

# CONFERENCE EXAMINERS AND EXAMINATIONS

- (1) The Conference course of study shall be of four years duration and in five groups of subjects as follows:
  - (a) Practical Theology.
  - (b) Christian Theology.
  - (c) Church History.

- (2) The president shall, not later than one week after the adjournment of Conference, appoint a committee of six to be known as the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. Of these, one shall be appointed as chairman and one each as examiner in "a," "b," "c," "d" and "e" to examine all classes.
- (3) The Chairman shall serve for one year. At the expiration of that time examiner "a" shall become chairman and the president shall appoint a new examiner "a." So in order "b," "c," "d" and "e" shall become chairman. The president annually appointing an examiner in the place of him who becomes chairman.
- (4) Each examiner may examine students at any time during the Conference year when mutually convenient. Each examiner shall report on each student annually to the committee, who shall thereupon make its recommendations to the Conference.
- (5) The Committee shall submit its recommendation concerning application for admission and ordination on Saturday Morning.

#### FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY

#### MORNING

The One Hundred and Ninth Session of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church was opened at nine o'clock in Alumni Hall, Western Maryland College, Westminster, Maryland; President Edgar A. Sexsmith, D.D., leading the devotional service.

Devotions. The Conference joined in singing Hymn 418, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," after which the President read the scripture selection; Ephesians, chapter three. Prayer was offered by E. D. Stone.

Roll Call. The Conference roll of ministers and laymen was called by the Secretary. A greeting from Brother Avery Donovan, who has been ill for three years was read in response to his name. The following names were transferred to the Memorial Roll: P. W. Crosby, G. R. Donaldson, C. K. McCaslin, W. S. Hanks, and B. W. Kindley.

Memorial Roll and Memorial Service. The Memorial Roll was read by W. B. Judefind. Obituaries of members who died during the conference year were read in the order of their decease, by the chairmen of the committees. J. H. Straughn read the obituary of P. W. Crosby. L. B. Smith read the obituary of G. R. Donaldson. The obituary of C. K. McCaslin was read by H. L. Elderdice. G. A. Ogg read the obituary of W. S. Hanks. The obituary of B. W. Kindley was read by George Hines. The Conference stood for a moment in silent tribute to our departed brethren. C. E. Dryden led in prayer.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. This service was conducted by the President, assisted by members of the Conference.

Conference Sermon. The scripture was read by C. M. Adams, (Selection from Ephesians 2.) The sermon was preached by C. C. Day. The topic: "Vital Christianity." The text was Gal. 2:20, "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." Following the sermon, C. B. Robey led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn 330, "Jesus I love thy charming name."

Closing. After an announcement by the President, the benediction was pronounced by B. F. Ruley.

#### AFTERNOON

Conference was called to order at 2 o'clock by the President. E. D. Stone led the Conference in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." G. E. Leister led in prayer.

Roll Call. The Secretary, W. F. Wright, called the roll of the Conference.

Report of the Committee on Credentials and Report of the Secretary.

All credentials were properly made out and filed with the Secretary. (Report B)

Report of the President. J. H. Straughn was asked to take the chair, and then the President read his report reviewing the work of the Conference and the achievements of the past year.

Reference was made and tribute paid to the ministers and wives of ministers who died during the year. Under official acts, changes were made in the pastoral supply of the following charges: Mt. Nebo, Doylesburg, St. Luke's, Wesley Chapel of Kent, and Fairfax. The itinerancy of the President indicated the attention given to the charges of the Conference which entails much travel and work along with the superintendency of the Church Extension Society.

The Conference was urged to continue the support of various affiliated organizations engaged in moral reform and general mission work.

The Maryland Conference interests were reviewed with reference to the following: the Church Home, the Superannuate Fund, Mutual Relief Society, Deaconess Work, the Summer Conference, the Maryland Conference Council of Religious Education, Group Insurance, Church Extension, Headquarters Building, increased pastoral support, local church achievements, membership and conversions. A brief statement was made concerning the general church interests. The work of St. John's Board of Beneficience and the Pipe Creek Benevolence Society and private bequests were mentioned. Eight recommendations were made. Appreciation for cooperation was expressed.

The President's character was passed and the report was referred to the Committee on President's Report. (Report A)

Standing Committees. The list of standing committees was read by the President.

Report of the Program Committee. The printed program was distributed and adopted.

Bar of the Conference. The bar of the Conference was ordered to include all seats on the main floor of the auditorium.

#### Election of Officers:

1. President-J. H. Straughn was asked to preside at the election of the president.

Ballots were distributed. Roll was called for return of votes. The count of ballots. Total ballots cast 203, necessary to choice 102. E. A. Sexsmith 148, E. L. Bunce 30, L. B. Smith 19, R. Y. Nicholson 2, W. F. Wright 1, C. C. Day 1, E. D. Stone 1, R. L. Shipley 1.

E. A. Sexsmith declared elected and presented to the Conference by the presiding officer, J. H. Straughn. President Sexsmith fittingly addressed the Conference in appreciation of the election and the office, pledging himself to the tasks invoved.

- 2. Secretary. Motion passed that the assistant secretary cast the ballot for W. F. Wright as secretary. The Assistant Secretary, J. W. Townsend, cast the ballot electing the secretary.
- 3. Treasurer. On motion, Secretary cast ballot electing C. F. Cummins as treasurer.

Address. F. G. Holloway introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Arlo Ayres Brown, President of Drew University, Madison, New Jersey, who addressed the Conference on the subject: "The Teaching Church."

Conference sang Hymn No. 5, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." The benediction was pronounced by T. G. Betschler.

## SECOND DAY, THURSDAY

Opening. The President called the Conference to order at nine o'clock. Conference sang Hymn 321, "My Jesus, I Love Thee." J. P. Dodge led in prayer.

Roll Call. The Secretary called the roll of those who had not previously answered a roll call of this Conference session.

Reading of Minutes. The minutes were read by the Secretary and adopted.

Report of Maryland Educational Endowment Society and Special Committee. N. O. Gibson read the report which was adopted. (Report I-1)

Report of Tellers: Committee on Appeals. The following were elected: E. L. Bunce, J. H. Straughn, J. N. Link, J. P. Dodge, N. J. Parks, R. S. Jett.

Report of Tellers: Standing District Committee. The following were elected: E. C. Makosky, E. D. Stone, W. H. Litsinger, J. H. Baker, W. C. Scott, F. M. Benson.

Anti-Saloon League Representative. On motion, Mr. G. W. Crabbe, Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Maryland, was granted the privilege of addressing the Conference. Mr. Crabbe spoke of existing conditions in connection with the liquor traffic and the dispensary business; requesting the support of Christian people in this fight for righteousness.

Report of the Agent of President's Parsonage. The report was read by the Secretary and referred to the Committee on Audit. (Report A-2)

Partial Report of the Committee on President's Report. H. C. Burkins read the partial report approving recommendation eight: to appoint a committee to deal with the Board of Administration program and fixing an order of the day for its report to Conference. Adopted. (Report A-1)

Report of Conference Trustees and Headquarters Refunding Campaign Committee. E. C. Makosky read the report calling for a change of time of the annual meeting and authorization of the Board of Trustees to handle finances as may be deemed necessary. The report of the Headquarters Building indicated a greatly improved condition financially. On motion, the Secretary cast the ballot for trustees electing: G. W. Haddaway, W. B. Judefind, F. G. Usilton, W. C. Scott. (Report D)

Report of Westminster Theological Seminary. H. L. Elderdice submitted the report which was referred, without reading, to the proper committee.

Introductions. The following brethren were introduced to the Conference: Rev. F. W. Stephenson, D.D., Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Methodist Protestant Church; Rev. Crates S. Johnson, D.D., Editor of Sunday School Literature of the Methodist Protestant Church; Rev. E. J. Rees, D.D., pastor of Wilson Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Baltimore, and Mr. Irving Pollit, a prominent layman of the Presbyterian Church, Baltimore.

Report of Special Committee on Church Libraries. H. C. Burkins read the report which made definite recommendations concerning church libraries and requested an appropriation to conduct the work of a library commission. J. E. Cummings spoke asking the taking up of the report by items. L. B. Smith, J. F. Bryan, E. C. Makosky spoke.

Report adopted, referring the item of the appropriation to the Board of Finance. (Report S)

Report on Legal Papers. Read by the Secretary stating that some papers have been received and properly filed. (Report T)

Quiet Hour. The quiet hour was led by the President. After the singing of a hymn there was a period of silent prayer. Conference sang "Let the Beauty of Jesus be Seen in Me." A. E. Woodward led in prayer. President Sexsmith spoke of the influence of the Spirit of God in us and suggested the possibilities of God's will fulfilled in the Conference and its churches. W. A. Melvin led in prayer. After the singing of another hymn, volunteer prayers were offered by the laity of the Conference. The devotions closed with the singing of another hymn.

Address, President General Conference, J. H. Straughn, D.D. Dr. Straughn greeted the Conference with a general statement, followed by a review of the General Conference funds for superannuates and Methodist Union. He then presented an official communication from the Board of Administration, which met recently in Atlantic City, and explained the reasons for these papers.

General Conference Representative. Rev. F. W. Stephenson, D.D., official representative of the General Conference, was permitted to address the Conference. He spoke of the leadership of the church and the challenge of the new program, using as his theme, the slogan adopted by the Board of Administration, "A Fellowship Crusade."

Announcements. President Sexsmith announced the appointment of a special committee to consider the message from the Denominational Board of Administration.

Presentation of Missionary Activities Among the Churches. Mrs. J. P. Dodge, of the Washington-Virginia Branch, spoke of the work in that district.

Mrs. Miriam B. Matthews, President of the Maryland Branch, spoke

of the work in that district.

Miss Grace Armstrong, of our Eutaw Church, spoke of her call to the mission field.

Dr. G. W. Haddaway, Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions, spoke of the general missionary activities.

Announcements. Various announcements were made of committee meetings and the Conference sessions for the afternoon and evening.

Benediction. N. O. Gibson pronounced the benediction.

#### **EVENING**

The evening session began at half-past seven with the President presiding.

Service of Song. E. D. Stone led the song service. A special selection was rendered by the Eutaw Young People's Choir. Prayer was offered by G. W. Haddaway. The offering was received. Congregation sang another hymn.

Address. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, minister of the Baptist Temple, Philadelphia, and president of the World Christian Endeavor Society, was presented to the Conference by the President.

The subject of Dr. Poling's address was "The Answer to the Statement, 'The world is headed for self destruction and moving fast' is Jesus Christ."

Closing. Conference joined in singing Hymn 195, "Jesus Shall Reign." Dr. E. J. Rees, pastor of Wilson Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Baltimore, led in the closing prayer.

#### THIRD DAY, FRIDAY

#### MORNING

Opening. The Conference was called to order by the President. Conference sang hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Prayer was offered by L. B. Smith.

Roll Call. The Secretary called the roll of those who have not answered at this session.

Reading of the Minutes. The minutes were read and adopted.

Requests for Superannuate Relationship. J. F. Bryan presented the request of F. M. Clift for superannuation. Motion was passed to grant the request and refer his case to the Committee on Superannuates.

L. B. Smith presented the request of G. M. Clayton for a superannuated relationship. Motion was passed to grant the request and refer his case to the Committee on Superannuates. Committee to Visit Our Sick Brethren. A motion was passed that the President appoint a committee to visit Brother Avery Donovan and Brother G. M. Clayton.

Report of Summer Conference. The report was read by J. E. Cummings and adopted with the item regarding the appropriation being referred to the Board of Finance. (Report O)

Personal Privilege. J. N. Link spoke asking an opportunity for a fuller presentation of the work of the Summer Conference. Motion to do so passed.

Report of the Committee on Jewish Work. The report was read by the secretary. Rev. F. L. Hertzfeld, city missionary and social worker of Baltimore, was introduced to the Conference and permitted to speak of his work in Baltimore. The report was adopted with reference of the financial request to the Board of Finance. (Report V)

Introductions. Rev. W. H. Best, Presiding Elder of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; Rev. Charles F. Phillips, Pastor of the Frederick Avenue M. E. Church, South, Baltimore; and Dr. W. W. Davis, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance were presented to the Conference.

Lord's Day Alliance Representative. Dr. Davis, the representative of the Lord's Day Alliance, addressed the Conference, telling of the need of people becoming Sabbath conscious and the question of gambling in the state. A motion was passed to comply with the request of Dr. Davis in the appointment of representatives in connection with this work. L. B. Smith and G. W. Haddaway spoke. The matter was referred to the committee on moral reform.

Quiet Hour. General prayer was offered by T. C. Mulligan after the singing of a hymn. A special prayer in behalf of the sick and suffering was offered by W. H. Litsinger. The Conference sang hymn "Sweet Hour of Prayer." K. K. Haddaway led in a prayer of praise and thanksgiving. The hymn "Come ye that love the Lord" was sung by the Conference. A prayer for wisdom and divine guidance was offered by Dr. W. H. Best, Presiding Elder of the M. E. Church, South.

Report of the Committee on Pulpit Supply. F. B. Bailey, chairman of the committee on pulpit supply read the report which was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Christian Literature and Education. E. C. Woodward, secretary of the committee, read the report. Representatives of the various institutions and interests were presented to the Conference and asked to address the Conference.

Rev. R. L. Shipley, D. D., Editor of the Methodist Protestant Recorder, spoke of the Board of Administration Plan to increase the circulation and the splendid literary contributions to the paper.

Rev. C. S. Johnson, D. D., Editor of the Sunday School Literature of the Methodist Protestant Church, told of the publications for use in our Sunday Schools.

Rev. F. G. Holloway, D. D., President of the Western Maryland Col-

lege, addressed the conference on the subject of the place of Christian Education in influencing the nation, and the work of the college.

Rev. H. L. Elderdice, D. D., President Emeritus of Westminster Theological Seminary, spoke in the absence of Dr. Forlines, concerning the Seminary.

Rev. E. C. Makosky, D. D., spoke for the Board of Education.

The entire report was adopted. (Report I)

Introductions. Rev. T. H. Tees, D. D., Pastor of the Old St. George's Church of Philadelphia, and Rev. Horace Miller, assistant pastor of the church, were introduced.

Church Extension Society Meeting. The Conference gave way to the Church Extension Society for its annual meeting, a regular order of the day.

Mutual Relief Association. The Mutual Relief Association held its regular annual meeting as scheduled in the conference program.

Message from Rev. T. H. Tees, D. D., Philadelphia, Pa. The Conference session was resumed and the President asked J. H. Straughn to present Dr. Tees in order that he might speak concerning the Old St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, Pa., the oldest Methodist edifice in America and the second oldest in the world.

Announcements. Committee meetings were announced for the afternoon.

President Holloway extended an invitation to an informal reception in McDaniel Hall Lounge Saturday evening.

Benediction. F. B. Bailey pronounced the benediction.

#### EVENING

Service of Song. The President at the evening session which began at 7:35 with a song service led by E. D. Stone. G. I. Humphreys led in prayer. Stephen Galley sang a solo, a selection of his own composition entitled "Mercy Seat." The offering was received. Mr. Charles Reiner sang the selection, "Hear my cry, O Lord."

#### BUSINESS SESSION

The President called the conference to order at 8:12 P. M.

Report of the Special Committee on Fellowship Crusade. The report was read by J. L. Green, secretary of the committee. The committee concurred in the recommendations of the Board of Administration, and recommended the launching of the Fellowship Crusade in the Maryland Conference.

The President of the General Conference was permitted to speak in regard to the report and the general plan as projected. The Secretary was asked to take the chair while the President spoke on the report.

The report was taken up by items, each item being adopted, and the report then adopted as a whole. (Report W)

Personal Privilege. Dr. Straughn requested to be excused from further attendance upon the Conference because of his official duties which demanded his presence elsewhere. He made a further statement in regard to the general church and the new program of the church. He told of the Methodist Protestant Group who plan to go to the Universal Christian Council at Oxford, England, this summer and the import of this conference to the Protestant Church.

The request for absence was granted.

Appointment of Committee. A committee was appointed by the President to visit Brother Clayton and Brother Donovan.

The committee consists of:

Conference Adjourned, in order that pictures of High Point Children's Home might be shown.

#### FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY

#### MORNING

Opening. President Sexsmith called the Conference to order at nine o'clock. Conference sang Hymn 348, "Jesus, Lover of my soul." F. A. Holland led in prayer.

Reading of the Minutes. Minutes were read by the Journal Secretary and adopted.

Announcements. The treasurer announced the appointment of G. E. Leister as assistant treasurer and W. F. Bauscher as clerk.

An invitation from Western Maryland College to hold the 1938 Session of Conference at the college was extended.

Resolution: Associate Committee Members. The Secretary read the resolution for associate committee members.

The president asked R. L. Shipley to take the chair while he spoke to the resolution. G. W. Haddaway spoke. President Sexsmith resumed the chair and called attention to a conflict with the Manual Regulations. E. C. Makosky spoke. L. B. Smith moved to substitute that the young men of the Conference who are not already members of committees be invited to sit in on committee meetings as auditors. The substitute was adopted. (Resolution 3)

J. H. Straughn was then asked to preside.

Resolution: The Strawbridge Shrine Association. A resolution was passed to approve the purpose of this association and the appointing of the following as our representatives in the association: C. E. Dryden, A. W. Ewell, Dr. T. H. Legg, C. E. Easterday. (Resolution 2)

Report of Committee on Pastoral Support. The committee reported a total increase of \$6,242 in pastor's salaries this year and recommended the continued increase throughout the conference. (Report V)

Report of the Memorial Day Committee. The committee met and reported a growing interest in this program. A lot was acquired for the purpose of a burial place of Dr. W. S. Hanks' body. R. L. Shipley, chairman of the committee, spoke and appealed for the interests as set forth in the report. He told of the case of Dr. Hanks burial and requested the collection of funds to pay for a memorial marker at the grave. Conference granted the privilege and a collection for this purpose was taken. Collection amounted to \$71.75.

The report was adopted. (Report R)

Report of the Committee on Evangelism. T. J. Turkington, secretary of the committee, made the report which urged an emphasis upon Evangelism suggesting opportunities among the unconverted and the inactive members of our churches. The committee recommends a definite campaign of evangelism throughout the Conference this year. Hearty endorsement was given to the "Won by One" campaign, and other worthwhile methods that may be employed.

A motion was made to adopt the report. Report held in abeyance until after the Quiet Hour.

Quiet Hour. Conference sang "Rescue the Perishing." R. S. Jett and L. W. Gordon led in prayer. Conference sang, "Jesus is Calling." W. G. Munroe led in prayer. Conference sang "Remember Me." E. D. Stone spoke of the joy of saving souls. Conference sang, "Jesus, let Thy Pitying Eye."

Continued Report: Committee on Evangelism. W. G. Munroe spoke of the need of evangelism in and through the Sunday Schools. J. L. Ward spoke of the projected Gypsy Smith Evangelistic Campaign in Baltimore, September 26 to October 10, 1937. A motion was passed to suspend the order of the day in order to continue the discussion of this report.

J. P. Dodge spoke of the significance of evangelistic effort on the part of the church and Christians. T. C. Jones spoke of winning back the inactive members of churches.

The report was adopted. (Report P)

Supplemental Report: Memorial Day Committee. R. L. Shipley made a report of the collection received. It was moved that the money collected (\$71.75) be placed in the hands of the President to purchase a marker and to use the balance as is deemed advisable.

Report of Committee on Missions. The Secretary read the report which was adopted. (Report M)

Partial Report of the Board of Finance. The partial report was read by A. W. Ewell, secretary of the committee, recommending reductions in appropriations due to a deficit in receipts. (Report E)

Report of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. B. F. Ruley, secretary of the committee, read the report. The report was received and

taken up by items, with the request of all named in the report to leave the room during the discussion of the report.

Item recommending that W. W. Sylvester, A. C. Ford, and Norman Roberts be granted licence to administer the ordinances if employed by the President was approved.

Items recommending the following to the membership of the Conference were approved. W. P. Kesmodel, W. J. Wright, E. N. Hassell, R. F. Loss. Those brethren to be given licence to administer the ordinances.

The report was adopted. (Report F)

Reception of the Members into Conference. The President received the following into the membership of the Conference. William Paul Kesmodel, William John Wright, Elmer Niles Hassell, Robert Frederick Loss; addressing them on the task of the ministry.

Report of the Committee on Superannuates. The report was read by J. A. Dudley, secretary of the committee. Conference voted that the list of appropriations should be read. In accord with the conference regulation, the report was laid on the table for 24 hours. (Report H)

Superannuate Fund Society. Conference gave place to a meeting of the Superannuate Fund Society at 11:50.

Conference resumed at 12:10.

Report of the Committee on President's Report. H. C. Burkins, Secretary of the committee read the report, which was adopted. (Report A-1)

Communications. The secretary read communications from G. A. Morris, W. H. Hodges, W. M. Snyder, T. R. Woodford, and C. G. Soderbom. It was moved that these communications be received and that the secretary be instructed to make suitable reply.

Personal Privilege. R. S. Jett requested to be excused from further attendance upon the session of conference.

Adjournment. After the making of the announcements, conference adjourned.

J. W. Kirk pronounced the benediction.

#### FIFTH DAY, SUNDAY

#### MORNING WORSHIP AT ELEVEN O'CLOCK

Worship Service. The congregation sang Hymn 13. Prayer was offered by R. L. Shipley. Responsive reading, selection 17, was led by E. A. Sexsmith. Scripture lesson, Matthew 5:1-16, was read by W. F. Wright. Congregation sang Hymn 235, "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds." Announcements and offering.

Sermon. The sermon was preached by Rev. J. M. Rowland, D. D., Editor of the Richmond Christian Advocate of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Theme was "The Religion that Surpasses." Text was "Except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." (Matt. 5:20)

Prayer and Benediction. E. A. Sexsmith offered prayer. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. M. Rowland.

#### EVENING WORSHIP AT SEVEN THIRTY

The evening worship service was held in Alumni Hall at 7:30 o'clock. The song service was led by W. F. Wright. G. W. Haddaway offered the prayer.

Dr. J. M. Rowland brought the message. E. T. Kirkley pronounced the benediction.

#### SIXTH DAY, MONDAY

#### MORNING

Opening. Conference was called to order by the President at nine o'clock and sang Hymn 55, "Every Hour I Need Thee." Prayer was offered by C. L. Dawson.

Reading of the Minutes. The minutes of the Saturday and Sunday sessions were read and adopted as corrected.

Motion. Motion passed to reconsider and recommit the partial report of the Board of Finance.

Chairman. E. C. Makosky was asked to preside.

Report of the Committee on Superannuates. The Secretary read the report which was adopted. (Report H)

Report of the Committee on Benevolent Agencies. G. J. Hooker, secretary of the committee, read the report. J. A. Dudley spoke concerning the election of Board members, and moved to elect the board. J. H. Litsinger asked the committee to make the nomination.

Report approved with the understanding that the committee submit nominations. (Report K)

Committee on Home for the Aged. This report was read by W. F. Wright, Secretary. It was adopted, carrying with it the election of members on the Board. The following were elected: S. F. Cassen, J. N. Link, C. C. Richardson. (Report N)

Report of the Committee on Audit. A. F. T. Raum read two reports stating that the following accounts have been audited and found correct:

Treasurer of the Church Extension Society, Agent of the President's Parsonage, and Treasurer of Mutual Relief Association.

The report was adopted. (Report Q)

Report of the Committee to Audit the Treasurer's Account. The Treasurer's account was audited and found correct. His work is very efficient.

A motion to adopt the committee's report and to express the appreciation of the Conference to the committee for its labors in this respect was passed. (Report C-2)

Report of the Committee on Statistics. J. L. Marker, Conference Statistician, read the report which gave the findings of the year. J. L. Ward spoke. The report was adopted.

Report of the Conference Steward. J. R. McKeawn, Steward, read the report, expressing his appreciation of the fine reports of the pastors and his assistant, H. H. Schauer. The report was adopted.

Personal Privilege. J. L. Marker, Conference Statistician, expressed his appreciation of the fine service rendered by Conlyn Nolan and Gordon Shaw who assisted in compiling the report.

Motion. Motion to substitute the name of the alternate as the delegate from Grace Church was passed.

Personal Privilege. J. L. Nichols spoke concerning the fine work of the Home for the Aged.

A motion to send a note of thanks to the Board of Managers of our Church Home expressing the gratitude and appreciation of the Conference, was carried.

Personal Privilege. G. W. Haddaway asked the privilege of speaking. He urged that churches observe the six special days set by the General Conference.

Report of the Committee on Moral Reform and Social Service. The Secretary of the Conference read the report, also the report of J. W. Kirk, the Secretary of Temperance.

G. W. Haddaway spoke about an emphasis in matters of temperance. L. B. Smith spoke concerning the gambling situation in the State of Maryland, and the general tendency toward increased and legalized gambling, and requested a recommittal of the report to deal with this question.

Motion passed to recommit the report.

The Chairman of the committee announced an immediate meeting of the committee.

G. W. Ports spoke regarding work in Lynchburg and the place of the church in moral reform work.

Supplemental Report: Committee on Benevolent Agencies. The resubmitted report nominating the names of J. L. Ward, E. Lester Keyser, Thales Disney, Mrs. W. C. Shriver and Mrs. Daisy E. Baker for membership on the Deaconess Board was submitted by the committee, and a partial report along with the Treasurer's report was read by G. J. Hooker.

J. A. Dudley spoke of the service of Miss DeMoss and the Deaconess Work. G. W. Haddaway spoke of the financial request for offerings by the churches in connection with service rendered. J. F. Shaw spoke in appreciation of Miss DeMoss' services at St. Luke's Church. E. C. Makosky and L. B. Smith spoke. Report adopted. (Report K)

Invitation to Meet at Western Maryland College in 1938. The invitation, read on Saturday, was taken up by the Conference. F. G. Holloway spoke, heartly emphasizing the invitation of the College.

Unanimously accepted by a standing vote.

Quiet Hour. Conference sang hymn: "Blessed Assurance." J. W. Baxley led in prayer. Hymn 39, "Sweet Hour of Prayer" was sung by the Conference. Mrs. A. E. Weber led in prayer. E. C. Makosky brought a brief devotional message. George Hines led in prayer. Hymn 38, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was sung by Conference. M. L. Lamborne led in prayer.

Conference resumed.

Report of the Committee to Visit the Sick. Committee reported their visit to Brothers Avery Donovan and G. M. Clayton.

Adjournment. Motion passed to adjourn Conference until three o'clock. After several announcements Conference was dismissed with the benediction by J. T. Bailey.

#### **AFTERNOON**

Conference was called to order at three o'clock, with L. B. Smith presiding. Conference sang a hymn. J. L. Marker led in prayer.

Committee on Official Relations. R. Y. Nicholson read the report of the committee. Appreciation was expressed in connection with the reports received from delegates and pastors. Without any objection pastors were permitted to have inserted any facts or figures which might pertain to the statement of their particular charges.

G. W. Haddaway, W. H. Litsinger, L. B. Smith, R. Y. Nicholson discussed the item in reference to ministers years of loan to other conferences.

Adopted by a standing vote. (Report L)

Recommitted Report of Committee on Moral Reform.. J. G. Eaton read a supplementary report in reference to the work of the W. C. T. U. and the question of gambling. J. F. Bryan, G. W. Haddaway, T. C. Mulligan, T. C. Jones spoke to the report. The report was adopted. (Report J)

Reading of Minutes. The Journal Secretary read the minutes of the morning session which were adopted as read.

Alumni Association of the Westminster Theological Seminary. W. P. Roberts, President of the Maryland Alumni Association, spoke of the association's affairs.

The Summer Conference. J. E. Cummings, President of the Summer Conference, spoke of the program and work of the Summer Conference.

Envelopes were distributed for registration at the Summer Conference. J. N. Link spoke of the fine men who are scheduled on the program. F. G. Holloway spoke of the program and invited the ministers' wives to attend.

Report of the Maryland Conference Council of Religious Education. R. W. White, President of the Council, read the report concerning the work throughout the Conference, our Leadership Training School, and the Junior Camp. The program of the school was distributed. L. C. Little spoke of the Junior Camp.

Report of the Board of Finance. A. W. Ewell, secretary of the committee, read the report. Due to the limited income, the board recommended a decrease in the payments of the appropriations due at this time. Needed assessments were recommended.

G. W. Haddaway, E. C. Makosky, W. H. Litsinger, G. I. Humphreys, L. B. Smith spoke to the report.

The report was adopted. (Report E)

President of the Conference. The President of the Conference made an announcement regarding the plan of appointments.

Motion that the President read the plan of appointments when ready passed.

Adjournment. Motion was passed to adjourn Conference until seven o'clock. The benediction was pronounced by S. F. Cassen.

#### **EVENING**

Conference was called to order at seven o'clock by President Sexsmith.

Service of Song. E. D. Stone led the Conference in a service of song.

Report. Board of Survey and Extension. The report was read by J. N. Link, secretary of the board, and adopted. (Report G)

Supplemental Report of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. B. F. Ruley read the report, which was adopted. (Report F)

Recess. Awaiting further reports Conference recessed the business session. E. D. Stone led in the singing of hymns. An offering was received.

Conference session resumed. The President addressed the Conference as to the splendid cooperation and fine Christian Spirit manifested in connection with the making of the appointments. He spoke also of the year which we face as we leave this session.

Report of the Treasurer. The report was read by C. F. Cummins, Treasurer, giving a comprehensive review and statement of the finances of the Conference. Report adopted. The Conference rose in a vote of thanks and appreciation to the Treasurer. (Report C)

Reading of the Minutes. The minutes were read and approved.

Plan of Appointments. The President read the plan of appointments at 8.15 P. M. After a moment of silent prayer, R. L. Shipley led in a closing prayer and pronounced the benediction.

# REPORT A PRESIDENT'S REPORT

(See Journal Page 18)

To the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

#### GREETING:

"Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus, our Lord.

According as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and goodliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue:

Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises; that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature."

We gratefully acknowledge the manifold blessings of God which have sustained us throughout the year and by which we are privileged to assemble in this our 109th annual session to review the achievements of the past twelve months and take counsel together as we plan for the future. Let us constantly look unto God for guidance that we may effectually chart the right course for the days which lie ahead.

#### OUR COMRADES AT REST

"And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them."

We reverently record the names of those who have been called from labor to reward.

Rev. Phillip W. Crosby, who had served so efficiently among us since 1903, and whose wise counsel and leadership will long be remembered, died on the morning of January 22, 1937.

Rev. George R. Donaldson, who became a member of this conference in 1892, and who was highly esteemed for his sterling christian character and faithful service, died suddenly on January 24, 1937.

Rev. Charles Kerr McCaslin, after almost 45 years of the most congenial fellowship with his brethren, and efficient service given to his master and this conference died suddenly on February 15, 1937.

Rev. William S. Hanks, became a member of this conference by transfer in 1906 and soon won the love and esteem of his brethren. He was a good minister of Jesus Christ. On March 21, 1937 the angel of death freed him from the sufferings of the body to be at rest with God.

Rev. Bradley W. Kindley, a member of this Conference for over 52 years during which time he proved himself a christian gentleman, a faithful minister, and true friend, entered into the rest on April 21, 1937.

Mrs. Annie A. Smith, widow of Rev. G. J. Smith, died at the home of her sister in Williamsburg, Maryland, October 22, 1936. While not known to many of our present membership, she served faithfully with her husband in those earlier days when home conveniences were meager and the present opportunities were unknown.

Mrs. Eva Jane Clift, wife of Rev. F. M. Clift, after a short but very painful illness died in University Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland on February 17, 1937. She was a faithful wife, a wise councilor, an efficient church worker, a consistent christian, and having made a valuable contribution to the ministerial life of her husband, she now rests from her labors.

All these through faith have obtained a good report and are now members of the church triumphant.

"On any morning

Think of stepping on a shore and finding it heaven,

Of taking hold of a hand and finding it God's hand,

Of breathing a new air and finding it celestial,

Of feeling invigorated and finding it immortality,

Of passing from storm and strife into perfect calm,

Of waking up and finding it home.

Obituary committees were duly appointed in each of these cases and have made their reports to this conference.

#### OFFICIAL ACTS

Immediately upon the rise of Conference a change of pastoral relations was effected by common agreement of all parties concerned by which Rev. J. T. Fenby was transferred from Doylesburg to Mt. Nebo charge and Rev. M. Z. Hovda, an ordained minister of the Illinois Conference, now a student at the Westminster Theological Seminary became pastor of Doylesburg. In September, Rev. Hovda wished to be released from Doylesburg and Rev. A. H. Green, one of our superannuate ministers, was appointed to serve as pastor of Doylesburg for the remainder of the year, satisfactory adjustments having been made relative to his superannuate allowance.

St. Lukes Church was made vacant on January 22, 1937 by the death of their pastor, Rev. P. W. Crosby. I immediately held a Quarterly Conference and at the request of the Quarterly Conference arranged for temporary supplies under the supervision of a Pulpit Supply Committee with Mr. J. W. Shaw, Chairman of the Board of Stewards, as chairman with the President of the Conference as Chairman ex-officio. The church very generously gave the balance of the stated salary after taking out the expenses of supplying the pulpit to Mrs. P. W. Crosby. A number of the men of the Conference have been called upon to fill the pulpit but it has been

supplied mostly by Rev. Cornelius Hudson, a retired member of the Philadelphia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who has rendered excellent service. We wish to express our gratitude to all who have so kindly assisted in caring for the services. I especially mention Brother N. C. Clough, who was appointed to preside at the Quarterly Conference and occupied an advisory relation to the church, also Brother T. E. Landis who has so cheerfully assisted in the services.

On February 15, 1937, Wesley Chapel of Kent was made vacant by the sudden death of Rev. C. K. McCaslin. I immediately held a Quarterly Conference and made provision for a temporary supply under the supervision of a pulpit supply committee with the President of the Conference as Ex-Officio, chairman. The committee arranged with Rev. A. N. Stubblebine a retired Presbyterian minister whose family is connected with the church, to fill the pulpit. We express our appreciation of the very fine service he has given.

On January 30, 1937, Rev. P. M. Lue Rutz resigned as pastor of Fair-fax charge and on April 1, 1937 forfeited his credentials as an ordained minister in the Methodist Protestant Church. I, therefore, recommend that his name be removed from our ministerial roll. All papers in this case are at the disposal of the Committee on Official Relations if they desire to see them.

On February 12, 1937 Rev. Lawrence Haddaway, a student at the Westminster Theological Seminary was appointed as pastor of Fairfax Charge.

#### Itinerary

I have endeavored faithfully to discharge the duties involved in the office of President. Owing to the time required by the Church Extension Society activities in the erection of the Lewis Memorial Church, I have not been able to visit all the charges of the conference this year. Thirteen charges have been visited more than once, some of them several times. In each I have given attention to such business matters as required consideration. I have held 51 Quarterly Conferences and business meetings, delivered 135 sermons, and addresses, and travelled about 18,000 miles.

#### AFFILIATED AGENCIES

### Anti-Saloon League and Women's Christian Temperance Union

The splendid endeavors of these organizations was never more needed than at present. Once more our fair land finds itself reaping an enormous toll of broken homes and debauched lives as a result of the legalized liquor traffic. The saloon of former days would seem rather decent as compared with the road houses and dives now so blatently advertised to attract the American youth. "Strong drink is raging and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." This enemy of human society again challenges every lover of righteousness and clean government. The war against the liquor traffic, started so many years ago, must be carried on to victory. There

must be no compromise. It will require education and legislation, courage and persistance, a determination never to give up until the iniquitous business shall forever cease. The Anti-Saloon League and Women's Christian Temperance Union have been the outstanding agencies in the crusade against intemperance. They have merited the most hearty support of all Christians. I wish to commend the leaders of these organizations and urge a loyal support on the part of the churches of the conference in this most worthy cause.

# Lord's Day Alliance

The physical as well as the moral welfare of our nation is largely dependent upon the proper observance of the Lord's Day. We face a well organized and persistant endeavor to commercialize the Christian Sabbath. The inroads already made have increased the difficulties of the church in reaching and holding the youth of our communities. The constant drift toward a continental Sunday, which is every where apparent, should arouse the Christian Church to the dangers involved and stir them to a united effort to recover the Lord's Day to its proper place in the building of Christian character.

This state as well as the churches owe a debt of gratitude to Dr. W. W. Davis who has so faithfully and efficiently led the fight to preserve a Christian Lord's Day. Two things are essential, legislation to protect the day from those who would commercialize it, and education to reveal its essential place in our moral and spiritual life and create an attitude which will demand its proper observance. I, therefore, urge upon our churches the importance of a hearty cooperation with the Lord's Day Alliance in its legislative and educational program.

## Maryland Tract Society

This Society, with its office in our Headquarters Building, continues to be of very valuable service in Baltimore and surrounding counties among a very much forgotten class of people. Their house visitation, factory services, and the distribution of tracts, has proven a blessing to many who are especially in need of spiritual help and who otherwise would not likely be reached with the Gospel message.

For several years this conference has requested its churches to give one communion offering per year to this worthy cause. Not all of the churches participated last year, but the amount contributed amounted to \$250.73. The same request was made this year. We trust the response will exceed the amount of last year. This offering assists in paying the rent of the space occupied by the Society in our Headquarters Building. Believing the Conference desires to continue its support of this cause, we are offering a recommendation to that effect.

# MARYLAND CONFERENCE INTERESTS

# Church Home

With just pride we look upon our Home for the Aged as a beautiful benefaction. Under the wise management of the Board of Managers both the physical equipment and financial condition of the Home are in the best condition they have ever been. It is not just another institution. It is what its name indicates, a Home. Those in charge do all in their power to maintain a home-like atmosphere, thus rendering a loving service to many of the less fortunate of our aged people.

A detailed report will be submitted to this conference covering the administration of its affairs financial and otherwise for the year.

## Superannuate Fund

The funds for distribution to the Superannuates as you are no doubt aware, comes from two sources. First—the invested fund which is administered by the Board of Managers with Mr. F. Murray Benson as Treasurer, whose wise counsel and efficient management of its funds has brought a further increase in its revenue this year. The second source of revenue is from the collection taken throughout the District for this purpose, being a part of the Maryland Conference Budget.

The constantly increasing demands made of the modern pastorate, with advance age and sickness, has forced an increasing number to seek retirement during the past few years thus increasing the demand upon this fund.

During the period of the financial depression our revenue from the invested fund naturally decreased as was the case with all like funds, and in order for the Conference to pay its claimants according to the rule of the Conference (\$12.00 per year of active service to the ministers \$6.00 per year of active service to the widows of ministers), it was necessary to supplement the income from the invested fund from the collections. In 1932-33—\$2,419.00, in 1933-34—\$5,131, in 1934-35—\$5,172, and in 1935-36—\$5,616, making a total in four years of \$18,384.00. No one is to be criticized for this condition. It was a natural result of the financial condition through which we were passing. However, this Conference must undertake to increase the invested fund for our superannuates in the very near future. This with some other matters which of necessity are related will likely be referred to a special committee for consideration.

### Mutual Relief

At a time when an expression of sympathy counts for most this Association has for years extended a helping hand. It affords to each of the members of this Conference the opportunity in a quiet but effective way to show a spirit of real brotherhood to each other. It would seem that every member of the Conference would covet this opportunity. "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ." I again urge all members of the Conference to enroll as members of the Association.

### Deaconess Work

I wish to record my appreciation of the splendid work done this year by Miss Lillian DeMoss, whose training and experience fit her to render a valuable assistance to any church. She has given considerable time to the work at St. Luke's and the results of her services are manifested in an increased church and Sunday School attendance as well as in many other ways.

The Deaconess Board will be glad to arrange with those desiring the services of a deaconess.

## Summer Conference for Ministers

Each year the ministers of our Conference are afforded an unusual opportunity at a very nominal cost to spend a few days in contact with several outstanding Christian leaders, and to receive from them information and inspiration for the meeting of the intricate problems of a minister's life and work. There are many who have now come to positions of leadership in the denomination, who would gladly testify to the blessings received from this gathering during their earlier ministry. Its blessings have been apparent to all who have availed themselves of the opportunity to attend.

A splendid program, the details of which will be reported to you later in our session, is in preparation for this year. We, therefore, urge all our ministers, especially the young men, to attend.

# Maryland Council of Religious Education

The outstanding activity of this Council is the holding of a Leadership Training School at Western Maryland College each year. This school has had an important place in our Conference life for a number of years. Its interest has not waned. Last summer the school was one of the most successful ever held. From the stand point of courses offered and the character of the work done, there has been noticeable progress in the past few years. The program for this year is near completion and will be presented in the report of the Council to this session.

In addition to the Summer Leadership Training School, they have cooperated with state and county organizations of like character as well as those of other denominations. A much constructive work could be done if we were able to employ a full time Director of Religious Education for the Conference area.

### Group Insurance

We began our plan of Group Insurance with the Prudential Company eleven years ago. Since then the Company has paid to beneficiaries the sum of \$27,000 and to the Conference in dividends \$7,495.24, making a total of \$34,495.24. Although there has been an advance in the amount of the premium on account of an increase in the average age of the members of the Conference, we have been able to pay all premiums out of the available incomes until this year. The Treasurer's report which will be given to this Conference will show a deficit of \$443.28.

The premium for the year was \$4,898.81. During the same period the company paid to beneficiaries \$5,000 or \$101.19 more than the premium for the year. This being the case there was no dividend allowed. Should the usual dividend have been allowed we would have been able to meet the

entire premium out of funds available. The advisability of our Group Insurance has been proven by the assistance given the families of our deceased ministers. However, the time has come for a careful study of the present sources of income for payments of premums. I am therefore offering a recommendation to that effect.

### Church Extension

There has been considerable building and improvement throughout the Conference during the year, most of which was under the supervision of the local congregations. However, the President of the Conference acting as Church Extension Superintendent, has given counsel in most of these activities.

The only project directly under the supervision of the Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society has been the Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church in Washington, D. C. The parsonage was completed at the close of last year and the church edifice is now near completion. Since Easter Sunday the congregation has been worshiping in the social hall of the new church. The erection of the church has stimulated a much greater interest on the part of the people of the community which has been reflected in a rapid growth in attendance and activities in all departments of their church life. The opportunity is certainly most promising for a strong church in the near future.

# Headquarters Building

It is indeed gratifying to record that a very much improved condition now obtains with respect to rental of space in the building and the financial condition of our obligations. At this time there are but 2 small rooms and 5 large rooms vacant, which is much nearer a full occupancy than we have ever had. While there has been some reduction in rental rates, we are receiving an increased revenue. This with the results of the Headquarters Refunding Campaign is enabling us to meet our obligations promptly. We wish to express our appreciation of the fine work done by Mr. Easome, Vice President of Steffy Company, Realtors, who is carefully managing the Headquarters Building. A full report of matters pertaining to the Headquarters Building will be given in connection with the report of the Conference Trustees. This report will show all interest paid to date.

# Pastoral Support

A comparison of the Conference Minutes of 1930 and 1936 will show a decrease in pastor's salaries throughout the conference of over \$39,000. This was a natural result of the financial condition through which our nation was passing. However, now that industrial and agricultural conditions have been improving, this should be definitely reflected in the financial condition of the church. Knowing the seriousness of the situation with respect to pastoral support in many cases, I recommended at our last session, the appointment of a committee of laymen to study the matter and seek if possible to offer some remedy. The committee met and as a result sent out a communication to Quarterly Conferences asking if they

would not restore a part at least of the reductions formerly made. As a result I am happy to report the information forwarded to me indicates that 39 charges have responded favorably making a total of \$6,292. This is the largest increase in pastor's salaries since 1927.

### Local Church Achievements

The year has been marked by splendid achievements in a number of local churches. Afton Church on Northumberland Charge was dedicated on Sunday, May 30, 1937 free of debt. This is a splendid accomplishment. Considerable time has been taken in the erection of this church because they had adopted the slogan "We will pay as we build." It is an attractive church and furnishes adequate equipment for the community.

Lewis Memorial Church is now nearing completion. They have been using the Social Hall since Easter Sunday but the Auditorium will not be formally opened until early fall.

Riverton Church on Mardela Charge was dedicated on Easter Sunday, free of debt. This also is a great accomplishment for the membership. Both pastor and people deserve credit for their wisdom and loyalty exemplified in bringing the enterprise to such a successful conclusion.

In addition to the above, a number of church and parsorage properties have been extensively improved. The total reported to me by pastors is \$44,474.81. The following charges report \$500 or more raised for building and improvement during the year.

# GENERAL CHURCH INTERESTS

# Board of Christian Education

The report given at the recent meeting of the Board of Christian Education by the Executive Secretary, Dr. F. W. Stephenson, who is in charge of the department of Educational Institutions showed decided improvement. Our colleges are well located. Westminster College at Tehuacana, Texas, Adrian College at Adrian, Michigan; High Point College at High Point, N. C., and Western Maryland College, our genial host. These four colleges with the Westminster Theological Seminary constitute the family of our educational institutions with which the Board of Education is directly connected. Pine Ridge, Ky. and Nagoya College at Nagoya, Japan, being under the supervision of the Board of Missions.

These institutions have all had increased enrollments during the past year and are in better financial condition than at the time of previous reports.

We are justly proud to have two of the above institutions located within the bounds of the Maryland Conference.

Western Maryland College continues to increase in popularity. They have not been able to accommodate all students who have applied for enrollment. Dr. F. G. Holloway has already proven himself a worthy successor to the noble leaders who have preceded him in the office of President. He is now laying plans for better equipment and a higher grade of educational work. It is not their purpose to increase their enrollment of students but to increase the educational standard.

We all rejoice in the success that has accompanied the administration of Dr. C. E. Forlines as President of Westminster Theological Seminary. They have just closed an exceptionally fine year with all bills paid. We are justly proud of the Seminary and those who have been in charge of the training of so large a percentage of the leadership of our denomination. They no doubt have had the largest part in shaping the destinies of our church in the last thirty years. A report from both of these institutions will be submitted during our present session.

There is another department of our denominational educational life which should be mentioned. The Department of Religious Education under the direction of the Board of Education with Rev. F. L. Gibbs as Executive Secretary.

No department of our denominational life has had a more rapid growth. Plans have been perfected for the holding of 36 Leadership Training Schools Last year the enrollment in these schools surpassed all previous records and the character of the work done was of a much higher grade. We are keeping abreast with other denominations in this important field.

### Board of Missions

This Board directs all our missionary activities both at home and abroad. It is gratifying to know that while drastic economy has been necessary during the days of financial stringency yet we have not recalled a single Missionary, and owing to the wise management of the funds of this Board by the Executive Secretary, Dr. G. W. Haddaway, their indebtedness has been reduced.

The Home Department has rendered valuable assistance in establishing a large number of churches throughout the denomination, while the Foreign Department is carrying forward the missionary activities of our denomination in Japan, China, and India.

Japan, the oldest of our missionary fields now has a native church membership of over 3000 with a well organized Annual Conference consisting of 24 churches and 18 ministers. Nagoya School, so ably, conducted by Rev. Paul F. Warner of this conference has an enrollment of 840. We now have four missionaries directing the work in Japan.

While we did not enter China as early as Japan, our work has grown more rapidly. We now have a native church membership of 2500, with 4 missionaries who are in charge of the work, assisted by a large number of native workers. Miss Grace Armstrong of Eutaw Church has been accepted by the Board and will take up the work in China.

The work in India was most efficiently directed by Rev. Paul Cassen of this Conference, who has now been succeeded by Rev. J. F. Mennis. The opportunities are great in each of these fields but our laborers are so few. "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that he will send laborers into his vine-yard."

### Women's Work

Too much cannot be said in praise of the good women of our denomination who have been organized so efficiently and are giving hearty support to the whole program of the church. Out of the \$114,014.14 total receipts of the General Conference Treasury \$67,910.01 was raised through the Women's Auxiliaries. The Maryland Branch raised \$14,000, and the Washington-Virginia Branch \$1,779, making a total to the credit of the Women of our Conference of \$15,779. This Conference should give hearty cooperation in the organization of Auxiliaries until there is at least one on every charge.

The receipts for the World Service budget for this year will show a decided increase but is yet far below what it should be. However we greatly appreciate the response which has been given and trust this increase will steadily grow until we regain our former level of giving to the general church interests.

### Board of Publication

Under the direction of this Board we maintain two publishing Head-quarters, Pittsburgh, Pa., where our Sunday School Literature is edited and published and 516 N. Charles St., Baltimore, Md., where the Methodist Protestant Recorder is so ably edited by one of our own ministers, Dr. R. L. Shipley, and publishing under the direction of Mr. Charles Reiner, Jr., the efficient agent.

Plans were laid at a recent meeting of the Board of Administration to increase the circulation of our church paper. No one will question the wisdom or necessity of such an undertaking. If we are to have a constituency well informed as to the program and activities of the denomination, they must be readers of our own literature. The details of these plans will be reported to this conference later in our session. I bespeak for it a most sympathetic hearing and favorable action.

### Benevolent Societies and Bequests

The Board of Beneficience of St. John's Church and the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society have continued their generosity in assisting the President of the Conference in emergencies which have arisen during the year, for which we are indeed grateful. They have proven a great blessing to those in need.

We gratefully acknowledge the following bequests:

Miss Emma L. Shellenburger made a bequest in her Will of \$3000 to St. Lukes Church, and also left the Church her residuary lagatee, through which the Church will probably receive an additional \$2000 or \$3000.

Mrs. Mamie Bertholomay, bequeathed to Christ Church, Baltimore, the sum of \$500. To the Church Extension Society of the Maryland Annual Conference \$500. And to the Westminster Theological Seminary \$500.

Mrs. Cecelia J. Wannamaker bequeathed to the Elizabeth Church \$1000. To the Superannuated Fund of the Maryland Conference \$200.

## Looking Forward

The record of another Conference year has been written in Christian service. No doubt we will wish it were better. However, we can not change it, but we can join with the great Apostle Paul in saying "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended but this one thing I do forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

The days through which we are passing call for a devotion to the work of the Kingdom such as we have not seen in the years just passed. The work will no doubt become increasingly difficult, but if we have the love, faith and courage to give ourselves in a full measure of consecration we shall see His Kingdom come and His will be done.

A message will be presented to this Conference growing out of the conclusions reached at the recent meeting of the Board of Administration

which will be a definite challenge to our faith. I bespeak for this message setting forth our "Fellowship Crusade," a most sympathetic hearing and a most hearty response in our plans for the year. Because of the importance of the matters to be presented I am offering a recommendation that a special order of the day be set for its consideration and that a large committee be appointed to receive the message when presented and after consideration report to the conference.

### Recommendations

- 1. I recommend that at the time of the formal opening of the Lewis Memorial Church, we have a pilgrimage consisting of one or more persons delegated from every pastoral charge to present the gift from their charge to the Lewis Memorial Church in person. That the Sunday next preceding the formal opening be designated as a time when the offering from charges having already subscribed may be increased, and those not having subscribed be requested to do so.
- 2. That we publish in our conference minutes the percentage paid on both Maryland and World Service Budgets.
- 3. In as much as it seems difficult to hold three series of District Conferences each year on account of the second series coming so close to the Christmas Holiday. I recommend that we discontinue the December meetings holding only two series, one in the early fall and one before the Lenten Season.
- 4. I recommend that we create a Board of Christian Education consisting of not more than five ministers who shall cooperate with the Board of Christian Education of the denomination and who shall pass on all applications made by persons within our Conference District for aid from the General Educational or student loan funds of the Board of Christian Education.
- 5. That we continue our cooperation with the Maryland Tract Society and that we request our churches to give one communion offering for the support of this cause. The time of the offering to be suggested by the President.
- 6. That the Board of Finance be requested to study the needs of our Group Insurance and report their findings to this Conference session.
- 7. That we change our present Honor Roll making a threefold Honor Roll as follows:
- (1) All charges and churches paying 100 per cent of the Maryland Conference Budgets shall be listed as Maryland Conference Honor Roll Charges.
- (2) All charges and churches paying 100 per cent of the World Service Budget shall be listed as World Service Honor Roll Charges.
- (3) All charges and churches paying 100 per cent of both Maryland Conference and World Service Budgets shall be listed as Gold Star Honor Roll Charges.

8. Inasmuch as this Conference will receive a very important message from the Board of Administration of the denomination which will call for definite action, I recommend that a special committee be appointed to receive this message and after careful consideration bring its findings to the Conference at a time set for its consideration.

## Conclusion

Gratefully acknowldeging the many kindnesses shown me by the ministers and their families as well as the generous hospitality of many throughout the District, and with deep appreciation for your cooperation throughout the year, we render thanksgiving unto God for giving us strength to carry on and His spirit which has guided us since we last met, I am.

We heartily approve of the administrative acts of the President and commend him for his indefatigable labors of love throughout the year. His activities in church extension activities as related to the Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church have brought much success. His presence in many official meetings of the charges bespeaks his interest in the problems of the local churches and his willingness to share their burdens.

We agree with the President in his stand on the liquor question and Sabbath Day observance and we call on the Conference to cooperate to the fullest extent with the Anti-Saloon League, the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Lord's Day Alliance as well as the Maryland Tract Society in carrying out their tasks of love and helpfulness.

With our President we view with pride our educational institutions and agencies. It is truly gratifying to see an advance in all of our endeavors throughout the conference program. ### REPORT C-1

## **GROUP LIFE INSURANCE**

Westminster, Maryland, April 30, 1937.

To the President and Members of The Maryland Annual Conference.

I have the honor to submit the following report for your consideration with reference to the Group Life Insurance now in force with the Prudential Life Insurance Company of America.

It might be well to give a complete statement as to membership and financial conditions owing to the present status of our funds which will no doubt be fully considered by the President in his annual report to conference. At the beginning of the group insurance year, April 17, 1936, we have 154 on the roll. We have lost through death, 6, and dropped 1, making a total of 7. During the last annual conference we gained 3 new members which at the present time gives us 150 members. The claims for the past year amounted to \$5,000.00 as compared with premiums for the same period of only \$4,898.81, making a loss to the company of \$101.19 for the period mentioned, thus it will be seen that the company was unable to apportion a dividend for the year.

The annual premium for this year beginning April 16, 1937, is \$4,791.33 and \$12.69 for the past year and adjustment making a total of \$4,804.02. To meet the demands of the company we forwarded on April 9, \$2,000.00 which left a balance of \$2,804.02 and on the above date we had in our possession \$570.74 balance on hand at the close of last year and \$1,375.00 received during this year, making a total of \$1,945.74 which left a deficit of \$858.28. To meet the demands of the company the President of the Conference obtained a loan of \$900.00 for 60 days. We have now in bank \$41.72 and in addition there is owing by members of the Conference \$415.00 which leaves a deficit to be considered by the Conference of \$443.28 to meet this loan, provided all the members meet their obligation in full within the next 60 days.

By referring to the following statement a better idea can be obtained as to the financial status of the case.

Your Board of Trustees has met whenever the business of the Conference required action on the part of the Board.

By your action in adopting the Report of the Committee on Manual Revision at our last Annual session (page 96, paragraph 2 of Minutes of 1936) you instructed us to have our "Charter" so amended as to allow the Annual Meeting of the Board to be held immediately after the Annual Conference session instead of in May as now provided. You also asked that an examination be made of paragraph VII of the By-Laws relating to the investment of funds and if it be found that a change is desirable we report such fact to the next session of the Annual Conference.

With regard to the change of time for holding the Annual Meeting of the Board the election of officers and organization, our counsel advises us that the Laws of the State of Maryland now provide that the time and place for the Meeting of Corporations may be determined by the "By Laws" of the corporation.

We therefore recommend this paragraph be included in our By-Laws; viz:

"The Annual Meeting of this Corporation shall be held the last Monday in June of each year at such a time of day and place as the President may designate.

We also recommend that Section VII shall read: "All income from invested funds and all moneys for distribution shall be apportioned under the advice and direction of the Maryland Annual Conference, upon the recommendation of the Trustees of the Maryland Annual Conference; and this authorization of the Conference shall be sufficient and valid when the report of the said Trustees is regularly adopted."

The membership of the Board of Trustees is now as follows: Julian P. Dodge, T. W. Donoho, B. F. Ruley, and E. C. Makosky to serve until 1939; J. H. Straughn, W. A. Melvin, R. S. Jett, and F. M. Benson to serve until 1938; and G. W. Haddaway, W. B. Judefind, F. G. Usilton,

and W. C. Scott whose terms of office expired with this Conference; and whose places are to be filled by election of the Conference during this session.

The Treasurer's Report for the year, which has been audited, is submitted herewith.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATES

(See Journal Page 28)

Your Committee on Superannuates has given much thought and sympathetic consideration to each individual claim that has come before it, and feels deeply its inability to do the large and gracious thing for our beloved superannuates due to the insufficient funds for distribution. It should be apparent to everyone with an increasing roll of superannuates and a limited amount for distribution that the numerous requests for increases could not be granted and the necessity of living within the income has made necessary some small decreases.

The distribution of the Invested Fund has been made on the same basis as in previous years, \$12 for each year of active service for ministers, and \$6 for each year of active service for widows, and dependents on the graduated scale. (See Conference Minutes 1933, page 122.)

Since it is evident to everyone that the funds must be in hand before distribution can be made to the superannuates, we therefore recommend that a schedule be prepared of pastoral charges listing certain ones for each month to pay the assessment for superannuates. The churches to be informed in advance of its month to secure the superannuate assessment. The urgency of the need and one's sense of loyalty to and appreciation of his brethren and their widows should cause each pastor to put forth untiring efforts to raise the benevolences for superannuates in full.

We recommend that question No. 7 on the Superannuate Fund Society Claimants blank be amended to include the following, "In case of ministers, what is the income of self and wife?"

# COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE AND EDUCATION

(See Journal Page 23)

Magazines and pamphlets of a secular nature are waging such an extensive campaign to enter the homes of our people that there are few families who do not receive one or more periodicals of this type. Yet there are many Christian homes that do not subscribe to any religious periodical whatsoever. We feel that there is a great need for some religious paper that shall inform our people of the events that are transpiring in the world of today as they are related to the Methodist Protestant Church in particular and to the Christian Church in general. The best publication that can meet this need is our own church paper, the Methodist Protestant-Recorder.

Although it has been said that "Reading maketh a full man" nevertheless while the reading of religious literature does not necessarily make make a man full of religion, yet it is vital if the knowledge of the Christian is to be increased. Our own paper contains within its pages a wealth of material that is ample to inform the mind and to inspire the soul. We heartily endorse the plan of the General Conference to enlarge the subscription list of our paper.

We believe that our churches should use our own Sunday School Literature. We trust that the question "Does your church school use the Sunday School Literature of our Board?" If not what do you use and why?" on our delegate's report will serve to awaken the consciousness of all of our churches of their imperative duty to support our own publishing interests.

### Education

The standards of life around us regarding education are constantly increasing. It is becoming more and more necessary that our youth equip themselves as thoroughly as possible for the life that lies before them.

We are proud of the work that is being done by Western Maryland College under the able leadership of Dr. F. G. Holloway. This is the logical college for the young people of our churches. Cultural training under Christian influence will serve to mold their lives so that they become useful Christian citizens. Western Maryland College offers the highest and best in an adequate preparation for life. We rejoice that the enrollment of the past year has been the largest in history, that all current expenses have been paid, and that \$10,000 has been paid on debt. We not only appreciate the achievements of the past but are in accord with the plans projected for the future, namely, that of raising \$250,000 which is to be used in the following ways: \$150,000 for a men's dormitory, \$70,000 for a field house and \$30,000 for an addition to the library. Of this amount \$75,000 has already been subscribed. We not only hope and pray for the success of this undertaking but also pledge to the limit of our ability our support to Dr. Holloway in this great project.

The Seminary continues to exercise its function as the "School of the Prophets". The fact that a very large proportion of the membership of our conference are graduates of this school attests to its usefulness. Under the capable direction of Dr. C. E. Forlines all current obligations were met during the past year. Several much needed improvements, including the beautifying of the campus, were initiated. Yet there remains much to be done. A larger endowment fund would provide the answer to many of our problems concerning this institution. It would relieve Dr. Forlines of the necessity of going out every Sunday to collect funds. Additional books as well as library space are also needed. We heartily endorse any means projected by Dr. Forlines for the betterment of our Seminary.

Our Leadership Training School at Westminster under the direction of Rev. Raymond W. White is performing a notable and efficient work. We urge all of our churches to take advantage of this splendid training that is offered their young people and young people's leaders.

Your committee offers the following recommendations:

- 1. That every minister and charge seek to continue the block subscriptions to the Methodist Protestant-Recorder, and make it a permanent part of our program.
- 2. That the official members of every charge be especially urged to subscribe to the Methodist Protestant-Recorder.
- 3. That every minister and layman of the Methodist Protestant Church shall cooperate with Dr. Holloway by sending him the means of prospective students.
- 4. That the pulpit of our churches be open to Dr. Forlines and his faculty and that they be permitted to solicit special offerings for the cause of the Seminary.

# REPORT OF THE MARYLAND CONFERENCE COUNCIL OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Maryland Conference Council of Religious Education brings to this Conference a most gratifying report. Our accomplishments have been made possible by the intense interest, earnest efforts, and cheerful cooperation of the ministry, layety, and youth of the Maryland Conference. For such we are grateful.

One year ago it became necessary for Dr. Lawrence Little to resign as part-time religious Work Director of the Council. We proceeded immediately to organize the Conference into geographical Districts and appointed chairman of these districts to be key-men through whom we might reach the local churches with our Conference program. These Chairmen and our executive committee met in September of this Conference year and planned our program, and our method of procedure.

The Council cooperates with the President of the Conference in a series of district meetings. The president of the Council was elected to represent our work and conducted discussions with youth groups in the study of what youth programs do to youth. We found the youth of our Conference deeply interested in a kind of program that ministered to the conscience, encouraged a religious experience, and cultivates an accurate judgment. We found them eager for a Christianity of life rather than a mechanical observance and obedience of codes. They wish to live creatively and not mechanically. They wish a program to make them rather than to be exploited for the sake of organization or a standardized program. This is a hopeful sign.

We have adopted the New Curriculum of the International Council and have encouraged the local churches to teach them a series courses. It is hoped that the local churches will continue to organize teacher training classes and use this course of instruction. We must recognize the fact that our youth should be challenged before they have reached the age of seventeen. If every local church would carefully solicit its youth before this age and diligently engage in training it for Christian Service, many of our local church problems of leadership would be solved. We must not wait until an office is vacant to find a leader. It is suggested that the church send its local classes to our Leadership Training School or some local cooperative training school for courses in methods.

We conducted our largest Leadership Training School in our history last summer. Two Hundred and twenty-five credits were issued. This represents the largest number ever issued in any school in our Conference. A number of denominational schools were conducted throughout the Conference and a number of credits were issued in interdenominational schools.

For a number of years the President of this Council has been anxious to see this Council out of debt. To this end we have labored. We come to this conference for the first time in a number of years not only out of debt but showing a surplus of \$143.20. While a number of churches have not made their annual contributions before this Conference Session, and for this reason will not be mentioned in this report, we have reason

to believe they will make their contribution before the opening of our Leadership Training School and thereby prevent any financial embarrassment which would otherwise occur.

Our Leadership Training School will be August 2-9. This year we have planned for a stronger evening program. We are fortunate in securing some of the very best leaders of youth movements for these services. Our curriculum has been enlarged. We will offer four "A" series and fourteen "B" series courses. For the first time in the history of the school, we have prepared a prospectus and it will be distributed at this Conference session. We hope it will meet with your hearty approval and that all of us will return to our charges, elect one or more delegates to attend the school, and confer with the delegates about enrolling for the course the local church and the delegates need most.

In cooperation with the Baltimore Conference Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church, we conducted last June our first "Methodist Junior High School Camp" at Western Maryland College. One hundred thirty-two intermediate boys and girls attended, thirty-six of whom were Methodist Protestants. Courses were offered in Bible, Christian Living, Dramatics, Music, Arts and Crafts, Nature Study, and First Aid. A well-rounded program of worship and recreation also was provided. The second session of the camp will be held this year June 28 to July 4.

The following churches have contributed to our work this year: Bivalve, \$5.00; Uniontown, Md., \$2.00; Choptank, \$1.00; Havre de Grace, \$2.00; Hurlock, \$5.00; Centreville, \$3.00; Woodensburg, \$5.00; Cambridge, \$7.00; Laurel, Del., \$5.00; Clayton, \$2.00; Federalsburg, \$2.00; Cherrydale, \$10.00; Harrington, \$10.00; Denton, \$2.00; Snow Hill, \$4.00; Newark, Md., \$3.00; St. Lukes, Phila., \$9.00; Rhode Island Avenue, \$10.00; Total, \$87.00.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

That a special place be given to a program arranged by the Council in cooperation with the Conference Program Committee for the Conference session of 1938.

That the Council, in view of the fact it no longer participates in the Conference Budget, be given permission to solicit offerings from individuals, Sunday Schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, and churches to help meet the expense of the Council.

#### REPORT J

## COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM AND SOCIAL SERVICE

(See Journal Page 30)

Your committee has given itself to the study of what seems to be the outstanding hazards of the general moral and social welfare of our people and submits its report on these great issues.

We believe in God, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord. We believe the word of God. We believe in the power of the Holy Spirit to direct human minds and hearts into ways of righteous living as revealed in the Bible and in the life of our Lord and Redeemer. This revelation is the foundation upon which we stand and is our inspiration in opposing the evils of today.

World Peace. The world is ill at ease. The passion for national supremacy is rampant. The nations of Europe are marching toward the destruction of themselves and their neighbors. Their frontiers are becoming walls of steel. Selfish nationalism has usurped the throne of reason, and a world waits with abated breath the beginning of another terrible conflict. There can be no peace except at the foot of the cross. Even as nations today are worshipping their heroes, we call upon all the disciples of Jesus to worship and follow Him as the only hero for the whole world "For he seeketh such to worship Him". "We must render unto God the things that are God's."

Social Justice. We believe that a more thorough Christianizing of the social order is an imperative need and an obligation of the Christian Church. The Golden Rule is practical and expresses the conduct that results from believing and living by the teachings of our Lord. We long to see a more equitable and just distribution of worldly goods. We want to see this happen by a proper regard and consideration for the sacredness of personality; by a due consideration for the rights of all; and without the exploitation of children, women, and men as well. We pray for the mind of Jesus to guide us and to rule in all social relationships everywhere.

Lord's Day Alliance. The Christian Church can take only one position in the matter of the use of the Lord's Day. There is no alternative to "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." We deplore the increasing disregard of the Lord's Day, which is a violation not only of the Law of God, but of the law of the state. The playing of baseball, amateur

and professional, on Sunday is in open defiance of the law of the Maryland in most towns and counties. We are all so greatly indebted to Dr. W. W. Davis that we commend him for his untiring efforts in seeking to restore this Day to its rightful use and observance.

Anti-Saloon League. The alarming toll of human life on our public highways due to drinking and drunken drivers; the growing number of drinking women; the glaring evidence of drinking among children, because of increased familiarity with the presence of liquor around them; the rapid rise of liquor consumption figures with its consequent increase of human misery and moral wreckage; the disgraceful debauchery of so many public social centers where liquor flows freely; the familiar sight of street drunks; the alarming development of the evil of social vice that makes Baltimore today a disgraceful spectacle to the entire nation; the apparent indifference of so many of our church members toward the drink evil; the alliance of liquor interests with practically every other vice known to society and its return to the throne of party politics; these and other conditions growing out of the repeal of the eighteenth amendment make imperative the enlistment of all the friends of temperance and sobriety in a very definite warfare against this age-old enemy of human life and society.

We, therefore, pledge ourselves through personal example and influence, and as far as possible through organized effort, to utilize every means in the home, the school, and the church, to acquaint children, youth, and adults with the destructive and damning effects of all alcoholic liquors, including beer and wine; and the enlistment of pledged total abstainers as rapidly as possible. To this end we urge all pastors, Sunday School workers, youth groups, women's groups, and children to unite in such a campaign as will be effective against this evil in all of our communities.

We must not forget that the greatest advance ever made in the history of temperance reform were made during the years when thousands of citizens were enlisted to support only such candidates for offices of public trust as were openly opposed to the legalized liquor traffic. When temperance people become willing to put temperance principle, public morality, and human life and welfare above party loyalty in politics then they will become a factor to be feared and respected by the leaders of partisan politics, and not until then.

We commend the W. C. T. U. in their effort to educate against the liquor business, and to build sentiment for temperance. The work which this noble band of women is doing deserves our earnest support.

The matter of gambling has continued to increase and to take on new forms. As a conference we unequivocally oppose gambling in all its forms. We are not only opposed to the many forms and expressions of gambling, we are definitely opposed to legislative action which aims to produce revenues to the state from gambling processes.

The issues are plain. This Conference is opposed to every work of the devil; and the liquor business and gambling evils are two of his major works. We offer the following recommendations:

- 1. That G. W. Haddaway be appointed a member of the educational committee of the Lord's Day Alliance.
- 2. That one minister and Sunday School Superintendent in each Conference District be appointed to promote the work of the Lord's Day.

Your Committee on Benevolent Agencies submits the following: The Deaconess Work, the Maryland Tract Society, the St. John's Board of Beneficence and the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society have all been matters of consideration.

The Maryland Tract Society is a most useful agency in extending the work of Christ's Kingdom and we are pleased with the response given this year by our churches. Fifty-two churches have responded this year by giving an offering of \$241.47. May we urge that every church in the Conference give an offering this year toward this society's work.

The Deaconess Board has had three meetings during the year and sought in every way to encourage the use by the churches of our lone

Deaconess, Miss Lillian DeMoss. Through this emphasis ten churches have engaged her to their profit. No once can over emphasize the value of Miss DeMoss' services. She faithfully performs her duties wherever she goes. All during the active church session she has been employed. The following churches have had her services during the year: Newark, St. Paul's, Lauraville, Cherrydale, Rhode Island Avenue, Lewis Memorial, Linthicum Heights, Mt. Olivet, St. Luke's and Christ Church. After the death of Rev. P. W. Crosby, upon the request of the President of the Annual Conference, Miss DeMoss spent nine weeks at St. Luke's. services were most valuable to that church at such a time. Already two churches have engaged Miss DeMoss for this fall. If desiring the Deaconess' services, see W. A. Melvin, the Treasurer. Miss DeMoss goes to the churches with the understanding that a free-will offering will be taken for her services. In all fairness to the Deaconess Board the freewill offering should be sent to the treasurer regardless of the amount. These offerings are needed to meet all obligations of the Board.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

(See Journal Page 26)

The evangelization of the world is still the supreme task of the Christian Church. We must not allow ourselves to be diverted from it by the deceptive pleas of new attitudes or modern viewpoints. "This changing world," of which we hear so much, is still a sinful world, and needs a Saviour as much as it ever did. Our Christ is the only Saviour who can meet its needs, His Gospel is the only panacea for its many ills. There is but one "Balm in Gilead", there is but one "Physician" there. We need make no apology for the missionary enterprise, we need wait for no permission of man to carry out our Lord's command. In this matter we "confer not with flesh and blood", for we have divine authority.

Godless and anti-Christian movements, some of them subtle and insidious, others bold and presumptuous, are seeking to dominate the world, and are dominating a considerable part of it. The lengthening shadow of the Anti-Christ is stretching over the earth, the Mystery of Iniquity is feverishly at work. Communism and Fascism are no longer mere vague socialistic and economic theories of government, but now stand fully revealed as mighty athestic and paganistic forces, seeking to dethrone God and destroy his church on earth. They will not succeed in doing either, but they have succeeded in destroying the souls of countless millions who worshipped their false God and they will destroy millions more if their power and influence is not checked. Surely, in these dark and troublesome days, the church should be more zealous and earnest in its evangelistic and missionary activity than ever before.

#### Home Missions

During the recent years, when our entire missionary program has suffered because of insufficient funds, the work at home has suffered more than the work abroad. Whereas we ought to be entering new and unchurched fields, establishing and building four or five churches a year, we have established only one new enterprise, the Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church, Washington, D. C., the past several years. The time has come when our work at home must take on new life and expand. Many young churches in promising fields should be supported and strengthened. New fields should be entered and churches built.

- Rev. T. C. Jones, who has just returned from a year's service in the Florida Mission Conference, reports that the conference is in better condition than it has ever been, and that with an ever increasing population faces a growing opportunity for Kingdom Service. Help is needed to erect new buildings and furnish a strong leadership.
- Rev. A. G. Lynch, who was present at this session of conference, and who has just completed four very successful years as pastor of our First Church, Seattle, Washington, reports that our work in that distant city continues about the same, with all three churches holding their own. Because of the great distance from the center of our denominational

life, this field becomes increasingly difficult to maintain. We feel that Methodist Union will come as a distinct blessing to this area of our Home Mission work.

After a thorough study made by a special committee appointed by the General Conference Boards, our work at Dillonvale has been definitely discontinued. The committee found the field being adequately cared for by other denominations which have been in the field longer than we. Very much do we regret that impaired vision has made it necessary for Mrs. Hazel Greenwald to retire from active Christian service. Our prayers ascend in her behalf.

The money formerly expended for the Dillonvale work will be added to the appropriation for our Pine Ridge School, which, under the capable and consecrated leadership of Superintendent Andrews, forges ahead in a most encouraging and commendable way.

Tremendous changes are taking place in every area of life here in the homeland. We must fortify our churches and make them as strong as possible, so as to be able to meet successfully the great challenge of the hour.

## Foreign Missions

We are glad to learn that the work in Foreign Fields is in as good condition as at any time in its history. This is due to the consecration and efficiency of our missionaries and the cooperative work of the native Christians. The depression proved to be somewhat of a blessing in disguise, for when the budget was reduced it caused more work to fall on the natives themselves, thus increasing their responsibility and developing their leadership.

In Japan the Boys School in Nagoya has an enrollment of over 900, and there are about 600 in the Girl's School. The evangelistic efforts in China and India are showing gratifying results. All three fields are becoming more evangelistic each year.

Since our last report Rev. Minnis and family have returned to India and are very happy. Miss Grace Armstrong has been accepted by the Board to prepare for service in China. She is going out on faith, as the Board cannot provide her financial support at present. Surely one with such devotion as this deserves our whole-hearted support. Too much cannot be said in praise of the ability and consecration of our missionaries, who rank favorably with the best of missionaries in other denominations.

We note with thanksgiving that the year's receipts show \$5,100 in excess of last year's. Much of this is due to the Women's Work. They are to be commended for their very loyal support.

We wish again to express our appreciation of the faithful and efficient services of Dr. G. W. Haddaway, the Executive Secretary of the Board, and of Miss Bettie Brittingham, The Executive Secretary of the Department of Women's Work.

We endorse the recommendation of the Maryland Branch that a

committee, composed of ministers, laymen and women, be appointed to plan closer cooperation in missionary work.

L. Stiffler. We wish here to pay tribute to our District Chairmen, who worked so effectively in bringing about the success of our year's work.

We appreciate so much the cooperation of Dr. E. A. Sexsmith, Dr. Shipley and the pastors of the churches who have helped their women to carry out the program.

We are always indebted to Dr. Haddaway and Miss Bettie Brittingham who keep us in touch with the latest news from the fields. We would like to encourage all our auxiliaries to secure more subscriptions to our Missionary Record and the Methodist Protestant-Recorder.

I had the privilege of visiting our school at Pine Ridge, Kentucky, the High Point Orphanage and High Point College. At each of these places I was impressed with the effectiveness of Christian leadership, and the wonders it has wrought.

Our Meth-Pro Home is filled to capacity, and has had its most successful year, meeting all of its financial obligations and paying on the principal as it came due.

We were blessed in having some of our returned missionaries with us this year, Rev. and Mrs. Soderbom from China, and Miss Evelyn Wolfe from Japan, who visited many of our churches and attended some of our District meetings. A farewell was tendered the Minnis family before they sailed for India. Our returned missionaries all brought inspiring messages of their own fields. These personal contacts awakened greater interest.

Having tried to cover the details of the past year, we must now look to our future, so that we may extend our work and usefulness in building His Kingdom. "BUILDERS," our theme, throws out a challenge for bigger things.

The most acceptable way of expanding is indeed our most cherished ambition—AN AUXILIARY ON EVERY CHARGE. With this hope uppermost in our minds, Maryland Branch recommended a committee, composed of ministers, laymen and women, to be appointed by this Conference to plan closer cooperation in missionary work. Let our ministers look to the real meaning of this, a more consecrated group of women behind the whole program of the church, monies raised, credited to your World Service Budget, in fact an awakened and enriched church. Here presents an opportunity for stressing STEWARDSHIP throughout our denomination, also a means of interesting our young people in World Missions.

Our Summer Special, this year, is clothing, new and used, for Pine Ridge, Kentucky.

Two of our young women are giving themselves as foreign missionaries this year; Ruth Staley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Staley, has gone to Africa as a missionary under the African Inland Mission. Grace Armstrong, daughter of our own Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Armstrong, will go to China as a missionary under our own Board.

At a special meeting of the executive committee of Maryland Branch on June 1, 1937, it was decided to assume her support. Some of our friends have contributed very generously to this end. A plan of one dollar per month, or twelve dollars per year was launched, and to date we have received quite a few subscriptions from individuals, circles and Auxiliaries. This is to be a free will offering, and subscription money should be sent to Mrs. Ross E. Collier, 709 E. 33rd Street, Baltimore. We should especially like our young people to take hold of this project and to feel some of the responsibility for her support. Grace felt the call to China at one of our Summer Conferences.

Let us give to Grace and all our missionaries and fields of endeavor our most prayerful support during the coming year, and all labor together so that our theme "BUILDERS," may truly be a symbol of our unity of purpose in making possible a truly Christian world.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME FOR THE AGED

The Committee on Home for the Aged has reviewed the reports of officers of the institution and submits the following observations.

- 1. The officers of the Home, the Board of Managers, the Board of Lady Superintendents, the matron, nurse and helpers are all to be commended for their efficient and consecrated service. They have not only cared for the business affairs of the Home and superintended with efficiency, but they have been interested in providing those less tangible yet vital elements of home life, such as a sweet spirit of Christian fellowship, a sincere interest in the comfort and happiness of each individual, and an understanding and sympathy for those who are facing life in its sunset years.
- 2. The Home family consists of twenty-four guests, the matron, nurse and two servants.
- 3. With regret your committee reports that during the past year Mrs. E. A. Warfield, who has served efficiently as matron for three and one-half years was obliged to resign on account of physical disability. However, the Home has been fortunate in securing Mrs. Mabel Masten, daughter of the late Rev. Thomas H. Wright of our church, to take up her task. Mrs. Masten is filling the difficult position most graciously and

acceptably. The Committee congratulates the Board of Managers of their wise selection.

- 4. The Committee finds that the building and equipment is well cared for and in excellent condition. Although economy has been the watchword, many repairs and improvements have been made during the year which have enhanced the attractiveness, comfort and convenience of the Home. The officers responsible for these improvements are to be commended.
- 5. Visitors are always welcome, and receive the most cordial of greetings. Visitor's Days, and Conference and Leadership Training Schools on the Hill, provide opportunity for our people to become acquainted. The growth of the number of visitors from year to year gives evidence of the increasing interest our Conference is taking in the Home, and the Committee commends this spirit, suggesting that all who have not visited the Home take advantage of the first opportunity.
- 6. Organizations and individuals from far and near continue to share in the happy privilege of providing for the Home and its guests. Contributions are welcomed for both pantry and treasury. The depression continues to affect the donations of cash, but this decrease in money gifts is to some extent made up by the increase in food donations. Ninety-two churches and organizations and sixty-seven individuals shared this year. Your Committee expresses its appreciation for this friendly spirit of helpfulness among our people.

We acknowledge with pleasure the report of the Treasurer of the Home with reference in a special way to donations from St. John's Church, Baltimore, from Christ Church, Chestertown, and from Mr. William C. Scott.

Aside from the gifts of food and cash, there is a real opportunity for us to recommend to our people on every appropriate occasion, particularly to those of means, that there is no more beautiful charity that can be remembered in their wills than this institution. Such bequests have greatly strengthened resources and have been invaluable in helping to meet obligations.

### 7. Recommendations:

- 1. We are delighted to announce the appropriation of the amount of fifteen hundred dollars per year for the next two years beginning October 1,1937, by the Maryland State Legislature. This financial assistance is to be received by similar institutions in the State. We recommend that this Conference express its appreciation to the legislative body and to Senator Milton L. Veasey through whose efforts this appropriation was secured.
- 2. Attention is called to the fact that the terms of office of the following members of the Board expire with this session: Rev. S. F. Cassen, Rev. J. N. Link, and Mr. C. C. Richardson. We recommend that their successors be elected.
- 3. We recommend that the list of Lady Visitors to the Home be printed in the Minutes of this Conference session.

4. We have received the request of the Board of Managers for a continuance of the six thousand dollar appropriation and hereby recommend that the same be granted.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF LADY SUPERIN-TENDENTS TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE HOME FOR THE AGED

March 18, 1937.

The Home family consists of twenty-three guests, the matron, nurse, and two servants—twenty-seven in all. There is one vacancy for which an applicant has been accepted.

There were four deaths during the year: Miss Carrie E. Osborne entered the Home November 1, 1928, died April 16, 1936, age, 72 years; Mrs. Susan A. Askey entered the Home May 14, 1930, died May 31, 1936, age, 81 years; Miss Stella Sessford entered the Home April 6, 1935, died October 9, 1936, age, 78 years; Mrs. Cattie F. Mettee entered the Home May 1, 1934, died November 22, 1936, age, 83 years.

The following applicants were admitted: Miss Emma H. Hogg of Edmondson Avenue Church, Baltimore; Mrs. Harriet E. Hollenberry of Edmondson Avenue Church, Baltimore; Miss M. Annette Price of West Baltimore Church. Miss Price was not satisfied in the Home and left February 17 before the end of her probation.

Owing to infirmities of age, a number of the ladies are unable to assist with the work or to take care of their rooms and themselves. We have been very fortunate in securing an assistant to the nurse, Mrs. Frank Brightwell, a member of Westminster Methodist Protestant Church. Mrs. Brightwell comes in Tuesdays and Fridays regularly; also at other times in emergencies.

We regret to report that Mrs. E. A. Warfield, our popular and efficient matron for a term of three and one-half years, was obliged to resign on account of physical disability. Mrs. Warfield left July 7 and we employed temporarily Mrs. Ellen Taylor, Westminster, to serve in this capacity until we should find a new matron. Mrs. Ackley kindly acted as hostess during this time. Through the interest of Mrs. H. B. Jester we secured Mrs. Mabel Masten, daughter of the late Rev. Thomas H. Wright of our Church. Mrs. Masten came to the Home September 7, and is filling the difficult position of matron most graciously and acceptably, not only to the Ladies' Board but to the guests. In fact, we feel that we could not have made a better selection.

Visitors' Day, September 2, was a success socially and financially. From far and near friends came to see the Home family in their comfortable surroundings, to enjoy the luncheon, and to bring their donations for the pantry and the treasury. Indeed it was a great day. Interest in this event increases each year. We note a great increase in number of visitors all during the year and especially when the Conferences are in session at Western Maryland College.

Christmas is such a happy time at the home that the guests would rather stay here than accept invitations to spend the holidays with friends or relatives. It is a matter of keen regret to us that the kind friends who make it possible for us to give them everything they ask for cannot see them gather around the tree to receive their gifts and enjoy all the good things of the season.

Since the depression, we have not been receiving so many cash donations, but this decrease in money gifts is fully made up by the increase in food donations. Donations were received from ninety-two churches and organizations and from sixty-seven individuals. Twenty-one groups visited the Home, rendered programs, and served refreshments to all. Students of the Seminary and the College held services and entertainments quite frequently during the school year. Our missionaries from

China, Rev. and Mrs. C. G. Soderbom, lectured and showed pictures of China and our Mission there.

The following repairs and improvements were made: New floor in upper hall; floors refinished in lower hall and stairway; new linoleum in two bathrooms; dining room chairs, tables, kitchen, and areaway painted; walls painted of pantry, two bedrooms, and two bathrooms; cupboards under front and back stairways relined and made usable; reception room papered and woodwork painted; infirmary completely renovated-walls and woodwork painted, floor sanded and refinished, furniture painted, electric lights changed and double sockets installed for greater convenience; and furniture repaired.

Purchases as follows: Institutional sink for kitchen; two stands, one lamp, four small rugs, five mattresses, institutional flat silver marker, "M. P. Church Home"; and a carpet sweeper.

As the work of the Secretary was greatly handicapped this year by the omission of the list of Lady Visitors from the Conference Minutes, she respectfully requests that the Committee on Home for the Aged recommend the continuing of the printing of this list in the Maryland Conference Minutes.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

(See Journal Page 26)

Methodism and Evangelism are almost synonymous terms in the thinking of thousands of people today. This is due, largely to the fact that evangelism has played such an important part in the history of Methodism, not only when it was born but down through the years, even to the present time.

We feel that we are not only keeping close to the heart of our illustrious founder, John Wesley, but living near to the heart of our Lord and Master, when we are promoting evangelism, and the evangelistic spirit.

May we never forget the reason for which Jesus came into the world namely, "to seek and save that which was lost." The reason also for which he called His Disciples that they might become "fishers of men."

Back of the parable of the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the lost boy, we find his burning passion, and heart felt yearning for the Salvation of men. His last great commission was "Go ye into all the world, and preach my gospel to every creature." It was this great evangelistic zeal of the master that re-echoed in the heart and life of Paul when he said "That I might by all means save scme." And as Dr. H. L. Feeman said in his report to the Board of Administration on bringing people to God, "We have nothing to fear in presenting the Gospel to this age. We are sure of Jesus Christ and His adequacy to meet human needs as never before and we can face with open mind the advance of knowledge on every sector."

It was indeed heartening to hear Dr. Daniel A. Poling in his masterful address on world conditions sound the triumphant note that Jesus Christ is not only adequate but "He shall reign where ere the sun does his successive journeys run." How these things stimulate our hearts, when men who know the world through such an intimate touch, who know the world leaders through personal contact come back to us and give us a vision of the triumphant march of Christ through the nations of the earth. Let us give our people a full and complete gospel, for we believe the world is still needing the "Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world" and let us not forget what Dr. Feeman said that Evangelism

is the main purpose and motive force inspiring the whole program of Christian enterprise.

Your Committee on Evangelism recognizes the fact that there are many and various ways through which we can win some.

First we believe that one of the most fertile fields for real evangelistic effort is to be found in our Sunday schools, where we have under our care, from the cradle roll on through to our Adult Bible Classes, precious souls for whom Christ died. Who can estimate the number of God given opportunities presented here to all our pastors, officials, and teachers. We can never begin to measure the wonderful possibilities, for Kingdom building, wrapped up in a Sunday school. Would God that all our Sunday school teachers could hear him say again "Follow me and I will make you to become fishers of men."

We earnestly urge the pastors and Sunday school teachers of our churches to cooperate to a greater extent than ever before, in order that we may win those under our care to him who blessed the little children, and who looked after the rich, young man, and loved him. He still loves and longs for our young people.

Second. The Preaching Mission. The Preaching Mission was mentioned, in this committee's report of last year. It was referred to as something to which we were looking forward with great anticipation, and high hopes. Today we are looking back with great joy to a glorious achievement. The Angels in Heaven must have rejoiced during that wonderful period when consecrated men gave of their time and talents in a great effort to make America God conscious. We are more than delighted to learn that this great movement is going to be continued and enlarged so as to include a great many cities that were not fortunate enough to be included last year. As members of this Conference, both ministers and laymen, we cannot do otherwise, than lend our support and influence to such a Heaven inspired movement. It was of God and God blessed it.

Third. The Lenten Season. Surely the Methodist Protestant Church by this time has come to realize the timeliness of this particular Season, for "Bringing in the Sheaves." Just one look at our Methodist Protestant-Recorder following Easter would convince the most sceptical, that this is a rich vein in our Conference year, one that will bring in great returns for every effort put forth.

We are convinced of the wisdom of organizing or forming classes for religious training and instruction, among our youth during the season of Lent, with a view to confessing Christ, and uniting with the church. We believe this will mean a better informed and more intelligent membership.

The practice of conducting special services during Holy Week has been productive of much good, and we are of the opinion, that such services will make Holy Week a greater source of spiritual power and blessing to all our people, and be the means of deepening their appreciation of, and gratitude to, Jesus Christ.

We are deeply indebted to Dr. R. L. Shipley, the Editor of the Methodist Protestant-Recorder, for helping to promote in such a splendid way, our Pre-Easter Program.

Fourth. In the questionnaire sent out by the President of our Conference this question was asked. "How many inactive members have you on your church roll?" The answer to this question was given to us by our President. Seven Thousand eight hundred and forty-seven are reported as inactive. Here is something that is not only a revelation, but a soul stirring challenge to every loyal minister and layman in the Maryland Conference. What a great opportunity for Gospel fishermen to help God recapture those who have gotten away from the Gospel net.

These people are our people, we have first claim upon them, we have a point of contact, an avenue of approach, in dealing with them that we do not have with the man on the outside.

These inactive, indifferent, and unconcerned members of our churches ought to be our greatest concern. Doubting Thomas was reclaimed, and brought back into the fold, because the "Other Disciples" put themselves out of their way to interest him. We may not be able to record them at the end of the conference year, as so many conversions, but when the books are opened and the records placed on display, we will receive credit for helping God to save many from the error of their ways.

This committee is unanimous in its recommendation that this Conference put on an intensive campaign throughout this church year, in order to win these precious souls back to God and the church. This can be accomplished by organizing our loyal devoted members into two groups. A young people's group to interest and win our young people, and an adult group to work with adults. These groups to meet with the pastor to engage in earnest, fervent prayer for guidance after which individual cases may be discussed and these names given to members of their respective groups, best suited to approach them. After ample time has been given to these workers, to see the individuals for whom they are responsible, the pastor will call them together again, that they may report the results of their efforts. We believe this will only bring back these spiritual delinquents, but will act as a spiritual tonic to our churches, and will promote growth in grace in our individual members.

Fifth. We re-emphasize what was said in last year's report, regarding the "Won by One" campaign. God has blessed, and is blessing, and will continue to bless this great work carried on by Brother W. A. Melvin, a member of this committee. Brother Melvin states that he is getting about fifty letters each day from individuals who have definitely accepted Christ.

This committee strongly advises that on every charge there should be at least a two week's evangelistic meeting with a definite purpose of immediate decisions for Christ.

We also re-emphasize the suggestions made in the report of last year, that we avail ourselves of the opportunities afforded us on special days such as New Year, Mother's Day, Children's Day, Rally Day, Christmas Day, and especially at the Holy Communion service, to win people to Christ.

We are advised of the coming Evangelistic Campaign in Baltimore September 26 to October 10, under the leadership of that peerless world evangelist, Gipsy Smith of England. Meetings will be held daily for fifteen days in the Fifth Regiment Armory. Our Preachers Meeting of Baltimore is unitedly supporting this proposed campaign.

We most heartily endorse this Campaign and urge all our ministers and people in the proximity of Baltimore to render their heartiest cooperation.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CHURCH LIBRARIES

(See Journal Page 21)

The ad interim committee appointed by the President of the Conference to study methods of promoting church libraries presents the following report:

First: We recognize the fact that though there are more religious books printed and read today than in any other age there are still many church members who are unacquainted with this important section of literature. Our church members will read and we therefore ought to encourage them to read the worthy religious books. Intelligent and informed Christians who know something of the message and program of Christianity and the problems which confront the world of today will more sympathetically support the church than those who have given no time, thought, study, to the Christian Enterprise.

We also recognize the fact that the solution of many of the social and personal problems which confront us must ultimately be found in religious convictions and attitudes which will lead to Christ-like actions. These attitudes and convictions will come through service, prayer, and study. The vital importance of a reading church ought to be apparent to all the members of this Conference. Believing that one method of encouraging our people to read the worthy religious books is by the establishment of Church Libraries we make the following recommendations.

First, We recommend that the President of the Conference appoint a Church Library Commission of five members. This commission to be appointed annually. This commission shall prepare and distribute a Church Library Bulletin which shall contain the following information.

- A. Why and How Establish and Operate a Church Library.
- B. The purpose, nature and scope of a Church Library.

C. A list of worthwhile religious books for general readers and church workers.

Second, We recommend that the Commission through bulletins and the Methodist Protestant-Recorder shall from time to time publish book lists which will aid local Church Librarians in the selection of books.

Third, We recommend that the commission elect one of its members to act as Secretary, who will correspond with pastors and church librarians and those who may be interested in the work of the commission.

Fourth, That this Conference appropriate the sum of fifty dollars to be used by this commission for printing, postage and such other expenses as may be incurred.

Fifth, That in the event five or more church libraries are established this commission shall confer with our Board of Publication and seek a 10% discount on all books purchased from our Book Store by Church Libraries on the recommendation of this commission. The money thus secured to be used as an expense fund for future work by the commission.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL SUPPORT

Your Committee on Pastoral Support met and carefully considered the conditions throughout the Maryland Annual Conference. By a comparison of the report as given in the Conference Minutes of 1930 and in 1936, we disclosed that there had been a reduction of \$39,696 in pastoral support in this Conference during that period. This of necessity caused much hardship to ministers and their families especially among those receiving the smaller salaries where much of this reduction occurred.

In view of the fact that living costs have risen to 92% of the peak days of prosperity and are still rising, your committee deemed it ad-

visable to take up this matter with each Quarterly Conference with the view of having some of the reduction reinstated. To this end your Committee sent out a communication to each Quarterly Conference calling attention to conditions and making a request for an increase in pastoral support wherever possible.

We are happy to report that as a result of this effort thirty-three charges have raised their pastoral support amounting to a total of \$5,332.00. We trust that this most excellent beginning shall continue until every minister in the Conference may secure an adequate support.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JEWISH WORK

(See Journal Page 23)

Through the labors of Rev. F. L. Hertzfeld, a Hebrew Christian, who is cooperating with your committee in his work, we wish to make our second annual report to the Maryland Conference. Brother Hertzfeld's report to this committee shows that during the year:

He has made 315 visits in homes, 60 visits to foreign vessels, 51 visits to hospitals, and 75 visits to penal institutions.

He has led 6 Jews and 45 Gentiles to profess conversion.

He has baptized 2 adults and four infants.

He has conducted 11 funerals for Gentiles.

He has assisted 5 families in procuring food.

He has gotten clothing for 5 children, enabling them to attend Sunday school.

He has distributed 2115 tracts in English, 680 in German, 150 in Hebrew, 525 in Lithuanian, 650 in Polish, 315 in Italian, 575 in Spanish, and 310 in Russian.

He has distributed 250 Bibles and New Testaments in English, 118 in Jewish, 25 in Italian and 25 in German.

He has distributed parts of the Gospel; 400 in English, 100 in Jewish, 75 in Spanish, 55 in Italian, 75 in Polish, and 25 in German.

We offer the following recommendations.

First, that the work be continued, and that the President of the Conference appoint a committee to supervise the work during the year.

Second, that the name of this committee be changed from that of the Committee on Jewish Work to that of the Committee on Alien Religious and Social Work.

Third, that this Conference make an appropriation of \$50.00 to the Committee for the purpose of purchasing literature in foreign languages to be used in its missionary activities.

To the Maryland Annual Conference

### Dear Brethren:

The Board of Administration which recently met in annual session in Atlantic City canvassed with much thoroughness the needs of the denomination and among other important questions took positive action in the following matters, having made them our church program for this fiscal year, and authorized their communication to all of the annual conferences of the church for their approval and with the request for their projection in the annual conference areas.

- 1. The Methodist Protestant-Recorder—That a campaign for new subscriptions to the paper be launched of a most vigorous character,—the outline of the campaign to be submitted by the Board of Publication with the editor as chairman, and submitted herewith in attached form, the same as published in the paper of last week.
- A campaign for funds to put our financial house in order. Board of Christian Education and the Board of Missions have an aggregate debt of approximately \$90,000. Many of our annual conferences have troublesome obligations or are facing the necessity of immediate solicitation of funds to meet most pressing needs. The Board of Administration, their full deliverance in the matter herewith attached, authorized an immediate joint appeal for funds wherein each conference being apportioned a goal for the relief of the Boards would add a like amount for its own affairs and the receipts shared on an equal basis, and outside the regular world service and annual conference budgets. A committee was authorized with the president of the General Conference as chairman which should work out all the details and submit the same to the annual conferences. This committee has been in session and submits herewith as a part of this report the fuller conditions of this undertaking. The Conference is asked to take the whole matter under advisement and to institute such measures of cooperation as may be necessary.
  - 3. The report of the Committee on "Bringing people to God", is a really remarkabble statement of the methods and technique in the realm of evangelism. The content of this report is worthy of much study and application. Nothing in the work of the Christian Church has become so apparently important in recent days as this matter of winning people to Christ. The only way to have a better world is to have better people in the world. And while there is not the slightest cessation in the emphasis on the social application of the gospel it is evident that conversion is primary and that the church must again be troubled in spirit over lost people. While there are no recommendations in this paper there is however much that may be appropriated for general use. It is the intention of the General Conference officials to provide a working foundation covering the Lenten and the Easter period and have it ready in ample time for pastors' consultation and use.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY OF THE MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

To the Maryland Annual Conference;

#### Dear Brethren

The year has not been without a forward step in church and parsonage improvements and erection. Two churches have been completed during the year and dedicated free of debt, the Afton Church on Northumberland Charge and the Riverton Church on Mardela Charge. While these were not directly under the supervision of this board, the President of the Conference acting as church extension superintendent, has given counsel to the pastors and official boards in both cases. As well as building, extended repairs were made to church and parsonage property.

The major enterprise which has claimed our attention has been the erection of the Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church in Washington, D. C. A contract for its erection was signed on April 3, 1936. The work has not progressed rapidly. However, I think the time taken has given us a better constructed building.

I wish here to express my appreciation of the fine spirit manifested by the contractor and the very careful supervision of the overseer of the work as well as the oversight and inspection on the part of our architect.

The building is now near completion. The contract for furnishings has been let and we are expecting the same to be installed in time for the formal opening in the early fall. The congregation has been worshiping in the social hall since Easter Sunday. There has been a decided increase in the interest manifested on the part of the people of the community since we began the erection of the church edifice. As has been

often stated, this community affords an excellent opportunity for the building up of a strong church membership. They have received about 60 members this year and increased their local budget very materially.

The contract price for the erection of the building was \$52,479.70. The contract for the furnishings including all pews, wainscoting, pulpit and pulpit furniture, choir furniture, altar rail, baptismal font, and hymn boards, etc., amounts to \$4,200.00. The lighting fixtures will cost \$668.00.

A canvass for funds to be applied to the erection of this church has been made during the year which has resulted in pledges to the amount of \$3,776.00, \$2,251.40 of which has been paid. There are twelve charges having one pledge and forty-five charges with more than one pledge, making a total of fifty-seven charges represented in these subscriptions. Eighty-six charges have not as yet responded. Some have informed the President of the Conference that they will respond at the Annual Conference. It is not our purpose to close this appeal but rather to press it until every charge is represented in the offering.

In addition to the above, the Board of Managers has given careful consideration to all matters brought before them and rendered such a sistance as in their judgment was possible.

## **OBITUARIES**

#### REV PHILIP WAXTER CROSBY



Philip Waxter Crosby, a good servant of Jesus Christ, was born July 28, 1878 in Baltimore, Maryland and was translated January 22, 1937, from the Maryland General Hospital, Baltimore, at the age of 58 years, six months. His parents were George and Sarah Crosby and later moved into Anne Arundel County. During the pastorate of Rev. H. L. Schlincke he was converted and united with the Severn His early education was had in the public schools of his neighborhood and later entered Millersville Academy. Having been called into the gospel ministry he entered the Westminster Theological Seminary, was graduated after a three year's course of study in 1902, and after spending most of a year

in the Illinois Conference was received into the membership of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in April 1903 at Pocomoke City, Md. The next year he was ordained an elder in the Church of Christ. June 1, 1904, he was united in marriage to Blanche Leigh at her home in Fairfax, Virginia. Three daughters blessed this marriage bond who with their mother survive the dear father and husband—Elizabeth Crosby Stieff, Margaret Crosby Spring, Blanche Leigh Crosby.

This is the official record of his ministerial career: Fairfax, 1903, 1904; Fairview, 1905; Leeds, 1906; without appointment at own request, 1907, 1908; Bethany, 1909-1911; Reliance, 1912-1915; Howard, 1916, 1917; Dover and Leipsic, 1918-1920; North Carolina Avenue, Washington, 1921-1926; Towson, 1927, 1928; Lauraville, 1929-1933; Pocomoke City, 1934, 1935; St. Luke's, 1936.

So briefly may a life time be tabulated. And yet who shall tell, save the recording angel of God, the records of good deeds done, friendships made, sermons preached, men, women and children won unto everlasting life, monies secured for the great benevolences of the kingdom, visits to rich and poor, sick and needy, days of hard toil, nights of fitful sleep, sacrifices gladly endured yea, time would fail us in attempting fully to add up the sum total of values relating to this good man's devotion and ministry. The last earthly rites were held in the Edmondson Avenue Church and were in charge of the President of the Conference, E. A. Sexsmith, assisted by the pastor, L. B. Smith and others, following which

the dear body of our beloved was laid to rest in Loudon Park Cemetery, Baltimore.

Sunday morning, May 9, his church, St. Luke's, Philadelphia, held a memorial service. It was largely attended. The sermon was preached by J. H. Straughn and many indeed were the beautiful expressions of appreciation and love spoken by the members and friends of the church as a tribute to the extent to which he had won their confidence. Perhaps no church he had ever served had rallied so completely to his leadership. He had found his way into their homes, they found his preaching helpful and inspiring, the organized life of the church was functioning most happily and the attendance at all services, on the Sabbath and through the week were exceedingly gratifying. There was every promise of an enduring and blessed pastorate. On the oak paneling, at the rear of the pulpit platform, beside several others a brass plate to his memory had been placed by the congregation and was unveiled at this memorial service.

In the Annual Conference "Phil" had but recently begun to take a prominent part in its affairs, although fr years he had been most dutiful in his attendance and in his interest. It seems a bit odd that one possessed of such a magnificant body, well over sixt feet in height and proportionately fashioned, a fine mind, a most attractive personality, should have been hesitant in assuming leadership. But it was much in keeping with his whole character. He was never aggressive although he was forceful, he was never presumptuous and yet courageous. He never worried presidents about his appointments, and he was not unambitious. He was mentally, spiritually and physically qualified to serve the best appointments the Conference had to offer. In whatever place he was he did his duty. No doubt had he lived he would have come to the very forefront in the leadership and in the confidence of his brethren.

One of his best friends in the ministry, G. I. Humphreys, greatly prized his worth, knowing him very well indeed and in the following paragraphs, expresses the feeling of many:

Phil Crosby—as we affectionately called him—was an all-round man. In physique, mentality and moral qualities, he stood out conspicuously among his fellows, and we unconsciously paid tribute.

My acquaintance with Phil dates back nearly forty years to his Seminary days, while I was yet in college; and there on College Hill I came to respect and appreciate this stalwart Seminarian.

When I entered the Conference, a few years after he became a member, our close association began. I think I can say, simply and sincerely, that through our more than thirty years' association in conference fellowship that I always ranked this brother as among the outstanding members. He was a progressive in thought and planning for the conference program and yet always constructive in his approach to the forward look.

He was forceful in the pulpit, faithful as a pastor, a parish builder, a promoter of the General Church interests, a conference loyalist. He ranks among the first of that number who sought and seek to build for tomorrow. I counted it a personal honor to feel that he numbered me among his close personal friends, and truly, I counted him as mine. In these past seven years, distance has separated us, and our close working fellowship in conference association was broken, but it weakened, in no sense, our genuine friendship. Phil Crosby was a friend, not for what that friendship might bring him, but for what he could bring to it. Such friends are rare and to have such a friend is a priceless privilege.

I add this final word: I honored and loved Phil—honored him for his sterling qualities, evident to all; and loved him for his spirit revealed in intimate friendship. I have a sense of personal loss in his going away in life's early afternoon, and I have a feeling that our Conference is the weaker and a bit poorer for his going. His name will always be honored among his conference brethren, and his memory lovingly revered by his inner circle of friends within the fraternity.

Very reverently I say-in Phil Crosby, God built himself a man.

"We are all blind until we see That in the human plan Nothing is worth the making if It does not make the man."

And among laymen he had made for himself a place of high regard and respect, not only for his genuineness as a minister, as a preacher, where one may naturally turn to find such, but also on the common level of real manhood and in the possession of sound judgment, level headedness and real sincerity. Paul E. Keedy, associated with him in the Lauraville pastorate, had every opportunity of knowing and understanding him. His appraisement is this:

His spiritual and ministerial qualities were enhanced by a marked ability in the administration of his pastorate. The active and responsible laymen were quick to recognize and respect and to follow practical ideas tending to stabilize their organizations and put their church on a more progressive program. And this was always accomplished in a somewhat passive way; the leaders of his churches seemingly became imbued with a new sense of responsibility created by an encouraging suggestion or by a timely sermon. Personal problems of parishioners or friends were given much time and consideration by him, so that in truth he became mere than a spiritual advisor, one that of necessity tempered his advice in the same manner as a wise medical physician. Thus, it came about that one of his most difficult charges heavily burdened with debt and despair was successfully piloted through the years of a depression. His realism was one which he recognized himself and made effective use of it for his Father's business.

In summarizing his character perhaps the one word 'honorable' comes as near describing him as any we might select. Phil Crosby owed no man anything save to love him. If he cherished animosities or kept prejudices

they were not evident either in his conversations or in his attitudes. He was often candid in his judgment or criticism of people but bitterness and hostility, even unkindness, was never present. He was honest in his every relationship. He paid his bills and paid them promptly. How he so studiously managed his personal affairs puzzled many, especially in the fact that at no time did he receive a large salary. He was never extravagant but in personal appearance he was always well groomed and most presentable. His home was conducted with the same scrupulous care—everything well regulated and a house that was always in order. His personal habits and work were on the same ordered schedule. It was his habit, for example, to have finished on his desk by Saturday noon the two sermons he was to deliver the next day. His church work was administered after the same careful fashion, as attested in Mr. Keedy's tribute.

The Maryland Conference has suffered a real loss in his death. He would have been more and more useful. His towering frame would have won added admiration. His essential goodness, his piety, his faith, his love of his calling would have given him increased influence and power in his pursuit of the things of the kingdom of God. For, in evidence, the quietness with which he accepted and faced his last illness, hoping and trusting always to recover yet realizing always the seriousness of the case. He never quailed, never complained. Peacefully, fearlessly he squarely faced the inevitable issue. He had much to live for. He loved his home, his wife, his girls, dearly. He loved his work and was so eager to return to it. He was but middle age, more than a decade remaining of the allotted span. It was not God's will. One more of Maryland's faithful has gone forth to fellowship with the Heavenly host. Let us all thank God for so fine a person.

#### REV. GEORGE R. DONALDSON

Rev. George R. Donaldson was born September 11, 1868, at Chesapeake City, Maryland. His death following a case of pneumonia, occurred on Sunday, January 24, 1937, at the age of 68 years, 4 months and 13 days. He is survived by his widow who was before her marriage Miss Mary E. Curtis of Down's Chapel near Clayton, Delaware, and one son. G. R., Jr. Funeral services were conducted in Baltimore, Maryland, Wednesday, January 27, at 9 A. M., by the President of the Conference, Rev. E. A. Sexmith, D.D., and the Chairman of the Committee on Obituary of the deceased. The body was then taken to Laurel, Delaware, for interment the same day. Twenty-four ministers were present at the funeral services in Baltimore, and a number of others also at the burial services. Honorable James Harry Preston, former Mayor of Baltimore, with whom George R. Donaldson, Jr., is associated in the practice of law,



was also present at the funeral services.

Brother Donaldson was connected by blood relationship with at least three prominent families in Cecil County,-the Prices, the Brattons and the Reeses. His parents were Robert and Mary Rose Donaldson. His father was for a long time a faithful member of the Methodist Protestant Church, once located in Chesapeake City, but now extinct. At the time this church was closed, he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, but he never forsook the principles of the Methodist Protestant Church as a matter of deep conviction. He was a saintly Christian and practiced regularly the unique custom of having family prayer at every meal time.

In such a deeply spiritual atmosphere the son, George, was born and reared. After completing his public school education near his home, he entered the Wesleyan Collegiate Institute at Dover, Delaware. In the meantime he was assigned to a pastorate in the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Épiscopal Church, and did most acceptable work for one year, after which he united with the Maryland Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in 1892 and was ordained in 1895.

During his ministry he was blessed with several most gracious revivals, one resulting in sixty-six conversions. In a revival during his ministry at Mardela Springs, Maryland, many of the men of the community were converted, including some of the most prominent and active present members of the churches on that charge, and Rev. Lee Elliot, a successful member of this Conference. During that same pastorate Mt. Pleasant Church on that charge was built Later during a pastorate at Sharptown, Maryland, the fine parsonage, now located beside the church was brought to its present commodious state to the delight of all his successors.

The members of the Maryland Conference knew George Donaldson as a most modest man. In fact his modesty was to a fault. He was often chided by his brethren for his persistent silence in Conference sessions. He had wholesome convictions, and helpful opinions, with ample ability to express them effectively, but either modesty or a self consciousness seemed always to keep him in the background as an interested listener. For this reason alone, his prominence as a member of the Conference was unfortunately limited more than it should have been by a silence which cannot always be called "golden." We could have wished that he had ignored Shakespeare's advice in this respect: "Give thy thoughts no tongue." But perhaps he felt as did another that "Silence is the sanctuary of prudence," or with Carlyle that "Speech is great, but silence is

greater." The Earl of Beaconsfeld has said, however, "There are some silent people who are more interesting than the best talkers."

This man of God was a good preacher. His sermons were helpful and delivered ofttimes with a measure of eloquence. People never tired of him. At every charge he served, he was invited to return each year by popular vote. He had the faculty of retaining friends on every charge long after he had left, and his contacts with them were never hurtful to his successors. One of the laymen on this Committee, whom Brother Donaldson frequently visited during vacation times, recalls a remark frequently made by the visitor in his home. "Said Brother Donaldson, 'I believe in the Eleventh Commandment that bids us attend to our own business and leave that of others alone,' and he did it."

Life in the Donaldson home was delightful. The business of ministerial duties was never allowed to be so pressing as to exclude attention to his high priestly duties at home, where in tender affection he commanded "his children and his household after him." The loss of a son by drowning some years ago brought unspeakable grief to his father's heart. In turn he centered his affection and sacrificial attention upon George, Jr., who always reciprocated that affection in a most exemplary manner. Seldom ever was there found a father and son relationship so close in every respect as that which existed between this good man and his son. As a father and a husband, he believed it to be a Christian's privilege to enjoy a Christian home, and he did it.

Brother Donaldson gave forty-four years to the active ministry of the Maryland Conference, serving sixteen of its pastoral charges. At the close of his sixth year on Marley Charge he expressed regret that he did not feel able to continue longer in the active ministry, and desiring to afford a home for his faithful companion and their devoted son, he asked for a superannuate relationship and retired. A short time before his death their new home in Hamilton was completed, and with the family he was enjoying it immensely when stricken with a severe cold, developing rapidly into pneumonia, which, due to an asthmatic condition of long standing, he was unable to combat. His passing takes from us another of those rare friendships in the flesh which we as preachers so much enjoy. As Oliver Wendell Holmes expressed it,

"Fast as the rolling seasons bring The hour of fate to those we love, Each pearl that leaves the broken spring Is set in friendship's crown above.

As narrower grows the earthly chain, The circle widens in the sky; These are our treasures that remain, But those are stars that beam on high."

## REV. CHARLES KERR McCASLIN



The Voice of Charles Kerr Mc-Caslin, at the opening Roll Call of this session of the Maryland Annual Conference, was silent. Yet, in the Hall of grateful and loving Memory, it was vocal; and, in countless hearts and homes, it will forever ring as a sweet song. His natural birth was June 9, 1863, at Chestnut Ridge, Baltimore County, Md. His spiritual birth was September 30, 1886, at the altar of the Broadway Methodist Protestant Church, Baltimore. His entrance into the fellowship of that Christian Brotherhood was December 12, 1886. His matriculation in the Westminster Theological Seminary was the following February. He joined the Maryland Annual Conference at its session in Pocomoke City in 1892,

and one year later at its session in Laurel, Delaware, he was ordained.

As an itinerant preacher he served Dover, Harper's Ferry, Chesapeake, Accomac, Liberty, Bel Air, Sharptown, Lisbon, Snow Hill, Potomac, Finksburg, Fawn Grove, Warwick, and Wesley Chapel of Kent. Two of these charges he served twice: Bel Air and Chesapeake. The name Chesapeake had been changed to Wesley Chapel of Kent, where he reached his journey's end after eight months from the date of his last appointment. February 15, 1937, while paying a pastor visit his heart suddenly failed and he was translated to his "house n made with hands." In the same church in which on the preceding Sa bath he had preached with his usual force and fervor, his funeral ceremon, was conducted by the President of the Conference, Dr. E. A. Sexsmith, assisted by Rev. A. N. Stubblevine of the Presbyterian Church, and by these brethren of our Conference: J. L. Marker, W. P. Roberts, H. L. Elderdice, J. H. Straughn, and W. F. Bauscher. His burial was at Harper's Ferry where three years before he had laid to rest the body of his wife.

Though he had outlived the allotted span of human life by three years, eight months and six days, yet his body was still strong, his mind alert, and his spirit bouyant. All he was in creed and character and all he accomplished in his thirteen parishes during the more than two score years of ministerial service are beyond human record and recital known only to the All-Seeing Eye; but we may easily echo a few of the many encomiums paid by those who knew him best and loved him most.

The Voice of the Maryland Conference, speaking through its Annual Official Reports, pays tribute to his obedience to his ordination vows, and to his loyalty to the programs of the General Conference, his Annual Conference, and his local churches. He was not a lover of the publicity of

pulpit eloquence, nor a selfish seeker after the loaves and fishes of the prominent parishes; but when the Plan of Appointments was read, he gratefully accepted his assignment however obscure, went cheerfully to his post of duty, and there for the ensuing year obeyed his marching orders like a good soldier of the Cross. His modesty, self-effacement, and refusal to resent a personal injury are evidenced by this page from the diary of a Conference President. This official was requested by a delegate to appoint to his charge a new pastor-any minister except C. K. McCaslin, for some peculiar reason or prejudice. Under the complex and conflicting claims of scores of delegates seeking an exchange of shepherds and the heart-rending appeals of scores of shepherds for new pastures, the President forgot all about the unusual and unjust request of that prejudiced delegate, and told Brother McCaslin that he had decided upon his appointment, and behold it proved to be the one place where he was not wanted. Totally ignorant of the peculiar situation, he gladly agreed to go, but when the delegate learned of the proposal the storm broke. To calm it the forgetful President told his ministerial brother the whole unwelcome truth. Whereupon his noble manhood and self-sacrificing spirit were disclosed by his request for some other appointment—any one within the bounds of the Conference. Under the ruling of a just and wise Providence there was a happy sequel to this unhappy experience, when, years later another President who knew nothing of this episode appointed our beloved brother to this identical charge, where he was welcomed by his parishioners and blessed with a peaceful and prosperous pastorate.

The Voice of his Local Churches, speaking through the many organizations and private homes of the more than a dozen charges served by him may be pitched to many keys, but there is a harmonious blending in the chorus of praise. A member of this committee has worded the testimony which numberless parishioners echo: "Those who were privileged to know Rev. Charles Kerr McCaslin through his devoted years in the ministry could not fail to benefit by their contact with this true man of God. His deep spiritual life reflected his implicit faith and his constant communion with God. He, in every sense of the word, exemplified the prayer: 'Let the beauty of Jesus be seen in me.' Our hearts are heavy with the passing of our beloved minister. To know him was to love him, but we know that our loss is his gain; so we lift our hearts to God in gratitude for his life and our congenial association as pastor, brother, and friend. he has gone from our midst the loving memory of his Christ-like example inspires his followers to attain the goal that he so ardently set before them." Another lay member of this committee has this tribute to pay: friendly hand and a kindly smile he endeared himself to all who knew him. His sense of humor was a byword among his brethren and the contagion of his mirth spread through any company he graced. He was an excellent preacher with a faculty for apt expression. The Conference lost one of its noblest members when he passed away."

Some of his happiest experiences occurred in the parish he last served. To this charge he brought his bride; here was a double baptismal ceremony in which the first-born son of Rev. W. B. Judefind was baptized by Brother McCaslin and the first-born son of Brother McCaslin was baptized by Rev. W. B. Judefind, and here, during his second and last pastorate the last

person he received into church membership was his youngest daughter. How fitting that this thrice blessed field of service proved to be the gateway to his goal—the church triumphant! It is also fitting that a member of this church during both administrations of our departed brother should speak this word of praise: "The happy groom and bride endeared themselves to the flock; and, when in the evening-tide of life he returned to these loyal people, he came back with the same bright, cheerful disposition that made him beloved by all who knew him." During his Seminary days he formed a friendship with a ministerial member of this Obituary Committee, a friendship that was cemented by close contact while serving the adjacent charges of Accomac and Parksley, and which qualifies him to bear this glad witness: "He was considered by his pepole to be a good preacher and pastor. He did good work in his various fields of labor and we are sure he has entered into his reward." All his Conference brethren who were favored by entrance into his inner life agree that "there is no man among us more highly respected and sincerely loved." Even those whose acquaintance with him was only casual cherish pleasant memories of "a genial man, witty and wise."

There is also abundant testimony to his practical qualification as a church builder. His decoration of the Liberty Church transformed it into "a thing of beauty," and his building of the new church in Bel Air was a marvel of financial achievement. While at supper in the parsonage one Sunday evening fire broke out in the church hard by. Before the Fire Company could come to the rescue it was in ashes. The faithful few who had come to worship remained around the ruins to weep. But their mourning was immediately turned into rejoicing when Mrs. Mc-Caslin received a subscription for a new church. It soon arose, phoenix-like, and Brother McCaslin crowned his building career by dedicating it free of debt, in spite of the fact that the probable "net worth of the membership did not exceed the cost of the church."

The Voice of the Family also speaks through this Memorial Report The scenes and associations of the fireside are too sacred for the public gaze but some of the deepest impressions as to his parental worth are due the public. The elder daughter may well be happy to remember that "he began every day with an individual prayer for every member of the home circle. He kept in such unending contact with the Heavenly Father that it seemed as if everything would be all right, because he prayed. He told me many times that he never did anything without first talking it over with God." And the eldest son pens within a paragraph the epitome of his father's creed and character: "The most outstanding feature of Dad's whole life was his love for his chosen calling. He was loyal to the Methodist Protestant Church and he had a finer sense of duty than any man I ever knew. His even temperament was admired by every one who knew him. He was not given to alarm or excitement, and he know the meaning of subordination to its fullest extent. To him the officials of the church meant all that their titles implied, and he stood ready to carry out their wishes and their programs. He never pushed himself forward, and sometimes I think he should have done so. However, his way of living and his treatment of the questions of life allowed him to live a

peaceful and beautiful life, the memory of which is a great inspiration to his children and all who knew him."

His survivors are two daughters and four sons: William Reese, Grand Rapids, Michigan; Ellsworth Leary, Baltimore, Md.; Louisa P. Barnett, Alexandria, Va.; Charles Kerr, Dunmore, Pa; Roger Milbourne, Wilmington, Delaware, and Ruth Gorsuch, Bel Air, Md. His wife, Mary Louise Perejoy, whom he married May 29, 1896, died March 8, 1934.

The Voice of Charles Kerr McCaslin, could it be heard by the ear of faith, speaks to his sorrowing family and friends these words of comfort:

"Oh! seek me not within the tomb— Thou shalt not find me in the clay; I pierce a little wall of gloom To mingle with the day."

#### REV. WILLIAM SUMNER HANKS, D.D.



Rev. W. S. Hanks, D. D., was a son of the late Rev. Ruel Hanks, D.D., of the New York Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and of Harriet Hanks. He went to be with Jesus in Paradise on the morning of Palm Sunday, March 21, 1937, being eighty-one years of age.

He was converted under his father's ministry when but a lad, made his educational preparation for the ministry at Adrian College, united with his father's conference in the fall of 1879 and served successively: Main Street, Paterson, New Jersey; (Here he married Miss Alice Fletcher) New London, Connecticut; Pittson, Pennsylvania, and Canterbury, Connecticut. He then served as a loan—Canterbury, Connecticut, Congregational and Middletown,—New

York Congregational Churches. In 1891 he transferred from the New York to the Pittsburgh Conference and served Knoxville, Pennsylvania; New Cumberland, West Virginia; Second Church, Pittsburgh, and Trinity, North Side, Pittsburgh. While in the Pittsburgh Conference he was

honored by his Alma Mater with the Doctor of Divinity Degree. In 1906 he brought his transfer to the Maryland Conference and served as pastor—Oxford, Brooklyn, Evergreen, Waverly, Kent Island, Union Bridge and Salem. After Superannuation, he lived at Oxford, Maryland, and Cannon, Delaware, except for a year when he taught at Pine Ridge School.

Mrs. Hanks died in 1926 and Miss Ruella, Doctor Hanks' sister, became his partner in the home and was his faithful ally and helper until his going. She, with a brother, George, of Port Jervis, New York, and a son, Fletcher, are his survivors.

During his last years he was a great physical sufferer but was patient in tribulation to the point of rejoicing. He said recently, "Until my bodily suffering came, I never knew how much it meant to wait on the Lord. When pain keeps me awake nights, my communion with and meditation of Him is sweet." An old friend writes, "Dear old Dr. Hanks, he was a good servant of the Lord." His great desire during his confinement to the home was to preach Jesus if only once more. This was not to be his privilege in the pulpit, but he preached faithfully to callers in his home.

He was a clear thinker as was to be expected of one so scholarly. His spiritual insight was no less profound. A member of the committee writes, "Dr. Hanks was a man of superior intellect and in his latter days that intellect became charged with a remarkable ability to interpret the scriptures. It was a joy to sit with him and hear him open the Word." In personal contact, he was sympathetic and understanding, especially so with young preachers. In his pulpit work, he was of quiet dignity and earnestness in the delivery of the message. Ability to read clearly the scriptures in the pulpit put him in a class with the most gifted.

In both public and private, he impressed strongly those in his presence with the genuineness of his Christianity. His faith in God was so real that it made one feel that God was right there. He was indeed a good man and full of the Holy Spirit. We who knew him best feel it yet, so "he being dead yet speaketh" and we who loved him rejoice.

Going to heaven was just as real to Dr. Hanks as going on any other journey. In conversation one day he spoke of the friendship he had had with Dr. J. L. Elderdice while they both lived at Oxford. In a matter of fact way he said: "I told Dr. Elderdice that if he went to heaven before me, to be sure and find my father and tell him about our friendship down here and give him my love." Dr. Elderdice preceded him and he felt sure his message had been conveyed to his father.

#### Dr. Hanks:

You are not dead—Life has but set you free!
Your years of life were like a lovely song,
The last sweet poignant notes of which—held long—
Passed into silence while we listened, we
Who loved you, listened still expectantly!
And we about you, whom you moved among,
Would feel that grief for you, were surely wrong—
You have but passed beyond where we can see

For us who knew you, dread of age is past! You took life, tiptoe, to the very last; It never lost for you its lovely look; You kept your interest, in its thrilling book: To you, death came, no conqueror, in the end—You merely smiled to greet another friend.

#### REV. BRADLEY WILSON KINDLEY

Rev. Bradley Wilson Kindley, the subject of this obituary, was born near Monrovia, Frederick County, Maryland, on February 11, 1862, and went to his heavenly home April 21, 1937. He was the son of George Frederick and Elizabeth Boyer Kindley. His father was a well known local minister 40 years ago, and was the delegate from Frederick Charge to the Maryland Conference several times. He was active in the building of the Pleasant Grove Church which afterwards became a part of Kemptown Charge. It is not definitely known when Brother Kindley was converted and joined the church, but it was while he was yet a boy, as he often referred to it in the family circle. He was educated in the public schools, Western Maryland College and the Westminster Theological Seminary. He was received into the Conference at the session of 1885 and was ordained at the session of 1887.

He was married to Francis Helen Robinson in Grace Methodist Protestant Church, Bel Air, Maryland, May 27, 1890, his father and the Rev. S. A. Hoblitzel officiating. There were born to this union three children: Charlotte Robinson and William J. of Bel Air, and George F. of Washington, D C. His wife preceded him to the Heavenly Home March 11, 1929. It is fitting that we add a word here about this lovely Christian lady. It was my great privilege to know her well, and to be entertained in that home. There was a winsomeness and sincerity about her that gave her personality a rare charm, and endeared her to every one who ever knew her. She was an unfailing source of comfort and help to her husband, and her "children rise up and call her blessed."

Brother Kindley's active ministry extended from 1885 to 1928 when he superannuated. From 1910 to 1914 he served as Executive Secretary of the Maryland Sunday School Association. Here he was eminently successful, and effected such changes in the organization and administration of the Association as to place the work on a firm and lasting foundation. Brother Kindley served the following charges: Mt. Pleasant, afterwards changed to Mt. Tabor, Leipsic, Harper's Ferry, Deer Creek, Milton, Greenwood, Cumberland, twice, Pipe Creek, Centreville, Seaford, Bel Air, Nichol's Memorial, Linthicum Heights, and Delta.

I do not remember when I first made the acquaintance of Rev. B. W. Kindley, but our friendship was firmly established when he moved to Centreville, Maryland, in 1902, and we became neighbors. I saw him frequently and was in his home quite often, and always, he was the same courteous, understanding, and hospitable friend and brother. That friendship ripened into a very close and warm comradeship that remained unbroken until he left us. Brother Kindley was a man of lofty ideals of ministerial conduct and service. He was not capable of doing a common thing for self-advancement. Partisanship was distant from his nature, but he held the ministry and his brethren in very high regard. Being guileless himself he could not impung to another anything that would hurt or tarnish the name of a brother minister. He was friendly without familiarity; dignified without coldness, and I do not think that he ever lost sight of the fact that he was a minister of Jesus Christ. He was a faithful and earnest preacher of the Word. His exposition of the Bible was simple and impressive. To him the Cause came first and he gave to it all he had of heart and mind and strength. While he was pastor of Bel Air Charge, during the World War, he took an active part in looking after the soldiers from Harford County, and frequently gave talks to them before thy marched away to camp, and for a while gave his services gratis to soldiers at Edgewood Arsenal. While he was secretary of the Maryland Sunday School Association he was elected a delegate to the World's Sunday School Convention which met in Zurich, Switzerland, in 1913. This opportunity to meet and mingle with the leaders of Sunday School work from all parts of Christendom was one of the greatest experiences of his life. But other members of the committee must have an opportunity to pay their tributes to the life and work of this noble man of God.

Brother Ogg, his pastor, adds this beautiful tribute: Rev. B. W. Kindley was a refined, courtly, kind, affable, cheery, considerate, sociable gentleman and Christian minister. With these characteristics he made friends quickly and without effort wherever he lived, and retained them. Those of high esteen considered friendship with him a privilege, and he considered it a privilege to be a friend to those of low estate, and all who had contact with him felt the force of his genuine Christianity.

After his retirement from the active pastorate he took up residence with his family in Bel Air, Maryland. His sense of justice and his talents won him an election to a judgeship of the Harford County Orphans' Court. He was serving a second term when he was called to his heavenly home. He was active and faithful to the Methodist Protestant Church in Bel Air, preaching every second Sunday as long as his physical strength permitted. He also taught a class of boys in Sunday school. He was active in the Christian Endeavor and in other societies of the church. He was an inspiring friend and counselor to all, especially the pastor. Dr. Kirk pays this affectionate tribute.

"Fifty-eight years ago B. W. Kindley and I met at Western Maryland College. He had gone there to study for the ministry, and I for the same purpose. The acquaintance formed then with him grew and ripened into a friendship which lasted through a lifetime. We united with the Conference the same year and my heart carried loneliness when this tie was broken and I saw his body borne away.

"In whatever relationship his life is studied it can be said of him, he was 'a workman that needeth not to be ashamed.' Some of the most admirable personal qualities showed themeslves in him. He was genial, quietly serious, he brightened conversation with pleasantries, he never made trouble, a good influence moved along with him, a current of pure air followed his entrance into any company: a high minded man both for himself and for his family.

"As a pastor he shepherded his flocks, knew them by name, guided them, led them into green pastures, and warded off prowling beasts. He felt responsibility for his pastorate, never took it lightly. He was diligent, seeking to develop his church. Steady and not spasmodic in his work. He grew in esteem, and his entrance into homes was welcomed, and there was a feeling that a kind friend had come in. His preaching was a direct presentation of the Word of God. He did not mystify the truth, but sought to give the Bible message so that spiritual blessing would follow. and the people could be fed. In the preaching which it was my privilege to hear from him, one felt that good food had been given, and that heart's love for God made stronger. The prayers offered by him were warm and tender, and the heart was made to feel nearness to God. My high regard for him continued to the day of his death. I feel that he was a beloved and faithful minister, and a fellow servant of the Lord."

### Dr. J. M. Gill pays this tribute:

"I esteem it an honor to be invited to add a line of tribute to the memory of our beloved brother, Reverend B. W. Kindley, who has preceded us to our Father's Home above.

"I met him for the first time on College Hill while we were students. From the very first of my acquaintance with him I learned to love him and to respect him very highly for his splendid social, moral and spiritual qualities. He was modest, humble and unassuming. He had that indefinable talent which enabled him to affect pleasantly those whom he met.

"On his way from his first charge to his second he stopped with me in Baltimore for dinner. After he left my wife, who has long since passed into the good world above, said to me, 'I like Mr. Kindley, he seems to be such a nice man.'

"He lived his genial, attractive bright Christian life along sane and well poised lines. He never allowed himself to be lifted too high or dragged too low by his emotions, nor to be swept from the moorings of his convictions by the surging tides about him.

"There were twelve men in the college when he was a student there, preparing for the ministry. Some of them where rated as brilliant students, some regarded as fine speakers. These twelve men conducted a prayer meeting weekly in the chapel. They took turns in leading the meeting. It was not long before it was observed by many that whenever Brother Kindley led there were more of the non-Christian students present. That fact taught me a most valuable lesson which has had a good effect on my life ever since.

"I saw him a number of times while in the hospital, suffering from his last illness. His weakness and suffering had pulled the cheering smile

from his face but you could discern the fact he still had the smile in his soul, which no pain or disease could take away.

"May God bless his dear family to whom he was always so loving and

true. He has left them a great heritage by the good life he lived."

Brother W. L. Barnes writes:

"Having known Brother B. W. Kindley for many years it is fitting that I should add my mite to the memory of so good a man and personal friend

"While he was not a native of Harford County and served charges in various parts of the state, he was particularly identified with this county and the town of Bel Air, having served this charge faithfully and on his retirement from active work, because of poor health he located here. The record vote given him when a candidate for Judge of the Orphans Court shows his popularity in the county.

In the very early years of his ministry he was assigned as pastor of the Deer Creek Church, siuated on the beautiful hills of the stream bearing that name. He there met the teacher of the nearby school, Miss Fanny Robinson, a refined Christian young lady. In due time they were united in marriage in the Bel Air Church by Brother Hoblitzell.

"Brother Kindley was a high type of the Christian gentleman, devoted to his church but always ready to preach for another minister in need whenever it was possible for him to do so. He was particularly devoted to the Sunday School and up to the time of his going to the hospital he continued to teach his class of boys though it caused him much personal discomfort. We greatly miss him and do not know how to fill the void caused by his transfer to be with the Christ whom he so faithfully preached here on earth."

Brother J. L. G. Lee writes:

"It may be truly said, without fear of a dissenting voice, that when this good man died there passed from earth a gentleman in the fullest sense of the word, a man of broad character, a man who had made a most helpful minister of the Gospel, and later a Judge of the Orphans' Court of Harford County (who dispensed even handed justice to all alike).

"This short sketch is simply a weak tribute to a useful citizen, a friendly neighbor and a good Judge in a Court where the writer, as a practicing lawyer in the Court where Mr. Kindley sat, had occasion to know him well.

There were three things in Mr. Kindley's life which reflected special honor on him and of which he was justly proud.

1. "In 1913 he was chosen a Delegate to the World Wide Convention of Sunday School Members, which met at Zurich, Switzerland, in that year.

This was a broadening experience and great pleasure to him, and also a happiness for his friends who rejoiced with him in it.

2. "Another happy occasion for Mr. Kindley occurred when he was invited to preach the dedication sermon at old historic Union Chapel. This ancient Church, located about five miles south of Bel Air, was used at one time by Episcopalians, Methodists and Quakers alike, and for one hun-

dred years had been a potent influence for good in that community. A handsome new building, seating three hundred persons, had been erected near the original log building, still in use by the members for social gatherings. Mr. Kindley chose as his text the words inscribed around the high pulpit in the old building—"How Amiable are Thy Tabernacles, O Lord of Hosts." This sermon has doubtless been remembered by all who heard him.

3. "However, it is as a Judge of the Orphans' Court that the writer had the honor to know Mr. Kindley best. The Orphans' Court is an unusual one—it is a people's tribunal of a pronounced type. There the affairs of widows and orphans are administered and their property rights determined, and it is a survival of the old Ecclesiastical Courts of England. The idea of being a Judge in that Court readily appealed to Mr. Kindley after his retirement from the ministry in 1928 and his removal to the town of Bel Air to permanently reside. In 1930 Mr. Kindley was elected to sit on this Bench by a large majority which showed his many friends and the great confidence placed in him at the time by the people of Harford County. After four years of useful service on the Orphans' Court Bench, he was re-elected in November 6, 1934, for a second term of four years, and was a member of this Bench when he died.

"He was not a talking Judge, which is defined by the poet to be an ill-tuned cymbal, but a quiet attentive Judge, unruffled and calm in the midst of heated argument of opposing counsel, and rendering a decision always just; gentle in manner, but firm in his conviction. The writer, as an active practitioner in the Courts of the City and State, and especially in his native County of Harford, states without reservation that Mr. Kindley, as Judge, brought to that Bench of three Judges a ripe experience, a sound judgment and a human decision for the justice of the case. He died loved and lamented by the members of the Bar of Harford County and by his fellow Judges and all who came in contact with the Court."

Brother Pollitt writes, that he became acquainted with Brother Kindley when he was connected with the Maryland Sunday School Association, as their offices were in the same building. He saw Brother Kindley frequently, and had every opportunity to know him well. In all their conversations he was impressed with the nobility of the man, and with his unique fitness for the duties of his office. He refers impressively to Brother Kindley's unsparing efforts to raise the standards of efficiency in all branches of the organization. Brother Kindley was the same under all circumstances, a courteous, lovable minister of the Gospel.

His funeral took place from his former residence on Broadway, Bel Air, at 11 o'clock, Friday morning, April 23. The President of the Maryland Conference, Dr. E. A. Sexsmith, conducted the services, assisted by the pastor of the Bel Air Methodist Protestant Church, Rev. G. A. Ogg. A number of the members of the Conference were present from whom all the pallbearers were selected. The interment was at Union Chapel Cemetery.

Brother Kindley has closed his life here, but his works do follow him. The influence of his life will be felt in every community where he ever lived for years to come. And the memory of such a father will ever be an inspiration to his children. May the Heavenly Father comfort them, and keep them until they meet an unbroken family in the beautiful Home above.

#### MRS. ANNIE A. SMITH

Annie A. Smith, widow of the late George Jeffrey Smith, departed this life October 22, 1936. I had the happy privilege of being her pastor for over six years. Madison, on the beautiful shores of the Little Choptank River, was her girlhood home, it was here she met, loved and was loved by the one who was to be her companion through the years. Her body rests in the little church yard where her husband served as pastor.

A bronze tablet in St. Paul's Church, Cambridge, bears her name with others of the Harrington family of which she was a member as a donor of the church organ chimes.

The last time she attended services at Madison Church she quietly made her way to the cemetery, it was there I found her praying at the grave of her beloved husband; she talked to me of him and she was living in the past, dreaming of the future, the present somehow had slipped away from her.

There were many beautiful flowers from loving friends when she departed this life but none so beautiful as the tender sentiments of the other members of this committee.

Of her Rev. J. L. Ward writes: "My acquaintance with Mrs. Annie A. Smith, the widow of Rev. G. J. Smith, carries me back to the early years of my ministerial life, and when I became the pastor of Cambridge Charge, a few years after I first met her and she was living at Madison, I was given a further opportunity to learn more of her beautiful character.

As her pastor covering a period of eight years I saw much of her Christian life in the church, in her home, and in the parsonage where we were always delighted to have her visit with us.

"She loved her church and had its work and progress at heart and she was always ready to do what she could to increase its usefulness and to extend its influence. She was a true friend of her pastor and his family and gave him many words of encouragement in his work. She was a good woman, full of faith, and devoted and consecrated to the cause of right-eousness."

Rev. D. W. Anstine writes: "During the summer of 1879, when I was associate pastor on Dorchester Charge in company with Dr. D. Bates, President of the Maryland Annual Conference, and was entertained in the

home of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Harrington at Madison, I met Miss Annie Harrington who later became the wife of the Rev. George Jeffry Smith.

"Miss Annie seemed to have been born for the position she filled—the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher. She could, I think, adapt herself to any condition. She was always cheerful, patient and hopeful. I never heard her complain, find fault or be dissatisfied with any charge to which the Conference assigned them. She faithfully labored to promote the interests of God's kingdom and the interests of the Methodist Protestant Church"

During the time the Smiths were at the Reliance Charge the parsonage was a meeting place for the whole community—we all looked forward to the evenings spent at the parsonage—it seemed as though Mrs. Smith's personality reached out and touched us all, making us feel a little better by the knowing of her."

Clay Hendricks writes: "I met Rev. and Mrs. Smith in 1889, we found them to be very sociable and lovable people. Mrs. Smith was a great worker for the church, a great help to Mr. Smith. She was a lovable Christian ladv."

#### MRS. FRANK M. CLIFT

Mrs. Eva Jane Mumford Clift, the beloved wife of the Rev. Frank M. Clift, the pastor of Grove Charge of the Maryland Annual Conference, passed to her rich reward from the University Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland, after an operation on Wednesday, February 17th, 1937. Her condition was recognized as most serious when she went to the hospital and she did not recover from the anaesthetic. She had been all her life a faithful and true follower of the blessed Lord; and since 1902, when she became the wife of Brother Clift, she has been a true help-meet, and never failed him when the tasks were hard and the problems were difficult to be solved. She was a Sunday School teacher of unusual ability and a home-maker of great charm.

The funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Episcopal Church, Berlin, Maryland, in which town her parents live; and in the cemetery in that town she was laid to rest, awaiting the resurrection of the just. Doctor E. A. Sexsmith, president of the Maryland Annual Conference, had charge of the funeral, assisted by the pastor of the church. Several of our ministers were present at the funeral to show their sympathy for Brother Clift in his deep sorrow.

Rev. B. F. Ruley, of Delta, Pa., writes: "My acquaintance with Mrs. Clift began when they served Reliance Charge. She and Brother Clift

were often visitors at our home in Seaford, and we were always pleased to have them with us. She possessed a charm that spoke well for her success as mistress of the parsonage and as the wife of our Brother Clift. She was courteous, stately, mentally alert and appreciative of any opportunity which would enable her to help advance the work of her husband.

"Her training as a public school teacher gave her the experience of knowing how to deal with the young. Inspired with a keen intuition, a clarified vision and a regnant faith in God, with high ideals, her consecration responded to all that bore the stamp of her Master's presence. These, with her constant activity, aided her in bearing the burden which became hers as the wife of a Methodist Protestant minister.

Rev. George Hines, of Oxford, Maryland, writes: "I first became acquainted with Sister Clift when I assisted Brother Clift in a revival meeting in the church at Oak Grove, Virginia, in 1912. As I was entertained in the parsonage, I had ample opportunity to observe those traits of character so essential in the wife of an itinerant minister.

"Sister Clift was first of all a cultured and an accomplished Christian lady, and a true help-meet in every way. Her heart was in the ministry and her talents were consecrated to the one business of supplementing the labors of her husband. She was cheerful in her home, and friendly and helpful in her relations with the members and friends of the church.

"Sister Clift did not arrogate to herself leadership in the churches her husband served, but her personality, and her intelligent grasp of the needs and problems of the church, won for her the confidence and co-operation of all with whom it was her privilege to labor in the Master's vineyard."

Mr. N. J. Wimbrow, of Whaleyville, Maryland, writes: "Were I to try, I could not say too much in commemoration of Mrs. Eva Clift. She is not dead. Her kind never die, but continue to live in the hearts of all those who came into contact with them. She occupied the parsonage in Whaleyville as the loyal wife of her devoted husband, who affectionately called her 'Eve.'

"We consider it one of God's consolations to have had her and her husband with us, as head of our church. She was not only willing to undertake whatever was required, but she was competent to accomplish it. Her kind restore confidence in humanity, and make us glad that God said, 'Ye are Brethren.' We were sorry when she went away, and are sorry that she cannot come back, but very glad that where she is 'There we may be, also'."

Mr. A Hill Smith of Reliance, Maryland, writes: "I first knew Mrs. Clift when she, with her husband, Rev. F. M. Clift, came to Reliance in 1919. This being just after the world war, and there being a scarcity of school teachers, she taught one of the local schools two years, where she was very popular both with the pupils and parents; but, with all her school work, she never neglected her church duties.

"She was fond of music, accepted the position of church organist and took delight in teaching children music. Mrs. Clift was unassuming in manner, but always had a smile and a cheerful word for both young and old.

She was ever seeking the ways of peace and harmony among those with whom she labored, enjoying fellowship with all who knew her, and she left behind a blessed and a cherished memory."

The vanished hand and silent voice will be to Brother Clift a cause for the deepest grief. Her going has left him lonely, and from the ranks of the ministers' wives has gone one whose life was characterized by devotion to Christian principles, and the church will be poorer by the passing of this laborer from the fields of Christian service. Her husband, family and friends may well rejoice in the "Blessed Hope" of seeing her again, whom they have "loved long since and lost awhile."

### CONFERENCE SERMON

#### VITAL CHRISTIANITY

"I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God. who loved me and gave himself for me."

-Galatians 2:20.

Henry Drummond wrote of two boxes filled with earth. From a hill in Scotland came the contents of the first box, and the contents of the second came from the Barbadoes. When examined under a microscope the Scotland earth is found to be full of small objects, clear as crystal. Each object is a six-sided prism capped on both ends with graceful little pyramids. The second box contains a countless host of glassy objects built up in many different patterns. These constitute a vast collection of microscopic urns, goblets, and vases, each richly decorated with small discs or perforations arranged in regular belts and rows. Each urn, goblet, and vase, is sculptured in faultless proportion and they all present a sight of magic beauty.

Tested for chemical substance the contents of both boxes are found to be of the same element, silica, or natural glass, and even judged by beauty of lines and curves they leave little to chose between them. Yet when human power is used to reproduce the forms of beauty of the two, the first may be crushed to powder but when subjected to great heat will immediately rearrange itself into its original designs. In fact we cannot help but bring back the prism with its pyramids. Six-sidedness is a law of its nature that cannot be overthrown. But try as we will, we cannot reproduce the sculptured forms of the objects of the second box. That alone is done by tiny creasures, living in Barbadoes' earth, that continue to fashion their fairy palaces of flint in one of the mysterious processes of nature. A vast difference lies between these two sets of objects; the second belongs to the living world and the first to the world of the dead. Nothing but life can produce the beauty and grace, the form and fashion of the shells from the Barbadoes.

As great a world of difference lies between the sensuous man and the man of the spirit; the man of the world and the man of God, even between the man who has the form of godliness and the man who has the power thereof. The difference in each case is the difference between life and death. In Christ there is life; without Christ there is naught but death. "He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life."

(I) The life's promise and portrayal. The Bible is the book of life and the culmination of its life is in the Son of God. To set forth the purpose, the power, the glory, and the love of God's Son (himself the law's fulfillment), moral, ceremonial, and religious laws were given with light-

ning's flash and thunder's roar, with ministering angels, with stones divinely inscribed, and by the voice of Him that spake. To outline the nature of the coming one, priests burnt incense, fired sacrifices, paced in processional pageantry, wrote and sang humanity's loveliest songs. Prophets with insight far above the wisdom of this world saw, beyond the veil of time, the breaking of heaven's dawn the dayspring from on high that should visit us; they saw beyond the limitations of race and region to the time when the uttermost isles should learn of God's law and love through His Son; they saw beyond the old dispensation's revelation of the deep mind of God's will, to the new dispensation's revelation of the broken heart of God's love. Tabernacles, temples, sacred places, soldiers, kings, and sages were given to picture and portray the Lord who should suddenly come to his temple, the heaven-born King who should come to his throne with a name above every name.

In the foreground of God's plan was the sending of the One in whom is life but in the background of his purpose was the provision that the life is to be the light of men. On the canvas of the Old Testament, pictured along with the giver of all grace, are pictured the objects of God's mercy and love. In the foreshadows of Christ are shadowed those that are his. Our hearts are the tablets upon which God has engraved his law: "After those days saith the Lord, 'I will put my laws in their minds and write them in their hearts." The temple of God with its Shekinah over the mercy-seat is now with Christian men. "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God and that the Holy Spirit dwells in you?" Our self-denying sacrifices are the odor of the sacred ointment. prayers are the smoke of the sweet incense on the altar of God. Christian worship in sincerity and truth is the feast of unleavened bread. deeming blood of Jesus Christ has taken the place of the sacred ointment for priests and the royal anointing of Kings, and with washing in his blood he hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father.

The gift of prophesy has been granted to the whole family of believers. "Your sons and daughters shall prophecy." And verily, our youth do see visions, our aged dream dreams, and even our humblest servants tell forth the truth of the gospel. We are the Israel of God, a holy nation, a peculiar people. All we Christians are priests, a royal priest-hood to show forth his praises. We are the offspring of Abraham; "They which are of faith, the same are the children of Abraham." We are the builders of a kingdom even though our kingdom is not of this world. We seek a country, a better country, that is, and heavenly. We look for a city, the New Jerusalem, a city that hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." We are the ones on whom the ends of the Old Testament world have come. Their living has found its fullness and completion in our Christian life.

The Old Testament is the promise of the life to be brought to light. Jesus Christ is the portrayal of that life; but concurrently with and continuously since his earthly life we are promised because he lived, we too shall live in the power of an endless life. Jesus is the trunk and we are the branches upon which the fruits of his life shall be brought forth; apart from him we can do nothing. We are accepted into union with the Beloved, or more plainly, the Lovable One. He becomes our salvation be-

cause, first of all, he is our life. Martin Luther leaped from the verbiage of "For to me to live is Christ," to the translation-interpretation, "Christ is my life." Christ promised in himself the satisfaction of every necessity of our life. He is our bread, "I am the living bread which came down from heaven." He is our drink: "Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst." Christ himself is the artesian-well springing up into everlasting life. He is our breath: "He breathed upon them," and said, "Receive ye the Holy Breath." Now if any man have not the breath of Christ, he is none of his.

By faith we may gain his body and blood. He took bread and said, "This is my body." He took the cup and said, "This is my blood." Who can deny that he promised to be our spiritual life within our flesh? He is our bread and meat and drink. He is our body, bone, blood, and breath. He did not give us an ethical code or a set of moral standards as did Confucius, or Buddha, or Plato, or Marcus Aurelius. The words that he spoke unto us are life. He did not give us moral law. He does not command our living. He gives us his own life. "We know that the Son of God is come, and hath given us discernment, that we may know him that is true, and that we are in him that is true, even in his Son, Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life."

The life's transmission and transformation. Through Jesus Christ has been transmitted the transforming power of God for the souls of men. Salient, fundamental happenings in the lives of men are duplicated in the gift of grace that becomes ours when we make his life our salvation. When his more abundant life displaces our life of sin and shame, we are made to rejoice like manumitted slaves in their newly gained freedom; for through Christ "the creature is freed from the slavery of decay into the glorious liberty of the children of God." The life that Christ gives is retrieved youth for the soul, for through him, "We have put off the old man who was perishing in deluding passions and have put on the new man formed as God approves in the rightequeness and holiness of truth." The new life in Christ is love's resurrection from the death of sin: "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren." Christ, the redeemer, is the spiritual creator of new souls for men; "There is a new creation when any man is in Christ. The old life has passed away; behold, the new life is come." "Neither circumcision nor the omission of it is anything, but a new creation is everything." Christ himself calls the new life of the soul, heaven's birth.. "I tell you, no one can see the Kingdom of God unless he is born over again from above." "Whatever owes its birth to the Spirit is spiritual. Do not wonder at my telling you that you must be born over again from above." In this newness of life, this youth of the soul, let us walk 'till travelling days are done.

For Paul, personally, conversion and growth in grace were crucifixion with Christ. He left his old life, which was in the law, upon the cross and from the crucified one he received his new life in the grace of the gospel so that he could herald to all the world: "Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God." That which was a mystery to the Colossian Gentiles was the constant experience of Paul; "Christ in me, the hope of glory." No wonder

he could say that he had the mind of Christ because a Christ consciousness dwelt ever in his soul.

Christianity was never organized for anything but the transmission of the experience of the transforming life of Jesus Christ. There could never have been an opportunity for the doctrine of apostolic succession if there had been no succession of saints. True sainthood through the millenniums has rested only upon those who have come swiftly like Paul cr slowly like Augustine and Francis into the new birth of the soul through Jesus Christ. Through the Middle Ages, between Augustine who stood at their beginning and Francis who stood near their close, never was there lacking some one who knew the grace of God in truth. John Huss loved righteousness and hated wickedness because glimpses of the truth had set him free; Thomas a Kempis asked naught but that he might be left alone in contemplation of his Lord; Martin Luther, with eagle wings. soared free from earth-made fetters that held the souls of others fast; for, with a vision of Christ, he learned to despise his own church-made righteousness in comparison with the righteousness of God by faith; with heavenly visions breaking upon his soul, John Bunyan saw far beyond the gloomy confinement of Bedford Jail to the Land of Beulah and the Celestial City: even the high churchman, John Wesley, was wakened to glorious ministry when a deep experience of God strangely warmed his heart. These all received the spirit of sonship that enabled them to know God as the parent of their souls when they learned through the Spirit to say, "Abba, Father."

(III) The life's experience and expression. The Christian experience for some begins with one crowded moment of glorious life; while for others it comes like the harvest time of wheat with a tender beginning in some other year, and then maybe it witnesses a winter in which there is life but not growth, and then in turn a spring-time with seasons of refreshing from above, increasing the soul's stature and development until finally, with the warm and radiant sky of summer, the field of one's life is full of a harvest of golden grain. Paul found Christ in a thundering dawn that blinded his eyes to pour light into his soul; Timothy found God when he saw Paul rise as from the dead from beneath the stones hurled by the men of Lystra; Augustine found his Lord when he turned to Romans 13:13 and then, self-condemned as a sinful man, he knew he needed a Saviour; Francis found Christ when with tender compassion he discover the washing of leper's wounds sweet and easy; Gipsy Smith found God as he listened to a message of a servant of Christ preached in the woods among the care-free sons of the open air. Martin Niemiller, submarine commander, searching the lowest deeps, found Him whom no depths can drown; Francis Sayre of good family and fine scholarship has found his Lord as he has walked in the path of civic duty and public service.

The experience of life and peace in God through our Lord Jesus Christ is the heart of vital Christianity. If, in the simplicity of my mind and heart, I find God in the ordinary duties and loves, I will not deny the genuineness of the scientist's, or historian's, or philosopher's, or business man's or artist's, or musician's or worker's finding. One finds God in contrition at the altar of the church, another finds God in the open fields or

under the night's starry skies; one finds God from the pages of his book, another finds God in the flowing stream of humanity; one finds God through the scholarly mesage of a preacher in a Gothic structure where lights like glories fall, another find him while listening to a simple gospel message of burning earnestness beneath a canvas tent with aisles of straw. The most important matter of all is that we may experience eternal life by knowing the only true God and Jesus Christ whom He has sent.

Finding our life in Him we fulfill the greatest longings of our being. The deepest quests of the human soul are achieved in experiencing the saving grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. In spite of all rebellions against the right there is an inescapable longing for goodness in every heart. Even Satan in the depth of despair in Milton's immortal tragedy says, "Evil, be thou my good." Men through all the years wrestle against the plain preventions of their consciences to their own destruction as they try to confuse moral and ethical distinctions.

The maiden Queen Victoria faced the opportunities and prerogatives of her exalted station with the statement of her purpose that she wanted to be good. It would have been far better for one of her royal descendant if he had cherished the same simple and naive desire. A great Victorian poet penned true words when he wrote, "Howe'er it be, it seems to me, "Tis only noble to be good."

Jesus Christ, the fairest among ten thousand, the one altogether lovely, has a beauty that every one implicitly if not explicitly desires. It is the beauty of holy love. A canvas gains loveliness from beauty of color, a temple gains it from graceful proportions, a poem possesses it in the charm of its ryhme and ryhthm; but the beauty of the Lord our Go found in the loveliness of the soul of Jesus Christ. Yet Christianity is a religious life based upon following Jesus as an example and pattern is an experience of the imparted nature and life of Christ. We mee divine in the depths of our being, and by dependence on and union Christ we overcome the world. His person and spirit alone make spitual values real. Personal communion with Him satisfies our souls in their craving after a living embodiment of goodness. In union with Christ we gain the righteousness of God by faith.

The strongest instinct in the human heart is the instinct for completion. In our carnal life we call its urge, ambition, and we name its achievement, progress. As sparks fly upward and flowers face the sun, there struggles in every heart an inner drive toward completion. We must round out with all we have and are the destiny that calls us to its own realization. The Christian goal is not joy and not sorrow, for neither is our destined end or way. But why do we live that each tomorrow find us farther than today? We so live because the Christian call is, "Let us go on unto perfection." Christian perfection for us is the complete realization of God's plan for our lives. This is not the doctrine of "what is to be, will be." It is the doctrine of what might be if God's plan is found and followed. But we do not achieve perfection even with all our striving. We gain only that which we receive. It is the perfection of Christ that rounds out our natures, for of his fullness have all we received, and grace for grace. We are complete in him. "And all of us, reflecting

the splendor of the Lord in our unveiled faces, are being changed into likeness to him from one degree of splendor to another, for this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit."

There is still another deep-planted instinct in our nature which must be satisfied, and that is the longing for campanionship. There is no pang of the soul so exquisite with pain as the anguish of the lonely heart. Jesus possibly spoke the tenderest and most compassionate words of his gracious ministry when He said just before His Ascension, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We are made to rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory when we realize that Jesus is the companion and comrade of our hearts He says to our souls, "I am the real and living way."

Once when I was confused as to the right road, I asked a native to direct me. He realized that the right road was hard to find even with his directions, so he said, "I will go with you and show you the way." I no longer had instructions, I had a companion. The way was no longer a thing of facts; it was the guiding of a person. My road was not in a guide-book, but in a man. The Bible is God's guide-book for the feet of life's pilgrims, but God determined to give us more than a book. He gave us His Son, the living way. He that hath the Son hath the living way, and he that hath not the Son of God hath not the living way.

This new life with its new motives, new desires, new purposes, new spirit, new breath, is recognized as the more abundant life promised by Christ. Our nature throbs with a stronger pulsation as though the heart of Christ filled our souls with His precious blood; our minds are a light with the brightness of a new and glorious experience for we now have the mind of Christ as we are filled with the life of God; our hearts and souls are possessed of the satisfaction and gratification of the highest, holiest, purest condition, the condition of those who have washed the garments of their souls and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

This old, worn, torn, soiled soul of me,
This drab, dank, dirty, broken heart of misery,
This wound-weakened, sin-sickened rebel from Thee
Came bending, penitent begging Thy mercy free.
Into my soul Thou didst breathe thy breath,
Clothed on me Thy life, didst cancel my death;
Into my breast transfused Thou the blood of Thy heart,
Forged on me fetters of life ne'er to be riven apart.

The experience of the rebirth of our souls by the Spirit was never meant to die unrepeated after its birth. The lovely graceful shape and the fragrant perfume of the apple blossoms are not gone with the month of May, but the blossom-end will show in every apple plucked in the autumn-time when we gather the most beautiful fruit that graces our tables, a fruit with a smell so sweet and a taste so wholesome that others like Solomon's bride may say, "Comfort me with apples." I think we may now grasp anew the meaning of I John 3:9, "Whosoever keeps in the birth of God does not commit sin; for God's offspring remaining in him cannot sin while he keeps alive his birth of God."

I shall not soon forget the strange and mystic sense of God's presence, glory, and love which I experienced one night in Philadelphia after I had read aloud the scripture of my personal devotions in the vestry-room in the quiet after midnight and then in the darkness stepped into my church auditorium and repeated, "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, Early in the morning our song shall rise to Thee; Holy, holy, holy, Merciful and Mighty, God in three persons, blessed Trinity." My heart was of a sudden filled with the glory of a wondering love for God and as soon, there seemed to come from the silence a voiceless message of the presence of God in my soul and the love of God for my soul. My meditation of him that night, like the Psalmist's of old, was sweet. I trust in God's grace that it shall not prove to be a lost chord, hereafter sought vainly, that came from the soul of the silence and entered into my heart and soul, but that again and again the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart shall be acceptable in his sight.


This life that we now live in the flesh is our expression of the loving life of God in Christ Jesus and we are Christ's means of expressing his own glorious life, for when we "shall make his soul an offering for sin, he shall see his seed, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of the Lord shall prosper in his hand." Personal experience and invincible testimony witness to the sufficiency of Christ as the companion, comforter, redeemer, and conservator of every individual soul. "Christ is the only one who can make the vile man, clean; the drinking man, sober; the dope fiend, free; the crooked man, straight; the proud man, humble; the rich, loyal; the poor, patient; the rebellious, obedient; the young, contented; the old, hopeful; the doubting, convinced; the covetous, unselfish; the ambitious, constructive; the unlovely, attractive; the impure, chaste; the deceitful, reliable; the dishonest, dependable; the treacherous, true; the impulsive,

steady; and the worldly, spiritual."

Jesus can thus completely fill all of any life; but, out of his fullness that filleth all in all, He filleth and doth fill all lives and all living. There never has been a high and noble thought but Christ completes it; there has never been an unselfish deed but to be called Christian honors it; there is no splendid ideal but that its highest reaches are to be found in Him. Art gains its greatest beauty from Him, song sounds its most glorious melodies for Him, government blesses the governed when ruled by Him, the thinker gains truth's richest treasures from Him. Society reaches its highest levels through Him, courage gains its finest nobility, morality its greatest heights, service its strongest depths, love its widest reaches. The holiest souls of the ages, the races, and the nations are all the beneficiaries of the life of God in Christ Jesus. We live in Him!

Deep-planted, strong-pulsed, hot-burning in the soul of me Up-welling, out-searching, undying quest of mystery For God, mankind's eternal contemporary.

Large in history's unceasing drama,
Beautiful in nature's widespread panorama,
Lovingly tender in tears on patient beds of pain,
In clean-washed souls pure-purged of sin's blotched stain,
I find the maker of life from the clod,
The high-lifted, love-humbled, e'er present God.

### MANUAL

#### RULES OF ORDER AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE

Government of the Maryland Annual Conference

#### RULES OF ORDER

#### RULE I. ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE

1. The Conference shall convene in annual session each year on the second Wednesday in June. The fiscal year shall be from June 1 of each year to May 31 of the following year.

2. The pastor shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the certificate of election of the delegate or delegates to the Annual Conference immediately after the election of the same. He shall also send the name to the President of the Conference and to the pastor of the church where the Conference is held

3. The Secretary shall make a list of the delegates so certified, omitting all contested cases; and this list, together with the list of the ministerial members, shall constitute the roll of Conference upon which the Conference shall organize.

4. The Secretary shall distribute the printed Minutes to the charges on the basis of one copy for each twenty members. Provided that extra copies may be supplied charges where need may appear. Also, copies shall be mailed to all ministers of the Conference holding special relation to the Conference, to all institutions and officials of the general church, to the widows of ministers of the Conference, and to other miscellaneous organizations that may apply.

5. Each session shall fix the bar of the Conference and shall require

all members to sit therein.

### RULE II. DUTIES OF OFFICERS OF THE CONFERENCE

#### A-Duties of the President:

- To take the chair precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.
- 2. See that the business of the Conference shall proceed according to these Rules of Order and other Rules and Regulations adopted by the Conference.
- 3. Shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; preserve the most rigid order, and confine the members to the subject under consideration; not allow improper personalities nor reflections upon any religious communities.
- 4. Announce each person arising to speak as soon as he shall have addressed the chair by declaring him "The minister from .....," or "The delegate from ......"
- 5. State a question sitting but stand when the question is put and taken; stand when he states a point of order and when he makes any formal communication to the Conference.
- 6. Is not allowed to vote when a question is taken unless there be a tie, but he may vote in case of ballot.
- 7. May call any member to the chair when he wishes to participate in debate or for other purposes, but such person shall not be entitled to the chair after adjournment.

- 8. The office of stationing the ministers and preachers is committed to the hands of the President of the Conference.
- 9. It shall be the duty of the President to fill blanks in statistical reports for all charges unsupplied.
- 10. In the event of the death of any ministerial member, or his wife, or widow, the President shall immediately appoint an Obituary Committee of three ministers and three laymen from the most intimate acquaintances of the deceased.
- 11. The President of the Conference is relieved from the usual plan of visitation on the charges. He is to make survey of the District; and conduct regular Quarterly District Conferences over the area where feasible; assume general oversight of all church work; examine church registers; he is to use his official leadership in securing the most constructive development for the charges, and so far as possible, he is to meet the Official Board of each charge once in the year.

The failure of the President to visit any charge does not vitiate his

right to the amount assessed on said charge for his salary.

12. The President shall visit the quarterly conferences of the charges as frequently as possible and shall sympathetically present the claims of the General and Annual Conferences; shall seek to secure a salary to the pastor of not less than \$1,200, and the prompt payment of the same; shall urge adequate insurance on all church property, the incorporation of the churches, the employment of approved and systematic financial plans, and such other matters as he may deem of value for the welfare of the work.

#### B-Duties of the Secretary:

- 1. To perform such duties as are usually required of the Secretary of a deliberative body.
- 2. Should the President not be in place at the hour of meeting, the Secretary, or in his absence one of his assistants, shall announce the fact, and the Conference shall elect a chairman "pro tempore" and proceed to business.
- 3. Have charge of all the papers belonging to the Conference and be accountable for them.
- 4. Be in his place precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.
- 5. Be the Committee on Credentials and keep an accurate list of members of the Conference.
- 6. Keep correct minutes of the proceedings of the Conference, including all written resolutions, whether adopted or rejected, and the mover and seconder of such written resolutions.
- 7. Keep a list of business, on which he shall record all business brought before the Conference and in the order of its presentation.
- 8. Keep a list of committees, on which he shall record: First, the standing committees in the order of their arrangement in these rules, and second, all other committees that may be appointed, and in the order of their appointment.
- 9. Keep a correct list of the Circuits and Stations to be used as occasion may require.
- Report to the Conference any unfinished business of the preceding annual session.
- 11. He, with the Treasurer, Steward and Statistician shall be the committee on the preparation and printing of the Conference Blanks, and he with the Chairman of the Board of Finance and the Conference Treasurer shall be the committee on publication and distribution of the Minutes.
- 12. Supply the pastors with blanks, and send personal report blanks to all ministers who are not pastors, on which they are to state the relation to the Conference they desire for the ensuing year.

13. He shall have a printed record of the Minutes duly certified by himself, which shall be considered the official minutes of the Conference, substantially bound every quadrennium, and include in each volume a copy of the General Conference Journal. These records shall be kept in the

vault of the Headquarters Building.

14. He shall maintain a book entitled "Memorial Roll" which shall include the names of the ministers of the Conference who are deceased, in the order of their decease, with information concerning them such as dates of birth and death, places of interment, etc. He shall also maintain a book for ministers' wives, in which a record of their full name (Maiden name), place of birth, church connection, services, etc., shall be kept.

#### C-Duties of Steward, Treasurer and Statistician:

1. The Conference Steward, the Treasurer, and the Statistician, shall constitute the Board of Stewards who shall receive the reports and collections from the pastors and shall be responsible to the Conference for all

reports, monies, receipts and vouchers delivered to them.

2. The Board of Stewards shall meet on Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock in open conference to receive the pastors' envelopes containing the reports and collections; shall meet thereafter to make a distribution of the various reports to the proper persons; shall note the agreement of the pastors' financial reports with the financial envelopes and prepare the reports of the Conference.

The report blanks shall consist of the following:

a. Financial, covering collections for general and local interests.

b. Statistical, covering memberships of all organizations.

c. Pastors' personal reports.

d. Certificate of delegate's and alternate's election.

e. General information.

f. A financial envelope corresponding to financial report.

A general envelope to contain the whole.

- 3. The Steward shall receive, after checking with the Treasurer the envelopes and blanks, the financial reports of the pastors from which he shall make his report.
- 4. (a) The Treasurer shall receive the financial envelopes and all monies, vouchers and receipts enclosed. He shall hold these monies for distribution according to the action of Conference upon order of the Board of Finance, which order shall be the voucher of the Treasurer covering his various transactions. This same provision for distribution shall apply throughout the year for monies received during the sitting of Conference and for monies received ad interim. He shall keep an account with some accepted bank, and his accounts shall be open for inspection at all times by the President of the Conference, the Board of Finance or by any one designated by either of them. The Treasurer shall designate the charges whose assessment for President's Salary, Travel Expenses and Parsonage Expense is due each month of the year, rotating from year to year. Charges failing to pay their apportionment in the month designated shall be referred to the Board of Finance for further action.

4. (b) Where appropriation is made by the Conference to supplement the salary of a minister, that hereafter the Treasurer of the Conference be directed to deduct from such appropriation one-third of the amount due to the Conference for Group Insurance and the Superannuate Fund, an-

nually, until fully paid.

- 4. (c) Hereafter when a minister claims superannuate relief the Treasurer of the Conference be instructed to deduct from his apportionment the first year all unpaid obligations to the Superannuate Funds.
- 5. The Statistician shall receive the membership blanks submitted by the pastors from which he shall make his report.
- In all cases where discrepancies in reports may appear the Steward, the Treasurer, or the Statistician, according to the department in

1937

which errors may be noted, shall seek to correct same by conference with the pastor concerned.

#### RULE III. COMMITTEES

- 1. All committees shall be appointed by the President, except when otherwise directed in the Book of Discipline, or by special vote of the Conference.
  - The Standing Committees shall be:

1. The Board of Finance—5 Ministers, 5 Laymen. The chairman to be appointed one year in advance. Recommend Conference budget, apportion and promote all budget assessments, and have general oversight of Conference finances as provided in Conference Minutes 1930, page 47.

Itinerancy and Orders-6 Ministers.

For further record of the duties of this Committee see detail listed in the forepart of the Conference Minutes under title "Conference Examiners and Examinations."

Board of Survey and Extension-5 Ministers, 5 Laymen.

The President of the Conference shall be a member ex-officio and the Chairman of the Board. This Board shall serve for the full twelve months period and shall at Conference and ad interim review the church extension needs of the Conference, make recommendations as to Church Extension appropriations, pastors' supplemental salaries, church and parsonage operations (Reg. 1, Par. 9, etc.)

4. Pulpit Service-3 Ministers.

This Committee shall make the assignments for Sabbath preaching during the sitting of Conference.

Superannuates-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Review the needs of the superannuated ministers and widows of the Conference, make appropriations, etc.

6. Christian Literature and Education-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. Review and report on all reports of our educational institutions, pul lishing interests, etc.

7. Moral Reform and Social Service-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. Deal with such matters as relate to Sabbath observance, prohibition, economic and social conditions.

8. Benevolent Agencies-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Review the Deaconess work, etc.

Official Relations-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Review and pass upon the character of all ministers and the Conference relationship to their charges, etc., and shall read as part of their report an "Honor Roll" of charges which pay their assessments in full.

10. Obituaries—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
To be appointed by the President upon the death of a minister of the Conference or the wife of a minister.

11. Missions-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Review the activities of our church in foreign and home fields.

12. President's Report-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. Pass upon the report of the Conference President.

13. Audit-2 Ministers, 1 Layman. To whom shall be referred all financial reports of institutions and boards belonging to this Conference.

14. Conference Program for the following session-3 Ministers (One

of whom shall be the President).

15. Appointees on Executive Committee of Council of Religious Education-President of the Conference and two members, appointed for two years each, but appointed one each year.

16. Home for the Aged-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Review the work of this institution.
17. Conference Arrangements—the President and Standing District
Committee.

18. Evangelism—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. The President of the Conference a member ex officio, with voting power. (This an ad interim committee).

19. Group Life Insurance—President of Conference and Treasurer

of Conference.

20. Memorial Day-3 Ministers.

- 3. Any person being a member of two committees shall have the right to decline an appointment to another.
- 4. When there are present Fraternal Messengers and other visitors to whom the courtesy of formal recognition is due, the Chairman of the Committee on Official Relations shall quietly inform the President, whereupon the President may request the visitors be brought to him, to be by him introduced to the Conference, either at that time or when the state of business may with more propriety be arrested.

#### RULE IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE ANNUAL SESSION

- 1. The order of business for each session of the Conference shall be arranged by the Program Committee appointed at the preceding session. Its report shall be made immediately following the roll call and be subject to approval, amendment or disapproval by the Conference.
  - 2. For the opening day it shall follow this order:

a. Call to Order.

At nine o'clock A. M., on the day to which the Annual Conference adjourned from the last annual session, the President shall open the Conference by reading a portion of the Word of God, with prayer by himself or by another, and with congregational singing.

b. Roll Call.

The Secretary noting the absentees.

In the event of the death of any member of the Conference since the preceding session, the Chairman of the Obituary Committee, or in his absence some member of the Committee, shall formally announce the fact to the Conference, such announcement being made when the name of the deceased is reached at the Roll Call, and the name shall then, on motion, be transferred to the Memorial Roll by the Secretary.

c. The Program Committee's report for Conference consideration.

d. Memorial Roll Call by some one designated by the President.
 e. The Lord's Supper, administered by the President assisted by such ministers as may be selected by him.

f. The Conference Sermon, preached by the President or someone designated by him.

g. The benediction.

### Afternoon Session, 2 P. M.

h. Examination of the President:

The Conference shall open with a hymn and prayer, after which the President shall call another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman shall then address the Conference thus: "Brethren, you have heard the report of the President, shall his character pass?" In case of any charge against the official character of the President, it shall be handed to the Standing District Committee; and the chairman of the committee shall answer the question: "Shall his character pass?"

- i. Election of Officers, 3 o'clock.
  - 1. President
  - 2. Secretary
  - 3. Treasurer
  - 4. Steward
  - 5. Statistician

The Steward, Treasurer and Statistician elected at one session shall serve at the following session of the Conference, and they shall each appoint two assistants with Conference approval.

- 6. Standing District Committee, 3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
- 7. Committee on Appeals, 3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
- j. Examination of Official Character, 4 o'clock.

The roll shall be called and the pastors shall deposit their reports and the collections prescribed by the Conference, each in a sealed envelope, upon which shall be marked the amount, the name of the collection, the name of the pastor, and the name of the charge, in the bag of the Conference Steward. The reports and charges against official character shall be handed to the Committee on Official Relations.

- k. Benediction at pleasure.
- 3. The Program Committee shall adjust the remainder of the Conference sessions without requiring undue absence from the floor of Conference by the committee members.
- 4. The order of business for the daily sessions shall be arranged by the Program Committee but shall include for each morning, and in such order as the Committee may elect, a devotional service, reading of the Minutes, roll call (complete or absentees only), by the Secretary for official communications by pastors and delegates, reports from institution and boards, which shall without reading (unless so requested and allowe at the time) be sent to the proper committees.
- 5. Committees shall report to the Conference at the time designate in the program. The report may be read by any member of the committe or by the Secretary. A re-reading of the report by the Secretary may be had at any time by a request from the floor.
- 6. The time for the reports of committees arranged on the program shall be considered as the order of the day and any delayed report must be withheld until the pending Order of the Day is concluded.
- 7. When any business is laid before the Conference it may be made the order of the day for any other day of the session and at a specific hour.
- 8. Unfinished business from the last annual session shall have precedence of all business except the order of the day.
- 9. Ordinary business shall have precedence in the order in which it stands on the list of business.
- 10. When any business is taken into consideration it shall not be interrupted by any other business except the order of the day or by adjournment.

#### RULE V. DECORUM

- 1. When a member desires to present any business, or to speak to any question, he shall arise and address the Chair "Brother President," and then pause until he is announced to the Conference, after which he may proceed addressing the chair, and restricting his remarks to the subject before the Conference.
- 2. If two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall determine which of them is entitled to the floor.

3. No interruption shall be allowed while a member is addressing the

chair, except a call to order by the President or by a member.

4. When a member is called to order he shall take his seat immediately, and be silent, until the President or member who made the call shall state the rule or order supposed to be infringed; after which the member called to order shall have the right to explain, and the President shall decide.

- 5. In deciding a question of order the President shall restrict himself to the rules of order, and any member declared to be out of order by the President may, if he obtain a second, appeal to the Conference. The question on such appeal shall be taken without debate, but the appellant may state the ground of his appeal. If the Conference sustains the chair, the member shall be allowed to proceed only in order.
- 6. No member shall speak oftener than twice to the same question, without special leave of the Conference, nor longer than fifteen minutes at any one time, unless by the same special permission.

7. Any member shall have the right to call for the reading of the subject under consideration.

8. Every member shall report at roll call of the first day's session, and be present at all daily sessions of Conference, unless excused by the Conference on request.

#### RULE VI. MOTIONS

1. Every motion and resolution shall be written, signed and read aloud by the maker, handed to the chair and read aloud by the Secretary, before any action can be taken upon it by the Conference, except motions to adopt and second, motions for amendment which do not change the content of a paper, to lie on the table, the previous question, or to adjourn.

2. Any motion may be divided, if the sense will admit of the proposed

division.

- 3. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to commit, to substitute, to amend, or to make the order of the day, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule; the first three to be taken without debate; and the first always in order. But when the report of a committee has been under discussion, the motion to lay on the table shall not prevail until the chairman of the committee shall have been heard once on the subject, if he desires to speak.
- 4. It shall be in order to move the previous question, or that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending—except in cases in which character is involved—and if sustained by two-thirds of members present the question shall be taken. It shall not be in order for a member to move the previous question or to move to lay on the table at the close of his speech in which the pending question has been discussed.
- 5. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question on reference to the standing committee shall be put first.
- 6. No motion to commit, or to lie on the table, being decided, shall be again allowed, on the same day, at the same stage of the proposition.
- 7. A motion, after it is seconded, is the property of the Conference, and the mover has no power to withdraw or have it amended, without leave.
- 8. No amendment shall be in order, further than an amendment to the amendment; but it shall be in order to move a substitute for the main question, and one amendment to the substitute, and if a substitute is accepted it shall replace the original proposition.
- 9. All invitations to fix the place of the meeting of the Annual Conference shall lie on the table twenty-four hours.

#### RULE VII. VOTING

1. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is being put shall vote, unless the Conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

2. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question, who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of Conference, or when such member has been necessarily

absent

- 3. Votes for all Conference Officers, the Committee on Appeals, Standing District Committee, Trustees of the Maryland Annual Conference, and all other officers of all other organizations shall be by ballot. Otherwise, voting shall be by yea and nay; but a division of the house being called a count vote shall be taken, members rising in their places and standing until they shall have been counted.
- 4. A member can change his vote at any time before the chair announces the decision of the question.

5. Blank ballots shall not be counted.

6. Ayes and Nays, and a vote by order shall be as prescribed in the Discipline.

#### RULE VIII. AMENDING RULES AND REGULATIONS

All motions or resolutions, whether submitted by committees or individual members, contemplating an amendment to these Rules and Regulations, must so specify. Otherwise, such action shall not be binding upon any other session of the Conference than that at which the same is passed.

#### REGULATIONS

#### Regulation 1. DUTIES OF PASTORS

1. The pastor shall be held jointly responsible with the Stewards of his churches for the collection of the assessments on his charge made be the Conference; in accordance with the provision of the Discipline, and the report quarterly at the time of the District Conference, the amounts raised on his charge for the benevolences to date, in order to determine the standing of his charge concerning the budget for benevolences.

2. It is the duty of the pastors to examine and see that suitable deeds be had for all churches, parsonages and other church property, as to secure them to the Methodist Protestant Church, and whenever allowed by state law have their churches incorporated. No minister of this Conference shall give his consent or assistance to building a church or parsonage on a lot that is not deeded unconditionally to an incorporated Board of Methodist Protestant Trustees.

3. Pastors are required to apportion the President's salary suitably among the several appointments, and to have the same paid when notified

by the Treasurer of the Conference that it is due.

4. Pastors are required to see that families belonging to their churches are supplied with the Catechism of our church and to arrange in the church schools for its use.

- 5. Pastors are instructed to ascertain of those received into the church whether they have been baptized, and if not, to administer the ordinance of baptism without unnecessary delay according to regulation of the Discipline.
- 6. Pastors, when changing appointments, shall hand to their successors, a plan of the work of the charge, including correct church registers, addresses of members, names of ill and aged persons, list and addresses of Sunday school members, list of prospective members, etc.

- 7. Station and Circuit Stewards shall furnish the pastor with a sufficient number of Disciplines, that he may be able to present each new member with a copy, in compliance with Disciplinary law.
- 8. No minister of this Conference shall go as a loan to any church outside of the Maryland Conference unless said church is willing to contribute to the Superannuate Fund of this Conference.
- 9. All pastors are required to submit in detail to the Board of Survey and Extension all plans their churches may have for new church buildings and parsonages, remodeling or extensive improvements, locations for buildings, etc., for advice and counsel, before giving their consent to or proceeding with the execution of their plans. This is done that churches may have advantage of the study and experience of the Conference in all such matters. Further, no church shall receive any appropriation from Conference funds until this Board of Survey and Extension shall have reviewed their plans and passed favorably upon the same.
- 10. All married pastors of the Conference shall be guaranteed a minimum salary of \$1,200, and parsonage, and where the charge either cannot or will not pay the said amount this Conference undertakes to pay out of Conference funds the difference between the amount the charge pays and \$1,200, except in cases where the pastors agree to serve for less than the minimum salary to accommodate personal situations.

Further, that the minimum salary guarantee as outlined above shall be interpreted as meaning that the Annual Conference will appropriate to various charges on pastors' salaries from a maximum total of \$2,500, amounts which are deemed imperative and justifiable by the Board of Survey and Extension, and that no allowance will be made for any deficit that may occur in the salary promised by the church.

11. Pastors, in arranging for their regular Quarterly Conferences shall give the President of the Conference at least two (2) weeks advance notice of date of such meetings, so that the President may be aided in so arranging his itinerary as to meet the most Quarterly Conference sessions possible during the year.

#### Regulation II. SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY

1. Every minister, preacher and member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of eighteen years shall be entitled to vote in all cases. Provided, that only those who have attained the age of twenty-one years shall be "qualified members" for the purpose indicated in the Constitution of the denomination, Article IV, Section 3, and in the Discipline under "Trustees," page 80, Section 9. (See 1932 Discipline). (These references having to do with property).

2. Every minister, preacher and lay member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-five years shall be eligible as

a representative in the General Conference.

3. Every member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Treasurer, Steward, Class-leader, and Sunday School Superintendent, Trustee and a Delegate to the Annual Conference.

4. Only those ministers who have faithfully exercised the office of Elder for two years in the Conference shall be eligible to the office of Pres-

ident of the Annual Conference.

5. The Conference records the fact that authority for the appointment of pastors to charges resides in the Annual Conference, but fully recognizes the right of the annual membership meeting or of a quarterly conference to give instructions to the delegate to the Annual Conference as to the return of a pastor, that it strongly disapproves the secret ballot for the return or removal of a pastor, that it condemns the complimentary vote that asks for a pastor's return in the public meeting and seeks his removal at the Annual Conference.

### Regulation III. THE PRESIDENT'S PARSONAGE

- 1. The President's Parsonage, owned by the Conference, is 3600 Copley Road, Baltimore, Md.
- 2. The Conference each year shall elect an Agent of the President's Parsonage, who shall out of monies placed in his hands for the purpose pay the water rent, insurance and maintain all needful repairs.
- 3. An assessment of \$4,500 shall be laid on the District for the President's salary, traveling expenses and for the expenses of the President's Parsonage, the assessment to be known as "President's Salary and Expenses." Nine-tenths (\$4,050) of this amount shall be paid the President for salary and traveling expenses; one-tenth (\$450) shall be paid to the Agent of the President's Parsonage for the purposes recorded in Section 2. The method of levying this assessment is recorded under Rule II, Section C, paragraph 4.

#### Regulation IV. RECORDS OF TRIAL CASES

In all cases of the trial of a minister, the Secretary of the Trial Committee shall make a correct record of the proceedings of the trial, and turn the same over to the Secretary of the Conference, together with a copy of the charges, and specification, a copy of the finding, or verdict, of the Committee—and all other documentary evidence used in the trial, to be kept by the Secretary among the records of the Conference.

#### Regulation V. MINISTERS AND SPECIAL RELATIONS

All requests to be left without an appointment for the ensuing year, or for a supernumerary relation, shall be referred by the Conference to the Committee on Official Relations for consideration and report thereon before such requests shall be granted.

#### Regulation VI. CHURCH SCHOOLS

1. As a preparation for more efficient study and teaching of the Word teacher's meetings should be statedly held under the direction of the pastor or superintendent.

2. Pastors are directed to carry out the Discipline regulations concerning the organization of our Sabbath Schools into Foreign Missionary Societies and the taking of a collection every quarter for Foreign Missions.

3. Children's Day shall be faithfully observed by all our Sabbath Schools, and the money received on that day shall be exclusively devoted to the Children's Day offering for Foreign Missions.

### Regulation VII. OUR CHURCH HOME

- 1. Every charge shall elect or appoint a Lady Visitor from each church on the charge, where there is more than one appointment, and the duties of this representative be defined as follows: "She shall be expected to maintain a sympathetic understanding of the Home in her church; to visit the Home whenever convenient; to cooperate with the Board of Lady Superintendents in securing special donations of money, food and supplies, and so far as possible to promote the interests of the Home in her local church."
- 2. The list of charges failing to meet the requirements of the Conference relative to Our Church Home shall be read at each session of the Conference.
- 3. The second Sunday of November of each year shall be known as "Donation Day" for Our Church Home, and all our pastors are instructed to call the attention of their congregations thereto, and an endeavor made

to have donations of provisions, groceries and things needed to conduct the Home, sent to Mrs. Chas. Billingslea, Westminster, Md.

#### Regulation VIII. ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES

Ordained ministers only have the right to administer, or to assist in administering, the Christian ordinances of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, baptism and marriage; except those pastors who have been given license by an Annual Conference for one year at a time. A license to preach, or election to orders (preceding ordination) does not constitute this right.

#### Regulation IX. UNSTATIONED MINISTERS

The Conference will not recognize as an unstationed minister of the Methodist Protestant Church any man who does not bring credentials from some other orthodox denomination, or who has not received suitable testimonials of ministerial character from our own Church. In returning the list of ministers and preachers, pastors shall name no person who does not possess the foregoing qualifications.

#### Regulation X. LOTTERIES

The practice of raising funds for church purposes by means of lotteries, selling chances, and other games of hazards, is strongly condemned by this Conference. Pastors are required to oppose such methods. The wilful continuance of such practices shall, upon recommendation of the Committee on Official Relations, subject pastors and churches responsible, to disciplinary action.

#### Regulation XI. MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY

The placing of mortgages upon church property for the purpose, directly or indirectly, of paying the pastor's salary, is, so far as it has authority, disallowed by the Conference.

#### Regulation XII. OBITUARIES

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee, appointed in accordance with the Rule of the Conference, to prepare an obituary, without delay, containing a notice of the place and date of the birth of the brother, the date of his conversion, receiving license to preach, and his reception into the Conference together with any other important facts connected with his history which their judgment may dictate, in addition to the particulars of his death, and said obituary shall be reported to the ensuing session of Conference.
- 2. Every ministerial member of this Conference is hereby requested to make and keep a record of his nativity, and all the prominent acts in his Christian and ministerial history.
- 3. The obituaries of wives and widows of the ministerial members of the Conference shall also be published in the minutes.

#### Regulation XIII. MARRIAGES

The Conference cannot encourage any of its members to expect support as married men until they shall have served at least four years in the itinerancy.

#### Regulation XIV. UNFERMENTED WINE

The Conference recommends the use of unfermented wine in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

#### Regulation XV. DROPPING MEMBERS

Members of the church who remove from the community without taking a certificate shall be given pastoral care through correspondence by the pastor, and if they manifest an interest in the church and desire to be continued as members shall remain on the register. But such members, and members remaining in the community but absenting themselves from the church services, and failing to give to the support of the church or to cooperate with the church in Christian work for more than one year, shall be visited by the pastor or written to by him if residing elsewhere and appealed to in loving solicitude for their loyalty to their Lord and to the church and to resume active relations to the church. If after six months, no change is manifest, it shall be the duty of the quarterly conference to address to each of such members a kind and Christian letter calling attention to their loss and the loss to the church of such neglect, and beseeching them not to abandon the hope of their calling in Christ Jesus, and admonishing them that if no change is made by them within six months the church will be compelled to regard their silence to mean that they wish to end their communion with us. and to drop their names from our register. If, after another interval of six months any member thus advised still manifests no interest, it shall be the duty of the pastor to report their names to the church and to show that the requirements of this section have been complied with, and the church shall have authority then to vote whether such members shall be continued or dropped. In the case of stations this action may be taken by the quarterly conference.

#### Regulation XVI. MEMORIAL DAY

A Standing Committee of three shall be appointed to arrange Memorial Services to be held on the Sunday nearest May 30, of each year, by congregations and ministers in honor of the ministers of the Methodist Protestant Church who are buried in cemeteries located near our churches. The duty of this committee will be to secure information about the burial places of all members of the Conference whose names are on our Memorial Roll, to gather biographical data to be used in the Memorial Services, to prepare an Order of Service for use when desired, and to arrange or appoint churches and ministers to conduct these services when such appointments would aid in securing a service for every minister who has been a member of the Conference and has passed into the Heavenly home.

#### Regulation XVII. PASTORS' MOVING EXPENSES

As the Discipline grants the Annual Conference the right to "make such regulations as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the ministers and preachers," it is the judgment of this Conference that the charge to which a minister or preacher is assigned should pay the moving expenses of the incoming pastor. Provided, that this regulation shall apply only to appointments within the Maryland Conference District. It is expected that with men who have been "loaned" or who have been in special relation outside of the Maryland Conference area the agency served or the minister moving shall provide the moving cost.

#### Regulation XVIII. ELECTION OF DELEGATES

First. In Stations.

In stations the election of delegates shall be by the qualified members under the direction of the Stewards, and whose credentials must be signed by the chairman and secretary of the meeting. The pastor shall announce the time and place of such meeting at least one Sunday before it is held, but in no case shall he preside at the election of delegates.

Second. In Circuits.

In circuits a vote of the qualified members shall be taken by the

Stewards in each church on the charge, after due announcement by the pastor, for a delegate to the Annual Conference. The votes shall be brought in separate packages to the quarterly conference where they shall be counted. Anyone receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared the delegate-elect, but if no one receives a majority the quarterly conference shall proceed at once to the election of a delegate. When it is necessary for the quarterly conference to elect the delegate, someone other than the pastor shall preside during the election, and whose name, with the secretary of the quarterly conference, shall appear on the credentials of the delegate.

Third, in both stations and circuits, and also at the Quarterly Conference, all voting shall be by ballot, and the election must be held at least ten days before the session of the Annual Conference; provided however that in case both the delegate and the alternate are unable to attend the sessions of the Conference a special election may be held, and such election be construed as an adjourned session of the meeting which elected the original delegate.

Fourth. In all cases of the election of delegate some one other than the pastor shall preside and shall sign the certificate of election. The pastor's name attached to any certificate of election invalidates the same.

#### Regulation XIX. PLAN OF CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

#### A—Expense of Travel:

The transportation of ministers and delegates to and from the Annual Conference shall be placed upon a mileage basis of two (2) cents per mile. A special committee shall be raised annually to compute the mileage and report the same to the Conference Treasurer who shall pro-rate the Transportation Assessment and notify the charges accordingly through the pastors. The churches are expected to pay the same before a designated period prior to the sitting of the Conference. Pastors and delegates will receive a Treasurer's check for the round trip to their homes. Superannuates will have their expenses paid out of the Conference Funds.

#### B-Expense of Entertainment

- 1. Each charge shall be assessed an amount equal to one percent of the assessed salary for pastor. No man is eligible for entertainment unless his church has paid the apportionment.
- 2. All members of the Conference, including supplies (who are pastors), candidates for admission, superannuates, supernumeraries, those in special relation and the General Agents of the church, are eligible for entertainment.
- 3. No member of the Conference can make a claim on the Conference if he remains at his own home, or if he is entertained, without expense to himself, by relatives or friends.
- 4. In lieu of money for board, a member is permitted to charge his carfare to and from the seat of Conference as the case may be, excluding the first trip. Maximum amount allowed shall be \$2.00 per day. Members are not entitled to the maximum amount if their actual expenses are less.
- 5. All members of Conference who make their own arrangements to stop at hotels or boarding houses shall be entitled to the maximum amount of \$2.00 per day.

#### C-Cooperation

1. The Conference shall require that every charge shall cooperate in this plan, and the names of the charges which fail to cooperate shall be reported to the Conference.

### NUAL 181

#### Regulation XX. PLAN OF LEVY FOR THE BUDGET

- The Budget System in distribution is of three parts—
   a. The President's Salary, Traveling Expense and Parsonage Expenses.
  - b. Maryland Conference interests, to wit:—Incidental expenses of Conference, Superannuates, Church Extension, Our Church Home and Headquarters Building.
  - c. General Conference Interests, to wit:—The Board of Christian Education, the Board of Missions, the Board of Superannuates (for the General Church), the Children's Home (High Point, N. C.), the Aged People's Home (West Lafayette, Ohio), the American Bible Society, the Contingent Fund.
- 2. The Board of Finance shall ascertain
  - a. The average amount paid by each charge for all purposes, plus unpaid total assessments, after deducting the amounts overpaid on "Assessments," "Rental Value of Parsonage," "Building and Improvements," "Paid on Debt," "Interest on Debt," "Special Campaigns, either for the General or Maryland Conference," for each of the five years immediately preceding the current year and determine the percentage of the same necessary to provide for the total assessment on the district.
  - b. The total number of full members for the previous year, and determine the per capita necessary to provide the total assessment.
  - c. The division to be 40 per cent for membership and 60 per cent for financial ability.

For the amount levied for the above Budget, the percentage of distribution, and for the percentage that each interest shall receive under various Budgets, see Report of Board of Finance as printed in the Minutes of each Conference session.

#### Regulation XXII. ADMISSION TO THE ITINERANCY

- 1. Candidates for admission to the itineracy of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church should have a collegiate training, and must be graduates of the Westminster Theological Seminary, or a school of equal rank, except where experience and practice have demonstrated such unusual natural and spiritual graces as would justify, for such individual, the suspension of the foregoing regulation upon the recommendation of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders and the vote of the Conference.
- 2. The President of the Conference shall have authority to employ local preachers, preferably Seminary students, to supply charges where their services can be utilized.
- 3. The provision of the Discipline that itinerant preachers shall be eligible for ordination only after serving three years under the appointment of an Annual Conference, shall apply to all candidates after the 1935 Conference Session, exclusive of any time served while a student.

#### FORM OF BEQUEST AND ANNUITIES
