the church property. The pastor has worked diligently. Paid on debts \$800; conversions 2; accessions 2; tithers 39; Episcopal Fund, full; Centenary \$141; other benevolences \$99. Total \$240. W. H. Johns, pastor.

COXE'S NECK MISSION has made a slight advance this year. They have purchased a quarter of an acre of land upon which to build. This Mission reports: Centenary \$23; other benevolences \$32. Total \$55. Zebulon Heath, pastor.

CHURCH HILL. The lack of money among the people prevented the finances from equaling last year. Conversions 25; accessions 34; centenary \$147; other benevolences \$36. Total \$183. Lewis Hodges, pastor.

CORDOVA makes the following report: Conversions 5; accessions 5; Centenary \$115; other benevolences \$38. Total \$153. J. O. Stanley, pastor

CRUMPTON is in the midst of a farming district. The farmer failed to realize on his crops, which handicapped the work of the church. The home church has been painted, and makes a fine appearance. Paid on debt \$153; conversions 3; accessions 3; tithers 2; Centenary \$91; other benevolences \$28. Total \$119. J. H. Cooper, pastor.

DENTON. The financial stringency seemed to discourage these people very much at the beginning of the year. But the work has gone forward in a creditable manner. The optimism of the pastor influenced the people to do their best. His slogan was "We must not fail." The people rallied. Paid on debt \$175; conversions 16; accessions 7; tithers 18; Centenary \$324; other benevolences \$50. Total \$374. Episcopal Fund, full. M. V. Waters, pastor.

DENTON MISSION reports paid on debt \$13: conversions 2; acces-

son, pastor.

EASTON found this a difficult year in which to reach its former achievements. The usual avenues for employment closed, the people were scarcely able to meet the cost of living. If the pastor had not had the sagacity to organize his church at the beginning of his administration, it is hard to see what the result might have been. A great deal of work has been done this year. Steel ceiling and wainscoting, beautifully decorated, has been put in the church. Parsonage apinted and electric lights installed. Paid on debt \$500; conversions 2; accessions 6; Episcopal Fund, full; tithers 12; Centenary \$298; other benevolences \$90. Total \$388. T. H. Woodley, pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT. This small congregation was inspired by its pastor to not give up because of its weakness and the scarcity of money, but do its best. Reports: Centenary \$40; other benevolences \$22. Total \$62.

Nicholas Brown, pastor.

FAIRLEE. The Bishop relieved the former pastor whom he appointed to this charge last Conference about the first week in July. L. W. Molock, a local preacher from Germantown, Pa. was secured to fill out the year. Brother Molock was late getting on the job. He found that nothing had been done by the former pastor. The people accepted him gladly. Though handicapped, the charge makes the following report: Paid on debt \$85; conversions 21; accessions 9; tithers 3; Centenary \$90; other benevolences \$33. Total \$123.

GREENSBORO has desired to keep its former record. The charge has done well under the present circumstances. The pastor's health failed during the winter. In spite of the handicap, the following report has been made: Paid on debt \$194; conversions 5; accessions 5; tithers 2; Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants full. Centenary \$343; other benevolences \$78. Total \$421. C. W. Moore, pastor.

LONGWOODS. W. H. Hayman has done his best to inspire this Charges to greater activity for the Kingdom of Christ. Converts 12; accessions 12; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$51; other benevolences \$26. Total \$77.

MARYDEL has never had a vision nor a serious conviction of its duty to the Church and the Kingdom of God. The pastor has labored for success. The church near the parsonage has been repaired, a recess choir gallery built, and the church painted inside and out. Paid on debt \$582; conversions 6; accessions 6; Centenary \$51; other benevolences \$32. Total \$83. F. C. Gillis, pastor.

McDANIEL. When oysters and crabs fail, the people of this Charge are without a definite means of a livelihood. The pastor has labored to

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have his report equal to last year, but did not quite reach the goal. Paid on debts \$28; conversions 2; accessions 2; Centenary \$149; other benevolences \$20. Total \$169. J. H. Russum, pastor.

MELITOTA. The pastor has worked hard to make things go. A great sorrow came to him in the death of his wife on January 16th. With a heavy heart he supervised the work. Conversions 7; accessions 4; tithers 28; Centenary \$65; other benevolences \$27. Total \$92. G. W. Joynes, pastor.

MILLINGTON with J. C. Bantom as pastor, has had a good year in spite of conditions. Brother Bantom has preached and sung himself into the hearts of his people. Paid on debt \$230; tithers 36; Episcopal Fund full. Conversions 15; accessions 15; Centenary \$208; other benevolences \$17. Total \$223.

OXFORD is still having success. A beautiful addition has been built to the parsonage, and the whole nicely painted. It is now a splendid home. Electric lights have been installed in the church. Pastor and people are happy. Paid on debt \$578; tithers —; conversions 50; accessions 48; Centenary \$166; other benevolences \$48. Total \$214. L. D. Beecham, pastor.

POMONO with S. A. Waters as pastor, has done the unusual. They have built two churches this year, without the advice or knowledge of the Superintendent, and the pastor told me that it was against his advice. Paid on debt \$3,069; tithers 5; conversions 21; accessions 22; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$134; other benevolences \$33. Total \$167.

RIDGELY with J. H. Nutter as pastor has been thoroughly organized and has had a learge measure of success. I heard these people complaining as I did others about there being no work, no money. The Charge reports \$325 for improvements; \$101 in bank on the new church fund; tithers 16; conversions 15; accessions 17; Centenary \$188; other benevolences \$30. Total \$218.

ROCK HALL is a tidewater appointment. The people depend largely upon oysters and crabs for a living. These commodities failed this year, which seriously interfered with the success of the work. Paid on debt \$120; conversions 6; accessions 6; Centenary \$131; other benevolences \$35. Total \$166. J. O. Lockman, pastor.

ROYAL OAK with C. W. Winder as their pastor, is rejoicing because of the revival fire which is now burning in their midst. Spiritual fervor is high. Paid on debt \$75; tithers 20; conversions 102; accessions 101; Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants full. Centenary \$207; other benevolences \$65. Total \$272.

ST. MICHAELS is a strong Charge. But this church has been greatly handicapped because of the failure of the crab and oyster industry on which these people depend chiefly for their living. The pastor urged them for the sake of the Kingdom to do their best for the various causes presented by the Church. A new carpet was placed in the church, and the walls were beautifully papered. Conversions 39; accessions 4; Centenary \$219; other benevolences \$34. Total \$253.

STEVENSVILLE is a tidewater appointment, and they have had the same problem to face which came to all of the appointments of this kind. Not much work or money to be had. Paid on debt \$85; conversions 5; ac-

cessions 5; Centenary \$103; other benevolences \$25. Total benevolence \$128. C. W. H. Briddell, pastor.

TRAPPE is in the midst of a rich farming district, but has suffered in its constructive program, reflecting the failure which came to the farmer. The pastor labored to keep up the spirituality of his church, and was blessed with 43 conversions, 43 accessions; 44 tithers; Centenary \$207; other benevolences \$50. Total \$257. J. H. Blake, pastor.

WILLISTON is supplied by J. E. Nichols, to take the place of G. R. Hollis, whom the Bishop relieved. He was late getting in the work, every thing being considered, he has done well. Reports paid on debt \$16; conversions 15; accessions 17; tithers 2; Centenary \$117; other benevolences \$30. Total \$147.

WITTMAN has had a hard year. This Charge is burdened with an unnecessary debt, which has hampered the pastor in his effort to do constructive work. Paid on debt \$887; conversions 5; accessions 2; Centenary \$54; other benevolences \$16. Total \$60. G. W. Downs, pastor.

WOODLAND. W. T. B. Devron has taken unto himself a wife, and therefore he is not so lonely as formerly. He reports a new roof and other repairs on one of his churches; and a new floor, and a recess choir gallery at the home church, all at the total cost of \$800. Paid on debt \$208; conversions 5; accessions 8; tithers 1; Centenary \$97; other benevolences \$32. Total \$129.

#### District Activities.

Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held at Royal Oak. The convention was profitable to all who were present. A pageant by the Junior Leagues of the district, conducted by Mrs. A. B. Horsey, and her assistants, was inspirational. Also the papers and discussions which followed.

District Conference was held in St. Michaels, C. W. Pullett, pastor. Addresses delivered by visiting District Superintendents were inspirational. Dr. L. C. Murdock brought the Conference a thrilling message on Stewardship and Storehouse. The laymen were greatly enlightened and pastors inspired. Prof. T. H. Kiah was present to represent Princess Anne Academy. He left a favorable impression on the minds of both young and old. W. H. Johns looked after the interest of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, and reported 70 cash subscriptions, and 40 renewals.

We have reorganized the groups on the district, and have urged that Minute Men be appointed on each Charge.

#### Ministerial Support.

Notwithstanding the cry of "hard times," twelve Charges out of the 32 cheerfully advanced their pastor's salary to the total amount of \$1,100. The majority of the Charges are satisfied to have their pastor's salary remain as it is. There are a few here and there who think there should be a reduction. May their tribe decrease.

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#### Evangelism.

We have faithfully presented the work of evangelism. Many of the pastors have organized their classes into units, as suggested by the Church and the Constituent Roll adjusted. Where this has been done, and the members cooperated with the pastor there has been success beyond the average. The program of the Church for world evangelization is a great program. The Church through her leaders has spoken. Results already produced prove the worthwhileness of the undertaking. So, let us lay aside all obsolete plans, and adopt the plan laid down by the Church.

#### Centenary.

Everything has been done that enthusiasm for the Centenary might not fail. Group meetings have been held, and the interest of the Centenary brought before every Quarterly Conference. Stewardship has been urged everywhere, and we have prayed that our totals might at least equal last year, in spite of the industrial depression.

#### Sunday Schools and Young Peoples Societies.

More and more the Church is realizing these societies to be the chief field of opportunity in building for the tomorrow. Questions of economics, social, industrial and political, if they are to be on christian basis, must be done by men who are christian. It is the business of the Church to develop that kind of men.

The Church has the material, in her children and young people, out of which to make high-class citizens, and thus guarantee the future against destructive forces which threaten the life of coming generations.

#### Summary.

Total paid on debt \$10,218. Total conversions 495. Total accessions 901. Total tithers 236. Total Centenary \$4,318. Total other benevolences \$1,199. Grand Total \$6,192.

#### PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

#### Bishop Jones and Brethren:

The demands of this hour and the responsibility for properly representing the rastors and charges, fills me with a sense of insufficiency. I shall attempt but a mere outline of the larger things that men have accomplished. An account of the multitude of detailed activities, and the constant labor incident to a present-day pastorate cannot be given in so brief a report.

For what has been accomplished, we ascribe the glory and honor to Him, who has lifted us to the high place of ministers of Jesus Christ.

#### Bereavements.

As we stood on the Jordan's Strand, twice during the year, we have seen two of our comrades pass into the mystic beyond shouting the Victor's Song. For them, death had no sting and the grave no victory.

July 16, 1921, Rev. A. R. Shockley (retired) went Home from the Mercy Hospital, Philadelphia, and on October 15, 1921, Rev. B. W. Berry, from the Cooper Hospital, Camden, N. J. Of these, suitable memoirs were read Wednesday.

The following ministers lost relatives:

April 20, 1921, Rev. W. E. Hilton was bereft of his son De Witt, a Philadelphia letter carrier. July 18th, Rev. A. L. Martin lost his daughter Lillie, and on November 30th, Rev. P. M. Shelton lost his daughter Ella.

Bishop, on the third day of November, there was another death, to me too sacred and sad for mention, of which Rev. J. E. A. Johns desires to speak. These all departed in triumphant faith and have gone to be with Jesus.

#### District Survey.

Our work has been simplified and made easier by submission to a definite program. April 13th the District Stewards met in Philadelphia and adopted the following program, which in turn was approved by each Quarterly Conference:

- (1) 1000 Conversions and Accessions.
- (2) Religious Educational Program put on in each church.
- (3) 300 New Subscribers for Southwestern Christian Advocate.
- (4) A definite amount of money to be raised by each charge for Building and Improvement.
  - (5) Centenary in full by each charge.

All of the pastors attempted to carry out the plan, some succeeded, others failed—we make no excuse for some of these failures. The financial depression under which we have labored is known to you all. To speak of it would be superfluous, but is has served to make manifest the realworth of some pastors and people. The unfavorable conditions under which one works is not as important as the measure of success he has under it, or the things that enabled him to succeed.

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Love is dynamic, it is Divine, it is of God and reveals in us, as in Him, a life sacrificial, manifest in serving and in giving. It is gratifying to say, that not a few on this district have His Spirit, and by His Grace have distinguished themselves. They would not take "no" for an answer. They stand out as leaders.

#### Items of Special Interest.

The following charges, in order, had revivals, raised the Centenary in full, and are in Class I. Newman, Delair, Mt. Holly, Germantown; John Wesley, Philadelphia; Zoar, Mt. Zion, Pleasantville, Yonkers, and John Wesley, Brooklyn.

All other charges, except two, had revivals. 18 of the 33 have raised from \$100 to \$5,500 for building and improving church property; total \$19,179. Five others raised smaller amounts. 10 charges have paid \$100 or more on church debts; total \$9,753.

We did not expect it, but 13 charges advanced the salary this year. The average is now \$1206. They range from \$500 to \$2300. It is our hope that the salaries will be kept up to this average, but if any minister should fail to receive all of his support, let him not feel more humiliated by it than when he has failed to raise Conference Claimants or Centenary money in full. We should love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

#### Survey of Charges.

ATLANTIC CITY.—The new financial plan has so simplified the work and increased the collections of this church that the current expense and Centenary were covered weekly. Time has been saved and used in Evangelism, which has brought \$4 souls into the Kingdom and the church. The pastor was his own evangelist. Paid on Parsonage Debt \$2,750, (which was the second mortgage). Centenary and benevolence increased. The church has asked for its popular pastor's return for the 13th year. The splendid manner in which this Conference is being entertained shows the loyalty of these people to him, the church and the Conference. A. L. Martin, pastor.

ATLANTIC CITY MISSION is beginning to grow. We need a better place for worship. Bishop Hamilton and others are interested and have promised help. George Brooks, pastor.

BRIDGETON.—The pastor, F. O. T. Laws, has been faithful and has helped his people pay off the longstanding mortgage, but they did not stand by him with the Centenary, only having raised 38%. The church is well organized as to Leagues, Sunday School, Prayer and Class meetings. 16 conversions, 16 accessions.

BRIDGETON CIRCUIT.—Here both pastor and people were somewhat discouraged at the beginning, but they have worked well together and a fair year's work has been done. Christian Education is their great need. The pastor, W. E. Hilton, has been invited to return.

BROOKLYN—JOHN WESLEY.—Garveyism and migration cause this membership to fluctuate, but the pastor and many of the people are faithful. They have shouldered a great responsibility, and I believe will go

through with it. The church is being remodelled and beautified. This is our strongest New York church. Conversions 43; accessions 43. J. R. H. Matthews, pastor.

NEWMAN.—The people say "T. W. Cooper just suits the place." New hot-water heater has been installed and other repairs made costing \$750. Paid on mortgage debt \$850. Centenary has been raised monthly and sent in. Other benevolences also in full. The congregation is steadily growing. Conversions 3; accessions 16.

BURLINGTON'S remodelled church did not bring the people in as fast as we had hoped. A union revival resulted in 6 accessions for our church. Centenary and benevolence advanced. J. H. Blackiston, pastor.

CAMDEN was glad to receive J. R. Waters for their pastor. Salary advanced \$250, and paid. Electric lights have been installed. Paid on debt \$438. Centenary and benevolence nearly 100% gain. Conversions 21; accessions 21. The pastor is asked to return.

CAMDEN MISSION.—Rev. B. W. Berry's death left the church without a pastor. The two lone members were transferred to Ferry Avenue Church. We are planning to continue work in this community.

DELAIR has had another good year. 43 conversions and 23 accessions. Membership is now 120; Sunday School 118. New pews have been installed and paid for. Tither's Association of 40. Centenary and benevolence raised in full. Pastor's salary increased \$150. E. F. Morris is evangelistic and has been asked to return for the third year.

ENGLEWOOD is struggling with a heavy debt. The "faithful few" are heroic. We need a revival and Christian education here. F. D. McQueen, pastor.

GRENLOCH AND RHODES shows growth in the young people societies. They have a Teacher Training Class and Recreational Club. Centenary decreased. Conversions 3, accessions 3. C. W. Johnson, pastor.

HUDSON.—The spiritual life of this church has actually improved. Sunday School and Leagues have been reorganized, also Sunday morning preaching instituted. Conversions and accessions 3. Centenary and benevolence advanced. H. R. Coleman is invited to return.

JERSEY CITY MISSION has been given free use of a room by the Salvation Army people. They collected \$100 toward the building fund and \$30 for Centenary. Rev. P. A. Dade being unable to serve, Rev. N. O. Osborne, a local deacon, was appointed to the charge in August. The membership has increased and the Sunday School is growing.

MAGNOLIA is historic but has not caught the vision or spirit of Missions. They are able, but the Centenary does not appeal to them. Raised less than last year by three-fifths. The church property is well cared for. Conversions 22; accessions 21. J. T. Wallace, pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE.—Any failure on the part of this church is not the fault of L. H. McArthur, or some of his organizations, or people, for they began on time and worked to the end. The Usher's Association, the Woman's Home Missionary Society and Ladies' Aid deserve credit for loyalty. Conversions 20; accessions 15. Centenary nearly in full.

MONTCLAIR.—These people seem responsive to the Missionary appeal, but the Centenary is less than last year by one-third. Perhaps the

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vision came to the pastor too late. This is one of our best charges and pays the second largest salary on the district. A strong educational program is being worked out. A new church is needed. Conversions and accessions 4. New pews installed. F. J. Handy, pastor.

MOUNT HOLLY holds her own. Debts reduced; Centenary and other benevolence is full, and the pastor's salary increased. Accessions 3. The pastor, J. A. T. Foust, is invited to return.

NEWARK is doing some foundation work, but many of the people have not taken to the Centenary. They seem to love the church but not her program. Electric lights have been installed in parsonage, and improvements made at the church. Centenary and benevolence advanced. Accessions 35. W. A. Hubbard, pastor.

ORANGE reports 35 conversions and 25 accessions. Centenary and benevolences same as last year. The Sunday School seems to be well organized. R. G. Waters, pastor.

OSSINING.—M. C. Anderson has made some progress in this difficult field. Accessions 2; Centenary advanced. He is invited to return.

PHILADELPHIA.—FRANKFORD'S debt is a handicap. The pastor and "faithful few" have tried to advance, but failed. A revival and Christian education are much needed. Conversions 5; accessions 5. Centenary decreased. R. S. JOHNS, pastor.

GERMANTOWN, like all other charges, felt financial depression, but like Caleb and Joshua, they saw God, said "It can be done," and did it. They have gone over the top in everything (even a \$75 suit for the pastor). Raised for building fund \$1275. More than \$1100 ahead with Centenary credits. They need a new church and hope to build this year. Conversions 40; accessions 42. J. E. A. Johns, pastor.

HAVEN is becoming a real haven for our people of N. W. Philadelphia. This is a growing colored community. We need larger facilities for the development of the young life, which is being organized, and trained for future use. Tithers are organized. A revival brought 120 persons into the church. Centenary decreased. J. R. Brown is asked to return for the 10th year.

JOHN WESLEY.—The new church is meeting our expectation; congregation and membership are growing. 42 have been converted and 97 were added to the church. They emply a Social Worker, which is much needed in several of our city churches. Paid on mortgage \$2000. Centenary and benevolence in full. Young people are well organized. This is a splendid church with only \$5,500 debt. J. W. Jefferson, pastor.

MOUNT ZION grows steadily. Centenary and benevolence in full; conversions 25; accessions 33. The charge stays in Class One. Here is another place where we need a church building. Wm. Goldsborough, pastor.

SOMERVILLE has paid off a longstanding church debt, and met all payments due on the parsonage. Centenary and benevolence in fair shape. A revival brought 19 into the church. E. E. Parker is happy in carrying out the church program.

ZOAR boasts of her big preacher. The year began and ended with genial spirit; W. B. Perry has kept the Mother Church up to her usual

standard; one of the recently acquired properties has been opened for community work; others will be utilized soon. Raised for Building Fund \$1500; Centenary and benevolence in full. Conversions 200; accessions 204. The return of the pastor is requested.

PLEASANTVILLE reduced its debt by \$325, and raised Centenary and benevolence in full. Had a revival and added 14 to the church; organizations are well in hand. J. I. Peaco is asked to return.

SALEM.—The new church is inclosed; paid for the same \$5,459. Centenary and benevolence advanced. No people have made greater sacrifice than these; W. B. Nelson keeps them praying and paying. They hope to complete the church building this year. February 22d the pastor took to himself a helpmate, Miss Sadie Bruce Brock. Conversions 4; accessions 2, and 60 organized tithers.

SALEM CIRCUIT, under the circumstances, has done good work. Centenary same as last year. Conversions 5; accessions 6. J. N. C. Davis, pastor.

SPRING LAKE paid off its debt of \$750. This summer appointment still has no members. Mr. Chas. H. Dorsey, a member of Zoar, and a Trustee of the Spring Lake Church, died March 15th. He helped build our first church in Spring Lake. Jessie L. Hull, pastor.

WHITE PLAINS.—Rev. J. H. Edwards, who was sent to Lawsonia, refused to go, but returned to White Plains and divided our membership into halves and organized an Independent Church. L. S. Perry managed the situation so well that the membership is now larger than before by 18 persons. 53 conversions, 75 probationers, and 57 received in full. Paid on mortgage \$1400. Centenary increased 100%.

YONKERS, according to church membership, has the largest and best organized Sunday School on the district. 106 in the Sunday School and 35 in the church. A building is very much needed here, and would give us another good appointment in New York. Conversions 3, accessions 5, Centenary in full. A. G. Henry reads the Church Literature, adopts its program and gets results. With him, our work is not theory, but a practical reality.

#### Retired Ministers.

Rev. A. W. Lowber is in fair health and assists his pastor, W. B. Perry, cheerfully. Rev. P. M. Shelton's vision continues to fail. He is otherwise in good health, and reports regularly to Haven Quarterly Conference.

#### Stewardship and Centenary.

Our greatest Church problem today is neither educational nor social, but financial. When this is solved and pastors are relieved from the office of a financier, to study, to preach, and to visit from house to house, exhorting the people to prayer and better living, the other matters will soon be adjusted. The unwillingness of some people to give proportionately, and the poor method some pastors employ, consume time, evoke irreverence, dull the spiritual life of the church, and give but little opportunity for evangelism.

If the Centenary did nothing more than to direct our attention to

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Christian Stewardship and furnish literature educative of God's way for church finance, it was worth while. Unless we teach the people and get them to practice tithing, we shall not be able to pay our Centenary; complete our program or keep the salaries up to the respectable and needed point to which they have gone. It must then be Stewardship or financial and Spiritual declension. It is encouraging to say for this district that the number of pastors is increasing, who out of their loyalty to Jesus Christ and in the interest of His cause, are pushing the campaign with unabated zeal. It is almost safe to expect that Easter will witness the greatest demonstration of tithe-paying and soul-winning ever known on this district.

#### District Meetings.

Our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention met in Mount Holly, N. J., June 28-30. Dr. F. H. Butler, Secretary for Colored Work, was with us and rendered valuable service. The convention took the form of an institute with the following experts as instructors: Miss Emma G. Lenen, Pennsylvania State Superintendent of Children's Department; Miss Rosa Bargstress of Camden, N. J.; Dr. W. C. Thompson of Annapolis, Md.; Dr. R. C. Wells of Philadelphia, and Dr. Butler.

The meeting was well attended by an enthusiastic body of young people who seem to have gotten a larger view of life and life-service.

The Board of Control is planning a regular institute to be held in John Wesley Church, Philadelphia, June 27, 28, and 29th, 1922. The Resident Bishop has been asked to deliver the opening address and one lecture.

The Preachers' Annual Institute met in Ferry Avenue Church, Camden, N. J., September 27 to the 29th. For inspiration and helpful instruction we have not had a better session, but in order that the Church program may be better presented to the laymen, the meeting voted to have a District Conference hereafter. The requisite number of Quarterly Conferences have approved it, and the first Conference will be held September 26, 27 and 28th in Haven Church, Philadelphia.

#### Evangelism.

The program adopted by the district, among other items, called for 1000 converts and accessions. The pastors and District Superintendent have preached, held group, cottage and protracted meetings, in many places, with marked success. The literature coming from the Home Mission Board is inestimable. Rev. E. F. Morris of our district and Dr. E. L. Hyde from the Department of Evangelism have proved valuable helps to our men, although most of them were their own evangelists.

We still hold that this is our chief work, which if neglected, all else fails. The salvation of the world, is the will of God, and to do that Will, Jesus said was His meat. He pursued it with a zeal and passion that took Him to Calvary, and now says to us, "Follow me, and I will make you to become fishers of men." It is only through a burning zeal for the salvation of the lost—a zeal glowing in the heart, and flashing out in the look and action and utterance, that the confidence of unbelief can be overcome, and the heedless traveler of the broad way won to the Path of Life and

happiness. This passion and zeal must be on fire—a real Coal from God's Altar must kindte a flame in our hearts; without fire, true fire, no sacrifice is effective or acceptable. This zeal, this passion and this fire must be not only in the pulpit but in the pew as well. In such an atmosphere, souls will come into the Kingdom and into the church.

#### Africa.

We are living in an age of intense Missionary activity, and are beginning to realize what is meant by "The Kingdom of God," and what Jesus meant by "Go and disciple all nations." Africa, our oldest foreign mission field, is included, and should be dearer to no one than to us. It has not developed as rapidly as some other fields, perhaps it has not received sufficient attention—certainly not sufficient means; but now the responsive chords of the Afro-American life are beginning to move at the touch of those who plead for Africa's redemption. Already our District is supporting one mission and 7 scholarships; and, inspired by the gift of a saint who was dying, 17 African clubs are being organized, each pledged to raise at least \$50 for Bishop Clair's work, exclusive of our regular Centenary and benevolent glving.

With Bishop Claire are gone out other men and women with consecrated zeal and lips touched with Holy Fire to publish the name of Jesus to those for whom He died. To put these missionaries in the trenches and fail to supply them with ammunition is most tragic. To them we must send not only money but other missionaries. Men may glorify the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man, but such beliefs will never save Africa. Like other races they need the Divine Life incarnate in human life to come and dwell among them.

#### Summary.

We have not completed our entire program. We have had some failures but we have had some success and our "Record is on High."

Reports from the charges show the following: \$70 conversions; 978 accessions; 583 tithers; 228 subscriptions and renewals for the Southwestern Christian Advocate; 18 African Clubs; raised for building and improving church property \$19,179; on mortgage debts \$10,813; for pastors salaries \$28,098; Episcopal Fund \$815; for support of Conference Claimants \$2,554, a gain of \$702 or 93% of full apportionment. It should have been 100% and it shall be; for Centenary \$13,792.00.

The above figures indicate, as far as possible, the sacrifices and labors of the 34 pastors and the 6,363 members of the district. We have failures and for these we are sorry, but we have had some successes and for these we thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Now with sincere gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His loving care and sustaining grace, and with thanks to the pastors, their families, and congregations for their sympathetic cooperation, I submit this my third annual report, and say to all "FORWARD." "We forget the steps already trod and onward urge our way."

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#### SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Bishop Jones and Brethren:

We bring to this fifty-ninth session the greetings of the Salisbury District. If we could we would add emphasis to the hearty welcome already accorded to the honored President of this Conference, the first member of our race to be elevated to the General Superintendency of the Methodist Episcopal Church. We consider ourselves highly honored by the presence of our distinguished brother, whose voice and pen have, for many years, been potent factors in helping humanity toward the realization of a new day of justice and freedom.

This year has been characterized by earnest endeavor, amid unusual difficulties, on the Salisbury District, but the hearty response to the call of duty by loyal pastors and a devoted people is responsible for the success which rewards our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom. While there has been some sickness among several of the pastors and their families, our ranks have not been invaded by death, and we rejoice that every member of the District is able to be at the seat of the Conference to answer to his name, and for these faithful men I now make a brief survey of the charges.

#### Survey of the Charges.

COTTAGE GROVE reports 3 conversions, 3 accessions, \$75 for the Centenary, for other benevolences \$23, and for old debts \$230. H. C. Snead, pastor.

CRISFIELD—SHILOH, notwithstanding unfavorable industrial conditions there, makes a good report. Bishops Thomas B. Neely and William A. Quayle preached at this church during the year. Conversions 5, accessions 13. The parsonage has been improved by having been raised up, putting in a basement, in which is to be installed a heater. A bathroom has been added, the entire building has been thoroughly renovated and treated to a coat of paint. Cost of improvements about \$2000, of which \$536 has been paid. Raised for Centenary \$400, other benevolences \$160. C. S. Sprigg, the pastor, sings, "Forever here my rest shall be."

CRISFIELD—UNION ASBURY. The brother who was assigned to this church at the last Conference refused to go. I notified the Bishop and three weeks after Conference he appointed W. E. Waters as pastor. The charge has had a great year. A lot 355 feet by 175 feet on the extension of the Main street of the town has been bought at a cost of \$1000. A beautiful nine room parsonage has been built on this lot at a cost of \$3500, and \$1815 paid on the same. Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$350. Other benevolences in advance of last year. Conversions 3, accessions 8.

DAMES QUARTER.—This charge was somewhat hindered in the early part of the year by the removal of its pastor to another charge, but very soon recovered and has done a creditable years work. It has increased its centenary offerings more than a hundred per cent. over last year. Also increased other benevolences. Conversions 4, accessions 21. Supplied by Wilmore S. Connor.

DEALS ISLAND.—This charge was hard hit by the failure of the oyster industry upon which the people depend for a livelihood. As a consequence its report is far below last year. Centenary \$56, other benevolences \$30, conversions 3, accessions 3. J. E. Waters, pastor.

DELMAR has had a revival resulting in 33 conversions. \$125 paid on parsonage improvements, \$150 paid on old debts. Centenary collections

not up to last year. C. T. Covington, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT—CENTENNIAL continues to advance. The pastor, G. H. Bivens, is a hard worker and gets results. The report shows conversions 8, accessions 8, Centenary \$150, other benevolences \$25.

FAIRMOUNT—ST. ANDREWS has installed a Delco electric lighting system and made other improvements, the whole costing \$795, on which \$563 has been paid, \$573 on old debts, \$126 on the Centenary and \$40 for other benevolences. Conversions 18, accessions 13. S. T. Parker, pastor.

FRUITLAND, under the leadership of I. D. Pitts, reports 18 conversions, 22 accessions, \$1470 on the new church, \$123 for Centenary and \$43 for other benevolences.

GREENWOOD, burdened with the debt of a new church was, until recently, much discouraged. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension has lately come to their rescue with \$500, and this has revived their spirit. But failure of crops and other industries upon which they depended made it impossible for them to make much of a showing. Centenary \$90, other benevolences \$32. G. S. Jacobs, pastor.

HEBRON advanced the pastor's salary \$300, but has not done much for the benevolences. Raised \$86 for the Centenary, \$18 for other benevolences and \$250 on old debts. C. A. Norwood, pastor.

HOPEWELL, with W. T. Spellman as pastor, reports \$102 for Centenary, improved both churches at a cost of \$2100, of which \$700 has been paid. Conference benevolences \$63.

HORNTOWN has suffered greatly by many of its people moving away to the cities and also by the financial slump in the potato market. Thousands of dollars were lost in Virginia last season on this crop alone. The pastor, O. H. Spence, playing the part of a wise general, has snatched victory from defeat and reports 14 conversions, 3 accessions, \$200 for the Centenary, \$50 for other benevolences, improvements \$270, old debts \$150.

JAMESTOWN, under the leadership of O. P. Dickerson, reports 32 conversions, 5 accessions, \$140 for Centenary, \$25 for other benevolences, \$24 for old debts.

KELLAR.—The change of pastors at this place has been an occasion for a year of strife. Several members withdrew from our church and attempted to carry the church to another denomination. We prevented this, but could not prevent failure in the work. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

KINGSTON.—I. H. Bivins, the pastor, is a workman that needeth not be ashamed. For ten years he has wrought heroically in this charge, strongly reenforced by his efficient wife, and still the people clamor for his return. He reports 20 conversions, 18 accessions, \$250 for Centenary, and \$30 for other benevolences.

LEEMONT reports 40 conversions, 45 accessions, Centenary \$251,

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other benevolences \$32, and \$200 for improvements. E. E. Rogers, pastor. LIBERIA, with H. R. Purnell, pastor, reports 13 conversions, 29 accessions, \$500 on improvements, Centenary and other benevolences not up to last year.

MARDELA SPRINGS.—This is a weak place and should be connected with some other work. Having to keep up regular payments in a building and loan association, it has done but little for the benevolences. Raised for Centenary and other benevolences \$50, for old debts \$335. J. W. Bowling, pastor.

MARION STATION.—This charge has replaced the church and parsonage destroyed by fire a little more than a year ago, with a magnificent church, and a splendid parsonage at a cost of \$23,500 including light and heating plants, a large basement and ample rooms for modern Sunday School work. Centenary \$245, other benevolences \$40. W. A. T. Miles, pastor.

MOUNT VERNON, R. C. Hughes, pastor, reports \$425 on old debts, \$40 centenary and \$38 for other benevolences.

NANTICOKE, under the guiding hand of F. G. Campbell as pastor, reports \$220 for the Centenary and \$20 for other benevolences. Conversions 5, accessions 6.

OAKVILLE reports 9 conversions, 8 accessions, \$75 for Centenary and \$16 for other benevolences. J. O. Griffin, pastor.

ORIOLE.—The improvements on the church at Oriole have been completed. This church presents a neat appearance. Something has been paid on the indebtedness and \$75 raised for Centenary. C. W. Shockley, pastor.

PARSONBURG, under the leadership of R. N. Davis, has the distinction of graduating the first Teacher Training Class of the district. Without neglecting his own work brother Davis has been a helpful factor in the Sunday School work of the district, helping to grade the schools and organizing Teacher Training Classes. Reports 19 conversions, 18 accessions, \$105 for Centenary and \$20 for other benevolences.

POCOMOKE CITY has suffered several reverses during the year. It lost, by death, some of its most useful members. Prof. Stephen H. Long, for several years Supervisor of the Colored Public Schools of Worcester Co., Md., a leader in educational and fraternal circles and a member of the Board of Stewards of the Conference, was cruelly assassinated on the 13th day of last September. Stephen Long was well and favorably known, and although a man of unusual ability, he "hath borne his faculties so meek, that his virtues will plead like angels trumpet-tongued against the deep damnation of his taking off." The report shows \$360 for the Centenary, ministerial support in full, both churches improved at a cost of \$1180, of which \$150 was paid, \$600 on old debts and \$150 for other benevolences. Conversions 7, accessions 8. W. R. A. Palmer, pastor.

PRINCESS ANNE has had 2 conversions and 75 accessions. It reports \$588 for the Centenary, \$103 for other benevolences, and ministerial support in full. /E. O. Parker, pastor.

QUANTICO has renovated the parsonage and paid \$205 on the same, raised for old indebtedness \$350, for Centenary \$130, and for other benevolences \$65. Conversions 4, accessions 8. J. A. Kiah, pastor.

SALISBURY—JOHN WESLEY, led on by J. M. Dickerson as pastor, makes the best report in its history. The church is thoroughly organized and all departments are active. The Sunday School is graded, a live Teacher Training Class is doing good work, the Epworth League is crowded, the Junior League is promising, two young peoples clubs are valuable assets, and the women's societies are powerful factors in the life of the church and community. Conversions 41, Centenary \$407, other benevolences \$95, and ministerial support in full.

SALISBURY—WHITES CHAPEL has bought a seven-room house for a parsonage, conveniently located. This is a valuable addition to the splendid property of this charge and enhances our standing in Salisbury. Raised for old debts \$198, for Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$82, conversions 32, accessions 34. A. Chase, pastor.

SHARPTOWN.—The home church has been improved by adding a cellar and installing a pipeless heater, also a modern lighting system. On these improvements \$485 has been paid, \$140 on old debts, \$65 for the Centenary and \$12 for other benevolences. Conversions 16, accessions 6. M. Rasin, pastor.

UNIONVILLE, led by the veteran G. T. Townsend, has struggled under adverse conditions to reach its excellent attainments of last year. It reports 32 conversions, 16 accessions, \$185 for the Centenary, \$65 for other benevolences, \$75 for improvements and \$200 for old indebtedness.

WACHAPREAGUE, with W. H. Turner as pastor, has at last succeeded in building a parsonage, a crying need of this place for years. It is a splendid house of seven rooms and beautiful for situation. It cost about \$1850 and more than \$1700 has been paid on it. \$135 has been raised on the Centenary and \$43 for other benevolences. Conversions 54, accessions 28.

WATTSVILLE.—The slump in the potato market greatly handicapped the work here. The farmers did not make expenses in some cases. Hence a decrease in finances. Raised for the Centenary \$360, other benevolences \$75, and old debts \$361. In order to supplement the feeble efforts of the State in common school education, this charge raised \$300. The school term in that section of Virginis is five months. Conversions 32, accessions 9. J. S. Coulbourne, pastor.

WETIPQUIN reports 18 conversions, 50 accessions, \$80 for Centenary, \$70 for other benevolences and \$200 on old debts. W. W. Brown, pastor.

WHITE HAVEN reports 20 conversions, 20 accessions, \$145 for Centenary and \$55 for other benevolences. Roswell Waters, pastor.

WITHAMS.—This charge has also felt the industrial depression and what has been said of Horntown and Wattsville can be applied here. J. R. Purnell, the pastor, labored for success with the following results: Conversions 4, accessions 40, centenary \$80, other benevolences \$26 and for old debts \$372.

#### Evangelism.

The evangelistic fire characteristic of early Methodism and at white heat last year still abides on this district. While reports do not show as

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Rec Stat many conversions as last year there have been 646 and 804 accessions. More pastors are giving the converts their personal attention and supervision. The result is less backsliding. While the long severe winter greatly hindered the usual protracted meetings in our rural field, many pastors with their people braved the rigors of the weather and won spiritual victories for the King. They led the children in the Sunday Schools to give their young hearts to Jesus, used the Epworth League as a means of bringing the young people to God, and won to the royal service of King Immanuel men and women grown old in the employ of the enemy of their souls.

#### Young People's Societies.

Epworth Leagues are maintained in almost all of the charges and some of them are doing an excellent work, others seem to be content to keep up a nominal existence. The Junior League work in some charges is making commendable advancement, while the children's auxiliaries of the Woman's Home Missionary Society in other charges are doing a similar work in training the youth in loyalty and service to Jesus. The Sunday Schools have taken on new life and were never so well organized as now. The Rev. Ross N. Davis, a capable young pastor, well trained and holding a certificate of graduation from the International Teacher Training Department of Sunday Schools under the Oliver system, was selected for superintendent of Sunday Schools of the district. Brother Davis rendered valuable assistance to the pastors and the district superintendent in grading the schools and organizing Teacher Training Classes. He has gone with the superintendent into all parts of the district, doing this most needed work, making no charge whatever, and receiving no material gain save meagre funds to feed his faithful Ford, which uncomplainingly carried us safely into 20 charges, with the result that 19 Teacher Training Classes were organized and several schools graded. There are 115 students in the Teacher Training Classes.

#### Education.

The social conscience of the State of Maryland seems to be aroused to the importance of public education as never before. In this, the Negro becomes a beneficiary. It is highly probable that the bill before the General Assembly making the minimum school term eight months will pass. A few of the counties have a term of nine months now. This bill provides also for an increase in the salaries of the teachers. This will mean better trained teachers and in the end a better prepared and a more useful type of citizens. In what better way can the State spend its revenues than in providing proper educational facilities for all its citizens? Acting upon this principle the State has increased its appropriation to Princess Anne Academy, which institution is today crowded to its utmost capacity, and Principal Kiah reports they had to refuse a larger number than they were able to accept. What a pity that this is true. These young people are willing to make any sacrifice for knowledge and will have it at any cost.

"Out of the wilderness, out of the night,
The black man has come to the dawn of the light;
Beaten by lashes and bound by chains,
A beast of burden with soul and brains,
But the cry of his soul is to know, to know."

The religious condition of the school is good. The Day of Prayer sermon was preached by the Rev. W. A. T. Miles in a most convincing manner, and 14 of the students gave their hearts to Christ. Dr. D. H. Hargis, several pastors of the district and the writer assisted in the services.

#### Christian Stewardship.

It is perfectly obvious if we are to keep step with the onward march of the modern church and answer in an adequate way the cry of a needy world, if the Centenary pledges are to be redeemed that the work of the Kingdom may proceed without let or hindrance, if Jesus is to reign and His Kingdom spread from shore to shore, we must teach and practice Christian Stewardship. If the church will respond hearitly to the call to bring all the tithes into the storehouse, there is no question but that God, in the fulfillment of His promise, will pour out the blessing.

#### District Conventions.

The Annual District Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in Metropolitan Church, Princess Anne, Md. and at Princess Anne Academy, July 5, 6, and 7th, 1921, and was largely attended. The addresses of Dr. J. O. Spencer of Morgan College, Baltimore, Md., Dr. J. E. Wood, President of the University of Maryland, and Dr. John F. Goucher of Baltimore, Md., were highly inspirational and furnished stimulation to our young peoples societies. Several of the young people attended the Epworth League Institute at Morgan College and good results are noticeable in the League work of the charges represented at the institute. A number of the pastors attended the Chautauqua at Dover, Del., while others of the younger pastors were greatly helped in their attendance upon the Summer School for Rural Pastors at Morgan College. Our District Conference was held at Fruitland, Md., Oct. 4, 5, and 6, and was truly a great occasion. Dr. L. C. Murdock, Area Secretary, and my colleagues, District Superintendents Hargis, Wallace, Fletcher, and Scott delivered stirring addresses that contributed much profit to the Conference.

#### Conclusion.

The loyal pastors, together with their wives and faithful people, have made strenuous efforts to advance every phase of the work and have willingly sacrificed that we might make a good report. I appreciate their endeavors and their co-operation in the cause of our Christ on the Salisbury District.

#### SOUTH PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

This year has been to the workers of this district one of continuous effort, ardent struggle and some achievement. We have had a goal and have not run uncertainly. Difficulties have confronted us, but we have fought not as those that heat the air.

We have had a program, rather we accepted the forward program of the Church and worked at it in all seasons and in all weathers.

The lives of all the pastors have been spared. No protracted illness has deterred any from carrying on the work of his charge.

BUTTONWOOD CIRCUIT, with L. T. Robbins, pastor, reports 25 conversions and an advance in the amount raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences.

CAPE MAY has paid \$1000 on old indebtedness, spent \$260 on improvements, raised \$152 for Centenary and has had 35 conversions and 34 accessions. H. T. Johnson, pastor.

CHESTER—ST. DANIELS, with W. J. L. Hughes, pastor, reports \$5072 paid for improvements. The enlarging and remodeling of the Church building have made it feasible to carry on some features of our forward program. The Sunday School has been graded. The boy's Athletic Club, the Camp Fire Girls and the Boy's Scout Troop, all find home, instruction and inspiration here. The Epworth League conducted by the young people is active in every department. The Junior League flourishes, being the largest on the district. \$1605 has been raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences. This keeps this charge on the Honor Roll. All other collections are raised in full.

CHESTER—SILOAM has spent \$365 on improving property; raised more than the full apportionment for the Centenary, \$550, and all other collections in full. The ushers of this church are more than ordinarily useful. They bring young people into the Church and lead them to Christ. This charge has had 28 conversions and 20 accessions. Sydney Emptage, pastor.

CHESWOLD, with R. B. Thompson, pastor, has made progress in organizing and maintaining Junior Leagues and classes for religious instruction. The Centenary and other collections have been looked after.

COKESBURY has advanced the ministerial support and painted the Church. F. L. Tomlinson, pastor.

COLEMAN, with J. H. Stevenson, pastor, has advanced. The Sunday School has increased in enrollment and in average attendance. The Junior League has made a gain of 60 per cent. in membership. \$300 has been paid on old indebtedness; \$200 has been raised for the Centenary and all the other collections taken. A gracious revival has blessed this charge. 55 conversions and 55 accessions.

DELAWARE CITY has had 14 accessions and has looked after the benevolent collections. E. B. Green, pastor.

DOVER, with L. S. Moore, pastor, has spent \$325 on improving the Church property and has in the treasury \$108 toward renovating the Sunday School department. \$588 has been raised for the Centenary and ap-

portioned benevolences the full quota and all other collections in full. This charge has had 23 conversions and 24 accessions. Its oldest member, Samuel Molliston, has been translated and has received his crown. For more than seventy years he was a sincere and faithful member and official of this charge. His was a remarkable career for industry and integrity and generosity.

DOVER CIRCUIT has had 14 conversions and 14 accessions. The interest of the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues has been advanced and the Centenary and other benevolences have been looked after. W. B. Whittington, pastor.

GALENA, with T. E. Randall, pastor, has enlarged the parsonage and paid \$300 on account of the same and raised for the Centenary \$200. This charge had 14 conversions and 14 accessions.

MIDDLETOWN has moved forward. The parsonage has been renovated, beautified and refurnished. \$508 has been spent for improvements and \$324 paid on old indebtedness; \$280 raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences, an increase of 40 per cent. over last year. W. C. Bowland, pastor.

NEW CASTLE, with J. L. Taylor, pastor, shows a net increase in full membership of 64 per cent. and a healthy growth in the Sunday School and in the Epworth League. Notwithstanding the distress in this mill town owing to the lack of employment, this charge has kept up its current expenses and reported \$212 for the Centenary.

NEWPORT has had 14 conversions and 18 accessions. The Sunday School and the Epworth League are increasing in numbers and interest. \$252 has been raised for the Centenary, and all the other collections have been taken. J. L. Parker, pastor.

OCEAN CITY, supplied by J. Evans Dunn, a summer appointment, raised \$157 for improvements, increased the amount for ministerial support and raised more than the apportionment for the Centenary and other benevolences.

ODESSA, with M. H. Murphy, pastor, remains on the Honor Roll, having again raised for the Centenary and other benevolences the full apportionment, \$317. The Church has been renovated and beautified at the cost of \$300 and is paid for. 11 conversions and 11 accessions.

PHILADELPHIA—EAST CALVARY has had another great year and reports \$2252 paid for improvements; \$16,304 for old indebtedness; \$5620, the full quota, for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences, besides raising all other apportionments in full, \$6704. For more than eight weeks, beginning the first of January, this Church was in a continuous revival, ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of hundreds of jobless, foodless, shelterless, penniless men. 9,140 free meals and 5,716 garments were given to 1,429 men. Many who had no place to go and no money, when the nights were long and the weather cold and frosty, were allowed to sleep in the Church. The gospel with apostolic fire was preached, and brotherly kindness was shown and a revival such as this great church of continuous revivals had never known was on. The result of this year's ingathering is: Conversions 1,800 and accessions 1,402. C. A. Tindley, pastor.

MACEDONIA, with J. L. Davis, pastor, has wrought well in spite of serious handicap. It was for a while without a place in which to worship, but is now settled and moving forward. Conversions 16; accessions 12. The benevolent collections looked after.

ST. PAUL has raised \$252 on old indebtedness and advanced the Centenary and the ministerial support. Conversions 6. J. E. Dennis, pastor.

PORT DEPOSIT, with R. H. Coleman, pastor, has made a 50 per cent. advance in the Centenary and apportioned benevolences. Conversions 9; accessions 9.

PORT PENN has paid \$150 on old indebtedness and \$200 for the Centenary. Conversions 3; accessions 3. K. S. Stewart, pastor.

SASSAFRAS, with P. W. Price, pastor, has paid \$108 for improvements and \$108 for the Centenary and the apportioned benevolences.

SEWELL for its first year as a station, being formerly a part of the Woodbury Circuit, reports an increase in the Sunday School enrollment, and advance in the Senior and Junior Epworth League work; and more than its full quota for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences. 3 conversions. C. E. Kincade, pastor.

SMYRNA, with J. W. Gillis, pastor, has spent \$275 for improvements and \$300 on old indebtedness and raised \$200 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences. Conversions 10; accessions 12.

STILL POND has been very active and reports 58 conversions and 58 accessions and \$300 for the Centenary, which is more than 100 per cent. increase over last year. All other apportionments in full and paid \$281 for improvements. W. C. West, pastor.

SWAINTON, with W. N. King, pastor, has freed the charge of debt, paying the balance due on the mortgage. The benevolences have been look, ed after. The Centenary advanced.

TOWNSEND CIRCUIT, with A. A. McDowell, pastor, reports having spent \$850 on account of improvements in remodeling and enlarging the Haven Church and painting the Ebenezer and the Lee Churches. Conversions 8: accessions 12.

EAST WILMINGTON, supplied by A. W. McBride, has made progress. It has a 50 per cent. gain in membership and raised its full quota for the Centenary and other collections and is on the Honor Roll.

WILMINGTON—EZION has had 25 conversions and 37 accessions; has paid \$800 for improvements; \$1000 on old indebtedness; raised \$2000 for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences and all the other apportionments in full, making a grand total of \$2802. One of the marked features of advance in this Church is the Junior League work. Two ladies who have the superintendence of this department attended the Epworth League Institute in Baltimore at Morgan College last summer and returned so full of information and inspiration that as a result the membership of the Junior League has more than doubled; four classes are taking the regular Junior League courses of study, one of which will graduate in the summer. The pastor, J. U. King, closes his fifth year and his return for the sixth year has been unanimously requested by the third Quarterly Conference, a record for Ezion.

in being instant in season and out of season. May their tribe increase. The district has had this year 2203 conversions and 1853 accessions.

#### Christian Stewardship.

The campaign for Christian Stewardship is on. Much depends upon the interest of the pastors. The zeal which they display will have much to do with the outcome. I am convinced we cannot hope to carry on successfully the work of the kingdom in this day of large opportunity and glorious privilege without the practice of Christian Stewardship. It means recognizing partnership with God. It is great. God gives us the privilege of sharing with Him in saving the world. Let us teach the people proportionate giving and urge them to put it in practice Easter Sunday for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences.

#### Life Service.

The rising sun of righteousness is bringing us a new vision. We must pray and work to have young people give their lives to Christ and His cause. They must be made to see the great thing is not money, not fame, not authority—but service. It is not what they can get, but what they can give. Let them hear the call to live the heroic life; let them see Christ Jesus the greatest hero, the mighty Saviour and they will respond. We must get recruits for the ministry, for directors of religious education, for missionaries, for deaconesses, and for women workers. The harvest is truly great and the laborers are few.

#### Benevolences.

From the work of raising the Centenary and the apportioned benevolences, there has been no vacation. It has been the year-long job. Every charge has been at it. The reports show the district has raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$14,980, which is more than 75 per cent. of its quota.

#### Summary.

The 32 charges of this district report 7,600 members, 3,806 preparatory members, 8,000 Sunday School scholars, 1,116 Senior Epworth League members, 1,231 Junior League members; paid for building and improvements \$12,850; paid on old indebtedness \$21,021; for current expenses \$11,701; benevolences and Conference collections \$18,000.

Thanking God for His innumerable blessings and pastors and people for their hearty co-operation, this my third annual report is respectfully submitted.

#### MEMOIRS.

### I. D. PAINE.

The Rev. Isaiah D. Paine, the son of Isaiah and Henrietta Paine, was born in Salem, N. J., March the 29th, 1866. Died at the seat of the Conference, Salisbury, Md., April 1st, 1921, age fifty-five years three days.

Brother Paine attended the public schools in Salem untill he was thirteen years old. His father died leaving ten children he being the oldest one he was compelled to quit school and go to work to help support the family. This is where his school education ended. He was earnest ambitious and industrious and found many opportunities to labor. Among these he had a chance to go to sea several times and come in contact with many strangers which helped him from an educational point of view.

Oct. 2nd 1887 he was united in holy wedlock to Miss Annie R. Strout and this happy union was blessed with eight children and all preceded him to the better land. In 1898 he was happily converted under the administration of the Rev. E. H. Webb and joined the Perry Avenue church. Three weeks later he felt his call to the ministry and was licened by the Rev. E. H. Webb. In 1906 he made an effort to join the Delaware Conference and was admitted after passing a creditable examination. The same ambition was used in the years of his ministry and with tact and grit he served the following charges very successfully; Crapo, 1 yr.; Trinity, Del., 2 yrs.; Box Iron, 3 yrs.; Beckwith, 2 yrs.; Linkwood, 1 yr.; Church Hill, 4 yrs.; Carmichael, 2 yrs.; total fifteen years service in the conference.

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Bro. Paine with his chances was considered a good preacher and a debater. He was always a conspicious figure in all the meetings ready to speak or take part and express himself in the presence of anybody. He was fearless and he would attack any one on any subject and express his views. Had he been an educated man with the same grit and tact he would have been among the leaders of this conference. Every body who knew him loved him because he was a friend and brother, a hard worker and honest and true with whatever he was intrusted. About May the first his health began to fail him yet his work did not lag. He finished up a successful year at Carmichael making some repairs to the church and paid for same. At the seat of the Conference he complained quite a great deal and on Friday evening while making his way to the church at conference he was stricken in the church yard and by the time a physician reached him he was dead, cause appolexy.

A short service was held at John Wesley Church, Salisbury, Rev. R. H. Wallace presiding (Monday). His remains were sent to Camden N. J. where services were held in the Ferry Ave. Church, the Rev. Dr. Scott presiding. Many ministers were present and took part in the service after which his body was conveyed to its last resting place. He leaves to mourn their loss, a wife and adopted daughter, four sisters, three nieces,

three nephews, and many relatives and friends. It can well be said of him he fought a good fight he has finished his course.

Servant of God well done! Rest from thy loved employ;

#### LEWIS T. ROBBINS.

The Rev. Lewis T. Robbins, son of Charles and Malinda Robbins, was born at Snow Hill, Md., Sept. 15, 1872. He departed this life Sunday 2:45 P. M., April 24, 1921 At Aireys, Md. He attended the public schools of his native town. He was converted to God at the early age of eleven years. He joined himself to the fellowship of Ebenezer M. E. Church and served acceptably the following positions, Class Leader, Steward, Trustee, Sunday School Superintendent and Local Preacher. also taught public school in Worcester County, Md., at Hull's Chapel, Box Iron, and Sinepuxent. He was called by Dist. Supt. C. W. Pullett to supply Sinepuxent in 1912, and joined the Delaware Conference at Zoar Philadelphia in 1913. He served successfully Trinity Delaware four years, and Aireys, Maryland two years, being appointed the third year to last charge, but only served two Sundays, for on the third, tho extremely anxious to serve, he was denied, and at 2:45 P. M. "He was not, for God took him." At both of these charges brother Robbins was loved supremely by his people; they demonstrated their love in that they incessantly followed his lead.

At Trinity he leaves a material monument to his labors in a brand new Church built, completed, paid for at the time of its dedication. Other renovations and repairs mark his labors at the other points upon his work.

He was adored and followed at his last point. The people hung upon his words. Brother Robbins loved to preach, and could surprise you with his ability to interpret and declare God's truth. Certainly he does not owe God any thing in the way of physical labor. Every ounce of the strength brother Robbins had, he used it in making God's gospel convincing and effective to the people.

Those who knew him best knew him to be of a seclusive and evasive disposition. It would appear that it was because of fear he had of the brethren; but upon closer investigation one would discover he was not

a man who was afraid. He preacticed solitude and humlity. This was the secret of his power. When he preached to his people they always took knowledge, "That he had been with Jesus."

May 15, 1890, he was married to Miss Mary B. Richardson. From this union survive two children, Charles A. Robbins and Mrs. C. Eleanor Stanley. There remains also three brothers and four sisters.

There were two funeral services held, one at Airey's the other at Snow Hill. His Dist. Supt. Dr. D. H. Hargis and his ex-pastor Dist. Supt. J. W. Jewett, officiated, assisted by some of the ministerial members of the district.

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#### REV. ALFRED R. SHOCKLEY.

Rev. Alfred R. Shockley son of the late Jesse and Diana Shockley, was born in Broadkill Neck near Milton, Delaware, Sussex County, January 18, 1849.

He was converted at an early age and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was conscious of a divine call to the christian ministry in his youth. And often in warm weather when working in the field, while resting his horse at the end of the furrow would be found studying his Bible.

Though himself free born, he realized the condition of his brethren and at the age of fifteen ran away to enter the service of his country. He enlisted on June 7, 1864 Company B. Forty-fifth Regiment of U. S. Colored Infantry. He was discharged on Feb. 24, 1865.

Upon his return from the army, realizing the necessity of a thorough training for his calling, he entered the Centenary Biblical Institute, which is now Morgan College, Baltimore, Md. After completing his course at this Institute he taught school for several years. During this time he served as junior preacher under Fathers Wing and Philips.

In the year 1876 he was married to Annie Elizabeth Moore from which union there were ten children: Cora Virginia; Arensy Colwell; Bessie Lynn; Caley Warren; Alphonso Ward; Elwood Gracesconde; Alfred Goodsell; Jessie Lenora; Joseph Wardell; Andrew Fowler. Five of whom survive him.

He became a full member of the Delaware Conference of the M. E. church in 1876 and served the following appointments: Passaic, N. J., 1 yr.; Laurel, Del., 2 yrs.; Germantown, Pa., 1 yr.; Bridgeville, Del., 1 yr.; Haven Phila. Pa., 2 yrs.;—transferred to Newark Conference M. E. Church served in Paterson, N. J., 1 yr, returned to Delaware Conference of M. E. Church served Zoar church Phila., 2 yrs.; Chestertown, Md., 1yr.;—transferred to New York East Conference of M. E. Church, New Haven, Conn., 2 yrs.; served Dover, Del., 1 yr.; Easton, Md., 3 yrs. He became District Superintendent of Salisbury district and served 6 years, District Superintendent of Phila. district 6 yrs., served Montclair 1 yr. Because of ill health he retired in 1905. In 1906 he became effective, served Smyrna, Del., 2 yrs.; Moorestown, N. J., 3 yrs. Retired in 1916, settled in Moorestown, N. J., became a member of Merchantville Quarterly Conference. For several years he served as trustee of his Alma Mater.

On the second Sunday in June he attended the morning service. In the afternoon he went to Zoar Mission. He was too ill to conduct the services but administered the sacrament. From that time on he gradually grew worse, but never complained and was always concerned that the family should not worry. On Monday July 11, the doctor ordered him to Mercy Hospital. On the following Thursday, he remarked he was far enough to test the Jordan. He said "Its all right I left it all with Jesus years ago."

He departed this life Saturday July 16, at 3:30 A. M. He is survived by a widow, five sons, eleven grandchildren a host of relatives and friends to mourn their loss.

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Funeral services were held at Zoar M. E. Church, Philadelphia, July 16, under the direction of Rev. J. T. Reference was made to Daisy her youngest sister who was absent. What shall I tell her asked Bessie? "Oh" she said. " I am so absent minded I came near forgetting that child, why she was my old chum; tell her to be a good gril." Gladys her adopted daughter and neice asked, "Mama have you any message for me, will you watch over me?" "Yes Gladys" was the reply, "You have done all you could for me." "Be careful, steady yourself" then remarked: Poor thing you have had two mothers and they both have gone and left you by the roadside."

Like Jacob who spake thus with his sons before death, this hour of reception was about ended, hence her attention was turned to the day of burial. "Oh, now about the funeral," said she; then gave directions, "I want my steel dress with slippers and stockings to match". "Bessie" she asked, "Is there room enough in our lot for my body? if there isn't maybe I could be buried on top of mama." "There is plenty of room said Bessie". The remark that followed was: "I would like to sleep beside Mama the balance of my days."
