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




Preamble



Doctrine of Allegiance

THE PREAMBLE

R. E. JONES, Presiding Bishop

WHEREAS, The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South and The Methodist Protestant Church did through their respective General Conferences appoint Commissions on Interdenominational Relations and Church Union; and

WHEREAS, these Commissions acting jointly did produce, propose and

present to the three churches a Plan of Union; and

WHEREAS, these three churches, each acting separately for and in its own behalf, did by more than the constitutional majorities endorse and adopt this Plan of Union, in accord with their respective constitutions and disciplines, and did effect the full consummation of union in accordance with the Plan of Union; and

WHEREAS, these three churches in adopting this Plan of Union did authorize and provide for a Uniting Conference with certain powers and

duties as therein set forth; and

WHEREAS, The Uniting Conference was duly authorized and legally chosen in accordance with the plan of Union:

THE AFFIRMATION

NOW. WHEREAS, we, the members of the Delaware Conference in session here assembled on this the 30th day of Nov., 1939, do solemnly in the presence of God and before all the world make and publish the following Declaration of fact and principle:

THE DECLARATIONS

T

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church are and shall be one United Church.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

II

The Bishop: The Plan of Union as adopted is and shall be the constitution of this United Church, and of its three constituent bodies.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

III

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church had their common origin in the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America in 1784, A. D., and have ever held, adhered to and preserved a common belief, spirit and purpose, as expressed in their common Articles of Religion.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church in adopting the name "The Methodist Church" for the United Church, do not and will not surrender any right, interest or title in and to these respective names which, by long and honored use and association, have become dear to the ministry and membership of the three uniting Churches and have become enshrined in their history and records.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

The Bishop: The Methodist Church is the ecclesiastical and lawful successor of the three uniting Churches, and through which the three Churches as one United Church shall continue to live and have their existence, continue their institutions, and hold and enjoy their property, exercise and perform their several trusts under and in accord with the Plan of Union and Discipline of the United Church; and such trusts or corporate bodies as exist in the constituent churches shall be continued as long as legally necessary.

Historical Society and Conference History

The Delaware Annual Conference was the first Negro Conference organized in the Methodist Episcopal Church. The wonderful growth made and the glorious work accomplished since its organization in 1864 deserve a place in history, and we hope that sufficient funds will be raised for those who are willing to prepare and publish such a work for our grand old organization.

Mother Zoar, in Philadelphia, has a charming history, with only two places as her home in this city. Her missionary efforts more than one hundred years ago were printed in a booklet, a copy of which was deposited in the cornerstone of the First M. E. Church, of Germantown, Pa., and was found when the old building was demolished, and was given to a brother in this Conference, who will gladly give it to the Society when it becomes active.

Ezion Church, Wilmington, Delaware, has known only one location in the 135 years of her life and labors. Also John Wesley Church, Salisbury, Maryland, and no doubt others have more than one hundred years of existence in one place.

Many of the men who were in the organization of our Conference have had wonderful careers leading up to this great work which they left us as a legacy. "Methodism of the Peninsula," a book written by the late Reverend Robert W. Todd, with an introduction by the late Bishop John F. Hurst, has excerpts from several sermons preached as early as 1854 by the sainted Reverend Frost Pullett, who later was a member of our organization Conference, and who served as a presiding elder. This preacher attracted crowds of white folk to hear him, and, with others, planted Methodism deep on the Eastern Shore.

Brother Pullett's zeal for Kingdom-building led him to the Eastern Shore of Virginia, where he stirred folk who heard him. It was against the law for him to cross the State line to preach, hence he was imprisoned and tried. But they decided to let him go after obtaining his promise that he would not come there again. He thanked them, and made the now historic promise that "they might see frost down there this winter, but that they wouldn't see Pullett."

The grandsons of this founder and other founders of our Conference are in our midst, so why not make known the legacy they left, and inspire them and other workers to whom this work is left.

Our Youth and the Church of the Future

We are living in a fast changing civilization, characterized by new and far-reaching accomplishments in education, transportation, social and economic structure. So productive has creative genius become, so extensive its results, that new applications of physical forces are apparently surpassing our spiritual development, and one fears lest the many creations for physical human welfare become an uncontrollable boomerang to defeat the very purpose of such inventions.

Almost every decade calls upon us to reconstruct our economic and social life so as to meet the new conditions imposed upon us by man's creative genius. So deeply has this material and physical phase of our existence entered into our life that our moral and spiritual attitudes have gradually changed and become more and more materialistic.

This liberal and materialistic influence has affected no group more than it has affected our youth. Modern changes in educational objectives and practices have developed in our youth a deeper consciousness of self and a more independent attitude in thought and self-expression. There has developed in America a sort of independence of youth, a devaluation of

This condition has imposed on the Christian Church an enormous task the past and a depreciation of spiritual ideals. of not only arousing in the youth a consciousness of his own spiritual possibilities, but to inspire a faith in him and a desire to assume those responsibilities. sibilities in concrete participation in the church of tomorrow. He should be made to feel that the church is the very fountain-head of all real accomplishment, and that our vast material wealth and its utilization should be inspired by spiritual impulses and objectives.

If required courses in religious education were placed in our public schools and colleges the effect would soon reveal itself in larger service which the youth would render the church of the future. If the influence of eight million Methodists cannot affect the incorporation of such courses in our public schools, then indeed United Methodism will not meet the expectation of a stagnant, bewildered world. The school is the child of the church, and as such this relationship should be maintained.

DELAWARE CONFERENCE

As to what the youth shall be in the church of tomorrow, depends upon the extent to which the church is willing to go to incorporate in the secular school these necessary courses which we believe will ultimately lead to a fuller participation in the Church of tomorrow.

Women's Organizations

THE WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS OF THE CHURCH are sources of moral and spiritual power. They should be fostered and encouraged. The women of these organizations are vitally interested in every phase of our work. Through the Ladies' Aid Societies, they not only aid ministerial support and furnish parsonages, but provide funds for the Trustees, meet local church obligations, raise World Service Units and other benevolences, visit the sick, comfort the sorrowing, and bring good cheer, love and hope to many unfortunate persons.

THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, never a strong organization numerically in the Delaware Conference, deserves great credit for its heroic spirit and devotion to lofty ideals. This loyal band of Christian women merit the hearty support of us all in their praiseworthy efforts to develop and maintain christian work among women in foreign lands.

THE WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY of the Delaware Conference continues to be a benediction to all who come under its influence. Happy is the Church which has an active auxiliary of this organization which holds a unique place in the activities of our good women. They minister to real social and spiritual needs of people whose lives would be cheerless and miserable without such aid.

THE FRIENDSHIP HOME is a visible evidence of the moral and spiritual ideals of The Woman's Home Missionary Society. It is a haven of hope and protection for girls and young women who need such help at moderate cost, and for those without means who need protection until they can become properly adjusted to their new environment. The Society deserves great credit for securing the splendid building at 1911 N. Twelfth Street, this City. However, this building is not large enough to accommodate many who apply for accommodation. Room should be provided for every worthy applicant. Every minister and layman of the Conference should respond to the earnest appeal of our sisters to make the Friendship Home all that a home of this type should be. Will we do it?

World Service

Last year our church reported that the number of missionaries at work in forty countries including our home work was 2749. They were at work building character in the youth through eighty-five educational institutions;

24,000 church schools, with 4,000,000 pupils; service to the aged and children in 43 homes; to the sick in 73 hospitals; helping to comfort 8,700 retired ministers, widows and children; solving problems relating to our economic and social life, and distributing the Bible free, or at low cost, in 991 languages and dialects.

METHODIST CHURCH

This great work has been made possible through our missionary giving.

But our giving has been insufficient to meet growing demands, and millions still hunger and wait for the Word.

The World Service Commission has made many appeals to arouse the church, with prayer for a return to the former spirit of giving.

Reports from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension show that only seven Conferences owe more for loans made possible from this source than our own conference. The report from October 31, 1938, showed that we owed the regular fund \$59,109.53, and the revolving fund \$61,405.07; or a total of \$120,514.60. Are we grateful? Should we not rally to a greater support of this cause?

We urge our people to greater sacrifice to spread the work of this great agency. We plead with those who have obligations to the Home Board to meet demands promptly, and thus help make it possible for others to benefit from this vital service.

Christian Stewardship

Every Christian should be fully gripped by this higher-ground call to service, for it is from the Lord, and is the sure way to real victory in our church program. When doing the will of God becomes the dominant factor in our lives, the Kingdom will spread from shore to shore; men will learn war no more, and swords shall be beaten into plowshares, and spears into pruning hooks.

God calls for one-seventh of our time. This given would fill our churches with ardent worshippers; equip our church schools with consecrated and efficient teachers and pupils, and cause each organization within the church to flourish.

Tithing, the outgrowth of real devotion to God's Cause here on earth.


He gave Heaven's best Gift for our salvation, and, we to be like Him, must give as requested to help win man back to God.

While this call from our Lord may not be the condition of salvation wholly, one thing is certain: It is the price for the greater blessing of the Gospel.

Ministerial Support

The most sacred calling to man is that to preach the Christian Gospel, and to shepherd the people in the things of the Spirit. The right to a comfortable living inheres in the Christian ministry. Assumption of the obligations of the itineracy required to be made at the time of admission



into the travelling connection puts upon the church the counter obligation of providing for the support of the entire ministry. In view of this, the claim for Ministerial Support in each pastoral charge is not completed until ample provision is made for the adequate support of pastors, district superintendents, bishops and conference claimants.

We appeal to all our people to consider prayerfully this matter; loose their purse strings, and provide our ministry with comfortable support.

Temperance

The historic position of our church on this subject is clearly set forth in the Discipline and General Rules of the Methodist Church, and it presents a ringing challenge to every member. Methodism has insisted that intoxicating liquor cannot be legalized without sin. Wine, through the centuries, has not ceased to be a mocker, traitorously destroying individuals and blighting society. Official records show that drinking is steadily on the increase. With the increase in the liquor traffic has come increase in crime and liquor law violations. The new saloon, in its various disguises, is attended by shocking evils unknown to the old saloon. Mortality has increased as a result of the drink habit in automobile operators.

Death rides our highways. Whole families are sometimes wiped out in so-called accidents caused by the liquor-befuddled brain and palsied hands of drinking drivers, who are utterly insensible to the sacredness of human life. One of the most tragic features of the whole debacle is the fact that the toll of disaster falls most heavily upon our youth.

Protection of our citizens is a function of the State. It is intolerable that any government, through participation in revenues, should be a party to a business which thrives upon the physical, social, moral and spiritual decay of its people. Unless the Christian and moral forces of America rally in united warfare against the evils attendant upon the legalized liquor traffic, we face an unprecedented era of debauchery and degradation.

We call upon our church to unite with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the World League Against Alcoholism, the Scientific Temperance Federation, the American Business Men's Research Foundation, the Antidrink evil. "Awake! Put on thy strength, O Zion!" is the call that comes to us today. May we respond, "Lead on, O King Eternal, the day of march has come!"

Christian Education

"From the standpoint of society, the work of the church is to seek, declare, and promote what is the best form of human association, so that man may achieve his highest development and the best expression of the spirit of Christ in human life. To this end the church will seek to commit its members to work for the Christian social order. It will expend its own organized efforts in behalf of this ideal society when the right of way is

The above quotation states primarily an education task, but it must issue in a definite and comprehensive form of social service. How shall we

teach people to engage in service? It should be kept clearly before our minds that religion is a way of life, and that effective religious teaching is that which leads one to live his life religiously and helpfully to others. Teaching must therefore have a constant relation to life.

The most effective way to teach service activities is to have people to engage in actual and continual enterprises of Christian service and let the sense of teaching grow out of this. This cannot be done wholly within the walls of the church, but there must be a close relationship between those who teach and those who serve, between committees and agencies of social service at large.

This is not just something that we can have different thoughts about, but it is vital for both faith and practice. A group of people who have acquired the habit of service together with the conviction that they are "workers together with God," represent the true Christian Church.

THE SCHOOL OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING, at Princess Anne College, under the efficient leadership of Dr. F. J. Handy, supported by a fine corps of teachers, is deserving of great praise for the splendid work it is doing in preparing ministers to render better service to their people.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE AND CHURCH SCHOOL INSTITUTE, held annually at Morgan State College, is considered among the best in Methodism. The attention of our young people should be directed to this training school of Christian Education, and the work being done there should receive the loyal support of all, for it is rendering a needed service to all.

Social Service

It becomes increasingly clear that education cannot be divorced from social service. "That which God hath joined together, let not man put asunder". The union of education and service reaches its climax in Christian Education. Our program of Christian Education, if it is to be truly effective in producing a higher and better social order, must be adjusted to the social needs of the present age. Christian Education must have as its goal the all-important task of social reconstruction. If it wisely and faithfully performs this task, a more Christlike society will be the ultimate result.

In order to effect such a desirable status in a country such as ours, where there are many different racial, social, economic, and religious factors to be dealt with, there must be leaders in Christian Education of the broadest Christian culture and social vision, fully prepared in mind and heart to contribute to the Spiritual upbuilding of all men, regardless of natural or artificial differences.

More than ten years of devastating depression bringing unemployment to millions, resulting in continued public relief, destroying the self-respect of many, and weakening the morals of the nation, does not reflect great credit upon our attempts at Christianizing for service.

As Methodist Christians we should be inspired by the life and labors of John Wesley, who ministered to the physical, intellectual and social needs of the people to whom he preached the Gospel of personal redemption. As Methodist Christians we must refuse to pass by on the other side while millions for whom Christ gave His life are in misery. We should be stirred



to sympathetic interest and definite action in the presence of hunger, injustice, exploitation, and widespread unemployment.

As Methodist Christians we must stand for equal rights and complete justice for all people, in all stations of life; for the protection of both the individual and the family by the single standard of purity; for the inherent and God-given right of every child to have equal opportunity to develop religiously and to achieve the highest Christian personality of which he may be capable.

As Methodist Christians we believe that personality is the supreme value. Jesus evidently had this in mind, when He said, "What is a man profited if he gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" Because of its insistence upon the sacredness of human personality, Christianity has been a social force. It has released the transforming power of Christ, which, working out through transformed individuals, has resulted in social action that has, in part, transformed society.

As Methodist Christians we must repudiate war, and seek to discover and develop reasonable and sane methods of peace. War as we now know it is utterly destructive. It is the greatest social sin of modern times, a denial of the ideals of Christ, a violation of human personality, and a threat to civilization. A truly Christian nation will not endorse, support, or participate in war. If we are to be loyal followers of the Prince of Peace, we must put up the sword—"for they that take the sword shall perish with the sword."

As Methodist Christians we must stand against lynching, for whatever cause or whatever group, and support any and all legal efforts to stamp out this blot on our American civilization. We must stand for the protection of the social, civic, economic and religious rights of all men, regardless of race or religion, and we must use all honorable means to make this effective according to the Golden Rule and the teachings of Jesus.

Methodist Advance

Much forethought and good judgment was exercised at the Uniting Conference in Kansas City last Spring. Several speakers called attention to the fact that we must be careful that our increased numbers might not develop in us a sense of self-sufficiency; that, thinking of our large numbers, we might forget the lesson of Gideon's thirty-two thousand and God's three hundred. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit", saith the Lord of Hosts.

In order to safe-guard and to keep the church conscious of her need, the bishops and a committee were authorized to institute and carry forward what is now known as the Methodist Advance. This movement has met with large cities, leaving the hearts of thousands of Methodists warmed by their Dr. John B. Methodisten messages of fire.

Dr. John R. Mott's book, "Methodists United for Action", suggests that echo meetings be held in all the districts and churches. Some conferences vasses, pledging people to attend church services, and to strengthen their own spiritual convictions.

We are also urged, in the Advance, to begin organization of our Conferences, Districts, and churches according to the Plan of Unification. The reorganization plan will include the following: The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and its divisions; the Board of Education; the Board of Lay Activities; the Board of Hospitals and Homes, and, in due time, The Woman's Division of Christian Service.

Not only has the Methodist Advance gone forward under the inspiration of the sermons and addresses of the bishops, but the General Conference Board of Education has held several great rallies in the interest of the movement. These meetings have awakened interest in Church School attendance through the "Win Three Campaign." The Advance calls for study classes in all churches that we may inform ourselves concerning the Plan of Union and the new organization of the church. Unless this is done, there is danger of our taking on the new name, but holding to the old forms for lack of information. If we take the new name and fail to advance with the new church, we shall fail to keep apace with the great procession of Forward Methodism. Let us advance with the Church!

Evangelism

It is to be expected that the district superintendents, in their annual report, would say something about Evangelism, but it is also necessary that they say something about a revival in the life of the Church. Some one has said, "You cannot evangelize an unspiritual age with an unspiritual church." The church needs to live again in the power that made it invincible and caused many to cry out, "Men and brethren, what shall we do to be saved?"

Dr. Nathaniel F. Forsythe recently said, "My greatest concern is not the fact that thousands have left the church and church school, but that we have lost interest in people. Regain that, and we shall regain all members we have lost—and gain more."

No, we cannot interest others in what we are not interested in ourselves, or evangelize a world with an unevangelized church. The church needs a revival, and that for the sake of her own life. A revival in the church means a survival of the church. She needs to get through with evangelizing herself so that she may evangelize the world.

How many sermons are prepared to-day and preached with a view to convicting and converting unbelievers as compared with the number prepared and preached for reviving and reclaiming church members and making them active again! John Wesley once said, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist, either in Europe or in America, but I am afraid lest they should exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power, and this will undoubtedly be the case unless they hold fast both to the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which they first set out."

Evangelism is the responsibility of all who are saved, and the surest way to keep saved. It is only as we give ourselves away in service to others that we shall find ourselves, like well used talents, returning with multiplied power for larger service.

From the General Church comes the appeal for us to stress evangelism in every department of the church, and especially among the children and young people. During the days and seasons which naturally call attention to the birth, death, and resurrection of our Lord, we must be diligent in presenting His claim upon the life of all groups, in the home, in the church, and in the State. Miss Edith Walker, of our General Board of Education, says, "More and more the church and society are becoming aware of the tremendous importance of undergirding the life of every child with spiritual guidance."

So, may the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church claim the children, seek the wandering, save the lost, and then sing the oldest Christian Hymn extant:

"Shepherd of tender youth,
Guiding in love and truth
Through devious ways;
Christ, our triumphant King,
We come Thy Name to sing,
Hither our children bring
To shout Thy praise!"

Lay Activities

We meet here to-day as laymen and ministers of the Delaware Annual Conference. What memories, emotions and aspirations must well up in our souls as we recall the labors, sacrifices and services of those who laid the foundation upon which we are expected to build! A superstructure worthy not only of Methodism of the past, but of the privileges of the New Methodist Church.

We rejoice in the large recognition given to the women of the church in the organization of the new Board of Missions and Church Extension, in making provision within the Board for the Woman's Division of Christian Service. We believe this to be a just recognition of merit, and it gives to our women an opportunity to render service for which they are so well prepared, and which they love so much.

Recognizing also the importance of all the laity in the church, the New Church has made provision for greater activity of the laity, by organizing the Board of Lay Activities, the purpose of which is to deepen the spiritual life of the laymen of the church, and to secure among laymen an increasing loyalty to the cause of Christ.

There may be in every Jurisdiction a Jurisdictional Board of Lay Activities. There shall be in each Annual Conference a Conference Board of Lay Activities, composed of the Conference Lay Leader, who shall be the chairman of the Board, the District Lay Leaders, and two Associate District Lay Leaders from each District, and the District Superintendents of the Conference.

There shall be in each District a District Board of Lay Activities, composed of the District Lay Leader, who shall be chairman of the Board, two Associate District Lay Leaders, the District Superintendent, and the Lay Leader from each charge on the District. There are to be in every charge and in every church Lay Leaders. They shall co-operate with the pastor in giving full direction to the work of the Official Board; co-operate with the District

Lay Leader in the program of Lay Activities of the District, and make a written report annually to the Quarterly Conference, and to the District Lay Leader.

It is to be clearly seen that this arrangement ties up the laity with the ministry in the total program of the Church. Briefly, that program is to make the Lord Jesus known to all men in all lands as their Divine Saviour, to persuade them to become disciples, and to gather these disciples into the Christian Church; to enlist them in building the Kingdom of God, at home and abroad; to promote Christian Fellowship and Brotherhood in the Spirit of Christ around the world.

"The Son of God goes forth to war
A kingly crown to gain;
His blood-red banner streams afar:
Who follows in His train?"

"Quit you like men, be strong;
There's a burden to bear.
There's a grief to share,
There's a heart that breaks 'neath a load of care—
But fare ye forth with a song!

"Quit you like men, be strong;
There's a battle to fight,
There's a wrong to right,
There's a God who blesses the good with might—
So fare ye forth with a song!

"Quit you like men, be strong;
There's a work to do,
There's a world to make new,
There's a call to men who are brave and true—
On! On with a song!

"Quit you like men, be strong;
There's a year of grace,
There's a God to face,
There's another heat in the great race—
Speed; speed with a song!"

Finally, may we thank God again for the Grace wherewith we abound. May we hold sacredly ever our calling in Christ Jesus, and the privileges which that calling carries. May we surrender all to follow and to serve Him. May we count all things as refuse; indeed, all things as loss, for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus our Lord; that we may know Him, and the power of His Resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being and conformable to His death, if by any means we might attain unto the resurrection of the dead!

And to Him will be the glory, and the majesty, and the dominion, and the power, both now and forever. AMEN.

Charges

BRIDGEVILLE has built a new church. It is, perhaps, the first built by our group, in the New Methodist Church. It is handsome, well appointed. adequate for the needs of the coming congregation, a credit to Bridgeville and the Conference. D. G. Waters, the church builder, is the pastor. Paid on new church building \$1500; World Service \$25; other benevolences \$25; ministerial support \$1330. Increase in pastor's salary \$100.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, T. E. Randall, pastor, has lost several of its hest members, which has greatly affected the work. The report, however. shows an increase in World Service and other benevolences. World Service \$50; other benevolences \$40; Ministerial support \$920; Trustees \$75.

CHESTERTOWN gladly received J. A. Fassett and family. They have labored hard with a burdensome debt. Their efforts have brought success. The report shows \$135 raised on old debts, \$40 on World Service, other benevolences \$35. Ministerial support in advance of last year.

CHESWOLD has suffered reverses due to crop failures, prolonged unfavorable weather and a general lack of interest in the program of the church. F. T. Johnson has done his best to succeed, and deserves credit for his efforts. World Service \$20; other benevolences \$18; Ministerial support \$325; Trustees \$200.

CLARKSVILLE with C. W. Bagwell, pastor, has had fair success. World Service \$25; other benevolences \$25; Trustees \$75; Ministerial support \$750. Toward the end of the Conference year, the pastor becoming equscious of the scriptural declaration, "it is not good that man should be alone," took unto himself a wife.






ANNUAL REPORT DELAWARE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Tindley Temple Methodist Church, March 28, 1940.

By EARL H. CRAMPTON

I have the honor of making the Eighth Annual Report for our Conference Board of Education. The work has steadily advanced year by year in interest, effectiveness, and financial support. Our first year we raised \$195.00

It is well for us to keep in mind that a Conference Board of Education for the work. Last year we raised \$2300.00. is responsible for the total program of Christian education in the Annual Conference as represented by the three divisions; namely, Educational Institutions, Local Church, and Editorial. This was stressed at the Methodist



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Conference on Christian Education in the Local Church held at Nashville, Tennessee last December.

Our Conference was represented by the Executive Secretary and Chairman.

The changes at Morgan College are so recent that we are not in a position to say very much about the plans for the College under State control. It does seem certain that the old Board of Trustees of Morgan College have established a Religious Foundation at Morgan; this Foundation being the continuation of Methodist responsibility for a religious program in a student continuation of Methodist responsibility for a religious program in a student group of 670. A special committee has been authorized to contact both the group of 670 a Special committee has been authorized to contact both the washington and Delaware Conferences, relative to the proposed erection of a \$100,000 plant for Christian education and work.

What Christian Education Involves

We believe Christian education involves (1) A belief in God; two purposes for mankind, and that He has made us in His image, with the power to become His sons and grow in His likeness. (2) A belief in Young People. A conviction that they are capable of sharing in God's purposes. (3) A belief in educational evangelism which is capable of leading young people to know God and of bringing them into closer relationship with Him. (4) We believe adults, as well as young people can grow.

Youth Coming to the Front

Everywhere we look today we find Youth coming to the front. The thing that impresses one today about Youth is the belief they have in themselves and in their power to change conditions. This trend is seen in all Youth gatherings whether they be secular, socialistic, communistic, or religious. Young people today are not as cynical, materialistic, reckless, as they were ten years ago. Shocked into soberness by the shaking of the foundations of society and the threatened collapse of many of our institutions, both youth and age no longer find themselves sure that they have all the answers. They are looking for something. If there is really a way, we must discover it.

We believe the Church of Jesus Christ especially should take note of what is happening today in the world of Youth. In a confused world, such as ours, it is natural that young people find many different objects for their loyalties, and unless the Church has something to say to Young People which is true enough to command their assent, compelling enough to challenge them to follow a course of action which really counts for a better world, we will find Youth slipping out of our hands.

The Epworth League of other days met in protest to consider what they could do to get rid of the "old people" who insisted upon attending the young people's meeting. And even today there is a feeling on the part of lems of life without adult interference. We believe that both young and conviction is shared by the leaders planning the new Methodist Church, for important Boards and Committees that make up the New Church.

We Look at our Job.

In our own Conference, we have been using Youth's fine enthusiasm and abilities for the work of the Kingdom. We have tried to seek out possible encouraged inter-racial fellowship through worship, conferences, banquets. Schools, and in one Church in Brooklyn a Week Day Bible School was conducted, running from October to April. The Annual Youth Conference always attracts a large number of young people.

Beginning with the new Conference year, the Board plans to put into the field beside the Executive Secretary, a part-time director of youth work and age groups.

This staff of two or three, under the direction of the Executive Secretary will supervise, direct, promote and intensify Christian education in the Conference. We advise an early setting-up of the Board of Education in the Local Church as prescribed in paragraph 1133 in the New Discipline.

An Appreciation.


We wish to express our appreciation to the pastors and lay leaders who cooperated with the Conference Board of Education during the year. In this you have shown vision and statesmanship for the Joint Committee on Christian Education in the Local Church has this to say about Christian education. "There is no other work which the Church has to do which can possibly be so necessary to its own future or in fact, to the future of civilization." We also rejoice that Bishop Jones is deeply interested in our work and according to a news item in the Southwestern Christian Advocate, Bishop Jones will propose among other things at the coming Jurisdictional Conference an annual budget in Christian education for this jurisdiction amounting to \$24,000; and the placing of College trained young people into the field as counselors, and workers in Christian education.

When the Future of the Church is Safe.

It was Phillips Brooks who said in speaking of Christ, "I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that were ever built, and all the kings that ever sat upon thrones, never influenced the world as did this lone person." We believe it and want our children to believe it; yet they must go out and face a world in which right does not always seem to triumph, and where the philosophy of their elders does not teach them that it will—even eventually.

The words of Phillips Brooks may be easily accepted with the mind, but denied by the life because the world is too much with us. Perhaps our biggest opportunity is to make truth real through the lives of men and women who exemplify truth. Then we can say to Youth "No matter what the world says; no matter what seems to happen; Right does make might, the world says; matter what seems to happen; Right does make might, spiritual power will triumph; man becomes great through sacrifice for others." If we can say that and make young people believe it, the future of the Church is safe in their hands.

REPORT, SCHOOL MINISTERIAL TRAINING

Dear Bishop Jones and Brethren:-

Unless we face more seriously the situation which confronts us relative to securing adequately trained men for the conference, the logic of the facts shows that within a very few years, we shall be compelled to do something quite drastic, if we are to carry forward the work assigned us.

The raising of the standard for admission into the conference to that of graduation from an accredited college or its equivalent, places us in the difficult position of finding such young men. Because of the sparsity of men who meet this standard, we are in grave danger of being compelled either to lower the standard for admission, or to continue to utilize for service, the accepted supplies. Neither of these contingencies is desirable. There are two other possible alternatives from which recruits may be drawn, that from other denominations and by transfers. No mere sensitiveness or unwarranted conference pride should prevent us from facing reality, and where ever we can secure men who can meet the test and do the work, they should be cordially accepted and welcomed. We should however keep the standard at the level designated by our church. We should encourage by promotion whenever possible the men within our ranks who have prepared themselves, through sacrifice and toil, and then if we have exhausted this supply, rather than utilizing men insufficiently equipped, we should extend open arms to others who are equipped to share with us the high privilege to serve in so great a cause.

The challenge is imperious and the call commanding, many of our sister denominations, especially in the large urban centers and even elsewhere, are placing in their pulpits some of the best trained men of our group, who are gradually attracting the attention of the community. We will not be able to hold our own, not to say compete, unless we adopt something of this strategy. We either have not enough well trained, alert consecrated men or perhaps not enough of this class have the opportunity they should have. The appeal of the hour is more and better men for better service, and unless we rise to this sacred emergency, we will be outstripped and forced into an inferior place of leadership, however reluctantly we accept it, while others will forge ahead and occupy the stations which rightfully belong to us, because of our intimate relationship to the great mother church, and the traditions of an educated ministry which has been transmitted to us in an unbroken line from our great founder John Wesley.

Pastoral Record.

I desire now to call your attention to a restudy of my report in the minutes of 1939 and especially to the part which attempts to tabulate the losses and gains within the conference membership, and the seriousness we face with respect to the possibility of securing new recruits for the ministrypages 426 to 428 inclusive, then using these figures as a background. I desire to present another set of simple statistics from a different angle, the purport of which is an attempt to answer the question, at least in part, why so many young men appear indifferent to the call of the christian ministry. If we can find an answer, we may in some sense relieve the tension and open a way that will become more inviting, and through which we may obtain a larger response than formerly.

From a study of the pastoral record of a number of men taken at random, it appears that

Record (1) Of those who have served in the conference from five to ten years-21 changed their appointments from 1 to 5 times.

Record (2) Of those who have served from 11 to 20 years, 25 men changed from 1 to 9 times.

Record (3) Of those who served from 21 to 30 years, 41 men changed from 1 to 11 times.

Record (4) Of those who served from 31 to 40 years or more, 48 men changed from 1 to 23 times.

These figures seem to indicate:-

First--That there are fewer changes in the earlier stages of ones ministry than later, due perhaps to the fact that he hopes for a better day in the near future, and thus only gradually shifts until he receives a better

Second-The longer one stays in the ministry, the more frequently he changes, due, perhaps, among other reasons that as he matures, he feels his chances for a better appointment slowly decreases, so he keeps shifting until he becomes relatively well fixed and achieves a fairly

Third—The highest rate of change is during the period from 31 to 40 or more years of service. The chances for better appointments again decrease greatly and in proportion to the relative health of body and strength of mind which the minister at this period of life possesses. There may be other reasons for these different changes at these various age levels, which only the cabinet may know and all of which may be more or less valid.


It also appears that there are more than high salaried men. One man changed 14 times in 36 years of service than high salaried men. One man changed 23 times and never attained a respectable salary, while another man changed 23 times in 40 years and hardly ever received a living wage.

The pastoral record made note of the various changes in the appointments from year to year, and it also showed a gradual increase in the number of changes as one grows older, it also reveals that these changes gave these men better appointments until they reached the possible period of retirement, which was about 45 years of service. All this indicates a gradually increasing restlessness in the conference until better appointments are attained, this the conference has sought to do, whenever possible. It also appears that in a very large sense every man makes his own appointment, and that there is no possible way to keep him back, if he is willing to wait and pay the price of sacrifice and conscientious toil. The wage scale also substantiates these same findings. There appears to be a gradual increase of salary in proportion to the fact whether one is trained or not; although the mere possession of a college and seminary degree is not necessarily the passport to success. Some of the men in these scales are highly certificated but are little short of failures, while others with no certification at all are outstanding successes, which again implies that the man himself determines whether he is a

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT FOR 1940

Social Service is the watchword of the hour and present complex social conditions make it incumbent that all agencies interested in human welfare be alert to render such assistance as may be needed.

The Church, as an institute of humanity must be in the forefront in all problems that affect human personality.

Your committee is glad to report that the heads of great denominations are speaking out in no uncertain terms as regards the irritations of our social organism. This indicates that the church of our Lord is observant of the social trends which affect the whole life of the people.

It is very significant how the Federal Legislation during the last few years has touched nearly every pronouncement and declaration issued by the churches, to the end, that they might become operative in the nations life, The time is past for dealing with our critical condition in pious generalities, but it is high time for concreting them in definite action.

We first desire to call your attention to the fundamental importance of the home. If there is a breakdown here, it will be hard pulling for the church and the school.

We call upon the people of our churches to do what they can to develop Christian Homes where God is acknowledged-where the Bible is readwhere Prayer and supplication are needed to be made. The home is the basis of strategic operation in the social realm; and therefore, must receive our most serious consideration.

We recognize the claims of the Christian Sabbath and issue the warning that its sanctity is being violated more and more. The Church cannot compromise with an invasion of the Lord's Day that violates its fundamental principles of worship and rest.

We ask our churches to carry out P. 1699 of the Discipline, "recommending that our Pastors give the Lord's Day the place it deserves in the educational and preaching program of the church, and that our District Superintendents be requested to bring this vital concern to the attention of the Quarterly Conferences in an effort to make the Lord's Day a Holy Day

The unemployment situation is still alarming; what appears to be good instead of a holiday." times is probably the result of inflation.

We call upon our churches especially in the great centers of population to have agencies within the local church to be on the alert for opportunities to make contacts with those who can employ our people.

We regret that the period of wage earning has been cut down. Men and women are being eliminated at earlier periods; according to statistics, there are now seven and a half million men and women in the United States who are sixty-five years of age or older; by 1970 there will be more than fifteen million of this age group in this country; hence the emphasis being

Plans were progressing to celebrate the Twentieth Anniversary Session authorized by the Commission in 1938.



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

WILLIAM H. COFFEY, JR.

The Rev. William Coffey, Jr., son of the Rev. William H. Coffey, D. D., and Mrs. W. H. Coffey, was born in Salisbury, Md., Aug. 10th, 1890. At the changed forever thereafter. DR. ALLAN MacROSSIE

Few men in our generation have been called upon to face the responsibility of the task of changing an effete and traditional method of training its ministers into a modern system of training, and performed the duty so satisfactorily and thoroughly as did Dr. Allan MacRossie. Under the direction of the Commission on Conference Courses of Study of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, he was assigned the delicate task of shaping a new course of study for our ministers, in which he was required to conserve all of the values of the old system, which had the sanction of usage and age, and to develop a new plan which would gear into our ever growing and changing newer methods of education, incident to a constantly expanding society. He guided gradually the training of the young ministers with skill,

discretion and statesman like leadership, so that it changed from the mere formal question asking and imperfect examinations a few hours at the seat through out the year for four years in which the young student studied his intimate companionship for a period of ten days each year on some colschools for the benefit of all, who had previously completed their formal.

He founded an institution, unique in its conception, adequate in its adaptations to present day educational needs, and eminently successful in its promotion. He was largely responsible for raising the standard of admission into the conference, from the low requirements of an high school education to that of graduation from an accredited college or its equivalent, as the minimum.

For 24 years he worked incessantly and sacrificially in the church for the highest educational standards for the ministry and at no time, did he desire to offer to us any one, as either teacher or special lecturer, who did nor share his catholicity.

He knew nothing of racial prejudice, and was careful to send among us the same type and character of men whom he sent to the best favored conferences in the church.

In person, he was simple in tastes, apparently outwardly austere, but inwardly deeply emotional. The humblest could easily approach him and feel at home. He was tender, considerate, thoughtful and sympathetic toward the gracious lady in the parsonage, and often with glowing uplifted smiling face, when the leaders in this movement were 1000 miles from home at the Christmas Conference, would he pray that God would bless and preserve these women and return their companions unharmed again to the loving embrace of their homes.

He was an aristocrat in thought and feeling and behavior, a puritan and gentleman in spirit, and a christian in his personal life. He loved his Maker and desired the brethren to share his own beautiful experience. May one of the world's classics be not inappropriate.

MRS. ADALINE BROOKS HORSEY



All the members of the conference who were alive in the year 1881, the year I joined, have died except three, these are: Rev. T. B. H. Coleman, retired; Dr. J. R. Waters and myself, J. H. Nutter. To me it is remarkable that of the only two other survivors, one, Rev. T. B. H. Coleman gave me my license to exhort; and the other, Dr. J. R. Waters gave me license to preach, and under his pastorate I was recommended for admission in the conference. I call them my Fathers in the ministry, and I love and honor them as such, and they love and honor me as their son in the ministry.

Since I joined the Delaware Conference, 191 members have died. I knew most of them.

I have answered the annual roll call fifty-nine times consecutively without ever having being absent or tardy.

Mrs. Annie E. Nutter, my wife, has served with me all these years; longer than any other minister's wife with her husband in the whole history of the Delaware Conference.

I am glad to be present today. I am praising God for the growing spirit of Christian unification, and the new and great Methodist Church. I am praying that the United Methodist Church may receive a Pentecostal Baptism of the Holy Spirit, continue to increase in power and numbers and go forward to spread Scriptural Holiness over all the earth.

HISTORY OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE

The old Philadelphia Conference covered all the territory of the Peninsula, including all of Delaware, the nine counties of Maryland, and two counties of Virginia. In this territory the white members were organized into the Wilmington Conference. Its boundary began at the Pennsylvania and Delaware line.

The Delaware Conference was within an unlimited territory except with a western boundary, the Susquehanna River, until the Organization of the Delaware Conference.

The Pastors of the Old Philadelphia Conference administered the spiritual work of our group. They married our people, baptized the children and administered the Communion. These pastors reported to the Quarterly and the Annual Conferences.

In some districts there were more colored than white members. The Local Preachers were made by the Quarterly Conferences of the Philadelphia Conference, to which they reported.

Our people sat in the galleries of the white churches. At the close of the service the white people, some of them, would wait and hear our men preach. Sometimes the fire would come down, and white and colored would sing and shout together, shake hands, embrace and shout "Glory Hallelyah".

Before the organization of the Annual Conference, the Local Preachers organized the Local Conference, for the purpose to give each one a good standing, so that they would have a place to preach Sundays.

Organization of the Delaware Conference met at John Wesley Methodist Episcopal Church, Philadelphia, Pa., July 29th, 1864, twenty in number: Wilmore S. Elzey, Frost Pullett, James Davis, Samuel Dale, Harrison Smith, John G. Manluff, Simon Taylor, Benjamin Gibbs, Isaiah Broughton, Joshua Brinkley, Charles Pullett, Abraham Brown, Wesley J. Parker, John Saunders, Samuel G. Waters, William B. Green, Stephen P. Whittington, Nathan Young, Jehu Pearce and Isaac Hinson. These men were Pioneers. They were the first to be organized into the Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The Washington Conference was Organized about a month later. They hardly knew what to answer, or realized what it meant when they were asked, "Will you go where you are sent?" Most of them had good homes, splendid families, farms and congenial neighbors. All of these had to be given up. About this time battles were being fought around Richmond and Petersburg, Va. They took their lives in their hands, they had heard the call of God "Go preach my Gospel," Lo I am with you always, Be not afraid.

The Conference was divided into three Districts. The Bishop appointed Wilmore S. Elzey to the Choptank District, Harrison Smith to the Philadelphia District and Nathan Young to the Salisbury District. The boundaries of the Districts were fixed, Circuits were formed. The pastors were not far apart. On the old Annemessick circuit, Frost Pullet was Senior, and Samuel J. Waters, Junior Pastors.

There were very few churches, the most important gathering was the quarterly meeting, people from far and wide would attend, every one wanted to see the Presiding Elder, the man to be feared by both preachers and people, every member was expected to be present. Every class leader would have in his possession as many Love Feast tickets as there were members in his class, every member had to qualify. To secure a ticket, regular attendance to the Class Meetings and other services of the church were required. Friday night before the Love Feast was General Class Love Feast, one hour. The doors were shut, no late ones admitted.

Camp meetings. Our group followed the white group, Revival meetings were held at the close of the Camps. Great numbers were saved.

No set of men worked harder than the preachers of that day. They had to furnish their own transportation. Those who did go on horseback, had to walk more than thirty miles. There were no parsonages. sent their donation. We are better off now. The magnificent churches; The commodious parsonages; the increased salaries; the growth in membership; the trained preachers.

I spoke of the financial condition as it relates to the preachers. When the World Service drive came including Pensions and Relief, the board at Chicago asked the Delaware Conference if it would find a man to canvass the Conference, they would underwrite his expenses. The lot fell on me. I went and returned, bringing the fund up to eight thousand dollars plus. Again the Board sent word to Bishop J. F. Berry, saying if the Conference would give them the same man they would again underwrite his expenses. Bishop J. F. Berry told me he would start with a subscription of five hundred dollars. I again accepted the challenge, rolled up my sleeves and went at it again. This time I brought the fund up to more than twenty thousand dollars. To last Conference, we had invested \$22,285.40. Last year of the Jubilee \$1,632.30. Total \$2,397.70. We now have invested \$23,937.70. If the men pay as the law requires, we will have more than \$30,000.00 when the Conference closes.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute.

(8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

a non-departable motion shall be decided without added.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons tion is put shall give his vote.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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


